#### Check It Out

Recently, at the midwinter meeting of the American Library Association in Chicago, the Newbery Award was presented to Sid Fleishman for his book, Whipping Boy, about the adventures of Prince Brat and Gemmy.

The Newbery Medal is presented annually to the author of the most distin; guished contribution to American children's literature published in the preceding year.

The award was established and endowed in 1921 by Frederic G. Melcher, chairman of the board of R. R. Bowker Co., publishers of the Library Journal and Publisher's Weekly. He named it for John Newbery, an English publisher and bookseller. Melcher also founded the Caldecott medal. (We'll give you more on the Caldecott medal next week.)

Rene Chambellan designed the medal, a likeness of which can be found on the dust jacket of those Newbery Award books published after the medal was presented.

Although presented as a contribution to children's literature, readers should note that Newbery Award winners are generally for the oldermature child. They generally aim at the 5th grade reader and above. Adults find them excellent, lively and stimulating: many times thought provoking.

#### Above Average Rainfall In February

The City of Santa Anna officially received 3.80 inches of rainfall for the month of February. On February 1 the rainfall was .28 inches; on the 6th, .34 inches; the 20th, .50 inches; the 23rd, .30 inches; the 25th, .20 inches: the 26th, 1 inch was received and on the 28th 1.03 inches of rainfall was received.

#### Time To Spray Pecan Trees

If you have not sprayed your trees with dormant oil, now is the time. Dormant oil treatments are effective for control of several pests including mites, scales, and some aphid species. These oils can also be

used on many plants, such as pecans, peaches, plums, oaks and many shrubs.

You can also increase the activity of the dormant oil by adding an insecticide to it such as Dursban or Diazinon.

The ideal time to apply dormant oil is usually in late February or early March when most of the hard freezes are gone but before the buds on the trees and shrubs begin to break. Dormant oils should not be applied when freezing temperatures are anticipated within the next few days. Always check labels or other precautions and make sure the application which you intend to make is included on the label.

EXAMINATION DISCIPLINE COMMITMENT

In the Calendar of the Christian Church, Lent begins today on Ash Wednesday. Lent reminds us how primary the spiritual disciplines of life are. Just as Sunday comes each week to remind us how we should live each day of the week, the Season of Lent reminds us of those disciplines which should be practiced all year.

SELF EXAMINATION is accented in Lent. The unexamined life will be a pretty poor one. Evaluation is important in all ventures. Whether it be a church program or a family vacation, evaluation should always follow. We need to ask ourselves about the kinds of things we do...should we be doing them...are they worth the time and energy expended? These next few weeks of Lent as we prepare for the celebration of Easter, spend some time examining your pattern of life.

SELF DISCIPLINE is accented in Lent. There are good things we know we ought to do. Important in the building of our life is the regular practice of reading the Bible and the practice of prayer. Private and public worship are essential practices, and ought to be daily and weekly experiences. Regular study of the Bible and Christian beliefs are essential in "growing a soul."

SELF COMMITTMENT is accented in Lent. Bible reading, praying, worshipping and studying must not end in itself. Archbishop William Temple has said, "The road to holiness (rightness) must necessarily pass through the world of action." As followers of Jesus Christ we are to be in service. Jesus said, "I did not come to be served but to be a servant." He also said, "You are friends of mine when you do what I have told you." It is in this spirit that we really become followers of Jesus Christ.

## Area Residents Due Money!

The Texas Treasury has about \$80 million in unclaimed money, safe deposit boxes, oil royalities and stocks and bonds that it wants to return to about 100,000 Texans.

"On Sunday, March 8, we will publish this annual list of names," Treasurer Ann Richards said, "and we hope to return a sizable portion of that money to its rightful owners."

Persons who find their name on the list may reclaim their property by calling the State Treasury, toll free at 1-800-321-2274 or by writing to the State Treasury at P.O.Box 12608, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

"There is no set time limit for making a claim," Treasurer Richards emphasized. "We will hold the account in the owner's name forever."

She said that last year, the State Treasury published a similar list and about \$50 million was reunited with owners.

The Unclaimed Money Fund list was first published when Treasurer Richards took office in 1983. Since that time, the State Treasury has returned 73 percent of all the money ever returned since the law took effect 26 years ago.

Under her administration, the State Treasury has also substantially increased efforts to collect dormant accounts. Collections have increased from \$6.3 million in 1952 to \$69 million in 1986.

"The amount of money that we collect is important," the Treasurer said. "Because in the past, accounts which were not turned over to the Treasury for safekeeping were often lost. Now, at least, the accounts are protected at no charge by the Treaury."







## **VA News**

(Editor's note: following are representative questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office.

Q-May I use my VA home loan guaranty to purchase a duplex?

A-Yes. A veteran's entitlement may be used to purchase up to a maximum of four family units, one of which must be occupied by the veteran.

Q-I would like to refinance my current VA home mortgage to get cash out of the refinance. Do I need entitlement under this procedure?

A-Yes. On a VA refinance, where the veteran is receiving cash from the transaction, the veteran must have sufficent entitlement remaining to guarantee the loan to the lender's satisfaction.

Q-Is it true that husbands of femal veterans are eligible for the same VA benefits as wives and w; idows of male veterans?

A-Yes. A husband or widower has the same status as a wife or widow of a male veteran and is eligible to receive the same benefits if otherwise entitled.

Q-When a veteran is in training under vocational rehabilitation, does the receipt of subsistence allowance cause any reduction in Veterans Administration disability compensation?

A-No. Veterans may receive subsistence for vocational rehabilitation and disability compensation to which they are entitled. In addition, the VA will pay for the costs of tuition, books and fees involved in the rehabilitation program.

Q-If I encounter legal difficulties while purchasing a home using my GI home loan, will the VA provide or pay for any legal assistance I may

A-No. The VA does not provide legal assistance or advice; nor can the agency pay for any legal assistance a veteran obtains to deal with troubles encountered in the purchase or construction of a home.

Q-My husband is a World War I veteran who is not eligible for Veterans Administration pension benefits because of income standards. Is he eligible for VA outpatient treatment?

A-Yes. A World War I veteran may be provided VA outpatient treatment for any condition even though he is not receiving VA pension benefits.

Q-Do the VA eligibility assessment procedures apply to veterans age 65 and older?

A-The egibility assessment procedures apply to all nonserviceconnected veterans regardless of age. Public Law 99-272 repealed a provision in The Veterans Omnibus Health Care Act of 1970 that allowed veterans 65 years of age or older to receive care in VA facilities regardless of income.

#### Open House At **School Tonite**



#### Special Tax Rules For Separated or Divorced

There are special tax provisions for divorced or separated taxpayers, according to the Internal Revenue Service. Certain tax rules apply if a taxpayer is paying or receiving alimony, tax breaks if the taxpayer qualifies for "Head of Household" status, a tax credit if someone is paid to watch your child so you can work, and an earned income credit that returns money to some low income taxpayers.

Taxpayers

If a taxpayer's divorce has been declared final during this tax year, generally the taxpayer is considered to be in the "Single" tax status. However, money can be saved on taxes if a taxpayer can qualify for the "Head of Household" tax status. Those who qualify as a head of household will have a lower tax rate than the rates for

To qualify for head of household status, a taxpayer had to be unmarried or considered unmarried on the last day of the year. To be considered unmarried, even if married but living last six months of the year, apart, a separate tax return must be filed and the taxpayer and spouse cannot have lived in their home together during the last 6 months of the tax year. In addition, the taxpayer also must have paid more than half the cost of maintaining a home during the year for: an unmarried child who does not have to be his/her dependent; a married child whom he/she can claim as a. dependent or whom he/she could non-custodial parent will claim the exemption for the child; or certain other relatives claimed as a dependent. Except for parents, any of these relatives for whom a home is maintained must live with the taxpayer for more than half the year.

If someone is paid to care for the taxpayer's child so that he/she can either go to work or look for work, tax money may be saved because of this expense. The credit for child and dependent care expenses allows a tax credit of up to 30 percent of the money paid for child care each year. The child has to be under 15 years old, or be unable to care for himself or herself, for the taxpayer to take this credit. If \$10,000 or less, the taxpayer may take a credit of up to \$720 if one child, or up to \$1,440 if two or more children are being cared for. The maximum taxable income. However, not all paycredit decreases for higher incomes.

if child care expenses allow the taxpayer to work or to look for work. While a credit can be claimed for the expense of having a pre-school child attend a day care center or nursery school during the day, the regular costs of schooling for a child in the first grade or above cannot be considered for the credit. Care for the child before and after school hours can be used to figure this credit. The credit can also be claimed if somebody is being paid to care for the child in the home.

For divorced or separated parents, the parent who has custody for a longer time during the calendar year

can claim the credit. Generally, a person who is married at the end of the tax year must file a joint return to claim the child care credit. A person who is legally separated under a decree of divorce or separate maintenance is considered unmarried and may claim the credit on a separate return.

However, if a taxpayer is married and living apart but not legally separated, the child care credit can be claimed on a separate return only if the child lived with the taxpayer for more than half the year, the taxpayer paid more than half the cost of keeping up his/her home for the year, and his/her spouse did not live in the home for the

People who are divorced also should know the relationship between alimony and taxes. If a taxpayer is paying alimony or separate maintenance payments, these payments may be deductible from income. Alimony may be deducted from gross income to find adjusted gross income. Only the amount of alimony payments specified in the court decree or written separation agreement may be deducted. If claim as a dependent except that the alimony or separate maintenance payments are deducted, the spouse's or former spouse's social security number must be included on the return for the year payment is made. If the social security number is not included on the return, there may be a \$50 penalty. The spouse or former spouse may have to pay a \$50 penalty for refusing to give the social security number to be reported. Any additional amount of money paid to a former spouse is not deductible.

Child support payments are not deductible. Taxpayers who are behind in child support payments may find their tax refunds offset to cover outstanding child support payments in states that have asked the Department of Health the taxpayer's adjusted gross income is and Human Services to help collect on these delinquent payments.

Taxpayers may claim this credit only ments are considered alimony. For instance, property settlements are not alimony. Child support payments that are made for minor children, since they are not deductible by the payor, do not have to be included in income.

Also of interest to many divorced people is the Earned Income Credit. A taxpayer who earns less than \$11,000 during the year and has a child living with him/her can receive payment of an earned income credit of up to \$550. Taxpayers who think that they will be eligible for the Earned Income Credit can receive it in advance as a part of their weekly paycheck. Those who want to begin receiving earned income credit payments with weekly wages should submit a Form W-5, Earned Income Credit Advance Payment Certificate, to his/her employer.

To find out more about tax rules and benefits for divorced and separated people, taxpayers can order free Publication 504, Tax Information for Divorced or Separated Individuals, Publication 503, Child and Dependent Care Credit, and Employment Taxes for Household Employers, and Publication 596. 


