Annual Coleman Rodeo Starts Thursday

Coleman's 50th annual PRCA Rodeo will kick off tonight at 8:00 and run through Saturday night. The "dust free" rodeo arena is located on South Commercial at the edge of town near the golf course on 33 acres of land owned by the rodeo association and seats 6000.

The Coleman Rodeo is strictly professional and is approved by the Professional Cowboys Association and the Women's Rodeo Association. This insures that some of the top Cowboys and cowgirls in the nation will be competing for some \$6,300 added prize money.

Queen of the 1987 rodeo is Kelli Neal, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.F. (Sandy) Neal.

Stock will be furnished by the Mesquite Championship Rodeo Company of Mesquite, Texas owned by Neal Gay who has long been one of

the best known names in the sport of rodeo and for years has turned out some of the very best rodeo stock in the business.

Donnie Neff of Santa Anna will provide background music throughout the rodeo again this year as well as entertaining for about 30 minutes prior to each performance.

Jay Harwood from Albuquerque, N.M. will serve as rodeo announcer this year.

Clowns will be Quail Dobbs, Roach Hedeman and Chuck Kinney. Quail is from Coahoma, Texas and will provide the specialty act for the

rodeo. Quail was elected PRCA Clown of the Year in 1978 and won the "Walk Tall America Award" in 1981. He has thrilled crowds at the Coleman Rodeo for many years. Gary "Roach" Hedeman is from El

Paso, Texas and is new with us this year. Chuck Kinney, from Sulphur, Louisiana is back with us again this year for the second time.

Events this year include Bareback and Saddle Bronc Riding, Calf Roping, Steer Wrestling, Girls Barrell Racing, Bull Riding, and Single Steer Roping. The kids Goat Race will be held each night also.

Family night will be Thursday night and all tickets will be half price.

The rodeo dances will be held at the Rodeo Dance Pavillion each night starting at 9:00 p.m. Jody Nix of Big Spring, Texas will provide the music this year.

There will be one parade this year, on Saturday, featuring floats, out of town sheriff's posses and local riders.

Grand Jury Indicts Man For Assault On Watson

Richard Gonzales Diaz was indicted by the Coleman County Grand Jury for the 42nd Judicial District when it met Friday, June 26. Diaz is accused of the May 2 assault on Jimmy Watson of Santa Anna.

The 62-year old Watson was stabbed several times in the attack that occurred when the intruder entered his home during the night while Watson was in bed asleep.

Three indictments were returned in the case:

a. Attempted murder, a 2nd Degree Felony, violation of Penal Code Article 19.01;

b. Assault with a deadly weapon, a 2nd Degree Felony, violation of Penal Code Article 22.02;

c. Robbery, a 2nd Degree Felony, violation of Penal Code Article 29.02.

Jerald Keith Brooks, was indicted for the robbery of Elroy Dietzel of Santa Anna at Lake Scarbrough on May 22, a 2nd Degree Felony, violation of Penal Code Article 29.02.

Parker Named One Of 10 Best Legislators

State Rep. Jim Parker of Comanche, who represents the 65th legislative district including Brown County, has been named by "Texas Monthly" magazine as one of the state's 10 best legislators for the 70th regular session which ended May 31.

According to the publication, Parker was chosen as one of the 10 best because "he labors far from the spotlight in glamourless committees (criminal jurisprudence and judicial affairs). Parker is the kind of legislator who is easily overlooked. But no one in the House did as much to clean up so many bills," the magazine article claimed.

The magazine cited numerous rolls Parker played in heading subcommittees in the fight against crime, saying the representative's "relaxed wit and West Texas drawl make him an effective advocate when he does engage in floor debate, but he would rather be in committee, guarding the law and the constitution."

Upon receiving the honor, Parker was quoted as saying he was "very pleased" and "pleasantly surprised." "It's nice to do the work and then have someone appreciate it," he said.

Texas Monthly has for the past several years named the 10 best and 10 worst state legislators at the end of each regular session of the

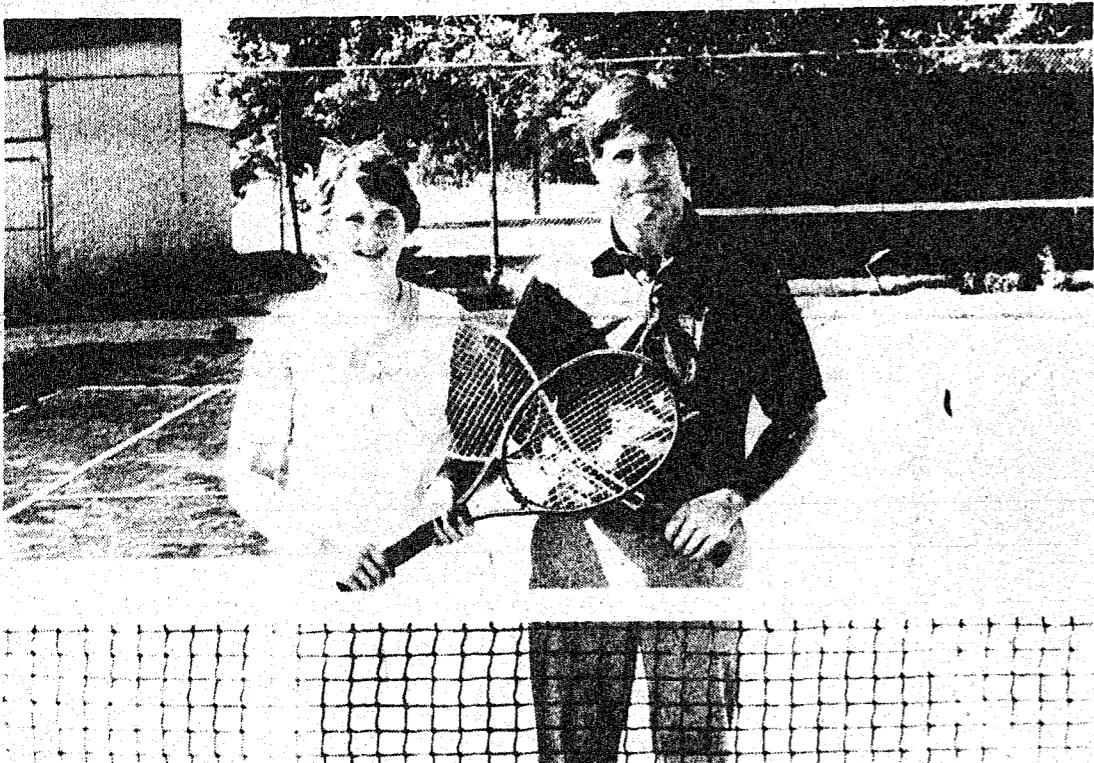
legislature. There was a twist this year, however.

Joining Parker on the "10 best" list were Sens. Kent Caperton, D-Bryan; Bob Glasgow, D-Stephenville; Ray Farabee, D-Wichita Falls; and representatives Juan Hinojosa, D-McAllen; Richard Smith, R-Bryan; Terral Smith, R-Austin; Jack Vowell, R-El Paso; Eddie Cavazos, D-Corpus Christi; and Bruce Gibson, D-Godley.

But the "10 worst" list included only seven legislators as the names of Gov. Bill Clements, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and House Speaker Gib Lewis were added due to what the magazine called a failure to provide leadership leading to the approval of a spending plan for the state.

The other seven "worst" legislators included are Reps. Betty Denton, D-Waco; Jim McWilliams, D-Hallsville; Bob Melton, D-Gatesville; Pete Patterson, D-Brookston; Al Price, D-Beaumont; and Sens. Ted Lyon, D-Rockwall; and Craig Washington, D-Houston.

Parker, a Democrat, serves as state representative for the 65th District, which includes Brown, Comanche, Coleman, Runnels, McCulloch and Eastland counties. He was re-elected last November to a third term after receiving about 62 percent of the vote from the six counties.

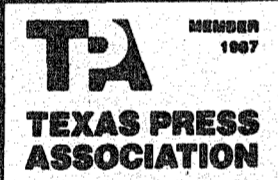

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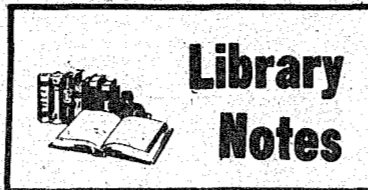
Letter To The Editor

IS YOUR LIFE WORTH 50¢
A MONTH?

Situation: At approximately 9:45 p.m., 2 miles out on U.S. 84, a severe head-on collision has occurred. As the next vehicle passes by, he immediately sends his wife to call the Ambulance. As she approaches the closest phone, she asks the operator to connect her to the local Ambulance. When the operator tells her that there is no Ambulance service in Coleman, her next thought is to call the police. After several minutes, they arrive at the scene. With no qualified emergency medical technicians at the scene, the police do the best they can at transporting the victims to the hospital. Two of the victims die enroute to the hospital from lack of oxygen and other life-threatening problems. The doctor at the emergency room reports that both patients could have survived if they had received prompt medical attention at the scene by certified medical technicians.

This is just an example of what could happen in our county without adequate emergency service. Most importantly...This could happen to you!

The general public has heard how much it would cost to support our local ambulance service - what they haven't heard is just how little it would cost. The approximate cost for each citizen of Coleman County would be less than \$6.00 per year, broken down, 50 cents per month. Our suggestion doesn't include raising taxes, but simply adding this small fee to a monthly utility bill. Why is it that we can spend 5 million dollars on a school, but refuse to pay \$6.00 a year for something that is far more vital to life? And, why is it that six men are able to make a decision concerning the welfare of the whole community. If we can vote for liquor, why can't we vote for life? All we ask is that we have some say in the matter before the issue is completely cast out. We expect our commissioners to make good judgments concerning our town. It is crazy to think that supporting our ambulance service is anything but good judgement. It is also crazy to think that a small ambulance service 7 miles out of the town could handle any emergency situation. What if two accidents happened at approximately the same time? What if they were on opposite ends of the county and what if three or more people were involved in both accidents? Anyone who remembers the tragic wrecks that happened last winter on the ice covered roads knows exactly the picture we are trying to portray. If not for the immediate action of an ambulance service with plenty of ambulances and a service on 24 hour call, more lives might have been lost. Ed and Patsy Freeman and the

We, as a class, realize how much time, effort and dedication it takes to be an EMT, and contrary to belief a volunteer service would be extremely difficult to organize. What good are volunteers without equipment? Who is going to buy an ambulance? Who is going to buy gas? Who is going to sit around a phone 24 hours a day with no pay to answer emergency calls? What employers are going to let their employees take off 2 or 3 hours to respond to calls or transport patients to Dallas or San Angelo? In all aspects, it seems the county would end up responsible for these debts anyway and would probably have to raise your taxes to take care of them.

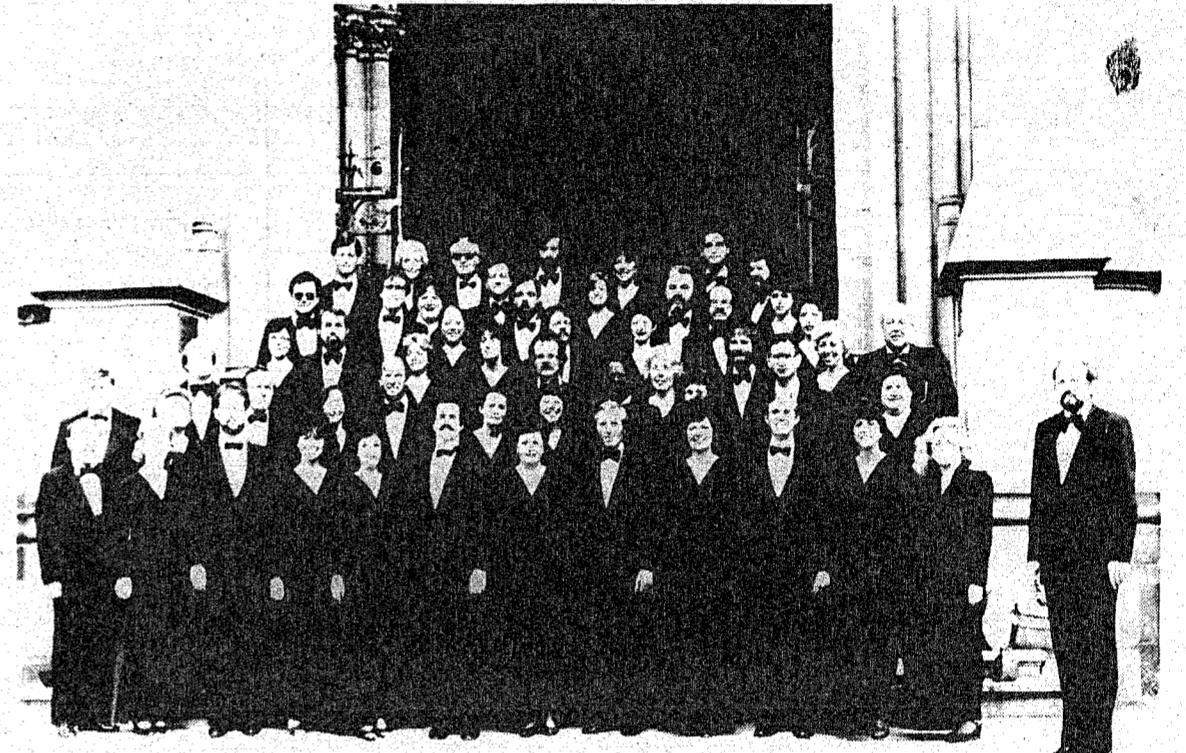
Sparkman Family Reunion June 28

From her hotel window she could see the campfires of the Confederate Army, but later she visited the troops, and then she wrote a poem that became one of the great Hymns of the Church.

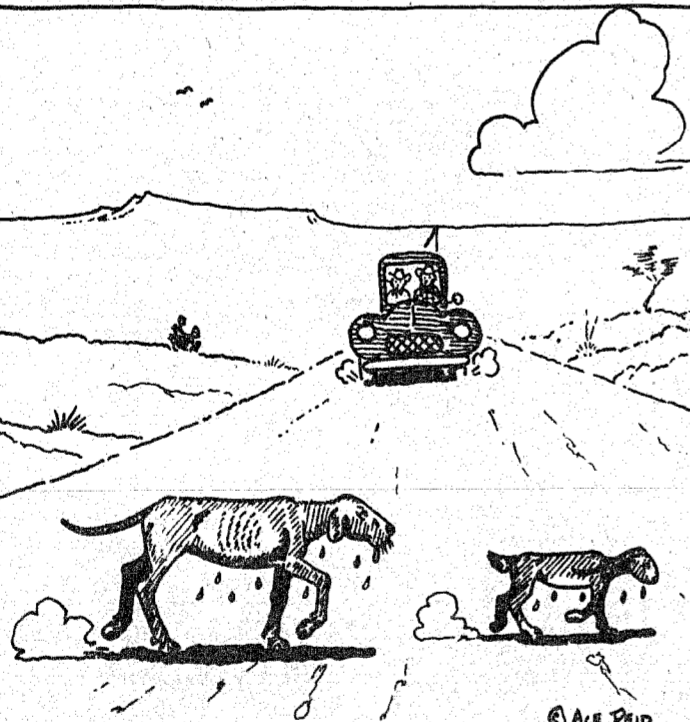
It begins:

STATEMENT OF DISCRIMINATION

COLEMAN COUNTY TELEPHONE COOP. INC. has filed with the Federal Government a Compliance Assurance in which it assures the Rural Electrification Administration that it will comply fully with all requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Agriculture issued thereunder to the end that no person in the United States shall on the ground of race, color or national origin be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of or otherwise subjected to discrimination in the conduct of its program and the operation of its facilities. Under this Assurance this organization is committed not to discriminate against any person on the ground of race, color or national origin in its policies and practices relating to applications for service or any other policies and practices relating to mistreatment of beneficiaries and participants including rates, conditions and extension of service, use of any of its facilities, attendance at and participation in any meetings of beneficiaries and participants or the exercise of any rights of such beneficiaries and participants in the conduct of the operations of this organization.

Any person who believes himself or any specific class of individuals to be subjected by this organization to discrimination prohibited by Title VI of the Act and the Rules and Regulations issued thereunder may by himself or a representative file with the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250, or this organization or all a written complaint. Such complaint must be filed not later than 180 days after the alleged discrimination or by such later date to which the Secretary of Agriculture or the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time for filing. Identity of complainant will be kept confidential except in the extent necessary to carry out the purpose of the Act and Regulations.

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County Talks Ambulance

Awards Contract On Elevator

All members and staff were present for the end of June meeting of the Coleman County Commissioners Court. Five visitors also attended.

Mrs. J.B. McCord addressed the commissioners saying, "We have got to have ambulance service here in Coleman". She stated that her family has needed emergency medical services a number of times and that, "We are well satisfied with the services of the present provider."

County Judge W.W. "Pete" Skelton responded saying "Our intention is that Coleman County have ambulance service." Commissioners Max Horne and Jack Strickland explained that a number of possible ways to provide that service are available and are being considered. Among those mentioned was the service as provided in neighboring Callahan County. There, reportedly, the county and cities buy the vehicles which are operated by trained volunteers.

Later in the meeting Judge Skelton circulated a letter he had received from Jimmy Eisenhower, President of Santa Anna Funeral Home, EMS. The letter was undated. Skelton said he understood that a similar letter had been sent to the Mayor and to members of the City Council.

In the letter, Eisenhower states: "It is our belief that due to the present economic condition in this county, that a large tax increase is not feasible for ambulance service. We are not saying that a subsidy would not be necessary at some point, but we feel now is not the right time."

"It is our feeling that we can provide professional ambulance service for this county with the same dedication that we now serve the Santa Anna area."

"We feel that no one can operate an ambulance service without charging for it, but with our present collection rate and the fact that we are already set up for ambulance service, we feel we could operate countywide from Santa Anna, and do not foresee any problems doing this."

That sounded like an offer to provide ambulance from Santa Anna. That possibility, plus the assurance

given McCord by Judge Skelton, and other options apparently being considered would seem to assure emergency service being continued in some manner.

In a related incidence in regard to the ambulance problem, the Coleman City Council on Thursday night of last week refused subsidy to Coleman County EMS. The Coleman City officials said they would be forced to limit ambulance service to the city of Coleman which could create legal problems.

In other business, Commissioners opened three bids for the elevator project at the county courthouse and awarded the contract to South Texas Elevator Service of San Antonio. Frank Knovicka, III, of that company was present and explained their proposals. The lift will be operable by November.

One of the three bids opened was not for a "turn key job" as specified so was rejected. The San Antonio firm was low bidder of the other two at \$58,563.00. Construction details for the project will be finalized within the month.

The elevator will be placed on the outside of the building on the east wing and south of the entranceway there. The elevator doors are to face north and south and will open onto extensions of the two hallways that will be enclosed. The bricks are to match, as nearly as possible, those installed when the structure was built. The county will, at its own expense, provide electrical connections to the elevator site.

The Commissioners approved several bills for payment; approved the selling of an old pickup and the purchase of another; a 1984 model for Precinct 4; approved three requests from oil companies to drill under county roads.

Shirly Sansing, County Auditor, showed off her new computer which had been installed since the last meeting. Voter registrations will be recorded on the unit and that work is now underway by personnel from the office of Billie Baker, County Tax Collector. The computer is also used by Sansing for accounting purposes.

Frank Mills: West Texas Lawman

(Editors Note-The next several weeks we will be running a series of articles from a book written by Billy Mills who is the son of the late Frank Mills. Billy has been Sheriff at Ozona for over thirty years and in his book writes about his father who was a Sheriff of Coleman County. The book was loaned to us by Ray Owen.)

Perhaps one of the most celebrated episodes in Coleman County's history with which Sheriff Mills had dealings was the Trammell Brothers Case. This was really a series of robberies and hijackings which the several brothers by the name of Trammell had committed over a period of time. These boys had been jailed in Tahoka, Texas, on a charge of robbery with firearms when they made their escape. They made their way back to their home "stomping grounds" for awhile. However, Sheriff Mills and other law officials got "hot" on their trail. In order to keep dodging the law, the Trammells had to resort to a series of automobile and cash thefts. This latest escapade started on June 10, 1933, and ended July 7, 1933, with the death of Doc Trammell and the capture of Luke.

To say the Trammell brothers were hijackers would be to say the least—they were notorious, fastworking outlaws. To Prove this last point one only has to look at the following: A Chevrolet was taken from C.W. Dunn at Abilene, June 27, 1933; another Chevrolet from R.W.

Burleson of Ballinger, June 30. It seemed as if the gang had to make up for lost time from June 30 to July 4th. For it was July 4th that they stole a Ford pickup from C.W. Hemphill near Valera, a Hupmobile and \$45 cash from Mitchell refinery near Coleman. Also on that same day a Pontiac was taken from a Mr. Baker. On July 5th the boys gave Coleman County a breather and went to San Angelo where they stole a car from Mr. Tom Finley and even kidnapped him for a short while.

According to Luke Trammell afterwards, "Everytime we hijacked one (automobile) it was because another had either been wrecked or deserted in a get away from officers." Trammell went on to say that "We didn't want to kill, but might have done so if the opportunity had come our way when cornered and knowing life depended upon it. One certainly would have been foolish to suggest that he was only kidding. Sheriff Mills had collected from the Trammell Gang the following arsenal: a .30 Remington pump gun and a 30-30 Winchester saddle gun, a .45 Colt double action, a .45 Smith and Wesson double action, and a .38 special Smith and Wesson and fifty rounds of ammunition for the pistols.

The Associated Press gave the following account of the Trammell gang's capture:

"In an exchange of shots with officers (Sheriff Mills and other lawmen) last night, (July 7, 1933),

Starkweather (Doc) Trammell, brother of Luke, was wounded fatally and Luke was forced to surrender.

Officers had been hunting the brothers for the last ten days in connection with a series of holdups and thefts in this section. They were in dense woods about two miles north of Coleman (Hords Creek Bridge) Friday night and in trying to slip through the cordon of officers (more than one hundred men in the posse) came in sight of Sheriff Mills, Deputy Sheriff Roby and two citizens, Ralph Stubblefield and Leon Shield.

Sheriff Mills said they all opened fire after the fugitives had refused to obey an order to halt. Mills said the Trammells returned the shots.

A bullet struck Starkweather Trammell (eighteen years old) in the head causing his death two hours later at a hospital. His brother called to officers he would surrender. (Luke was twenty-four years old)."

Sheriff Mills received many congratulatory messages as a result of his work in the Trammell boy's capture. One of these messages was from the Ward County Sheriff F. Dyer, who also wanted the boys on theft and burglary charges, "Allow me to congratulate you on your good work in getting the Trammell boys. It will stop for a while at least the depreating of a pretty bad bunch."

Luke Trammell later escaped from Guthrie County, Oklahoma jail where he was awaiting sentence on charges there. He again made his way to his native county, Coleman, where he was again captured by Frank Mills. This time Mills and a group of officers traced Trammell to the southern part of Coleman County where he was hiding. This time he offered no resistance after running from the house to a small outhouse. When commanded by Mills to come out, he did so without giving the sheriff and his men any trouble—he even begged Mills not to shoot him. On this occasion Luke Trammell was taken to Stephenville where he faced charges on automobile theft.

In all, Trammell had accumulated a total of 150 years in the penitentiary. Twenty of these came for the hijacking and assault of C.W. Hemphill near Valera.

Man Enters Guilty Plea

A Santa Anna man pleaded guilty in Brown County District Court last Wednesday to felony drug charges resulting from an April 17 narcotics bust.

Thomas Dudley Sansom, 28, was handed two concurrent 10-year prison sentences by District Judge Earnest Cadenhead.

Sansom and his wife were arrested by Department of Public Safety Officers when a vehicle they were in stopped near Early. A large quantity of methamphetamine was seized.

Sansom's wife, Lisa Shelton Sansom, 27, also pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 10 years probation and a \$1000 fine.

Salt-Free Pickling Hints

If you love pickles but have to cut back on your salt, making your own saltless or low-salt pickles can be an alternative. This process is safe because vinegar is the main preservative in fresh pack pickles.

Sweet pickles generally taste better without salt than dill pickles, but don't expect either to taste just like regular pickles. Dill pickles will taste better with at least 1/2 to 3/4 teaspoons of salt per pint jar. Add hot peppers, herbs and garlic to improve the flavor.

Avoid using salt substitutes or lye salt in pickling. They don't serve the same function as the sodium chloride in regular salt. The large amounts of potassium in these products can also leave a bitter aftertaste in the pickles.

Any fresh-pack pickle recipe that calls for as much or more vinegar than water and produces a finished product with at least 1 1/2 cup 5 percent (4-6 grain) acetic acid vinegar per pint, can be made successfully without salt.

As with regular pickles, it's necessary to pressure-canner or hot-salt pickles in a boiling water bath.

SCALLOP CHOWDER

| 12 sea scallops | Juice of 1 lemon | 1 1/4 cups fish stock |
| 1 large onion | 6 ozs. slab bacon | 4 potatoes |
| 1 carrot | 1 parsnip | 1 green pepper |
| 2 stalks celery | 2 1/2 cups milk | Salt and black pepper |
| Juice of 1 orange | 1 tablespoon flour | 2 tablespoons butter |

Sprinkle with scallops with lemon juice and allow to stand for 15 minutes. Cut each scallop into four pieces and put them in a saucepan with the fish stock. Bring to the boil, cover the pan and simmer four 10 minutes. Peel and thinly slice the onion. Put the bacon in a saucepan and cook over low heat until the fat runs. Remove the bacon and add the onion to the pan, cooking it in the bacon fat until transparent. Peel and dice the potatoes, carrot and parsnip. Cut the pepper in half, remove the stem, seeds and white midribs, and slice the flesh. Add these vegetables, with the cleaned and roughly chopped celery, to the onion. Pour the milk into the pan and bring to simmering point. Season with salt and freshly ground pepper. Add the orange juice; return the bacon to the pan, and simmer, covered, until the vegetables are tender. Lift out the bacon and dice it finely. Stir the scallops, the stock and the bacon into the chowder.
