tation Commission approved a $\$ 3.6$ million investment to develop and implement an entirely automated
system. than 20 years old,", said Bob Lanier chairman of the highway commission. "Manual processing at the county level is duplicated at the
state level. It is time-consuming and costly to both the state and to county governments."
Currently, the department needs up to six weeks to issue vehicle
