Coleman County Jr. Rodeo August 7, 8, & 9

The 30th Annual Coleman County Junior Rodeo will be held on August 7, 8, and 9, 1986 at the Coleman Rodeo Grounds. Runt Sloan of Newcastle, Texas will produce this years rodeo with nightly performances at 8:00 p.m.

The 1986 Rodeo Queen is Leigh Ann Alexander, 15 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Alexander, of Talpa, Texas. She will be featured nightly at the rodeo as well as in the downtown parade in Coleman on Saturday, August 9th at 5:00 p.m. Saturday's parade will feature all entries in the float division, riding clubs, and decorated cars, along with any other riders. All divisions

will be judged and awarded prizes.

The highlight of this years rodeo is two Longhorn trophy saddles to be given to the High Point Boy and the High Point Girl. Trophy buckles will be given to all first places and trophies to second and third places.

All events will be jackpot in the three age divisions of 12 and under, 13-15, and 16-19. Admission charges for this years rodeo are 5 and under-free, 6-12-\$1.00; and 13 and over-\$2.00. Proceeds from the rodeo this year will go toward scholarships in the amount of \$800.00 awarded to Coleman County Seniors who are active in the Coleman County Junior Rodeo Association.

The Southern Cross Band of Coleman, Texas will play for the dance at the open air pavilion each night from 9:00 p.m. to 1:00 a.m. Admission charges will be \$3.00 each or \$5.00 per couple.

May 1986 Savings Bonds In Texas Up Almost 52 Percent

Sales of Series EE Savings Bonds in Texas during the month of May 1986 were \$45,825,627, up 51.7 percent over May 1985, T. J. Morrow, District Director for U.S. Savings Bonds Division, announced recently. This amount brings the total sales in Texas since January 1986 to \$174,413,964, an increase of \$34,170,083 over the same period in 1985, for 47.4 percent of the state's assigned dollar goal of \$370 million.

Sales of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$10,163 during May 1986 in Coleman County, Larry D. Willard, Volunteer County Chairman, announced. Total sales in the County during the period January-May 1986 were \$58,359, which represents 78.8 percent of the County's 1986 assigned dollar goal.

Nationally, May 1986 sales continued an upward trend, with sales of \$849 million, a 79 percent increase over May 1985. Total sales for 1986 totaled \$3,281 million for 61.9 percent of its 1986 dollar goal of \$5,300 million. May 1986 sales were also the highest for any month since December 1985 and the highest May since 1945. Savings Bonds held by the American public reached \$83.06 billion, an all-time record.

Current issues of Series EE Bonds held at least five years earn the average of semiannual market-based rates in effect while they are held, or the current minimum guaranteed rate of 7.5 percent, if the average falls below the mark. Semiannual market-based rates change each; May 1 and November 1. The rate for May 1 through October 31, 1986 is 7.02 percent, bringing the average rate for the 8 periods since the market-based variable rate program started in November 1, 1982, to 9.36 percent. Bonds held less than five years earn interest on a fixed, graduated scale.

Information on rates, including the new semiannual rates when they are announced, can be obtained by calling toll-free-1-800-US BONDS.

Paul: A Changed Man

His name means little, but for those who have read of Paul, Paul was anything but little. Paul did everything in a big way. Before he came to know Jesus he described himself as "chiefest of sinners". After he knew Jesus he is saying "for me to die is gain".

Paul's body size and appearance may have been against him. From a second century historian we read these words "He was a man of little stature, partly bald, with crooked legs, with eyes close together."

Paul's preaching and writing are known the world over. Of the twenty-seven books of the New Testament, Paul wrote fourteen. Robert Speer a noted biographer of Paul, wrote "His religious intensity, his originality, freshness and depth of thought and his intellectual boldness and strength show a heart enlarged by the grace of Christ".

Paul was a changed man. From a persecutor to a preacher, from a mad man with the intent to wipe out Christianity to a missionary with the

intent to let all the world know. From a person with all things going for him, to a man who counted all things loss except to serve Christ.

Saul was his Jewish name, after the first king of Israel, for Paul was of the tribe of Benjamin. Paul was his Roman name for he was a Roman citizen. After his conversion he always calls himself Paul. Even his name changed.

Paul was born in Tarsus, learned tentmaking for a trade. We know he was educated under Gamaliel a noted scholar. He may have attended the University of Tarsus.

Paul was a Hellinist Jew. He was reared in Tarsus as a Pharisee and became a loyal follower of that sect opposed to the Sanhadrian.

Paul had it all together. He came from a good family. He was well educated, he had a trade, he was religious and he was smart. In other words he had it all together!

He also had a self appointed mission. This mission was to rid the country of people of "the way." For you see the word "Christian" was not used till after Antioch some years later. Paul was at the stoning of Stephen. Paul never did forget the

way this man of God died.

But one day of the road to Damascus, something happened! This man who had it all was brought to his knees by the power of God. This man knew it all was blinded by the light of God. This man was changed.

What changed Paul? I believe three things effected this change.

Number One: Paul encountered Jesus Christ. After this, Paul was never the same. After Jesus Paul was completely different.

Number Two: Paul surrendered to Jesus. Paul was no longer in control. Jesus Christ became the boss of his life. Paul said "it is all in vain except to know Jesus."

Number Three: Paul walked with Jesus. Paul gave up his old life, but exchanged it for a new and glorious one. Paul said "Forget the past, and press on." This man who had it all, gave it all up, but received more than he gave.

The same is true today. Jesus Christ can still change men.

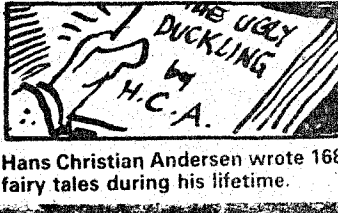
Plans were made to sponsor a program for Fire Prevention Week at school the first or second week in October.

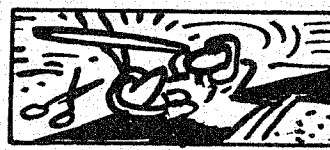

District 7, 4-H Record Book judging was held Tuesday, July 29, in Sterling City. Seven 4-H members from Coleman County participated in the competition.

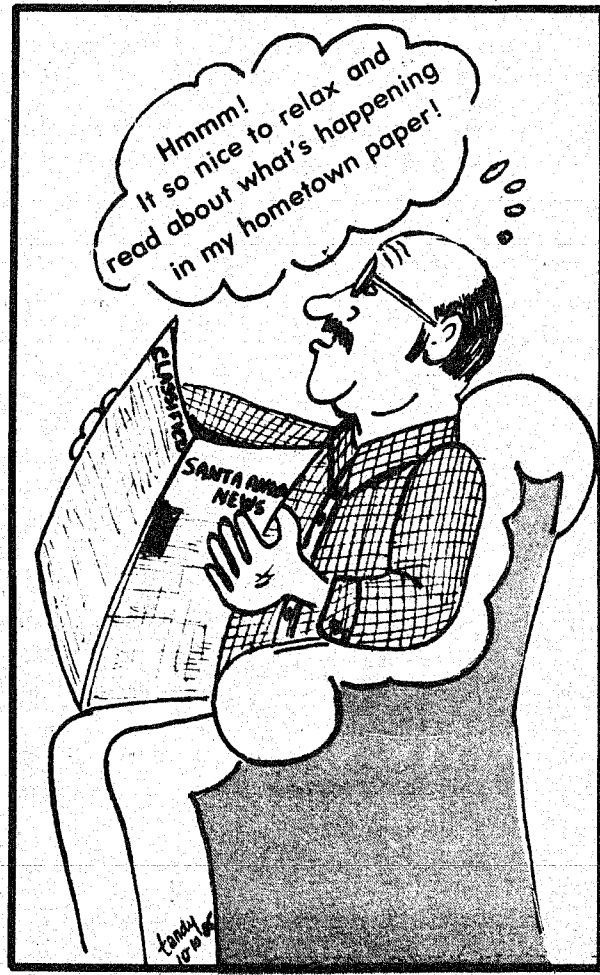

They are printed on parchment paper and are suitable for framing.

Department on Aging spokesman Allen Baca said the TDoA promotion is gradually improving the public's awareness of National Grandparent's Day. "It's a pretty new holiday," observed Baca. "It was signed into effect in 1978 by President Carter. This is the second straight year we've offered the free certificates and we're giving them away by the tens of thousands. People seem to respond well to the idea."
