According to the nutritionist, oatmeal is high in 'gummy' fiber
which helps lower blood triglycerides as well as cholesterol. And ARS scientists in Madison, Wis. recently identified two chemicals in berley that dramatically reduce LDL-cholesterol in several animal
species, LDI cholesterol is thought to increase risk of heart disease. Also on the right track is the dictura "try everything on' your plate." But remimber, Guttman added,
