

Board Sets Tax Rate

In their recent meeting, the Santa Anna School Board approved a tax rate of 95 cents per \$100 assessed property valuation for the 1986-87 school year. Of that figure 81 cents will be used for the operation of the school district and 14 cents will go into debt service to pay bonded indebtedness.

There will be no encrease in the tax levy although the effective tax rate as calculated by the Coleman County Apprasial District has changed to compensate for decreasing property values due to loss of oil revenues. The Santa Anna ISD has felt a loss of 5 million in evaluation.

I did not believe the city acted in god faith, they did not announce the appointment of a dog catcher, nor did they say where citizens could claim their dogs, other than the city pound. As I stated there were no dogs ther. If you, the City, are not going to take the animals there, you should tell the citizens where to pick

City Receives

State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently sent checks totaling \$54.8 million in local sales tax to 1,022 cities that levy the one-percent city

Bullock said the 1986 payments to date were down .5 percent as compared to the payments to date in September of 1985. The decrease in August and September check amounts reflects a downturn in the Texas economy, he said.

Santa Anna's check totaled \$1,312.19, down 6.51 percent from last year's payment of \$2,096.98. Total payments to date equal

\$19,969.40 for the 1986 year. Houston's check for \$8.6 million was the largest, bringing total



San Antonio received \$3.4 million, pushing 1986 payments to \$42.7 million, up 2 percent over 1985. Austin's check for \$2.5 million brought total payments this year to \$31 million, a 3 percent decrease.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$25 million to the state's six Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's MTA payment of \$10.2 million brought 1966 totals to \$125.7 million. Dallas' DART check was for \$9.2 million, a total of \$119.6 million for 1966. Austin's Capitol Metro received a \$2.6 million check for a yearly total of \$31.7 million. VIA in San Antonio received \$1.8 million, increasing this year's payments to \$23.4 million. Fort Worth's MTA check for \$494,670 brought the city's total this year to \$6.2 million. Corpus Christi's MTA check was for \$473,622, bringing total payments for the year to \$4 million.

September checks represent taxes collected on sales made in July and reported to the Comptroller's Office by August 20.



Allen Bruce Hornell, member of the First United Methodist Church, Belton, Texas is the 1986 winner of the Central Texas Conferance Merit Scholarship awarded by the Board of Higher Educatin and Campus Ministry. He is the son of the Rev. and Mrs. J.W. sellers of Belton. He also is the son of the late Rev. A. Bruce Hornell, who was the United Methodist pastor at Trickham 1960-62, and the grandson of Mrs. Grady McIver of the Trickam Community and the great-grandson of Mrs. Keety Haynes of Santa Anna.

Allen was nominated for the BHEM award by the First United Methodist Church of Cleburne. At Cleburne High School, Allen excelled in both academics and sports. He was named by the faculty as one of five all around students, earned an academic sweater each of his four years in high school and graduated with a 4.7 average out of a possible 5.0. He participated in the National Honor Society, the Key Club, the Explorers, the Spanish Club, Youth and Government and is listed in the Who's Who in American High Schools, 1985-86. He was the Beta Club Senior Student of the Year and selected by his classmates as class favorite for five years.

In sports, Allen was a member of the football team his freshman and senior years and on the varsity basketball team three years. He was elected by the North Central Texas District of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes as the Athlete of the Year for 1985-86 and several other honors in athletics.

Allen was active in the United Methodist Youth Fellowship at Saint Mark United Methodist Church where his father, Rev. Sellers, was pastor until his appointment to the
