West Texas Utilities Co. has filed for an increase in its retail electric rates, citing the costs of completing

a new coal-fired power plant as making the move necessary. "We have said over and over again that it would be necessary to increase rates when our Oklaunion Power Station was completed," said

WTU's last rate request came almost three years ago. The rate changes being sought would add \$50,361,475 to the Company's annual retail revenue. This is a 23.9 percnet increase over the test year ending March 31, on which the case is based. The request was filed May 19 with cities in the WTU ser-

1986. WTU's share of the cost as majority owner is \$275 million. which increased the Company's total investment in facilities by 75 percent. Until this cost is reflected in our rates, the Company does not have the opportunity to recover its ex-

penses and earn a reasonable return on its investment," Wetsel explained.

Construction at Oklaunion started in May 1982, and the plant was completed on time and well within the original budget. Industry surveys show that Oklaunion was the most

economically constructed coal-fired power plant built during the mid-1980s.

Rate Increase

The plant will provide 25 percent of WTU's total generating capacity. The long-term contract for low sulphur western coal diversifies the Company's fuel base and will help stabilize fuel costs, which in recent years have been affected by sudden changes in natural gas prices.

Other company's owning shares of the plant are Public Service Co. of Oklahoma and Central Power and Light Co., both associated with WTU as members of the Central and South West System; the city of Brownsville and Oklahoma Muncipal Power Authority.

Usual procedures at the PUC indicate that a full-scale hearing of WTU's case would be held in late summer, with a final order by the Commission coming late this year. This would make it almost three years since WTU's last change in basic retail rates.

85 % Of Taxes Collected

The monthly report of tax collections showed eighty-five percent has been collected by the Coleman County Tax District for 1986. Chief Appraiser Bill Jones gave the report at the Monday, May 11, meeting of the Directors of the District.

The collections are just over one percent lower than the same period last year, according to Mr. Jones. Uncollected taxes are turned over to a collection frim in July.

Stacy Reservoir Ground Is "Broken"

After many delays spanned over a decade. West Texas officials "broke" ground for the \$70 million Stacy Dam project this past Saturday. The ceremony was held in the Ballinger High School parking lot because of threatening black clouds and because the construction site had received more than eight inches of rain in the last three days and was too muddy.

City, state and national leaders joked about the endangered Concho Water Snake, the project's last stumbling block, during the twohour ceremony. Elected officials and citizens from area communities took turns at turning dirt that had been hauled from the construction site 20 miles away and placed in a

When the dam project is complaced in three years, it will provide drinking water for over 566,360 peo-ple in San Angolo, Midland, Abilana and autrounding areas that buy water from the Colorado River

Municipal Water District. Revenue bonds will pay for this project.

"It will be an economic base for jobs and growth for our people." said Senator Phil Gramm to approximately 1500 people who attended the barbecue and ground-breaking ceremony. "It literally has the potential for making West Texas bloom in terms of new opportunities we all want for ourselves and our children," he added.

The reservoir will encompass more than 19,000 surface acres in Concho, Coleman and Runnels Counties and will have the capacity for 544,000 acre-feet of water, according to water district officials. The reservoir is being constructed by Brown and Root, Inc. and is located south of Ballinger near Leaday on the Colerado River.

The water district first filed a tailthing permit in 1977, but delays included the water make and battles in Legislature and the lederal government. The U.S. Plan and idille Service gave approval in

January for the water district to construct the reservoir if developers built rock nests for the endangered species of snake to live.

Gramm stated that he had argued with federal officials about the importance of the project to the area.

"I think that today with this symbolic turning of earth, we have pretty well guaranteed that if West Texans ever were in danger of being on the endangered-species list, we have taken them off today," Gramm said.

"It's the fulfillment of a dream that we didn't know would come shout," said Joe Pickle, the water district's secretary. "This says something about our water supply in West Texas. You can't wait until you rood it before you start semething lks this. You have to anticipate it by 18 years or more."

CONTACT LENSES: LOOK CAREFULLY BEFORE BUYING

LICENSING ADS

The ads include lines indicating that there are "unlicensed" persons fitting contact lenses. The fact is, there's no specific license for contact lens fitting. Both optometrists and opthalmologists are licensed by the state and may dispense either glasses or contact lenses. Opthalmologists are licensed as medical doctors and may do a wide range of treatments also. Optometrists are specialists in

corrective eye wear only. It appears that there is a small

A new product, Heartgard-30™, from MSD AGVET, a division of Merck & Co., Inc., takes advantage of a new compound-ivermectin-to prevent heartworm disease in dogs. The treatment is available by prescription from veternarians. It's given to dogs in tablet form once-a-month. It protects dogs from the disease by preventing the immature larvae deposited on dogs by mosquitoes from developing into sources to detect and treat your dog mature adults in the dog's heart and pulmonary arteries.

Consumers interested in getting war going on between optometrists of Texas. The deceptive advertising may be a result of that war.

It is also suggested in some advertising that unscrupulous operators have been using "factory reject" contact lenses. Although this may be occurring, we have had no complaints on the matter and the Federal Food and Drug Administration monitors contact lenses very carefully.

COMPLAINTS

Contact lenses come in sealed vials with lot numbers, much like prescription drugs. If you feel that you have not received a good pair of contact lenses, you should first check with the dispenser. After doing that, if you believe that you have been treated unfairly, you can complain to my Consumer Protection Division or to the proper licensing agency, such as the State Board of Optometry.

SHOPPING TIPS

As with any major purchase, it is best to shop around before making a final decision about where to buy. Of course, it is also wise to get recommendations from your doctor and friends who are satisfied customers.

It is generally wise to deal with an established firm in your community. And, as always, if an offer sounds too good to be true, it probably is.



(EDITOR'S NOTE: Following are representative questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA

Q-Does a general discharge from military service qualify me for benefits from the VA?

A-Yes. Honorable and general discharges qualify veterans for benefits, unless other statutory bars to entitlement exist.

Q-I am a Vietnam veteran and I am rated 10 percent for a serviceconnected disability. Am I subject to the eligibility assessment procedures?

A-No. The following veterans are exempt from the eligibility assessment procedures: service-connected veterans, former prisoners of war;, veterans exposed to certain herbicides while serving in Vietnam and to ionizing radiation in connection with atmospheric testing of nuclear weapons and in the occupation with atmospheric testing of nuclear weapons and in the occupation of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, veterans receiving a VA pension, veterans of World War I, the Spanish-American War and the Mexican Border period, and veterans eligible for Medicaid.

Q-When I purchase a home using a VA loan guaranty, will the income my spouse be considered?

A-The veteran's and the spouse's income are considered in determining ability to repay the loan.

Q-Can a non-veteran assume a GI

A-Yes. VA approval is not required before a veteran or a non-veteran assumes a GI loan. However, before the veteran-seller can be released from liability in the case of a loan default, the buyer must be a creditworthy obligor who is acceptable to

Former County Resident Will Retire From D.P.S.

On August 31, 1987 Trooper III, B. J. Zirkle will retire from the Department of Public Safety as a Texas State Trooper Trooper Zirkle has 30 years of service to the people of Texas.

He was born July 25, 1932 in Santa Anna, Coleman County, Texas, the second son of Earl Zirkle and Thelma Thate, both deceased. He grew up in the community of Burkett, 12 miles northeast of Coleman. His parents and grandparents are all buried in a family plot in Burkett, Texas.

By the time B. J. was 12, he not only helped his father and mother run the family farm, he was leasing land to farm himself and raising his own livestock. Upon graduationfrom high school, he took up farming as his occupation. In 1952 he married Barbara Ann Nalley. Receiving a new wife and a summons from Uncle Sam at about the same time, he. spent the next four years in the Air Force. During these four years he sold his farming business to his younger brother.

After an honorable discharge from the service, he applied for and was accepted to the recruit school for Texas State Troopers of the Department of Public Safety. He finished recruit school in September of 1957 and was stationed in Houston. Texas. From Houston he was moved to Texas City and then in 1961 he was sent to Austin. For the first 20 years B. J. was a routine officer, serving in driver license and later highway patrol. For the past 10 years he has been in the Governor's Executive Security at the State Capital. He has helped with security of Presidents of the United States, Vice Presidents, Governors and former Governors,

Princes and Kings of foreign countries and just plain citizens.

However, the record B. J. is proudest of is not some heroic deed but in 30 years as a trooper he has only pulled his weapon from its holster in self-defense one time and even then did not have to use it.

B. J. and Barbara have three children. Dana and Joe live in Austin and Janna Zirkle Hudson lives in Midland. They have two grandchildren, B. J. has two brothers and a sister; David Lee of Shields, Don E. of Austin, his sister, Linda Z. Dove of Austin. He is also the son-in-law of Josephine Fowler Zirkle of Cole-



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
