Sewer charges will be discussed again at a later time after the ordinance for mandatory hookup is passed.

Stanley Hartman was appointed as mayor pro-tem with the motion unanimously carrying.

Next Mr. Craig Terry, City Police Officer asked the Council about purchasing a speaker and siren for the

police car. A speaker from Ten Four Communications would cost \$55 and a siren from MPH Ind. would cost \$150. This matter was tabled until a salesman from MPH Ind. could come down and explain the warranty and if it would be a used or new

Officer Terry then introduced Mr. Harold Casey and informed the council that he would like to join our Police Reserve Force. It was decided to accept Mr. Casey as a member of the Reserve Police Force.

Rusty Wells, City Supervisor, asked the council abot getting a new sprayer for streets, chemicals etc. He informed the council that Mr. Steve Adams has a used one for \$1250. with a six month guarantee. It was decided to purchase this sprayer from Mr. Adams.

Next the Mandatory Sewer Hookup Ordinance was read and approved for passing on the first reading of said ordinance



Council went into executive session. When they returned the accounts payable were discussed and then approved for payment in the normal manner.









City Receives \$3,108.42 Check

AUSTIN-State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently sent checks totaling \$97.9 million in local sales tax to 1,039 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said 1967 payments were down 7 percent as compared to payments to date made in May of last year.

Santa Anna's check was for \$3,165.42, compared to last year's payment of \$4,771.19, bringing total payments in 1987 to \$7,722.33, compared to \$13,476.34 for 1986, down 42,69 percent.


Houston's check was the largest-414.5 million, bringing total payments in 1927 to \$52.5 million, down 10 percent over 1925. Dallas received \$11.5 million for a total of \$42.5 million in total payments for this year, a decrease of 5 percent.

million increased that city's 1987 payment to a total of \$23.2 million, down 7 percent over last year. Austin's check for \$4.5 million pushed payments to \$17 million in 1987—down 8 percent.





Oilfield Workers May Be Eligible For Retraining

Unemployed oil and gas workers from the West Central Texas region may be eligible for retraining under \$100 000 contract recently negotiated between the Texas Department of Community Affairs and the West Central Texas Private Industry Council and its administrative agency, the West Central Texas Council of Governments.

This contract, funded through Title III of the Job Training Partnership Act (PL 97-300) is designed to aid individuals who have been displaced since January 1, 1986, from jobs in the oil and gas industry.

In order to be eligible for this program, an individual must meet State and Federal requirements as

(1.) be a displaced oil and gas industry worker from the 19 ocunty West Central Texas area which includes the following counties: Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Taylor, and Throckmorton.

(2.) have been terminated or laid-off or have received a notice of lay-off and is eligible for or has exhausted unemployment compensation; and it is unlikely that the individual will return to previous oil and gas occupation.

Eligible individuals can participate in classroom training in one of eleven fields. This training will only be offered at Texas State Technical Institute's campus at Abilene and Sweetwater. In addition, eligible individuals may receive training in self-directed job search activities.

Appealing Penalties

Taxpayers who are charged a penalty because of a tax delinquency and feel the penalty is unwarranted may appeal the penalty, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) says.

Federal tax notices sent to taxpayers explain how to request abatement of a penalty charge. Generally, the taxpayer's first step is to contact the IRS office shown on the notice. If the request is denied, the taxpayer will received an explanation, including information on further appeal procedures, the IRS says.

And the 1987 survey by Texas Transportation Institute shows Texans are in eed of a safety belt reminder."

In 1986, Texas had one of the highest belt-use rates in the nation, with 66 percent of the drivers buckling up in cars and light trucks. The latest survey, conducted in January, indicated usage had dropped to 59 percent.

"That's still high, when you consider that the average for states with safety belt laws is 45 percent," said Gustafson. "But Hawaii had a rate of 68 percent for drivers and passengers last year, and North Carolina passed us this spring with rates above 70 percent. Pride demands that we put Texas back on
