## Political Year Will Have Earlier Start

There are changes for the upcoming "political year", mostly in the area of filing sooner and voting sooner.

Candidates for office may file December 3 through January 4, and the party primaries will be held on March 8. Here in Coleman County, two persons have already declared their intent to seek the office of sheriff, that being Chief Deputy Wade Turner and former sheriff Corky Chapman.

Terms of six county officials expire at the end of 1988, those being Sheriff H. F. Fenton (who has said he will not seek re-election), Precinct 1 County Commissioner Jack Strickland, Precinct 3 County Com-

missioner Vernon Slate, Tax Assessor-Collector Billie Baker, County Attorney Joe D. LeMay, and Constable Rondoe Horton. On the district level, the term of Judge Don Lane will expire.

Filing as candidates for the primary party elections will be with County Chairman Baker Rudolph for Democrats and with County Chairman Beck Knox for Republicans.

Word has been received here that persons wishing to file for precinct chairman may file now, and those wishing to file for county chairman may begin filing on December 3. All applications must be filed not later than January 4, 1988 at 6:00 p.m.

## Coleman County Tax District Board Meeting

Tax collections for the month of October have been high, according to Bill Jones, Chief Appraiser of the Coleman County Tax District. The recent figure includes some delinquent taxes.

In his report to the Board of Directors of the District, Jones told that over 90 percent of the 1986 taxes have been collected, with Santa Anna ISD having the highest collection rate with 94 percent. Other taxing entities have collection rates of from 84 to 93 percent.

A review of the 1987 budget showed the Tax District to be well within the budget and expected to have excess funds at the end of the year to be refunded the taxing units in the county.

Mr. Jones announced that the audit for the District will be done after January 1 by Collier Watson of Coleman.

Ballots for election of Tax District directors will be mailed to the eight entitled this week. Five directors will be elected from the six names on the list. They include incumbents Barbara Kingsbery, Jake McCreary, Dwight Nanny and Lang C. Martin, and also Richard Johnson and Jack Knox. The other current member, Billie Wright of Novice, did not choose to be a candidate for re-election.

Other routine business was on the agenda at the Monday, October 19 meeting that was attended by Kingsbery, McCrary, Nanny and Chief Appraiser Jones. The next meeting will be Monday, November 9, at 5:00 p.m.

## Post Office Lobby To Close At Dark

The Santa Anna Post Office box section will be permanently closed at dark each day by the Santa Anna Police Department. The lobby will also be closed all day Sunday. Postmaster Gary Absher closed the lobby earlier in the year for a ninety day period, because of mail theft and vandalism. "More locks to Post Office Boxes were vandalized the evening of October 21st. More than 25 locks have been ruined and the boxes forced open over the last year" said Absher.

## Voters To Decide On 25 Issues Tuesday

Texas voters will go to the polls Tuesday, November 3 to vote for or against 25 Constitutional Amendments and two referendum propositions. The Constitutional Amendments were published in earlier editions of the News.

Santa Anna citizens will vote at the Telephone Cooperative and Rockwood voters will go to the Community Center. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

AUSTIN—The November election ballot will contain a record number of proposed constitutional amendments, Secretary of State Jack Rains announced, after drawing numbers to determine the order in which the 25 amendments will appear on the Nov. 3 ballot.

For the first time in Texas history, Rains said, two statewide referenda will be presented to voters. By law, those will follow the constitutional amendments, he said.

Local issues, if any, will follow the statewide questions. At least four counties have already decided to place local-option horse racing before their voters.

Gov. Bill Clements issued a proclamation designating the order for the two referendum propositions sent to voters by the Legislature.

The propositions, in the order of ballot appearance, are:

- SB 86: Provides for retain the State Board of Education as an appointed—rather than elected—body. Unless voters approve this proposition, the board is scheduled to return to an elected group with equal representation throughout the state of Texas in 1989.

- SB 15: Legalization of parimutuel wagering under the Texas Racing Act on a county-by-county local option basis.

Rains' drawing of paper slips out of a cowboy hat, set the proposed constitutional amendment ballot order as follows:

- HJR 104: Provides for the

surety of a grain warehouse fund to be established by the grain industry for the protection of farmers and depositors in public warehouse facilities.

- HJR 60: To permit raising the maximum property tax rate that may be adopted by certain rural fire prevention districts, but only if approved by the districts' residents.

- HJR 48: Permits limiting school tax increases on the residences of the surviving spouse of an elderly person if the surviving spouse is at least 55 years old.

- HJR 5: Authorizes the Legislature to provide assistance for encouraging economic development.

- HJR 65: Authorizes agreements between the State Department of Highways and Transportation, and the Texas Turnpike Authority and the governing bodies of counties with a population of more than 400,000, adjoining counties and cities and districts located in those counties to aid turnpikes, toll roads and toll bridges, by guaranteeing bonds.

- HJR 4: Allows the Legislature to provide for state financing of the development of Texas products and businesses.

- SJR 55: Authorizes the issuance of general obligation bonds to finance local public facilities.

- SJR 56: Authorizes issuance of general obligation bonds for projects relating to corrections institutions and mental health and mental retardation facilities.

- SJR 9: Provides that a member of the legislature is eligible to be elected or appointed to serve in a different state office but may not receive an increase in compensation granted to that office during the legislative term to which he was elected.

- SJR 12: Allows the Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation certain personal property

- SJR 12, Part 2: To allow the Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation certain property

located in the state temporarily.

- SJR 35: Permits spouses to hold community property with right of survivorship.

- SJR 27: Allows for the creation and establishment, by law, of special districts to provide emergency services.

- SJR 34: Would give the state of Texas a limited right to appeal in criminal cases.

- HJR 35: Permits the abolishment of the office of county treasurer in Gregg, Fayette and Nueces counties.

- SJR 6: Providing that certain justice precincts may contain more than one justice of the peace court.

- SJR 26: Allows the legislature to define for all purposes the governmental and proprietary functions of a municipality.

- HJR 18: Relates to the creation, operation, and financing of jail districts.

- HJR 88: Authorizes the issuance of general obligation bonds to fund undertakings related to a superconducting super collider research facility sponsored or authorized by the U.S. government, and to make appropriate grants.

- HJR 96: Allows the Legislature to provide ad valorem tax relief for certain offshore drilling equipment that is not in use.

- SJR 17: Permits the Legislature to include the speaker of the House or speaker's appointee in the membership of an executive agency or committee.

- SJR 53: Permits the Legislature to limit the authority of a governor to fill vacancies in state and district offices during the end of the governor's term if not re-elected.

- SJR 54: Authorizes the issuance of an additional \$400 million in Texas Water Development bonds.

- HJR 83: Allows a county to perform work, without compensation, for other governmental bodies.

- SJR 5: Authorizes the Legislature to permit the Amarillo Hospital District to serve certain residents of Randall County.

"Seven days shalt thou keep a solemn feast unto the Lord thy God in the place which the Lord shall choose: because the Lord thy God shall bless thee in all thine increase, and in all works of thine hands, therefore thou shalt surely rejoice. Three times in a year shall all thy males appear before the Lord thy God in the place which he will choose; in the feast of unleavened bread, and in the feast of weeks, and in the feast of tabernacles: And they shall not appear before me empty. Every man shall give as he is able, according to the blessing of the Lord thy God which he hath given thee." Deut. 16:15-17.

The Union Presbyterian Church of Brownwood was the host October 18-19, to the forty-eighth stated meeting of the Palo Duro Presbytery.

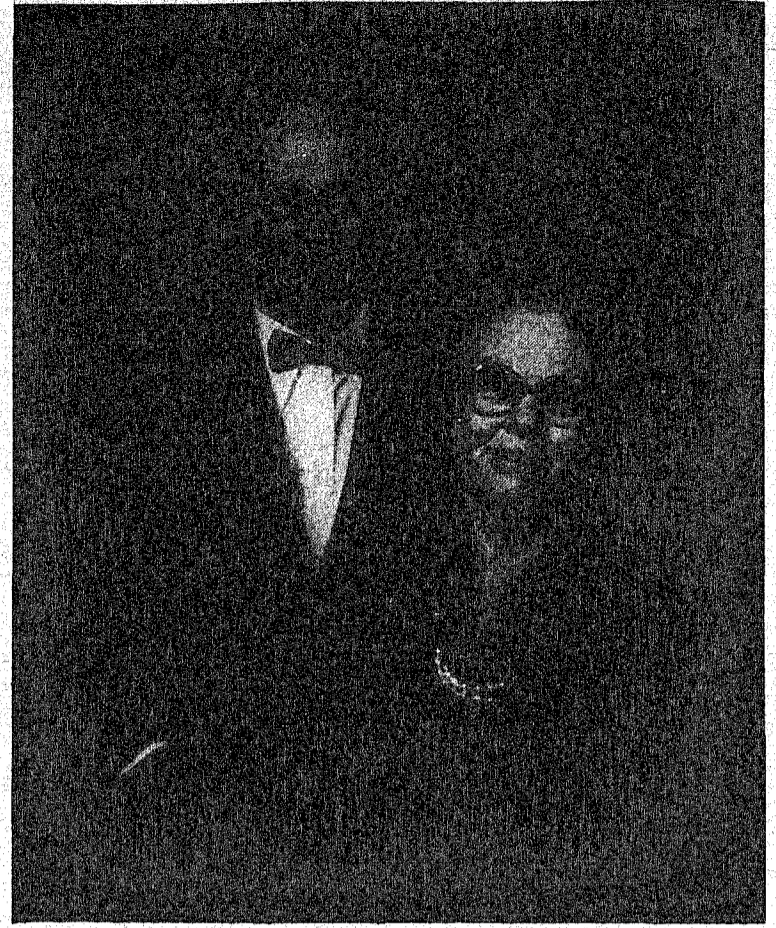

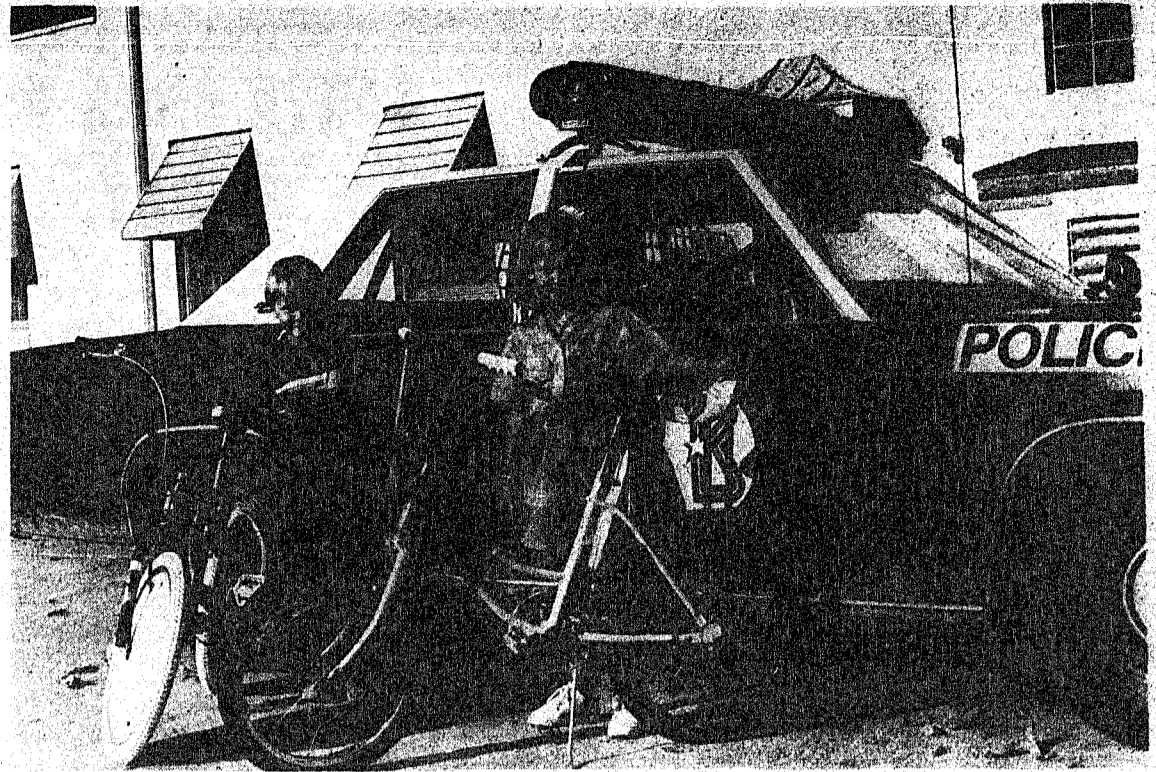

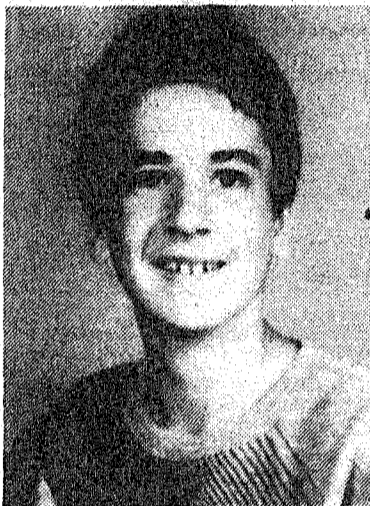

### Attitudes Influence Contentment

Contradictory attitudes about aging can often interfere with feelings of contentment in old age, says Dr. Judith Warren, a gerontologist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economics program. "Some elders feel that they ought to act a certain way or dress a certain way because of their age. These age norms can inhibit them from being themselves and being as outgoing as they might be." She observes that older people are also advised to "stay active" as the way to be happy in old age. "While this formula may work for some, many older people do not feel like being active, mbusy and responsible to others," she maintains.

**Signature Cards And Survivorship**

The signature cards you sign on joint bank and checking accounts will determine if those funds go directly to your spouse in the event of your death. "In Texas, establishing an 'and-or' joint account does not automatically create the right of survivorship," says Nancy Granovsky, a family economics specialist. "The right of survivorship is important because in means that the surviving spouse receives the property outright, without having to go through probate," she explains. "KWwithout the right of survivorship the spouse's share or the accounts will go to his or her heirs, usually th children. Granovsky, who in a specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economics program, says the right of survivorship can be created with a written agreement that has been signed by the person who dies and stating the intention that his or her share should pass to the surviving spouse.
