

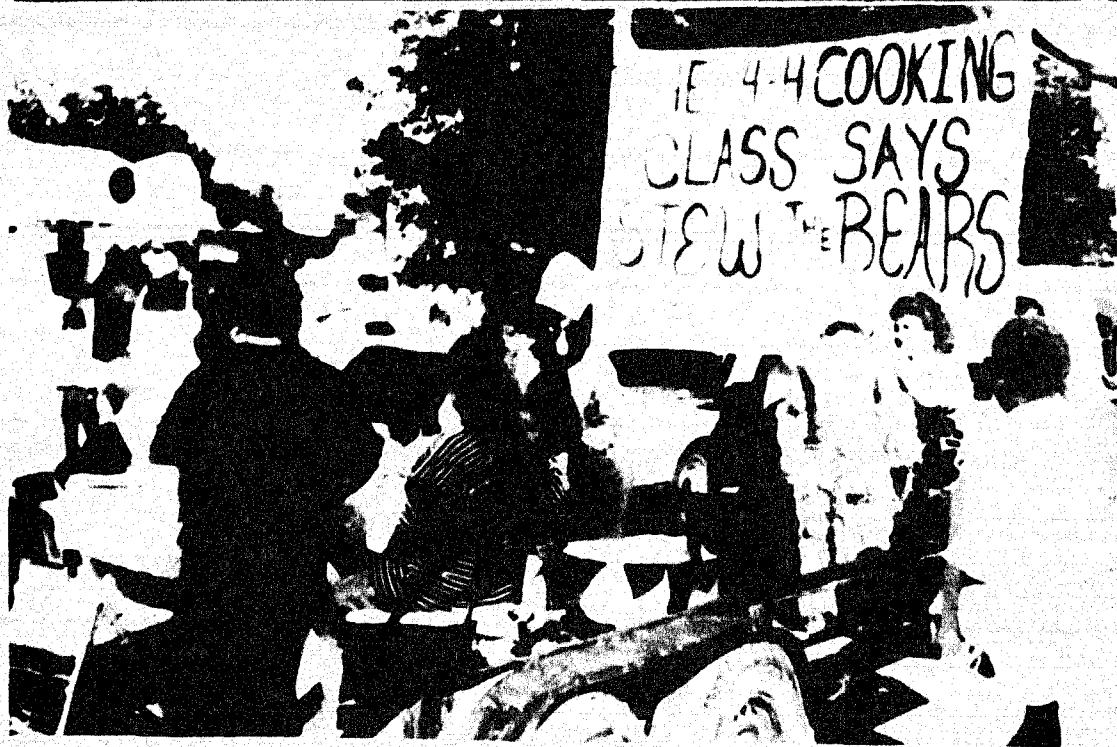

The 1986 Annual Santa Anna High School Homecoming and Business meeting was held in the High School Auditorium on Saturday, October 25, 1986 with 251 people registering. The meeting was called to order by President Leanna Pollock Hartman. She extended a welcome to all ex-students and guests attending and a very special thanks to Lula Joe Harvey Holcombe, who had been entertaining the crowd with several piano selections. The crowd was also entertained by D.J.'s School of Dance. Several young girls from the Santa Anna and Coleman schools were involved in a tumbling exhibition.

The invocation was led by Eddie Jones, 2nd vice-president. The meeting was then turned over to Dickie Horner, a member of the SAISD School Board, who gave a short report on the renovation of the elementary school building. He also mentioned a growth in the Santa Anna School District. The minutes were approved as read by Secretary Gay Rutherford Abernathy.

Old business brought before the

group was a special request for any momentos for the trophy case. Also a request was made that any class having reunions during the weekend, make a list of names and addresses of those attending.

New business began with the recommendations of the nominating committee, President Hartman asked for a motion to re-elect Roberta Morgan Tomlinson and Randy Brown as directors of the Ex-Student Association. They will serve a two-year term. It was announced that next year (1987) will be the 50th anniversary of the SAHS Band. A special request was made for any old pictures and awards of the band, to be used in the celebration of the anniversary. Dickie Horner, then presented special recognitions as follows: Ex-Student from the earliest class—Fannie Whetstone Bryan, Class of 1912; Ex-Teacher from the earliest class—Mae Allen Blue, teaching in 1916; and Ex-Student traveling the greatest distance—Thomas Ray Rutherford, class of 1951 from Concord, New Hampshire. Each was presented

with a plaque. All classes ending in "6" were recognized, with the class of 1936 having the largest in attendance.

President Leanna Hartman then introduced the special honorees. She presented Mary Haynes Bordeaux, Coming Home Queen from the Class of 1966, with a china plate hand-painted by Orna Dean Horner. Gary Rider, Coming Home King from the Class of 1966, was presented a special plaque. Each gave a short talk and thanks to the crowd. The Ex-Student of the Year, Raeford Evans, Class of 1936, was recognized and presented with a special plaque. Mr. Evans gave a special thanks to the school faculty and student body, for making this homecoming special and expressed his thanks for the welcome all the ex-students had felt.

President Leanna Hartman then gave special thanks to all who helped make this homecoming successful. She then led the singing of the Alma Mater accompanied by Lula Jo Harvey Holcombe on the piano.

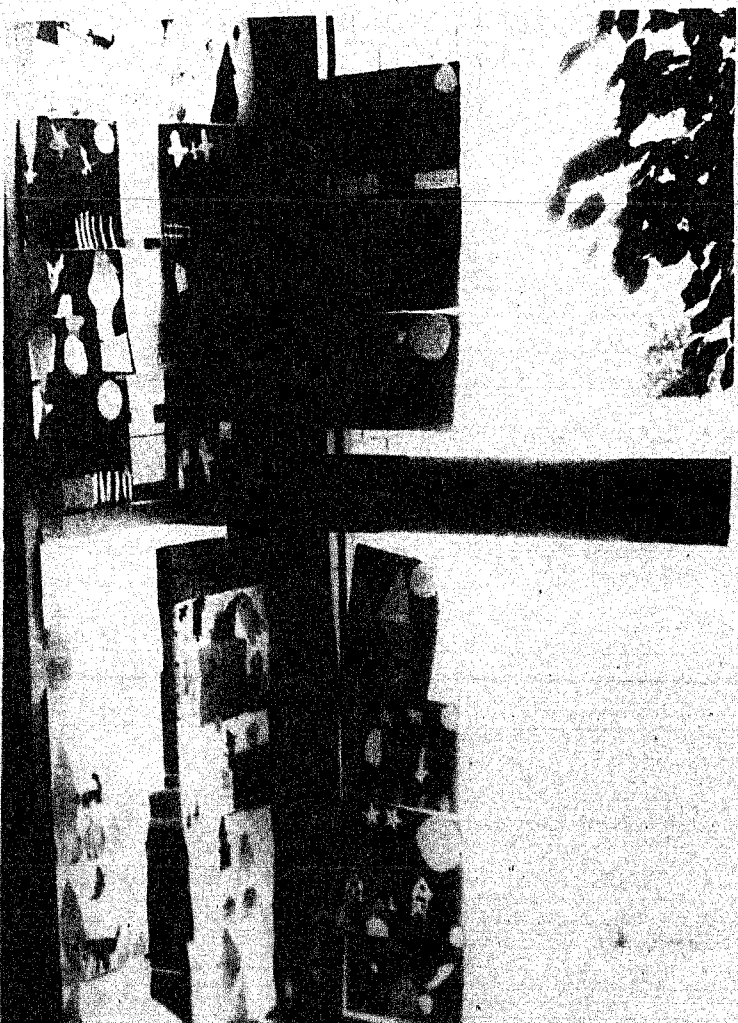
Curtis Puckett Receives Eagle Scout

Bonfire Yields Mystery

The Homecoming bonfire was big and beautiful on Thursday night of last week, but yielded a surprise when explosions started occurring within the fire.

Upon investigation on Thursday morning after the fire had completely died down, it was determined that the explosions had been from military type ammunition.

Captain Larry Rutherford of the National Guard in Brownwood headed up the investigation and is seeking the assistance of other agencies as well as civilian law enforcement officers in solving the case. Helping with the investigation will be the FBI and the CID (Central Investigation Division) of the Army. A Texas Ranger stationed in Brownwood has also been consulted in the affair.

Since this is the second incident in less than a year in Santa Anna involving military type ammo, the problem is considered to be quite serious. The other incident occurred earlier in the year when a young boy was injured while playing with a military explosive. Captain Rutherford is looking at the possibility of the two incidents being related in that the ammunition may have come from the same source.

The ammo is a type that is commonly found at military installations and used for training exercises. It is not accessible on the civilian market.

Rutherford asks that anyone having knowledge of such ammunition in

the area, please contact him or other law officials.

He also asked parents talk to their youth about the seriousness of the matter. The incident at the bonfire could have been tragic if some youngster's eyes were blinded by flying shrapnel or even worse.

Captain Rutherford states that he and the other investigating personnel are committed and determined to get to the source of this problem and will leave no stone unturned in doing so.

FRUITS OF THE SPIRIT

The Apostle Paul in writing to the Galatian Christians (Gal. 5:22-23) wrote these encouraging words, "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, long suffering, gentleness (or kindness), goodness, faith (or faithfulness), meekness, temperance: against such there is no law." A person who bears these fruits will find no law in the Word of God interfering with the production of these fruits.

It is so easy to look around us and see the lack of charity, LOVE, in others, but may the Holy Spirit help us to search our own hearts.

I can recall a lady who came to her Pastor and seemed to very concerned about her sister who was in a lost condition. And she asked her Pastor if he would please call on her. The minister said, "In the morning my wife and I will drive to your house, pick you up and we will call on your sister." "Oh, No!" she said, "don't do that. We don't speak to each other." No wonder her testimony amounted to so little. Had she tried to give a testimony for Christ it would have been as sounding brass and a tinkling cymbal because the fruit of love was missing. 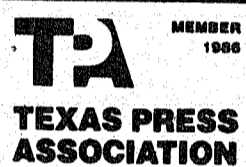

Halloween Time For Fun & Safety

Halloween is a time of fun and great excitement for youngsters of all ages. Unfortunately, each year, it results in injury and, occasionally, death for some. Captain G. J. Matthews, Commander of the Texas Highway Patrol for the Abilene District of the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "If parents will do some planning and closely supervise their children's activities on Halloween night, many of these injuries could be avoided."

"First, the trick or treaters should be dressed in white or light-colored clothing. Don't put a child out on the streets in a black or dark-colored costume unless it has reflective tape on it. The children should be instructed not to sample any of the candy until they return home. The treats should be carefully inspected to insure, as best as you can, that it is safe to eat. If you have any doubts about any of it, it should be discarded. Wash all fruit and slice it into small sections to insure nothing has been embedded into it."

Captain Matthews strongly urged parents to remind their children of all pedestrian safety rules they should observe while trick or treating and to furnish them a flashlight to use. He also suggested to use facial makeup instead of having them wear a mask since a mask severely reduces their ability to see. He suggested to go only to homes where the porch light is on and where you, as parents, know they are welcome. "If we confine a child's trick or treating activity to our own neighborhood, where we know the residents, we would know the treats are safe."

"Driver's have a special problem on Halloween night, also," Captain Matthew said. "They have to be alert for trick or treaters and remember, in a child's excitement, they are likely to forget to look before crossing streets. If drivers would drive as if their child was out trick or treating, we could avoid the vehicle-pedestrian accidents on Halloween."

Some other Halloween safety tips include:
+Prevent fires by using small flashlights—not candles—to light jack-o-lanterns.
+Do your trick-or-treating before dark, especially if you have young

children, and go with them. Set a curfew for older children and enforce it.

+Remind children to use sidewalks rather than cutting through yards and vacant lots to prevent tripping over objects.

+Give each child a flashlight and remind them not to shine them into anyone's eyes, especially a driver's.

+If your child gets sick, try to find out exactly what he or she ate and where it came from. Call your doctor immediately or contact the Poison Control Center at Scott and White (817)774-2005.
