

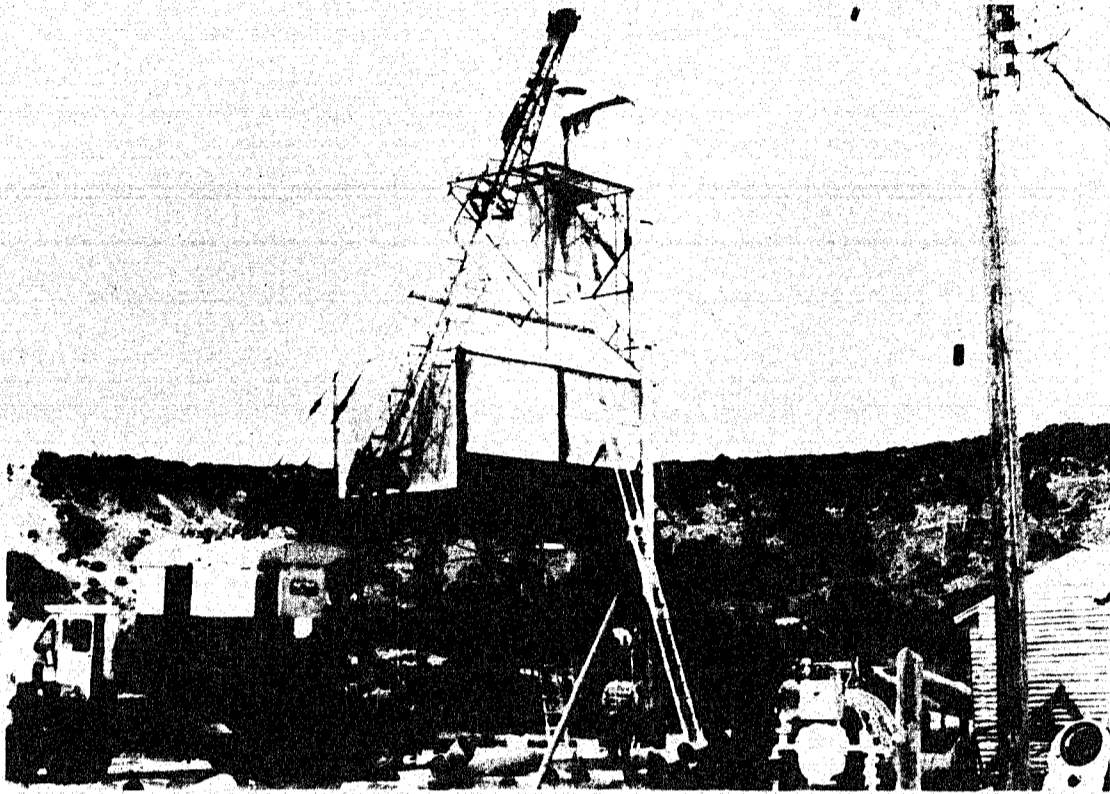

Council Meets

The Santa Anna City Council met on Thursday evening, November 6 at 7:00 p.m. with all members present. Minutes of last month's meeting were read and approved.

First on the agenda was the Bulldog Corp., but they were unable to attend. The council discussed the tank support beam and decided to appoint a committee to contact individuals and see if they would like to do the work on the support beam for the city.

Mr. David Huggins, with the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department, was then introduced. He asked the council if the Fire Department could build a little four room building on a piece of City property (the old dog pound, sanitation dump ground) to help train fire fighters. Councilman Stanley Hartman made a motion we let the Fire Department use Block 16 of King and Gilbough Survey; Councilman Jim Spillman seconded; motion unanimously carried. Also Mr.

Huggins wanted to inform the council of the condition of the 2nd floor of City Hall that being that it had lots of cracks in the walls and along the ceilings. Council asked Mr. Rusty Wells to get a certified building inspector to come and inspect City Hall as soon as possible.

Building Codes was next brought into discussion. The Building Codes for Santa Anna had been located and the council asked to study these ordinances until next month's meeting and then decide about the.

Mr. Gary Fleeman was then introduced to the council. He propositioned the council asking if they would consider matching him load for load of dirt on the street to his house. The Council asked Mr. Fleeman if he would return to the next meeting and it would be placed on the agenda.

The Accounts Payable were discussed and approved to be paid in the usual manner.

Wet/Dry Election For Santa Anna

In session Monday, the Coleman County Commissioners Court set a local option wet/dry election for Santa Anna on December 6. A legally certified petition with 124 signatures was presented to the court.

The election will be on the question of legal sale of all alcoholic

beverages for off-premise consumption only. The area involved in the election includes all within the city limits.

The Court handled much routine business, such as approving bills, canvassing the election returns. Marty Baker was appointed a new deputy sheriff.

Details On Phase 5 Public Meet Listed

Farmers Home Administration has given conditional approval of the loan and grant for construction of the Phase 5 water system. In order to receive final approval of the funding, the Corporation must meet several conditions. The Corporation must obtain the required right-of-way easements on "new FmHA" easement forms. Also, all proposed water service customers must sign a service agreement and their location must be identified on the plans.

A meeting of all Phase 5 landowners and prospective water customers shall be held on Thursday, November 20, 1986, at the

Graves Gym, 600 West Pecan in Coleman, Texas. The meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. The primary purpose of the meeting is to identify and locate all Phase 5 landowners-water customers and to obtain the required right-of-way easements-service agreements.

Each landowner is asked to bring a copy of his property deed for each tract so that the number of acres and the deed recording volume and page can be placed on each easement. Also, any lienholders must be identified on the easement, and both the husband and wife must be available to sign the easement for all community property.

New membership applications will be received for service feasibility determination. A membership fee of \$200.00 per meter is required (if not already paid) along with a signed service agreement. If you are unable to attend this meeting, you may go to Gregg Abstract in Coleman to sign an easement and service agreement prior to the meeting.

City Receives Check

AUSTIN--State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently sent checks totaling \$104.6 million in local sales tax to 1,033 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said 1986 payments to date were down 1.7 percent as compared to the payments to date in November of last year.

Santa Anna's check was for \$3,249.71 bringing total payments in 1986 to \$24,355.20, down 8.78 percent from last year.

Houston's check was the largest--\$16.1 million--bringing total payments in 1986 to \$132.9 million, down 5 percent from last year. Dallas' payment was \$12.7 million for a 1986 total of \$89.2 million, a 5

San Antonio's payment of \$6.8 million pushed payments for 1986 to \$53 million, up .5 percent. Austin's check for \$4.8 million brought total payments this year to \$39.2 million, a 5 percent decrease from 1985.

Fort Worth received \$4.1 million for a total of \$32.5 million in 1986, up 2 percent. El Paso's payment of \$2.5 million brought its total to \$21 million, a 7 percent increase from 1985.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$48.7 million to the state's six Metropolitan Transit Authorities.

Houston's MTA payment of \$19.3 million pushed 1986 payments to \$155 million. Dallas' DART payment of \$18.6 million brought its total to \$148

million this year. Austin's Capitol Metro received \$5 million, increasing this year's payments to \$39.5 million. VIA in San Antonio received a check for \$3.8 million, a total of \$29.1 million for 1986. Fort Worth's MTA received \$971,655, for a \$7.7 million total this year. Corpus Christi's MTA check for \$837,815 brought total payments this year to \$6.4 million.

November checks represent taxes collected on sales made in September and reported to the Comptroller by October 26.

Jay Moseley, of Ft. Worth, Texas, was awarded a Certificate in Data Processing (CDP) from the Institute for Certification of Computer Professionals (ICCP) for successfully completing the 1986 examination. The ICCP semi-annually administers the examination in more than 160 controlled testing centers at colleges and universities across the United States, Canada and throughout the world.

Jay Moseley, a Programmer-Analyst for the City of Ft. Worth, was one of 949 successful candidates out of 2,289 who took this year's examination. A total of 40,000 certificates have been awarded since the first examination was given in 1962.

The ICCP is a nonprofit organization comprised of fourteen computer societies for the purpose of testing and certifying knowledge and skills of computer personnel. The examination establishes a method for recognizing a corps of individuals who have the knowledge considered important to data processing and information systems management. The examination helps lay a foundation for the continued growth of the information processing field and for the personnel within the field seeking to attain a position of leadership.

Living With...Hope

As I look out a picture window here at Southwestern's library the day is cold and grey. There seems to be a stillness awaiting an even colder and more grey day. It is like the sun has hidden itself behind the clouds.

Sometimes our world is like the cold grey day, the sunshine of life has been hidden behind the cloud of despair.

Last Monday night at the Monday night Bible study I conduct, it seemed the sunshine had hidden itself from one lady in particular. For her privacy I will not reveal her name but before the group she confessed as having lung cancer.

The emotions were high as she told of her illness. There were two emotions struggling deep within my soul. One was a crying out "Why God, does there have to be such a thing as cancer?" The other was an emotion of thanks even in this for the hope she has.

Oliver Goldsmith in the poem "The Captivity" says so much about hope:

"Hope, like the gleaming tapers light, adorns and cheers our way. And still as darker grows the night, emits a brighter ray."

There was once a Michigan farmer who had his minister over for lunch. The minister sat on the porch after lunch and looked at a countryside which had been recently destroyed by fire. He commented that scrub brush was now growing on the hillside and he thought it was not to attractive. The farmer agreed with his minister, but he said the brush was the only thing holding the ground together and indeed his whole world.

Sometimes we have to hold on to the "scrub brush" called hope. But

just as the farmer said, it is sometimes the only thing that holds it all together.

For life to be full and have purpose we must have hope. Now, hope is not necessarily naive day dreams but the hope of glory that is born of God and moves us beyond cynicism and despair into the joy of being one of God's children.

The ancient character Job reached out of his despair over human frailty with a cry of hope. In Chapter 14:7 he says "for there is hope for the tree, if it is cut down it will sprout again, and the roots will not cease."

We can experience the hope of glory as we live fully in the present knowing that the future is secure in the Lord. Matthew recorded that the angel told the two Marys not to be afraid, for Jesus had risen just as he said he would. They went to the tomb hopeless and in despair, they came away with joy simply because Jesus had done just what He said He would do.

There are two main ropes to hold on to in life. One is faith and the other is hope. Faith links us to God. Hope enables faith to be open. Hope is the expectation of those things promised to us by faith. Faith believes God to be true. Hope awaits that time when this truth is fully revealed. Faith is the basis for hope and hope sustains faith.

Because of our faith and hope in Christ we can endure the trials and tribulations of this life. Though they be not fair or justified, we can endure. Our hope is based on our entrusting ourselves to God believing fully in His ultimate power and control. Think about it: Christian hope is that which gives continuity to our past, shape to our future and direction to our present.

STUDENT DRUG AND ALCOHOL ABUSE

While many schools now offer anti-drug and alcohol programs, there are still a number of things parents can do to help protect their children from such substances. One way is to support drug education in all classes, beginning in the elementary grades.

Another idea, also supported by the National Education Association, is for parents to ask schools to impose stiff and fairly enforced penalties for use, possession or distribution of drugs by students at all grade levels. At the other end, parents can recommend students get factual information on drugs' dangerous physical and emotional effects.

Parents can work with school systems, parent groups and other community agencies to provide activities for students of all ages to make the most constructive use of their free time.

When you get down to it, you can make an economical cleaner for your floors if you add two gallons of warm water, half a cup of borax, half a teaspoon of dishwashing liquid and a tablespoon of ammonia.

You don't have to pussyfoot around the problem of cat litter odor if you thoroughly blend six parts litter mix with one part 20 Mule Team Borax and pour it into the litter box. It can double the time you can go without changing the litter box and when you do throw the mixture away, it can help control odors in the garbage container.

Don't let spills floor you. You may be able to clean them off your carpets before they cause stains if you dampen the spot with water and then sprinkle a bit of borax over it. Rub the borax into the area and let dry. Brush or vacuum to remove the dry borax.

VA News

Q-I am a member of the Selective Reserve. Does the Selective Reserve G.I. Bill allow me to pursue my high school equivalency diploma?

A-No. Educational assistance under the Selective Reserve G.I. Bill is not available for elementary or high school training, deficiency or remedial courses, apprenticeships, on-the-job training, cooperative courses, farm cooperative courses, flight training, correspondence courses and graduate or post-graduate training.

Q-May a veteran with peacetime service only be buried in a national cemetery?

A-Yes, providing the service was under conditions other than dishonorable.

Q-I have a Loan Guaranty Certificate of Eligibility which was issued to me by the VA over 15 years ago. Can I still use it?

A-Yes. Certificates of Eligibility do not expire and are good for the maximum loan guaranty currently available.

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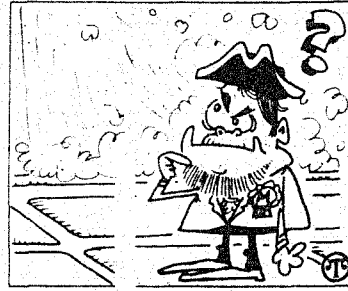
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TIME-SAVING TIPS

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stalls and under shower doors, or grout around sinks or tubs, use an instant mildew stain remover, such as Tilex. Spray it on and mildew stains should begin to disappear on contact. Wait until stains disappear (about 4 minutes), and rinse thoroughly.

If your bathroom is windowless be sure your exhaust fan really does push air up and out. During very hot weather, consider using a fan to blow steam air out of the bathroom when it's unoccupied.
