School Board Candidates Speak Out

Quinton Daniel School Board Candidate

Quinton Daniel, a plant superintendent for Coleman County Telephone Coop and farmer and rancher, is a candidate for one of the two spots open in the school board election that will be held Saturday, April 4. Daniel has a degree in Business Administration and attended Cisco Junior College for two years.

Quinton and his wife, Wanda, have one son, Ronnie, and a daughter-in-law, Suzan, and they have two grandchildren, Candi and Josh.

When asked what he would like to see accomplished he said, "To insure the young people of this school district they will receive the best our school system has to offer at all times."

He stated that he was a candidate for this office because "I am interested in all young people and feel they are the backbone of our community, therefore, I am looking forward to working with the school administration, students and parents of our district to encourage our students to do their best and receive the best education possible in order

to build a solid foundation for their future."

Daniel feels that the greatest need of the school is "that the students, parents, and staff be treated fairly and impartially in all matters pertaining to the education of our young people."

Ronnie Hartman School Board Candidate

Ronnie Hartman, an employee and partner in Edd Hartman Construction Co. of Santa Anna, is a candidate for one of the two positions open on the school board. Election will be held on Saturday, April 4.

Hartman, a 1967 graduate of Santa Anna High School, attended Angelo State University and was in the U.S. Army for four years.

He and his wife, Leanna, have two sons, Jeremy, a junior student at SAHS, and Jeffrey, an 8th grade student at SAJH.

When asked what he would like to see accomplished, he stated, "I would like to see the school board continue to work together for the benefit of the students and the school district."

Hartman stated that he was a candidate for this office because "this is an opportunity for me to serve the students and parents of this school district."

"I would like to see the Santa Anna schools continue to offer the students

an opportunity for a quality education," replied Hartman when asked what he saw as the greatest need of the school.

Landfill Permit In Offing

According to Mayor Joe Guerrero, there has been some concern about the city's landfill contract with the state. Citizens have approached him with questions about a rumor that the city has lost the contract.

In a telephone conversation on March 20, with the city's engineer, Guerrero was assured that the engineer had been in touch with the state officials concerning the landfill and that it would be about 8 weeks till the permit is received and if there is no one to oppose the permit it would be a matter of no time until they can accept bids for a new dozer. When the permit is granted, the city can then request funds from the State to buy the land and dozer.

Guerrero also stated that Santa Anna along with other cities, had lost Revenue Sharing Funds. This amounted to between \$2000 to \$10,000 in less to the city. Sales tax revenues are also down about \$200. Some revenue was made up in property taxes, about \$200.

The Mayor feels that the economic picture is not too good at the present time. Many hours were spent last year at city hall going over figures

and trying to find ways to cut down on expenses. City officials have talked with all city employees on ways that they could be of help in cutting expenses. They feel with everyone working together the city will have a good cash balance at the end of March compared to having very little at the end of March in 1986.

Mayor Guerrero stated that even with the losses mentioned, if common sense is used, the condition of the city can be improved with good management.

ISD Candidates Guests Of Lions

Candidates for places on the Santa Anna school district board of trustees were guests of the Lions Club at their noon luncheon, Tuesday, March 24.

Candidates speaking to the group were Jerry Ellis, Terry McIver, Quinton Daniels, Ronnie Hartman, and Bill Gustavus. Robert Pritchard was unable to be away from his business in Brownwood.

Jerry Ellis School Board Candidate

Jerry Ellis, a candidate for a spot on the school board, is a rancher. He has a B.S. and M.S. from Sam Houston State University with a major in Physics and a minor in Math.

Ellis and his wife, Cathy, have one son, Bryce, age 11, and two daughters, Jamie, age 9, and Alicia, age 2.

When asked what he would like to see accomplished, Ellis said, "I would like to see more emphasis on the average and above average intellect students."

Ellis stated that he was a candidate for this office "to have some say in the way my tax dollars are spent and to gain a better understanding of state requirements for school operation."

Ellis feels that the greatest need of the school is "new and adequate quantities of lab equipment and classroom aids to make subject

material more interesting and to give the students more hands on learning."

Terry McIver School Board Candidate

Terry McIver is running for reelection on the Santa Anna School Board with the election to be held Saturday, April 4. McIver is an independent oil and gas producer and is involved in farming and ranching. He has a BS degree from McMurry College and was a graduate of Santa Anna High School.

Terry and his wife, Orabeth, have four children, Reece, Grady Clay, Betsy and Sally, who all attend school at Santa Anna.

When asked what he would like to see accomplished, he replied, "Maintain high quality of performance of teachers and administration."

McIver stated that he was a candidate for this office because he "has 13 years experience as teacher and administrator in secondary education. I am familiar with this school due to my previous three years on the board, and I feel I have the ability and experience to make a positive contribution to its overall operation."

"I feel this school does not have the need to make any great changes. It is, in my opinion, operating very effectively due to the fine performance of the administration and staff. The school is in good financial condition," stated McIver when asked what he thought the greatest need of the school was.

Music Director for the revival will be Mary Ann Kirtley of Houston. Mary Ann is a member of First Baptist Church of Houston. As a full-time Christian singer, her ministry has opened into a broad range of ser-

vice. Following her graduation from the University of Houston, she became a speaker-singer for many Christian women's clubs and ladies groups. With more exposure she began singing in many churches, schools and missions throughout Texas. As God opened doors she shared her music at World Evangelism Crusades in Taiwan, and other crusades throughout England, Scotland and Wales. Bill Gustavus, a rancher and cattle broker, is running for a place on the school board in the election to be held Saturday, April 4.

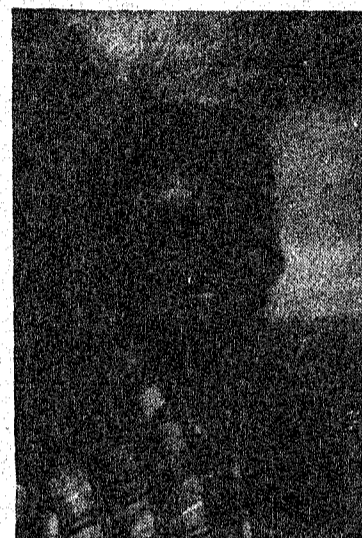

Mrs. Miller has experience in law enforcement work. She presently teaches classes for the hearing impaired in Bangs and Brownwood.

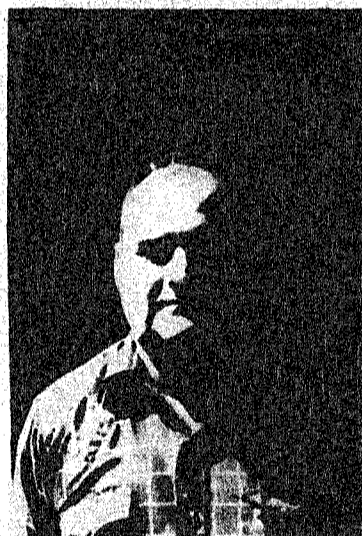
Baseball Registration

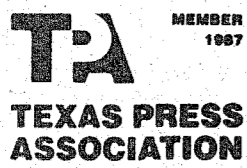

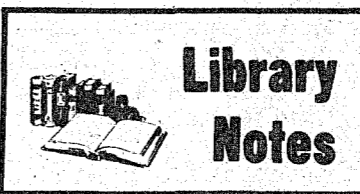

Many years ago, a small Indian girl-obeying the voice of the Great Spirit-gave in sacrifice her most precious possession, a doll. Her people were sick and had no food.

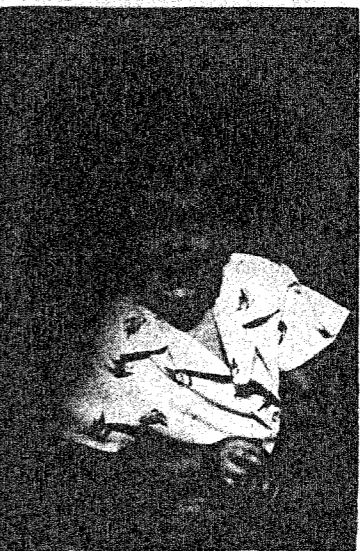

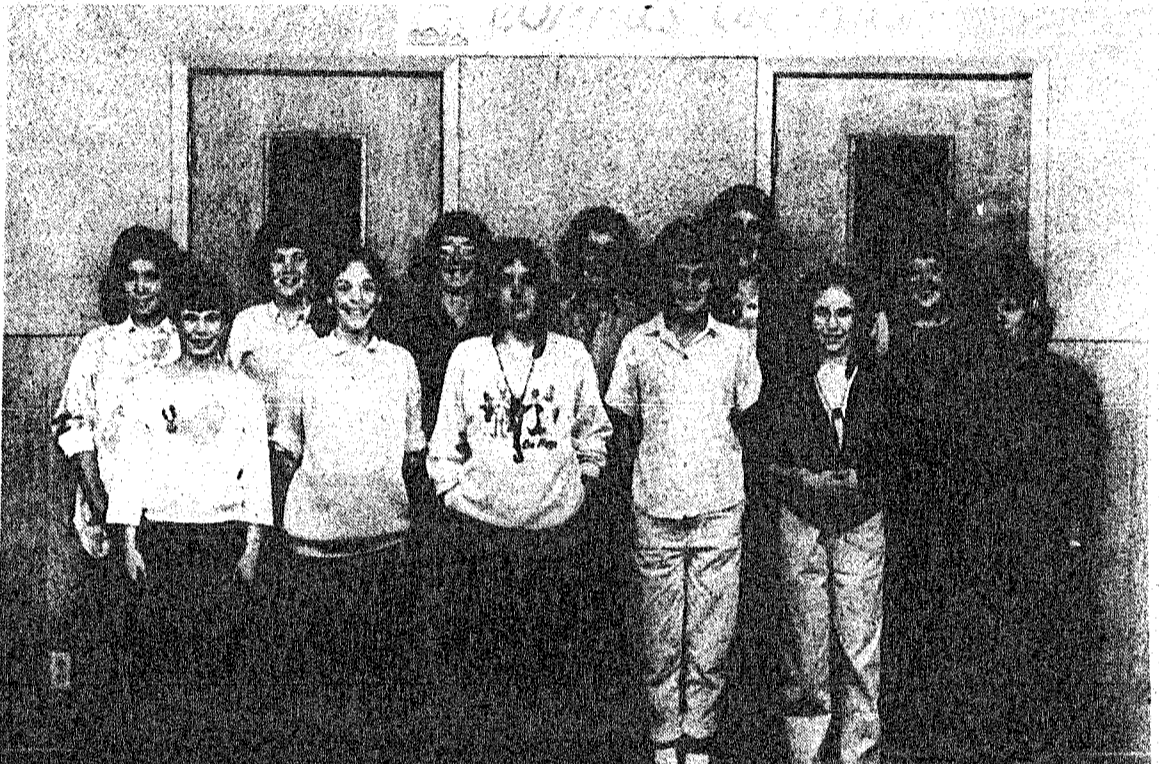

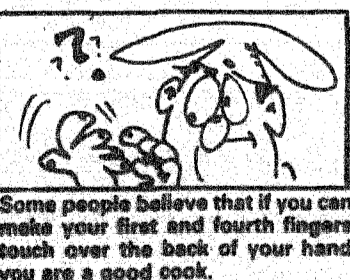

First Quarterly Estimated Tax Payment Due

The first installment of 1987 estimated federal income tax payments by individuals other than farmers and fishermen is due by April 15, 1987, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

Generally, taxpayers must pay estimated tax if they expect to owe, after withholding and credits, at least \$500 in tax for 1987; and they expect their withholding to be less than the lesser of:

- 1. 80% of the tax shown on their 1987 tax return, or
- 2. 100% of the tax shown on their 1986 tax return.

Form 1040-ES, Estimated Tax For Individuals, must be filed.

one day, due to high water. Don't forget about our annual Whon Picnic Saturday, April 4th.

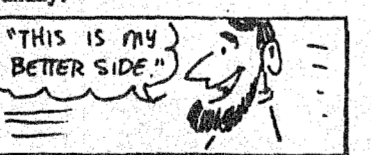
