# Lone Star Wagon Train Rides Thru Santa Anna


July 7 and will travel approximately another 1000 miles before ending their trip in Austin on November 30.


In talking to the leader of the wagon train, he stated that some of



## Plans Almost Complete

Plans for the 1986 Santa Anna Ex-Student Homecoming are well under way, with the event set for Friday and Saturday, October 24 and 25.

# Vehicle Registrati-System To Be Improved

More than \$14 million a year will be saved by the state and county governments in Texas when the highway department installs a new motor vehicle registration and title processing system.

At its September meeting, the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission approved a \$33.6 million investment to develop and implement an entirely automated system.

"Our exisiting system is more than 20 years old," said Bob Lanier, chairman of the highway commission. "Manual processing at the county level is duplicated at the state level. It is time-consuming and costly to both the state and to county governments."

Currently, the department needs up to six weeks to issue vehicle titles, Lanier said. The new system will be designed to record title changes instantly at the county level.

"We anticipate that counties around the state will save more than \$8 million the first year the system is in operation," Lanier said.

A study begun last January by the consulting firm of Coopers and Lybrand determined that the present system has both reliability problems and increasing operation costs, he said.

"With 14 million vehicles registered in the state today and an increase expected, the question is not 'if' we need a new system, but 'when,'' said Lanier. "By eliminating much of the time-lapse in processing registration and title fees, we're protecting about \$600 million of our state's highway revenues."

The new system, which will take about five years to design and implement, will place state equipment in each county's vehicle registration office, said Dian Neill, with the highway department's Division of Motor Vehicles in Austin.

"Some counties have independently automated their registration and title process," she said. "This will free their equipment and computer storage space for other uses, which is an added benefit to their initial savings."

"Registration clerks in each county will key vehicle information directly into the state system," Neill said. "Every county in the state will realize a savings in both time and equipment. Direct savings in processing time will average about 60 cents per registration."

"The net savings to the highway department will be about \$2.1 million for the first year," said Neill.

THE GREAT COMMISSION

John the Baptist, the great prophet and harbinger of Jesus, "was a man sent from God" and given a divine commission. His was a commission of preparation. He was sent to prepare the people for the coming of the Lord (Luke 1:13-17). John recognized the fact that his was a strictly limited commission (John 3:25-30). He fulfilled his ministry and commission during his life time, or when Jesus was "declared to be he Son of God with power, accorling to the Spirit of holiness, by the esurrection from the dead" Romans 1:4).

Very early during the personal ninistry of Jesus he chose the welve apostles and sent them out inder a strictly limited commission (Matthew 10:1-15). The burden of heir message was "the kingdom of neaven is at hand" (Ver. 7). A little ater in his ministry Jesus chose the 'seventy" and sent them out to oreach under the same type of imited commission (Luke 10:1-12). The burden of their message was 'The Kingdom of God is come nigh into vou" (Ver. 9 & 11).

But after the death, burial and esurrection of Jesus and just before nis ascension back to heaven he called the apostles unto him and gave hem what is known as THE GREAT COMMISSION. It is heaven born, plood bought, world wide and age asting. God is it author, Christ its executor and the Holy Spirit its evealor. It is to be preached to every creature in every nation in all he world and for all time. It is ecorded in Matthew 28:18-20; Mark 16:15-16 and Luke 24:46-47.

Do you want to think tall, plan, from doing something foolish. powerfully, dream big, and be somebody? Then prepare yourself for criticism.

· There is a formula for avoiding all criticism, would you like to know what it is? Here it is....

....believe nothing and no one cay say you were not believing right. ....do nothing and no one can say you did a wrong thing.

....expect nothing and no one can say you expected too much. ....plan nothing and no one can say

you should not plan that way. ....say nothing and no one can say

you said the wrong thing. ....support nothing and no one can say you supported the wrong team. ....think nothing and no one can ac-

cuse you of using your mind. Add to that the fear of failure and you will never have to fear criticism.

There are two kinds of people. People who are carpenters, those who build: and the Criticizers, the ones who tear down. The choice to build up or to tear down is our choice. If we choose to be a carpenter expect a criticizer to be just around the corner.

Oliver Wendell Holmes once said: "The human race is divided into two classes: those who go ahea and do something, and those who sit still and say, "Why wasn't it done the

other way?" Col. George Goethals had to live with criticism from busybodies back home. His critics predicted that the canal would never be built. An assistant once asked, "Aren't you going to answer your critics?" "In time," replied Goethals. "How?" the assistant asked. The great engineer of the

Panama Canal smiled and answered "with the canal." There are some definite steps we can take when we are criticized. The first thing we can do is to congratulate ourselves. For if you are criticized you have either done

something worthwhile or refrained

It doesn't make any difference what you or I try to do, sometimes we will get the ax of criticism. sometimes it is justi; fied but most imes it is not.

Your "So You Know Texas" feature of August 27 states that Santa Anna, Texas, was named not afater the Mexican general but after Saint Anne.

My father taught school at Santa Anna in 1888-90. Santa Anna was a new postoffice at that time and locally there was quite a bit of talk about 'Santa Anna." The talk that my father heard was that the local request was that the postoffice be named Satanta, afater a little known Indian chief who had been contacted in battle or in his camp north of one of the hills called Santa Anna Mountains and at one time he went through the pass between the mountains just east of the town of Santa Anna. Satanta was the name requested,

but "thanks" to someone in the Postoffice Department "Santa Anna" went on record. Don't blame Texas for this. I would like to see this version printed as I feel sure that it is the real version. Santa Anna was a young town in 1888-90. Bennett R. King


