does the receipt of subsistence allowance cause any reduction in Veterans Administration disability compensation?
A-No. Veteran
A-No. Veterans may receive subLion and disability compensation to which they are entitled. In addition, the VA will pay for the costs of tuition, books and fees involved in the abirt in program.
Q-If I encounter legal difficutties
while purchasing a home using my GI home loan, will the VA provide o pay for any legal assistance I may need
A-No. The VA does not provide legal assistance or advice; nor can the agency pay for any legal wisistance a veteran obtestains to deal chase or construction of a home. Q-My husband is a World War veteran who is not eligible for Veterans Administration pension benefits because of income standards. Is he eligible for VA outpa-
tient treatment? tient treatment?
A-Yes. A World War I veteran may be provided VA outpatient
treatment for any condition even though he is not receiving VA pension benefits.
Q-Do the VA eligibility assessment procedures apply to veterans age 65 and older?
A-The egibility
cedures apply to all nonservic connected veterans regardless of age. Public Law $99-272$ repealed a rovision in The Veterans Omnibus Health Care Act of 1970 that allowed receive care in VA facilities
