

the inner worth, do men achieve."


I have listed all the "things" I




To be a "thing" or to do a list is not so important as to know that you are of worth to God. Of so much worth He sent His Son to die that each of us might find peace and value through Him.



representative questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office.)

Q--I receive VA compensation benefits. I am now retired and living on a limited income, can I also receive a VA pension?

A-You cannot receive both VA compensation benefits and a VA pension. You may elect to receive a pension, if you qualify, and the pension would in fact be greater than the compensation benefit.

Q-I am a veteran with a serviceconnected disability rated at 50 percent. I have received an injury which is not service-connected, but which will require a prosthetic appliance. Will the VA supply this needed applianc?

A-Yes. Any veteran with a serviceconnected disability of 50 percent or more may be provided with necessary prosthetic appliances for any medical condition.



Just think, an almost invisible 1/4" gap at the base of a standard 36" wide outside door is equal to a nineinch hole in the side of your house! Close that gap with easy-to-install felt or foam rubber products which draft-proof doorways.
