



WERE YOU THERE?

Pastor of Presbyterian Church

A familiar song asks the question, "Were you there when they crucified my Lord?" The question is raised again during this Lenten season. We would do well to ask it anew, emphasizing different words in the question.

This was no ordinary person. This was the one and only begotten Son of God, the King of Kings, and Lord of Lords, innocent of all sin, yet being crucified. Were you there when they crucified my LORD?

Were you there when they CRUCIFIED my Lord? This is the worst possible kind of death, and the most painful and most humiliating. Death by lethal injection, gas chamber, electric chair or evn firing squad would have been easier. Were you there when they CRUCIFIED my Lord?

Were you THERE, when ....? Of course not! That was 2000 years ago. You were not THERE geographically or physically. Many who were THERE, however, were not really THERE in mind and spirit. They were not really with Him. The disciples proved they were not of one spirit with Him previously. as evidenced when Jesus mentioned one would betray. Each, in turn asked "Is it I?" Neither could they watch and pray as asked, rather fell

So it is with many of us. We may be physically at the ball game, the committee meeting, even at worship, and not really be THERE! As a friend of mine used to say, "Wherever you go, be THERE." Were you THERE when they crucified my Lord.

Were you THERE? Were you really THERE when they crucified my Lord? What an extremely important question it is. Yet there is one question that is even more important. 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### **4-II Adult Leaders Honored**



PERMIT APPLICATION FOR MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE SITE

CITY OF SANTA ANNA has filed Application No. 1924 with the Texas Department of Health for a permit to operate a proposed Type III municipal solid waste site to be located 1.8 miles northwest of the northwest city limits of Santa Anna, approximately 2.0 miles northwest of the junction of U.S. Highway 67 with U.S. Highway 84, and adjacent to and southwest of Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad

in Coleman County. The application covers approximately 28.51 acres of land and seeks a permit to receive solid wastes under the regulatory jurisdiction of the Texas Department of Health for disposal or other processing in accordance with the said Department's 'Municipal Solid Waste Management Regulations." AUSTIN-Legislation designed to alter the state's long distance telecommunications regulatory polidy is now before the Texas Legislature.

Senate Bill 229 sponsored by Senator John Montford, D-Lubbock, and House Bill 468 by Representative Bill Haley, D-Center, would reduce the regulatory restrictions placed on AT&T and encourage direct competition among the more than 160 long distance companies now doing business in Texas.

"The legislation ensures that all Texans, not just those in major metropolitan areas, receive the benefits of an extensively competitive long distance market place." said Pres Sheppard, AT&T vice president external affairs. "Only an economically sound telecommunications industry can provide Texans with the latest technology and attractively priced services and options."

Today, AT&T is the only long distance company that must endure prolonged regulatory proceedings by the Texas Public Utility Commission before changing its prices, or offering new products and services.
