# 4-H Week Is Oct. 5-13

Coleman County 4-H members are geared up for the week of October 5-13, National 4-H Week.

Coleman County boasts some 200 4-H members who are among more than 4.3 million young people across the country who will participate in the week-long celebration using the theme, "4-H For Youth, For American."

"In celebrating National 4-H Week, we recognize that 4-H is truly a people development program." says Barry Cooper, County 4-H Program Coordinator with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the parent organization of 4-H. "4-H helps young people develop skills that will be useful in the real world. It helps them discover their strengths and weaknesses. It exposes them to activities in a variety of career fields. And, most importantly, 4-Her's learn and have fun

doing it. And families can add to the fun by learning and growing together," adds Cooper.

"Learning doesn't stop with the 4-H member and family. Volunteer leaders learn new skills while sharing their expertise with young people," notes Cooper. "Through a network of volunteer leaders, state land-grant universities, state and local governments and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, 4-H has been able to stimulate youth to develop life skills."

Some 75 adult leaders work with 4-H boys and girls in Coleman County through six different 4-H clubs. 4-Her's can choose from some 70


different project and program areas designed to help them prepare for the future, adds Cooper.

# **Another Refund To Gustomers**

A continuing price decline in the natural gas market means another refund to West Texas Utilities Co.'s retail customers in December.

WTU officials announced last Thursday that a request was being filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for permission to refund a total of \$6.9 million in retail revenues collected in excess of actual fuel costs, and to lower its fuel charge rate for the months of December 1986 through April 1987. The total includes \$6,740,467 in actual fuel cost savings accumulated in July and August, plus \$149,003 in interest.

Under WTU's proposal, all existing retail customers would receive refunds through one-time credits to their bills in December, A typical residentail customer would receive about \$17.

The fuel rate-known as the "fixed fuel factor"-is approved by the PUC. When the actual cost of fuel is below the approved rate, the overrecovery is returned to the customers, with interest.

WTU's base rates have not changed since December 1984. Company officials have indicated that a rate increase likely will be necessary next year after the new coal-fired Oklaunion Power Station near Vernon is completed and place in service. The assured supply of coal under a long-term contract is expected to stabilize WTU's power plant fuel costs and to partially offset the necessary base rate increase. SOME QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

> Q-How will refunds be calculated and made? A-WTU will comply with the refund provisions of the Commission's fuel rule. The total refund will be allocated to each rate schedule based upon that schedule's kilowatthour usage for the period in which the over-recovery occured. There are twenty-three (23) rate schedule classes. Except for the municipal pipeline, cotton gin and large irrigation classes, once the refund is allocated to each rate schedule (class) the refund amount is divided by the projected kilowatt-hour usage for that class during the month of refund to develop a refund factor which will be applied to individual customer's usage billed in the refund month. For the municipal pipeline, cotton gin and large irrigation classes the refund will be a lump sum credit based on their historical usage during the period during which the over-recovery occurred. This complies with the PUC's rule.

A-The PUC requires utilities to use fixed fuel cost factors, which specify the amount to be charged for fuel per kilowatt-hour used by the customer. Because the factors are based on the expected cost of fuel as forecast at the time the factors are set, actual fuel costs probably will turn out to be more or less than the amount of revenue recovered through the fixed fuel cost factors. IN WTU's last fuel case fixed fuel factors were set, but, for the past several months, WTU has spent less on fuel than was anticipated with the result that another over-recovery

has accumulated. This reduced fuel cost is due to the declining gas market, WTU's continued efforts to take advantage of this gas market and the favorable renegotiation of one of WTU's current gas contracts.





# Holiday **Mailing Rates**

For those with relatives in the armed services stationed overseas, and those who wish to mail holiday greetings and packages to others living in foreign countries, now is the time to plan for holiday mailings, according to San Antonio Division General Manager and Postmaster Joseph G. Schraer.

Parcels sent to friends and relatives in North, Northwest, West and Southeast Africa; Australia: and Southeast Asia by international Mail should be mailed by October 3 if shipped by surface mail, the least expensive form of shipment.

Parcels sent to relatives in the armed services in Australia, Far East, and South and East Asia should be mailed by October 17 if shipped by surface mail.

November is the month when most parcels shipped via Parcel Airlift Mail (PAL) should be sent. PAL packages are airlifted domestically to a gateway facility, then airlifted on a space avaiable basis from the gateway to the APO (Army or Air Force Post Office).

Packages up to 30 pounds and 60 inches in combined length and girth may be sent by PAL. Mailers pay the regular Parcel Post Rate to the U.S. exit port or from the port of entry plus a fee for air service. The air service fee is 30 cents for parcels weighing two pounds or less, 60 cents for 2-3 pounds, 90 cents for 3-4 pounds, and \$1.20 for 4-30 pounds.

November mailers can also ship military parcels by Space Available Mail (SAM). Items shipped by SAM are transported by surface means in the contigious 48 states and flown on a space available basis from the U.S. to the overseas destination or from the overseas destination to the U.S. Packages up to 15 pounds and 60 inches in combined length and girth may be sent by SAM for regular Parcel Post Rates to the U.S. exit port or from the U.S. port of entry.

# Insurance

GEORGETOWN-October 31 ends the 1986 year insurance period for Barley, Oats, and Wheat grown in Coleman, Texas and insured by the **Federal Crop Insurance Corporation** (FCIC) according to Ardell Kalmbach, a representative for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

'Under the terms of the policy, any acreage on which harvest will not be completed must be left intact until an inspection is made. Any claim for indemnity may be rejected if these loss reporting requirements are not met," Kalmbach stated.

"Any notice of loss must be given promptly after the total destruction of the unit, completion of harvest, or October 31, whichever occurs earlier." according to Kalmbach. The producer who anticipates a claim should notify his or her group insurance representative immediately.
