

New State Taxes To Begin Oct. 1

AUSTIN - State Comptroller Bob Bullock said last week that many new services will become taxable on October 1, when the state's sales tax rate increases from 51/4 percent to 6 percent.

The tax change will not only hit items which are now currently taxed, but a number of newly-taxable items and services as well, Bullock

The expanded sales tax was a major element of a \$5.7 billion tax bill approved by the legislature this past

October 1 is also the effective date of an increase in taxes on cigarettes, going up from 20.5 cents a pack to 26 cents a pack.

The legislature extended the sales tax to several broad categories of services such as real property services, including landscaping. janitorial, garbage collection and pest control: security services, including private investigators and armored car services; information

furnished by credit bureaus; and debt services, such as adjustments and repossessions.

It will also include information services like financial research, and specialized information and insurance services including damage appraisals, investigations and claims adjustments, but not premiums paid for insurance.

The expanded tax base is expected to add more than 64,000 Texas businesses to the state's tax rolls, joining the more than 420,000 merchants and businesses already collecting state taxes.

Newly taxable items include custom computer programs, labor on installations to tangible property, some transportation charges on the sale of goods, telephone service and membership and dues to private

Businesses need to reprogram cash registers and alert workers and staff of the new rate taking effect October 1, Bullock said. There is no increase in the one-percent local op-

tion tax collected in some areas of

Texas.

A fee for getting a sales tax permit and an increase in the state's motor vehicle sales and hotel-motel room taxes went into effect on September

A rollback in the state's motor fuels tax from 15 cents to 10 cents a gallon was also cancelled on September 1.

Starting Jan. 1 will be further extended to data processing services, including word processing, data entry, retrieval and search as well as payroll and business accounting, data production, time sharing and computer management.

Taxes will also be due on repair and remodeling services, except on new construction and owneroccupied residences, starting Jan. 1,

Coleman County Law Enforcement Is Investigating Chain Scheme

been notified by the local Sheriff's office of reports of an illegal chain scheme being conducted in Coleman County.

Section 32.48 of the Texas Penal Code which makes chain schemes illegal is shown in its entirety below. \$32.48 ENDLESS CHAIN SCHEME

(a) For the purposes of this section: (1) "Endless chain" means any scheme for the disposal or distribution of property whereby a participant pays a valuable consideration for the chance to receive

The County Attorney's Office has compensation for introducing one or more additional persons into participation in the scheme or for the chance to receive compensation when a person introduced by the participant introduces a new parti-

> cipant. (2) "Compensation" does not mean or include payment based on sales made to persons who are not participants in the scheme and who are not purchasing in order to participate in the scheme.

(b) A person commits an offense if he contrives, prepares, sets up,

proposes, operates, promotes, or participates in an endless chain. (c) An offense under this section is

a Class B misdemeanor. Under Texas Law, a Class B Misdemeanor is punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000.00 and a jail sentence of up to 180 days or both fine and jail

sentence. "If sufficient evidence is submitted to my office by law enforcement officials, complaints against offenders will be filed and prosecuted", states Joe D. LeMay, County Attor-

1987 Tax Statements To Be Mailed Today

Tax Statements for 1987 will be mailed by the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District on October 1st. Taxpayers can take advantage of discounts and half payments if taxes

are paid premptly. Half payments can be made in October and November with second half of payment due prior to July 1, 1998 with no penalty and interest charged. Also a taxpayer can receive a discount of three percent in October, two percent in November and one percent in December for prompt payment. A taxpayer can ceive only one of the alternatives. Discounts and half payments cannot be given together. Une nam payment will be calculated on the base amount of the tax. The statements sent to property owners will show the discounted amounts and the penalty and interest amounts

based on what month the tax is paid. As of August, 91 percent of the 1986 taxes had been collected, the same as this time last year. Total collections from October 1, 1985 to August 31, 1987 amount to \$3,987, 974.77. Delinquent taxes collected during same period total \$253,578-30 which represents about 40 percent of what was delinquent on October 7, 1993. The total amount of delinquent

taxes still owed is \$641,033.83.

The Appraisal District will make every effort to help delinquent taxpayers. Payment plans can be set up, but the taxpayer needs to cooperate and make arrangements to pay these delinquent taxes. The amoust of penalty and interest will go on

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



Water Lawns Properly

Although some turfgrasses might live through a hot, dry summer without any water, they all need water once in awhile to stay green and actively growing. Because water is fairly expensive and is limited in some parts of Texas, it makes good sense to water your lawn properly.

In much of Texas, clay soils develop rather impressive crackssome several inches across and even a few feet deep. These cracks do not seriously affect grass plants, but may turn what started as a neighborhood football or baseball game into a medical emergency if a child steps into a crack and is iniured. These same shrinkable clay soils also can do a great deal of damage to a home's foundation. A good irrigation program can help prevent these problems.

When watering a lawn, the "rule of thumb" is to soak the soil to a depth of about 5 or 6 inches. This sounds fairly simple but it takes some work. First, there are a lot of different sprinklers available. Those which spray water in an even pattern are more efficient. Ideally, a sprinkler should put out water at the same rate the water drains into the soil. However, often a sprinkler applies water too quickly, resulting in runoff. Put another way, some soils are so heavy they cannot absorb water as fast as it's applied by even the slowest of sprinklers.

The absolute first step of running a sprinkler is to find out how much water it emits in a given period of time. This information should be available from the manufacturer or installer. If not, just set out some old



coffee cans, run the sprinkler for an hour, and measure the amount of water collected.

In most high clay soils, it takes about an inch or so of water to wet the soil deep enough. If a soil is high in sand, as little as half an inch of water will do the job. Very likely the lawn will start to puddle or show runoff before the desired amount of water is applied. Stop the sprinkler just before this occurs. Allow enough time for the water to soak in and then start the sprinkler again. These on-off cycles must be developed through experience since few lawns are the same. Variables

in soil type, slope and height of the lawn all affect the water infiltration

If water infiltration is extremely slow. A machine called called an "aerifier" can be used to punch small holes up to about three inches deep in the soil. Many rental stores



If you are offered a coupon book, examine it carefully. Note the names of several of the merchants and check to see they are providing what is advertised. Check the expiratrion dates, restrictions and all other conditions. And, of course, make sure that most of the services offered are services you would want

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
