

ISD Board Reviews Audit



Coming Home Queen Coming Home King Ex-Student Of the Year



The Ex-Student of the Year for 1986 is Raeford Evans, a graduate of the class of 1936. Mr. Evans was born to Coleman County pioneers, near the community of Shields, on August 20, 1919.

Mr. Evans attended grades 1-8 at Shields Public School and grades 9-11 at SAHS, graduating in 1936. He continued his education at Texas A&M, receiving a Bachelor of Science degree in Agriculture in 1941. At the University of Wyoming, he received his Master of Science degree in Agronomy in 1963 and his PhD in 1969.

Mr. Evans was married to Jeri Foster, a native of Erath County, in Snyder, Texas in 1942. They have two sons, one daughter and seven grandchildren. Two of his sisters, Mrs. O. E. Shelton and Mrs. C. A. Scarborough, are still Coleman County residents.

Mr. Evans began his professional career in 1941 as a research agronomist at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station near Lubbock. He returned to Coleman County in 1945, where he spent nine years as a farmer and rancher. In 1955 he went to Tarleton State University where he became the manager of their livestock and dairy farm. He began his teaching career in 1959 as Instructor in the Agronomy Department at Tarleton State. He also served as faculty

sponsor for the TSU Rodeo Club and other student organizations. In 1981, Mr. Evans retired from Tarleton after 27 years of teaching in the Agriculture Department. He retired with the Academic rank of Professor, a rank which he held for ten years. After his retirement, Mr. Evans served as Sr. Lecturer at a developing School of Agriculture in Nigeria, West Africa. From 1982 to the present, he is employed as a lecturer on a part-time basis at Tarleton.

Mr. Evans also has an impressive list of professional and community involvements. He is a member of American Society of Agronomy, Gamma Sigma Delta National Honor Society, Sigma Xi Research in Science, American Society of Soil and Water Conservation, Texas Association of College Teachers, Leon-Bosque Resource Conservation and Development Committee, a mason and member of Scottish Rite. He is an acative deacon in the Baptist Church, and a member of Gideons International. He has also served as a member of the United Way Committee and the Kiwanis Service Club.

tion (NMSC). Studetns are chosen because of their high scores on the PSAT-NMSQT. The qualifying score to become a semifinalist in Louisiana is at least 186. The scores differ from state to state and may change from year to year, according to the percentage of students who take the test and the level of their test performance.

To become a finalist additional requirements specified by the NMSC must be fulfilled. These include subnitting the completed semifinalist application by Oct. 14, taking the SAT on or before Nov. 1, and plannng to enter (no later than the fall of 1987) an accredited college or miversity in the U.S.

3. Shave hold cake of lie soap in bilin water.

4. Sort things makin' three piles. One pile white close; one pile colored and one pile work britches and rags.

5. Stir flour in cold water to smoothe, then thin down with bilin water from tea kettle on kitchen stove, for

6. Rub dirty spots on rub-board, scrub hard then put in pot and bile. Rub colored on board, don't bile, just rench and starch. Wring water out by twistin and squeezin.

7. Take white things out of pot with broom handle or stick, after punching 'em a while. Put bluin in rench water, rench and starch.

8. Hang britches and old rags on fence. Spread tea towels on grass, sheets and pillow cases on line stretched between trees.

9. Pour rench water on flower beds. 10. Scrub poarch with hot soapy water.

11. Turn tubs upside down.

12. Go put on clean dress. Brew cup of tea. Rest and rock a while and count yer blessin's.
