394 Enrolled In Santa Anna **School System**

The fall enrollment at the Santa Anna Schools is down about 28 students from last year, with the decrease of 42 students in elementary school. High School enrollment is up from last year to 139 students, an encrease of 16 over the first weeks of 1986.

Enrollment by class is as follows: Kindergarten, 20; First Grade, 25; Second Grade, 27; Third Grade, 25; Fourth Grade, 29; Fifth Grade, 36; Sixth Grade, 33; Seventh Grade, 35; and Eigth Grade, 25. The total enrollment for the elementary school is 255.

There are 27 students in the Senior Class and 30 in the Junior Class. The largest class in the local school is the Sophomore Class with 53 enrolled. The Freshman Class has an enrollment of 29. The High School total enrollment is 139.

County Tax Board Eyes Collections

Directors of the Coleman County Tax Appraisal Board met September 14th at the Tax office in Coleman, and among other matters dealt with, heard the monthly financial report given by Chief Appraiser Bill Jones.

Barbara Kingsbery, chairman, led the meeting. Minutes of the last meeting were read by Billie Wright, secretary, prior to Jones' report.

According to Jones, collections of the 1986 taxes show the total to be almost the same as this time last year. The City of Novice and the City

Commissioners Agree The County To Join With Crime Task Force

The Coleman Country Commissioners Court last week approved involvement of Coleman County with other area counties in a West Central Texas Inter-Local Crime Task

The focus of the effort, which will not envolve extra finances, will be on drugs. Both the Sheriff and the Assistant County Attorney are reported to approve local envolvement

As reported last week, Ed Freeman, owner of Coleman County Emergency Medical Service was awarded the subsidy for ambulance service in Coleman County. No bid

was made by either Santa Anna ambulance service. County residents will still have to

pay a charge for ambulance service. The subsidy is to make up the difference between expenses and the revenues of the provider.

Ed Freeman, operator of the service awarded the subsidy contract is to provide 6 full-time and 2 part-time trained personnel in the county. Two state approved ambulances are to be ready to make Immediate response to an emergency and a third one is to be available for use within 40 minutes.

Fees for the use of ambulances begin at a base rate of \$75.00 for nonof Santa Anna lead with 93 percent of the taxes being collected at this

The board discussed a change in cost of tax certificate fees but chose to leave the charge the same as in

the previous years. A new state requirement for annual financial audit was discussed, and plans made to have the audit of the district each year to comply with the new ruling. The tax district has had an audit every two years since

being established in 1980. The group also heard information comcerning the staggered terms for

emergency runs and \$85,00 for emergencies. Mileage and other

charges vary in each instance. Upon being told that the City of Santa Anna had passed an ordinance that requres ambulances operating within the city limits to have a city permit, Freeman stated he had no objection to "ambulance services operating over there". He said that if Santa Anna residents call their local service provider he feels this leaves him out and under no obligation. However, if he receives a call he will dispatch a vehicle to handle the request.

County Attorney, Joe Dan LeMay requested additional funding for the Adult Probation Office. He had advised the court that with the office staffed 41/2 days a week at present, fee income to the county has encreased significantly. To keep the office time from being reduced to 2 days a week, the county must come up with about \$5,000 additional funding for the year. The concensus was that revenues produced by the office more than pay for the extra cost and the county should encrease the funding as nescessary.



Shades of Big Brother

In his classic novel 1984, the British writer George Orwell created a society where government reigned surpreme over the private lives of all its citizens. The world, unfortunately, is crowded with governments that follow the "Big Brother" example outlined

Americans are protected from such abuse of power by the U.S. Constitution, whose 200th anniversary we are celebrating this year. The power of the federal government is tempered with specific limitations on its power over individual citizens. Under our democratic form of government, where the majority of the electorate chooses our leaders, the Constitution wisely protects the rights of those in the minority.

The framers of our Constitution were well aware of the often flagrant abuses of power by colonial governments. Many colonies had adopted state religions supported by public tax dollars. If the members of a certain denomination or sect were predominant in a colony, they were able to, and often did, outlaw the open worship of other creeds. While the cruelest discrimination may have been in Puritan-dominated New England, where followers of other faiths were at times executed, other areas also had long records of discrimination. For example, Baptist preachers were jailed routinely in

By guaranteeing the basic rights of all, the U.S. Constitution established a watchword for our nation: tolerance. Mr. Jones may be a Baptist and a Democrat but that doesn't keep him from respecting his neighbor, Mrs. Smith, who happens to be a Methodist and a Republican. It would never occur to either of them that laws should be passed outlawing churches and political parties other than their

Freedom to choose our own lifestyles and to grant others the same right is the true spirit of America. To forget those principles is to begin to destroy that precious gift given to us 200 years ago by our Founding Fathers—the U.S. Constitution.

394 Enrolled In Santa Anna **School System**

The fall enrollment at the Santa Anna Schools is down about 28 students from last year, with the decrease of 42 students in elementary school. High School enrollment is up from last year to 139 students, an encrease of 16 over the first weeks of 1986.

Enrollment by class is as follows: Kindergarten, 20; First Grade, 25; Second Grade, 27; Third Grade, 25; Fourth Grade, 29; Fifth Grade, 36; Sixth Grade, 33; Seventh Grade, 35; and Eigth Grade, 25. The total enrollment for the elementary school is 255.

There are 27 students in the Senior Class and 30 in the Junior Class. The largest class in the local school is the Sophomore Class with 53 enrolled. The Freshman Class has an enrollment of 29. The High School total enrollment is 139.

Commissioners Agree The County To Join With Crime Task Force

The Coleman Counmty Commissioners Court last week approved involvement of Coleman County with other area counties in a West Central Texas Inter-Local Crime Task

The focus of the effort, which will not envolve extra finances, will be on drugs. Both the Sheriff and the Assistant County Attorney are reported to approve local envolvement

As reported last week, Ed Freeman, owner of Coleman County Emergency Medical Service was awarded the subsidy for ambulance service in Coleman County. No bid

was made by either Santa Anna ambulance service.

County residents will still have to pay a charge for ambulance service. The subsidy is to make up the difference between expenses and the revenues of the provider.

Ed Freeman, operator of the service awarded the subsidy contract is to provide 6 full-time and 2 part-time trained personnel in the county. Two state approved ambulances are to be ready to make Immediate response to an emergency and a third one is to be available for use within 40 minutes.

Fees for the use of ambulances begin at a base rate of \$75.00 for nonof Santa Anna lead with 93 percent of

the taxes being collected at this The board discussed a change in cost of tax certificate fees but chose

to leave the charge the same as in the previous years. A new state requirement for an-

nual financial audit was discussed, and plans made to have the audit of the district each year to comply with the new ruling. The tax district has had an audit every two years since being established in 1980.

The group also heard information comcerning the staggered terms for emergency runs and \$85.00 for emergencies. Mileage and other charges vary in each instance.

Upon being told that the City of Santa Anna had passed an ordinance that requres ambulances operating within the city limits to have a city permit, Freeman stated he had no objection to "ambulance services operating over there". He said that if Santa Anna residents call their local service provider he feels this leaves him out and under no obligation. However, if he receives a call he will dispatch a vehicle to handle


the request. County Attorney, Joe Dan LeMay requested additional funding for the Adult Probation Office. 
