The contest is for members only of the Old Time Fiddler's Association. Anyone may become a member by paying a \$10 membership fee.

A citywide promotion that started with an idea from Carry Cochran and Dub Franklin and picked up on by the Chamber of Commerce and city officials will bring an "Old Fiddlers Contest" to town Saturday in what is hoped will be an annual affair. Bring your lawn chairs and be there to hear some great fiddling and guitar picking. The event is free of charge to the public. Sponsors emphasize that this will be family type entertainment.

Competition will begin at 10:00 a.m. with the 0-9 youth division. Prize money will be awarded for first, second and third places with the Youth division, \$30, \$20 and \$15; Junior division, age 10-19, \$55, \$30 and \$20; those between the ages of 20 to 59, \$150, \$100 and 75; and "Young Timers", 60 yrs. and older, \$125, \$100 and \$75.

There will also be spaces available for anyone wishing to set up a booth for selling arts and crafts, etc. Contact Dub Franklin at the Opera House. There is no charge for the booth space.

Dub Franklin and The Opera Kings will provide the music for a street dance that evening beginning at 9:00 p.m.. Donations will be accepted.

All funds raised during the days events will be given to the City.

in six weeks, or less, and then the firm can advertise for construction bids. With no problems being encountered, construction might begin in two to three months.

Phase 5 will serve much of the east part of Coleman County, and will double the size of the system. Presently there are about 800 customers and when Phase 5 is completed there will be almost 1600 meters.

The construction itself will provide a strong economic boost to the county as many people will be employed and much material used.

## County Approves Specs For Ambulance Bids

The Coleman County Commissioners approved specifications Friday for bids on the controversial ambulance subsidy.

Companies who want to operate ambulances in the county can enter bids saying how large a subsidy they

will need. Bids will be received until Sept. 14, when the commissioners will open them, County Judge Pete Skelton, said.

The bid specifications were hammered out during a meeting held last week with the commissioners and County Attorney Joe Dan LeMay.

The bid specifications say a company must operate two ambulances in the county 24 hours a day and have a stand by unit. They don't say where the ambulances should be based, but it is expected that the commissioners will ask that one be based in Coleman.

Because the referendum election attracted media attention, Skelton said that two ambulance companies from outside the county have contacted him about bids.

The Commissioners Court had met earlier on Monday of last to once again deal with the ambulance subsidy issue. All members of the Commissioners Court were present to face the problem before them.

The canvass of the votes in the referendum on the subsidy showed no errors in the reports and the final totals remained 781 'for' and 449 'against', with almost 80 percent of

the county's registered voters not voting on the issue.

About ten people had gathered to meet with the commissioners concerning the subsidy. Mayor Theima Brooker and others from Santa Anna were among the group. Mayor Brooker told the court that she was concerned about the fact that the two ambulance services now based in Santa Anna were not subsidized and feels a subsidized service should be based here. She also expressed concern that the subsidy would raise county taxes.

Judge W.W. "Pete" Skelton assured the group there would be no tax increase this year, but, "we are trying to avoid making a promise of no tax increase".

Ms. Brooker wondered if more than two ambulances would be required and received the reply that two would be a minimum and probably three would be needed to serve the county.

Dorothy Eisenhower also expressed her concern that an ambulance be based in Santa Anna and that the county should specify that vehicles be in good running order and all state requirements met for both vehicles and personnel.

Ed Freeman, operator of the Coleman EMS stated that he thinks two units will be enough "for Coleman County Needs". He did say that basing ambulances at two different locations within the county might require a third unit.

Freeman also expressed concern over the length of time that the bidding process might take. Skelton said that the earliest possible date that bids could be opened would be September 14. Freeman was concerned about being able to keep operating until that time, but said that he would try.

During the discussion, someone informed the Court that there were a number of people who voted 'for' the subsidy thinking that a 'for' vote meant that the county would pick up the tab for ambulance service in the future.

After the discussion, the commissioners received a draft of a proposed bid request for county ambulance service prepared by County Attorney, Joe Dan LeMay. The draft is a three page single spaced document

which the individual commissioners were to study before the meetings when the specifications were finally approved.

Several letters concerning the ambulance question had been received by Judge Skelton. The letters were read to the commissioners. All the letters were from Santa Anna.

In other action taken by the commissioners during their regular meetin on Monday of last week, they continued working on the proposed budget for next year with most items agreed upon. However several part-time salaries are not finalized and costs for the ambulance subsidy remains anybody's guess

## School Officials Looking At Drug Detection Programs

The Santa Anna school board met in its regular session on Tuesday night August 11 and among items discussed were drug detection programs. Several possibilities were discussed and the board gave the administration approval to look into an on campus drug detection program. According to school officials there is a definite need for inacting a program of this sort. The matter will be further discussed at the September meeting and action taken on what kind of programs to implement.

The board also approved a policy concerning the use of tobacco. In the policy approved by the board, the use of tobacco of any form will be forbidden on the campus or at school related activities. The use of tobacco in any form will be prohibited in the grandstands during a football game or other sporting events held at the stadium and is also forbidden in the gymnasium.

Betty Coffee, who was employed with the school system last year as a 5th grade teacher was given coaching duties in addition to her continuing as a classroom teacher. She will be assistant coach for girl's basketball and assistant tennis coach.

In other routine business, the board approved the continuation of Santa Anna National bank as the depository for school funds for the 1987-88 biennium.

Amendments were approved for the 1986-87 operating budget.

Time periods were set for teacher appraisals. The board met again on Thursday, August 13 for a budget workshop getting the 1987-88 budget in order for presentation at the Thursday, August 20th public hearing. That meeting will be held in the board room of the administration office on the school campus at 7:30 p.m.

## Phase 5 Work To Begin In Two to Three Months

A big hurdle has been cleared in the proposed Phase 5 project by the Coleman County Water Corporation, according to Raymond Bush, executive president. Local paper work has been completed and the information is being forwarded to the

Farmers Home Administration office in Junction.

Some delay had been encountered in securing contracts and in dealing with some chemical land covers.

## Observation Point Being Developed At Stacy Dam Site

An observation point is being developed at the Stacy Dam Site on the high bluff on the south side of the river, overlooking the entire construction area. This will be complete and open to the public within three to four weeks, according to an announcement made last week.

Currently traffic is not allowed on the construction site. The observation point will allow interested people to drive out at any time and stay as long as they like. Up to this time this has not been possible. Only persons there on approved business have been allowed into the area.

To reach the observation point, go to Leaday, cross the low-water crossing on the Colorado River just south of Leaday, then turn left, following signs. The road is not yet open all the way and an announcement will be made when it is.

The tunnel drilling was to have begun Monday with a special machine "a mole" which has been brought in for the job. The tunnel is in rock, and the machine will drill about 40 feet a day. The machine costs about \$1000 a day to operate.

The tunnel, 10 feet high and eight feet wide, will be under and parallel to the dam. Its purpose is for drainage. It will be pierced at close intervals with four inch entrance holes. Any moisture under the dam creates problems and this tunnel is designed to properly handle the drainage. Exit from the tunnel will be into the river below the dam. The top of the tunnel will be 30 feet below the bottom of the dam.

Water district officials must also arrange for relocation of several area cemeteries before the dam is completed and the lake begins to fill up.

In addition to a cemetery near Leaday, which the water district knew was there, two small cemeteries have been found in the reservoir's flood plain.

Relatives of those buried in the cemeteries will be contacted to determine where they will be moved and the water district will hire a mortician to move those whose relatives can't be found.

An agreement with federal officials also calls for the water district to collect and preserve archeological artifacts that would be found by the reservoir.

Michael B. Collins, an archaeologist hired by the water district, has found a stone-lined structure that he estimates is 2,000 years old. Neolithic Indians, ancestors of plains Indians like the Comanches most likely used it.

## Library Notes

### Check It Out

Ever wonder where those silly Mother Goose rhymes came from? We all memorized a few, some many, but what is the meaning of "Little Jack Horner sitting in a corner?"

Checkerboard Press has done some research into this question. They publish THE REAL MOTHER GOOSE. Their research shows Mother Goose may have been modeled after Charlemagne's mother (8th century). A storyteller of sorts who was often referred to as Queen Goosefoot. Mother Goose was known in France for centuries thereafter as the supposed originator of any incredible tale, especially those intended for children.

She made her way into England with the translation of Perrault's 1697 publication, "Tales of Mother Goose," which consisted of a series of fairy tales. In 1791, the Newberry edition of traditional verses and jingles under the title "Mother Goose's Melody" appeared, each illustrated with a tiny woodcut.

Eventually, more and more nursery rhymes—some very old with roots in folklore—began to be linked with successive editions of Mother Goose.

The rhymes themselves are based on a wide range of sources: ballads, prayers, rituals, jests, tongue twisters, games and historical facts. For example, "Old King Cole" is supposedly based on a third-century British king, although evidence is rather thin.

"Little Jack Horner" refers to a man who apparently gained numerous lands in Somersetshire in the 1540's during the reign of King Henry VIII. But whether he also delivered the deed of 12 manors to the king in a Christmas pie-pulling out one of them, the "plum," is anybody's guess.

"Ride a cock-horse to Banbury Cross" has been identified with Lady Godiva's chilly ride, as well as Queen Elizabeth I's enjoyment of the equestrian sport. Regardless, the actual cross was destroyed in 1601 by zealous Puritans.

## Thoughts From Our Pastors

### THE IMPORTANCE OF BAPTISM

It would seem to this writer that anyone who has ever studied the New Testament to any profit at all should be impressed with the divine emphasis placed on water baptism. It shall be my purpose in this brief article simply to point out, as space will permit, what the scriptures teach on this subject. It is my prayer that those who read will understand and obey the instructions which God has given us.

Baptism, even that preached by John, was "for the remission of sins" Mark 1:4-6; Luke 3:3. Both John and Jesus knew this, and so, when Jesus came to John to be baptized of him, "John forbade him, saying, I have need to be baptized of thee, and comest thou to me? And Jesus answering said unto him, suffer it to be so: for thus it becometh us to fulfill all righteousness. Then he suffered him" Matthew 3:13-17. Please note that John, knowing that Jesus was sinless, did not understand why Jesus should need to be baptized: But when Jesus explained that it was a part of fulfilling God's righteousness, he understood and complied with Jesus' request.

Both Jesus and his disciples, during his personal ministry before his death, burial and resurrection, preached the same message and baptized for the same purpose as John. That is "The baptism of repentance for the remission of sins" Luke 3:3. But John's ministry and his baptism did not actually put people into Christ or into his church or body, but only prepared them for his coming and the establishment of his kingdom or church.

After his death, burial and resurrection, Jesus commanded his apostles to "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved" Mark 16:15-16. He thus made baptism an essential part of the plan of salvation for all men.

On Pentecost, when people asked "Men and brethren what shall we do? Then Peter said to them, Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins; Acts 2:37-38. Thus the baptism in the name of Jesus Christ was and is "for the remission of sins".

After three days and nights of agonizing prayer and fasting, Saul of tarsus was told by the inspired messenger of the Lord, Ananias, "And now why tarriest thou? arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord" Acts 22:16. Thus baptism was essential to the washing away of sins.

That same Saul "who also is called Paul" inquired of Christians in Rome as follows, "Know ye not, that so many of us are baptized into Jesus Christ were baptized into his death. Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death; that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. For if we have been planted together in the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection" Romans 6:3-5. Then in verses 17-18 he wrote, "God be thanked, that ye were the servants of sin, but ye have obeyed from the heart that form of doctrine which was delivered you. Being then made free from sin, ye became the servants of righteousness"

Peter wrote—"Baptism doth also now save us" 1-Peter 3:21.



# Stewardson Cemetery

John Stewardson and W.B. Harper platted the cemetery at the death of two-year old Lilly Harper, grand-daughter of John Stewardson. The cemetery consists of two acres of land in the southeast part of John Stewardson Survey No. 90, abstract 1001 being the same two acres Arthur Lee and Ora Lee Stewardson conveyed to the trustees of the Stewardson Cemetery in 1909 for the sum of \$46.00. The original trustees were W.B. Harper, Robert Milligan, and George Stewardson. In 1911, John M. Stewardson, Robert A. Milligan, and W.T. Stewardson were appointed to serve in that capacity. Present trustees are Burgess Stewardson and Dr. Tommy Stewardson.

The cemetery is located approximately twelve miles south of Santa Anna, Texas, one mile east of Highway 263, and it has a perimeter of 332' x 212'. There are fifty-one marked graves and eight unmarked graves, one being a rock structure built 12" to 15" above the ground and another one being the site of a night burial.

The Stewardson family discovered a new grave one morning and they have been unable to determine who is buried there or why this location was chosen. In the early 1900's, members of a wagon train traveling through asked permission to bury their children who had died of a fever here. Their graves are marked only with stones. The serenity of that day and time, still prevails in the cemetery today, as birds, turkeys, deer, and other wildlife are often seen quietly feeding nearby.

There are two trees in the cemetery, one being an arbor vitae that Arthur L. Stewardson planted at the head of the grave of his first wife, Artie May, who died in 1900. The other tree is a live oak that is growing in the northern section near

the grave of Theola Stewardson, daughter of W.T. and Jessie Ella Stewardson.

Members of the pioneer family buried elsewhere include: Emma Stewardson Harper who is buried beside her husband, S.D. Harper, in the Santa Anna Cemetery, Santa Anna, Texas and also, Arthur Lee Stewardson who is buried beside his second wife, Ora Lee Williams Stewardson, in the Eldorado Cemetery, Eldorado, Texas. Two young children, thirteen month-old Sarah Jane and fifteen month-old John H. Stewardson, are buried in the Jordan Cemetery, five miles east of Shelbyville, Illinois where the Stewardsons lived prior to their move to Texas.


In 1979, the Stewardson family accepted the recommendation by W.T. Stewardson to establish a Memorial Endowment Fund to provide financial means for continued upkeep and maintenance of the cemetery. Mrs. Gayle Stewardson was appointed administrator of this account.
