

Bonfire Yields Masons In

The Homecoming bonfire was big and beautiful on Thursday night of last week, but yielded a surprise when explosions started occuring

within the fire. Upon investigation on Thursday morning after the fire had completely died down, it was determined that the explosions had been from

military type ammunitions. Captain Larry Rutherford of the National Guard in Brownwood headed up the investigation and is seeking the assistance of other agencies as well as civilian law enforcement officers in solving the case. Helping with the investigation will be the FBI and the CID (Central Investigation Division) of the Army. A Texas Ranger stationed in Brownwood has also been consulted in the affair.

Since this is the second incident in less than a year in Santa Anna involving military type ammo, the problem is considered to be quite serious. The other incident occured earlier in the year when a young boy was injured while playing with a military explosive. Captain Rutherford is looking at the possibility of the two incidents being related in that the ammunition may have come from the same source.

The ammo is a type that is commonly found at military installations and used for training excercises. It is not accessable on the civilian

Rutherford asks that snyone having knowlege of meth assessmittion in

the area, please contact him or other law officials

He also asked parents talk to their youth about the seriousness of the matter. The incident at the bonfire could have been tragic if some youngster's eyes were blinded by flying shrapnel or even worse.

Captain Rutherford states that he and the other investigating personel are committed and determined to get to the source of this problem and will leave no stone unturned in doing

FRUITS OF THE SPIRIT

The Apostle Paul in writing to the Galatian Christians (Gal. 5:22-23) wrote these encouraging words, "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, long suffering, gentleness (or kindness), goodness, faith (or faithfulness), meekness, temperance: against such there is no law." A person who bear these fruits will find no law in the Word of God interfering with the production

You will notice that the fruit of the Spirit is in the singular number. We can find in the Apostle's words nine modes of expression; nine manifestations by means of which we may identify the source. The Apostle uses the word "Spirit" here, as denoting that these things do not flow from our own nature but are the product of a foreign influence-the agency of the Holy Spirit.

of these fruits.

Note that the first three seem to have reference to God (love, joy and peace). These concern our relation to God. Our love to and for God. Joy and peace relates to the assurance of our pardon and our reconcilation with our Father.

The next three (long suffering, gentleness and goodness) seem to represent our relation to our fellowman. The next three (faith or fidelity, meekness and temperance seem to have spicial reference to ourselves.

Let us consider the first, THE FRUIT OF LOVE. Does your spiritual life produce this fruit. The first and greatest commandment: "Thou shall love the Lord Thy God with all they heart, with all they soul, with all they mind, with all they strength; and they neighbour as thyself.'

It is so easy to look around us and see the lack of charity, LOVE, in others, but may the Holy Spirit help us to search our own hearts.

I can recall a lady who came to her

Pastor and seemed to very concerned about her sister who was in a lost condition. And she asked her Pastor if he would please call on her. The minister said, "In the morning my wife and I will drive to your house, pick you up and we will call on your sister." "Oh, No!" she said, "don't do that. We don't speak to each other." No wonder her testimony amounted to so little. Had she tried to give a testimony for Christ it would have been as sounding brass and a tinkling cymbal because the fruit of love was missing. I once ministered to a church where a brother and his sister would sit on the same pew, partake of the Communion, a service standing for love and sacrifice, yet they didn't speak to each other.

If you are a fruit-bearing Christian, you will love the unlovely as well as the lovely, love the outcast as well as the high caste.

If you lack a freshness in your spiritual life, if ; you feel that the fruit of the Spirit has become "dried fruit" because of neglect or compromise, if you have lost your first love, remember Jesus said, "I have somewhat against thee, because thou hast left thy first love. Remember therefore from whence thou art fallen, and repent, and do your first work." The answer is very simple. Repent and confess every known sin in your heart and life and give the Holy Spirit a chance to come into your heart and life.

was later made Postmaster General of England. He had purpose and stuck to that dream.

Paul talked a lot about goals. In Philippians 3:13-15 RSV He states "Forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press towards the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus."

In his little book"from Here to Maturity," John A. Ishee describes ambition or purpose as "Charting." He gives an illustration from Arthur Miller's "Death of a Salesman," He is only a little boat looking for a harbor," such was the description of Wille Loman.

So often the lack of purpose can cause us to lose the joy of living. Purpose is that intangible that enables a person to find meaning in life. Purpose gives us that unifying power. Purpose gives to us achievement goals and efforts. Purpose is found as we find goals for our lives. Milton Mayeroff in his book "On Caring," states "No one else can give meaning to my life; it is something I alone must make. The meaning is not something predetermined which simply unfolds; I help both to create it and

discover it. And this is a continuing process not a once for all." We must ask ourselves the questions: Are we hacking away at a log not knowing what we are building? Are we just chiseling? Or does our life have a purpose and a goal to strive towards?

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Halloween Time For Fun & Safety

Halloween is a time of fun and children, and go with them. Set a freat excitement for youngsters of all ages. Unfortunately, each year, it results in injury and, ocassionally, death for some. Captain G. J. Matthews, Commander of the Texas Highway Patrol for the Abilene District of the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "If parents will do some planning and closely supervise their children's activities on Halloween night, many of these injuries could be avoided.

'First, the trick or treaters should be dressed in white or light-colored clothing. Don't put a child out on the streets in a black or dark-colored costume unless it has reflective tape on it. The children should be instructed not to sample any of the candy until they return home. The treats should be carefully inspected to insure, as best as you can, that it is safe to eat. If you have any doubts about any of it, it should be discarded. Wash all fruit and slice it into small sections to insure nothing has been embedded into it."

Captain Matthews strongly urged parents to remind their children of all pedestrian safety rules they should observe while trick or treating and to furnish them a flashlight to use. He also suggested to use facial makeup instead of having them wear a mask since a mask severely reduces their ability to see.

He suggested to go only to homes where the porch light is on and where you, as parents, know they are welcome. "If we confine a child's trick or treating activity to our own neighborhood, where we know the residents, we would know the treats are safe."

"Driver's have a special problem on Halloween night, also," Captain Matthew said. "They have to be alert for trick or treaters and remember, in a child's excitement, they are likely to forget to look before crossing streets. If drivers would drive as if their child was out trick or treating, we could avoid the vehicle-pedestrian accidents on Halloween.

Some other Halloween safety tips include:

+Prevent fires by using small flashlights--not candles--to light jack-o-lanterns.

+Do your trick-or-treating before dark, especially if you have young curfew for older children and enforce it.

+Remind children to use sidewalks rather than cutting through yards and vacant lots to prevent tripping over objects.

+Give each child a flashlight and remind them not to shine them into anyone's eyes, especially a driver's. +If your child gets sick, try to find out exactly what he or she ate and where it came from. Call your doctor immediately or contact the Poison Control Center at Scott and White (817)774-2005.
