
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

## Letters To The Editor

The letter in last week's paper was written and submitted by Robert Pritchard, P. O. Box 835, Santa Anna, Texas 76878. His signature and address was inadvertently omitted (Our mistake here at the paper) from the paper,

Dear Editor,

I feel a need to respond to the letter to the editor in the January 22, 1987 issue of your paper. (The letter was, AT THE LEAST, misleading.) It is true that curriculum rules require some participation by students at times other than during school hours. This is true in areas of band, vocational agriculture, home economics, fine arts, and in some cases, physical education. If a student is substituting athletics for the required physical education credits, attendance at Friday night and weekend games then becomes required. The administration at Santa Anna has never scheduled, nor do they plan to schedule a school activity which would conflict with any of the traditional religious activities. In fact, we have an administration policy that all school activities on Wednesday must end by 6:30 p.m. For years the county stock show has begun on Sunday afternoon. The bands have performed several concerts on Sunday afternoon as well. A person who would suggest that administrators would schedule school activities at 10:00 a.m. on Sunday is grasping for things to complain about.

The bottom line in this case is freedom of choice and responsibility. When parents allow their children to register for a class or activity, they, with their children, are accepting the responsibilities that go along with the rewards of completing that class or activity. If a student does not feel that he or she has the time to devote to the class or activity, that student has the choice of not participating in that class or activity. Nothing in state law or local policy require a "7-day" school week. A student can graduate with the required number of credits and NEVER attend an activity outside the school day. To enroll in a class that requires participation outside the school is ELECTIVE.

I feel we have a first class school at Santa Anna. This is a result of the support of the entire community, not just the parents, students, and teachers. It is our hope that your support of OUR school continues. -Gerald Brister, Supt.

Dear Editor:

I do not believe the people who think the Seat Belt Law is a good idea have taken the time to think it through. Wearing a seat belt is a good idea, just like having regular medical check-ups, daily walks, smoke detectors in your home, dead bolt locks on your doors, not smok-

ing and on and on. But is it the government's responsibility to place a fine on us if we do not? I say it is

There is no question the cost of

medical care is on the backs of all of us either through insurance premiums or taxes. So if you support the Seat Belt Law for these reasons, then the rationale follows that you want laws requiring medical checkups, daily walks, no smoking and all other known practices that might lengthen our years and make us healthier. The cost of us not adopting these practices are also passed on to us through increased insurance premiums or taxes. But who should make us adopt such practices? The

government? A law requiring the wearing of seat belts is not different in principle from a law requiring annual medical check-ups. If we can pass the one law-on the grounds that a particular practice is good for us-on what grounds could we spurn the other law? It is presumed by our government that we have too little sense to consider our own self interest and buckle up. So the government says let us accordingly, force them to do what we know is best for them. Let us do their thinking for them.

Let me tell you how the Seat Belt Law came about. By no means was it an outcry from our citizens to protect them from burting themselves,

but instead an outcry from the automobile manufacturers' lobby. The reason the auto lobby was concerned is because the federal government a few years ago said unless two thirds of the 50 states passed laws mandating seat belt use by 1989, it would order Detroit to equip all cars with expensive air bags. Not a single person in my district or the state of Texas asked me to pass a bill requiring them to wear a seat belt.

Many people are wearing seat belts not just because of the law, but because of the national publicity pointing out the facts in case of an accident. Just as more people are having medical check-ups, more people are installing dead bolts on their doors, more are exercising and fewer people are smoking. They are doing it for their own health and safety and not because the government is saying do it or we will impose a fine. For every good cause, there is not necessarily a gaood law waiting to be passed. Knowing all this makes you

wonder why it will be difficult to repeal the Seat Belt Law. There are many people who feel the government should tell them what to do to keep them helathy and then make them do it. And then there are others who do not really care whether the law is on the books or not, since they are not going to abide by it anyway. They probably will never be ticketed for not complying unless they are stopped for some other reason. But there are many who are adamantly opposed to the law. I have heard from over eight thousand. They fall into two categories. One, those opposing for the reasons discussed above, and two, those who have a fear of being strapped in should a wreck occur and feel their chances of survival are better without it. Such is the case of the parents of a 31 years old son in West Texas. They were traveling in the car in front of their son's car and the last thing they waw him do was buckle up. They witnessed the accident and his last words were "Get me out- get me out." His car was on fire and they could not get him out.

Our chances for repeal would be better if the law were strictly enforced of if automobiles were manufactured so they would not start until the seat belt was buckled. Then you would hear an outcry from the people all the way to the State Capitol that would overcome the special interest groups that passed the law.


So in the meantime, obey the law and wear your seat belt. But do not be surprised if this new session of the legislature comes up with more good ideas and passes more laws to take away some more of our human liberties. As Pogo said long ago: "We have discovered the enemy, and it is us." -Sincerely,

The unit they are studying currently is the area of Food and Nutrition. Each class member was required to enter at least one food entry for the Youth Fair and Stock Show as a part of their classwork. These students were judged separatey and on individual taste and appearance of their food item. Here are their recipes for those entries.

Jason Dean-4th place GRANNY'S PEACH COBBLER Pour 1 pint jar of fruit into a saucepan with ½ cup sugar and let heat.

Mix well and put in small casserole. Melt 1/4 cup butter and pour over mixture. Bake at 350 for 20 minutes.

Ross Bradley-1st Place STRAWBERRY NUT BREAD Stir together in large bowl: 3 c. sifted flour

1 t. baking soda 1 T. cinnamon

2 c. sugar

Combine and mix well: 4 eggs, beaten

2 c. frozen strawberries, thawed and 11/4 c. vegetable oil

11/4 c. chopped pecans

Make well in center of dry ingredients. Add liquid mixture, stirring just enough to moisten dry ingredients. Pour into 6 greased 6x3x2 foil pan or 2 greased 9x5x3 loaf pans. Bake in 350 oven for 40 minutes for foil pans (1 hour for loaf pans). Let cool 5 minutes before removing from pan. Cool on wire racks.



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

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#### Some IRS Tips For Preparing Tax Returns

Follow these tips when you prepare your federal income tax return and speed any tax refund due to you. The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) says:

-Have all your necessary records and forms available. -Get an early start to allow plenty of

-Make sure you have a Form W-2 from each of your employers.

-Read your tax instruction booklet carefully. -If you need additional information. check with the IRS-they may have a free publication that will answer

your questions. Double-check the following before you mail your return:

-Attach all W-2 forms and related schedules. -Verify all arithmetic.

-If you rounded off numbers, did you round consistently?

-Make sure you used the correct tax figure from the correct tax table. -Sign and date the return, both

spouses sign if it is a joint return. -Use the peel-off lable and preaddressed envelope that was supplied with your tax package. Write any needed corrections on the label. -Use the correct amount of postage on the envelope.

-Keep a photocopy of the return for your own records. -Make sure social security numbers

are entered correctly at the top of the return.



each of their employees with Form W-2, Wage and Tax Statement, by January 31. Taxpayers who have not received their Form W-2 by that date should contact their employer and request the form, the Internal Revenue Service says.

Taxpayers who do not receive the form by February 15 should notify the IRS. When contacting the IRS, taxpayers will be asked to provide the employer's name, address and employer identification number as well as their own name, address and social security number. Having the necessary information available on the first contact, IRS adds, will prevent the need for taxpayers to call again.

Taxpayers who were employed during 1986 should receive the form, even if they had more than one employer or worked for a particular employer for only part of the year. Taxpayers should be aware that if they leave their jobs they may request that their employers give them their W-2 forms within 30 days after they leave.

The Form W-2 is important, not only because a copy of it must accompany the tax return, but also as a personal record for the taxpayer, the IRS


The form lists the wages paid, the amount of federal income tax withheld, social security tax withheld, any uncollected employee social security tax on tips, social security wages, social security tips, advance earned income credit payments, and the cost of group-term life insurance over \$50,000.

If the Form W-2 contains an error, such as the wrong amount of wages received, the employer should be asked to issue Form W-2c showing the corrected information. If the employee's name, social security number, or address is incorrect, copies B and C of the W-2 should be corrected and the employer notified. It is not necessary to obtain a new form in this case, IRS

#### Social Security Benefits May Be **Taxable Income**

Higher-income taxpayers who received social security or tier 1 railroad retirement benefits in 1986 may have to pay federal income tax on part of their benefits, according to the Internal Revenue Service

As much as one-half of a person's social security benefit is taxable if that amount, when combined with other income (including tax-exempt interest), exceeds certain base amounts. The base amount is \$25,000 if the taxpayer is single, or married and does not file a
