Council Receives Keeney Resignation

The City Council received a written resignation From Councilman Jim Keeney last week. He had turned it in at City Hall November 3 and the Council was informed during their meeting last Thursday. Mayor Brooker stated there would be a called meeting in two weeks to discuss filling the vacancy. Keeney cited personal reasons for his resignation. He was elected for the term as councilman in April of this year.

The council approved the purchase of filters for the water plant at the cost of \$4,897.98.

Dudley Sansun had submitted the only bid on the 78 Chrysler police car the City had advertised for sale by bids. Sansun's \$75 bid was rejected.

There was a discussion and passage of a City Lake Ordinance prohibiting the the use of all-terrian

vehicles in the vicinity of the city lake dams and spillways. The ordinance amended an old City Lake Ordinance.

The City has 120 votes for directors of the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District Board and council cast all of them for Barbara Kingsbery.


A discussion was held on the TDCA Grant application and matching funds. It seems the City can do the paperwork themselves and match \$9,577 cash and it would appear on the application as the City matching \$19,577 and they would receive an extra 35 points. Its purpose is to encourage mammograms for women who have no symptons, he

The American Cancer Society says all women between the age of 35-40 should have a mammogram. Women between 40 and 50 without symptons should have a mammogram every one to two years.

The society also says women over 50 should have an annual mammogram. Those women with a family history of breast cancer should have a mammogram at age 30 and those with previous breast cancer should be examined yearly. According to the Cancer Society, one of every ten women will develope breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. 



The devaluation of the American dollar is a fact of life.

Although not so dramatic, but perhaps more important is the continuous trend toward the devaluation of human life. When men and women are identified only by numbers rather than by names, and when conglomerates and mass production dictate more and more of the daily life of families and individuals, it is impossible to ignore the conclusion that human life has cheapened. Inflationary food prices and the devaluation of the dollr may force you to shift your priorities...but if you should be disturbed enough to make an honest search for true values, you would surely find the greatest value of all in a growing commitment to faith in the LIVING GOD. 



Young men born in 1961 were required to register with selective Service in July 1980 when President Carter reinstituted the registration requirement. These men turn 16 in 1987. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept a young man's registration after he has reached his 26th birthday.

Harold Doyle, Texas Selective Service State Director, warned that, with few exceptions, a man who fails to register before turning 26 will permanently forfeit his eligibility for federal student financial aid, job training benefits and most federal employment. Additionaly, nonregistrants face possible prosecution as felons.

Texas has registered nearly one million men since 1980.
