Halloween Time For Fun \& Safety

Halloween is a time of fun and freat excitement for youngsters of
all ages. Unfortunately, each year it results in injury and, ocassionally,
death for some, Captain G. I Mat death for some Captain G. J. Mat thews, Commander of the Texas Highway Patrol for the Abilene District of the Texas Department of
Public Safety said, "If parents will do some planning and closely supervise their children's activities on Halloween night, many of these in-
juries could be avoided. juries could be avoide.
First, the trick or treaters should clothing. Don't put a child out on the streets in a black or dark-colored
costume unless it has reflective to costume unless it has reflective tape
on it. The children should structed not to sample any of the candy until they return home. The treats should be carefully inspected to insure, as best as you can, that it is safe to eat. If you have any doubts
about any of it, it should be discardabout any of it, t should be discard-
ed. Wash all fruit and slice it into small sections to insure nothing has been embedded into it." Captain Matthews strongly urged parents to remind their children of
all pedestrian safety rulde all pedestrian safety rules they
should observe while trick or treating and to furnish them a flashlight to use. He also suggested to use facial makeup instead of having them wear a mask since a mask
severely reduces their ability to see. He suggested to go only to homes where the porch light is on and where you, as parents, know they are welcome, "If we confine a
child's trick or treating activity to child's trick or treating activity to our own neighborhood, where we
know the residents, we would know the treats are safe."
"Driver's have a special problem on Halloween night, also," Captain
Matthew said. "They have to be Matthew said. They have to be
alert for trick or treaters and remember, in a child's excitement, they are likely to forget to look before crossing streets. If drivers
would drive as if their child was would drive as in heir child was out
trick or treating, we could avoid the vehicle-pedestrian accidents on Halloween.
Some other Halloween safety tips include:

+ Preven + Prevent fires by using small lashhights-not candles-to light + Do your trick-or-treating before
dark, especially if you have young
