

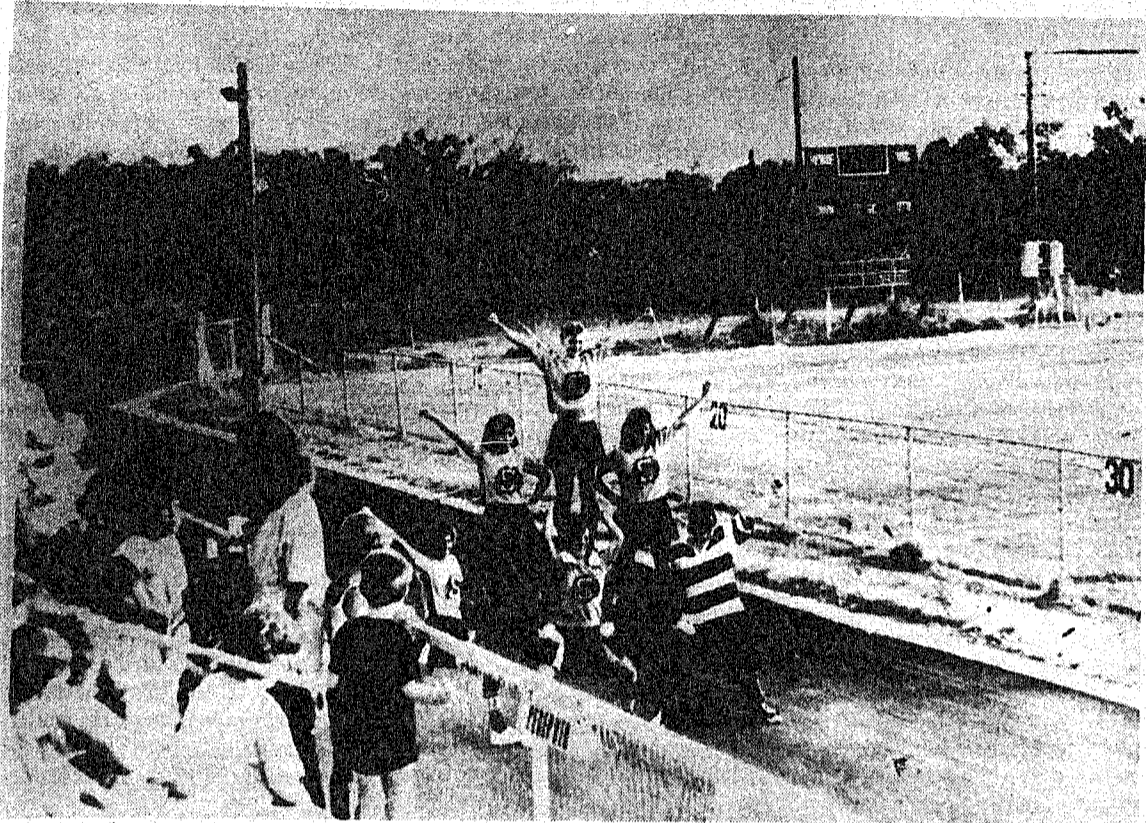

## DPS Estimates 42 To Die Over Holiday

The Texas Department of Public Safety is estimating that as many as 42 persons will die in traffic accidents during the 78-hour Labor Day period. The period begins at 6 p.m. Friday, Sept. 4 and ends at midnight on Monday, Sept. 7.

"We are seeing a decline of approximately 13 percent in traffic fatalities reported in Texas so far this year compared to the same period last year," said DPS Director Leo Gossett. "I'm hopeful that we'll be able to add 1987 to the downward

trend in Texas deaths which began in 1982."

There were 48 deaths reported at the end of the 1986 Labor Day period in Texas. The addition of later deaths due to injuries received during the period raised the final count to 51. Thirty-eight of the 51 deaths resulted from accidents where speed or DWI was a contributing factor.

"The new state law which prohibits consumption of alcoholic beverages while driving went into effect today," Colonel Gossett

reminded motorists. "Violators of this statute are now subject to receiving citations from our troopers and may face a maximum fine of \$200."

George Gustafson, spokesman for the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts and president of the Texas Safety Association, joined the DPS in cautioning drivers.

"Texas motorists can do a lot to make the Labor Day weekend safer simply by buckling up and, in addition, securing their young

"Put a Smile on your Face" was the theme of the meeting. On Saturday and Sunday, we attended the leadership seminar getting lots of good ideas for the new year.

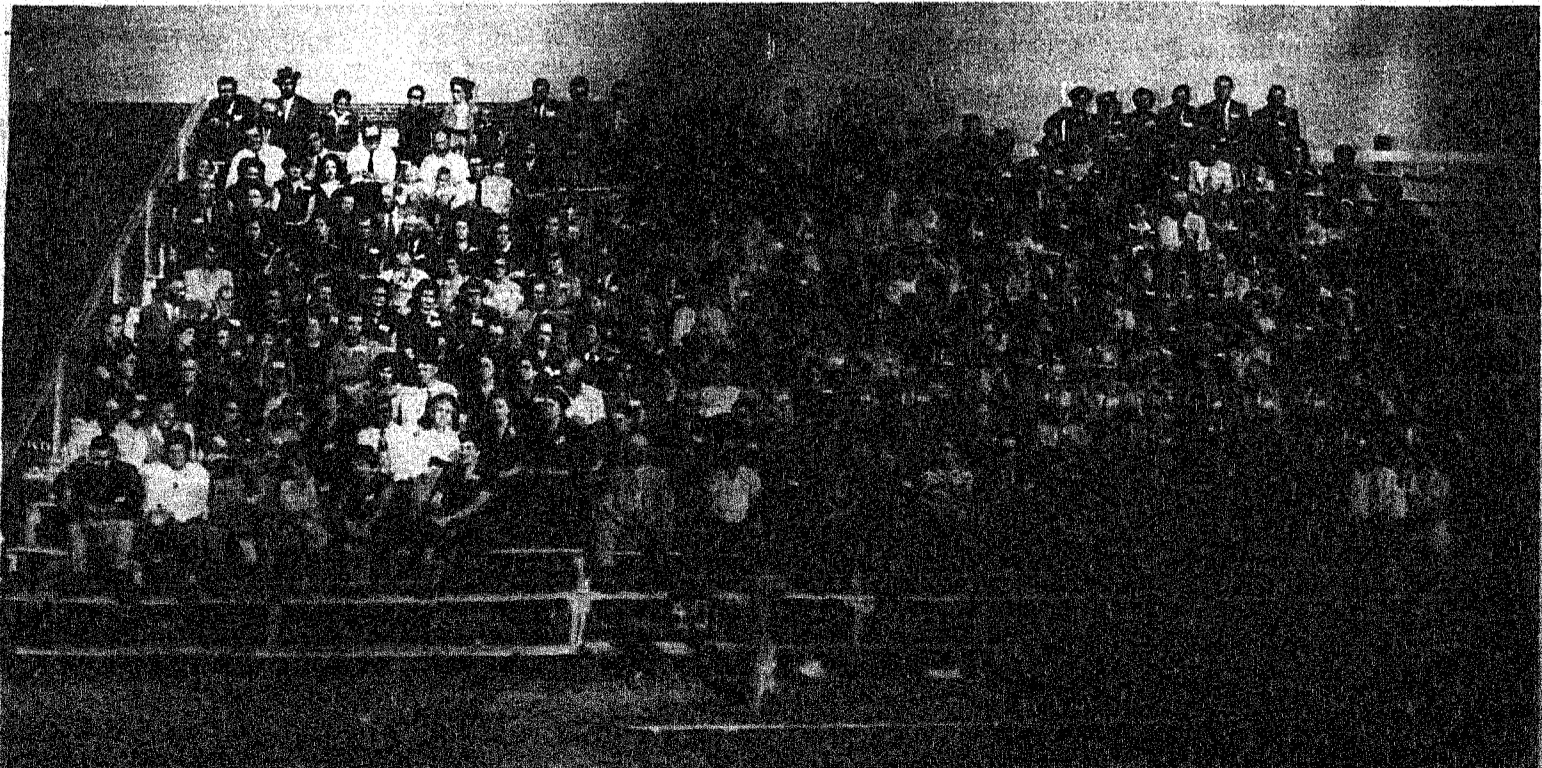
While in San Antonio, we enjoyed the River Walk, Market Square, riding the Trolley and lots of other sights.

**WHAT IS THE CHURCH**

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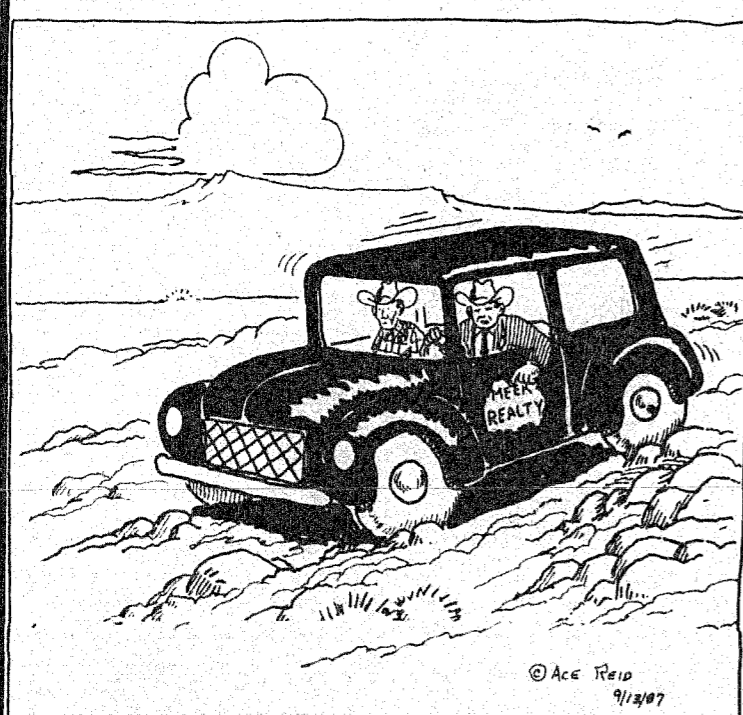

# New Immigration Law Raises Questions

DEAR COMMISSIONER NABERS: I am very apprehensive about the new immigration verification requirements. I have heard that the Texas Employment Commission may be able to help employers. Could you give me some information?

DEAR A.W.: No. There is a section of the unemployment law which gives an employer protection from chargeback if the employer was required by federal, state or municipal law to terminate employment. One note of caution. You should be sure that any employee you terminate because of the new immigration law has not applied for amnesty. These individuals are protected under the new law until a decision on their application is made by the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Any individual in the amnesty application process will have documentation from the INS that they can provide you.

The TEC cannot certify workers for jobs of less than three days duration.

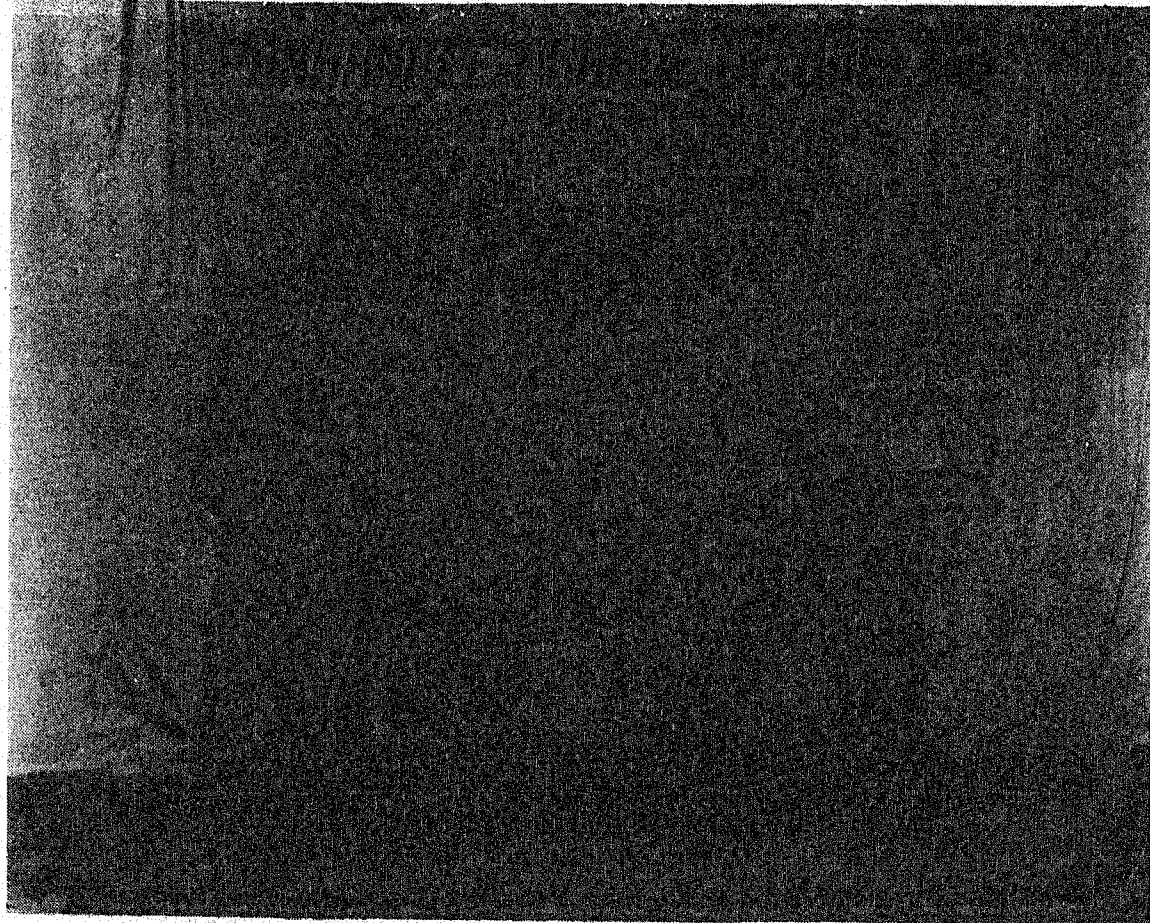

DEAR MS. NABERS: Under the new immigration law, I must terminate any employee hired after Nov. 6, 1986 who cannot or refuses to provide the necessary documentation. Will this affect my TEC tax rate if a claim for unemployment is filed?  
-A.W., KILGORE

DEAR C.F.: Under the 1986 Immigration and Reform Control Act, all employers must now verify their employees' legal right to work by completing what is called an I-9 form. (Form available from the Immigration and Naturalization Service.)

The Texas Employment Commission is authorized by law to relieve employers of this verification responsibility.

If you place a job order with us and subsequently hire a TEC referral, TEC will verify the individual's legal right to work and will MAIL you an official certification form. This form takes the place of the I-9. You must keep it on file for three

### Safe Bicycle Exercise

Before hopping on your bicycle to get some extra exercise, make sure you and the bike are fit for the road. "Cycling is good way to improve cardiovascular fitness," says Dr. Mary Ann Heussner, a health education specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. "But it's also an easy way to get hurt if you aren't physically and mentally prepared."

"Remember, bicycling is like any other form of exercise," says Heussner. "You should stretch out before and after each ride to increase your flexibility and avoid muscle and tendon pulls. Relaxing your shoulders and keeping your elbows bent to help absorb shocks, and consistent pedaling to increase efficiency are also good techniques you can use to decrease the possibility of injury."

"Bicycles are an important part of health safety," the specialist says. "They should pass safety requirements, fit snugly, and be worn

at all times. "Bikes that are working properly are more enjoyable to ride, as well as safer," says Heussner. "The tires should be properly inflated and be the correct type for your bike. The gears should shift smoothly, and the brakes should stop evenly."

If you're buying a new bike, be sure to have a salesperson help you find one that is suitable for your height, weight and intended use, Heussner cautions.

Bicyclists have the most safety problems with traffic. They often forget that they must follow the same rules as moving vehicles, and they need to signal at every stop and turn.

"Bicyclists are also more difficult to see, especially at night, which often causes problems for unsuspecting motorists. Because of this, cyclists need to obey traffic laws, be aware of all motorists, and have their bikes equipped with proper reflectors and lights," Heussner maintains.

## Contact Lenses: Look Carefully Before Buying

Consumers interested in getting contact lenses may be subject to some strange and deceptive advertising, according to attorneys in my Consumer Protection Division.

### LICENSING ADS

The ads include lines indicating that there are "unlicensed" persons fitting contact lenses. The fact is, there's no specific license for contact lens fitting. Both optometrists and ophthalmologists are licensed by the state and may dispense either glasses or contact lenses. Ophthalmologists are licensed as medical doctors and may do a wide range of treatments also. Optometrists are specialists in corrective eye wear only.

It appears that there is a small war going on between optometrists and ophthalmologists in certain parts of Texas. The deceptive advertising may be a result of that war.

It is also suggested in some advertising that unscrupulous operators have been using "factory reject" contact lenses. Although this may be occurring, we have had no complaints on the matter and the Federal Food and Drug Administration monitors contact lenses very carefully.

### COMPLAINTS

Contact lenses come in sealed vials with lot numbers, much like prescription drugs. If you feel that you have not received a good pair of contact lenses, you should first check with the dispenser. After doing that, if you believe that you have been treated unfairly, you can complain to my Consumer Protection Division or to the proper licensing agency, such as the State Board of Optometry.

### SHOPPING TIPS

As with any major purchase, it is best to shop around before making a final decision about where to buy. Of course, it is also wise to get recommendations from your doctor and friends who are satisfied customers.

It is generally wise to deal with an established firm in your community. And, as always, if an offer sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

### High Humidity Can Damage RVs

High humidity can be particularly destructive to recreational vehicles such as motor homes and travel trailers, says an official with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

A large number of RVs use a paper or plastic covering pasted over the ceilings and walls, often in the form of a wood grain or wallpaper type design. High humidity sometimes causes the bonding agent or glue to loosen its grip and causes wrinkles or air pockets to form, points out John Cochran, an agricultural engineer. Sometimes this is due to wood expanding or swelling as it takes on additional moisture.

One way to prevent and sometimes correct these wrinkles or air pockets is to leave a lamp with a 60 to 100 watt bulb burning continuously in the RV. The lamp heat should remove a great deal of the excess moisture. After several days, check to see if any wrinkles are still evident.

If loose covering or wrinkles still exist, try pressing them gently with a folded cloth to re-stick the material, recommends Cochran. Do not use a sharp object that may tear the covering. If the covering will not re-stick, "super glue" injected with a disposable syringe does wonders.

Inject small amounts of glue in the wrinkle or air pocket and smooth it out with a cloth. The tiny hole left by the needle is not visible, and excess glue is removed by the cloth, Cochran notes. This practice also keeps glue off the fingers.

**Mountaineers Hold Their Own Against Goldthwaite**

Coach Galen Privitt was disappointed while watching his Mountaineers scrimmage the Goldthwaite Eagles last Friday night in Santa Anna. However after he had reviewed the film later, he was well pleased with what he saw.

"We handled them every place but on the scoreboard", Privitt concluded after seeing the film.

The Goldthwaite varsity first team racked up 116 yards offense, 6 first downs and one touchdown. The 2nd team had 69 yards offense, 4 first downs and 1 touchdown.

Santa Anna's first team offense accumulated 124 yards and 6 first downs, with no touchdowns. The second team offense accounted for 111 yards, 4 first downs and one touchdown.

When asked about meeting Bangs Friday night at Mountaineer Stadium, Privitt replied that they had seen Bangs scrimmage twice this year. Once against Ballinger when they were outscored 6 T.D.'s to 0 and against Wylie when they were outscored 8 T.D.'s to 0.

"They looked very unimpressive. It scares me to death", he said. "It makes me wonder what they are saving for us!"

Offensively, Bangs uses a "run and shoot" offense developed by former pro Jack Pardee who was raised in Cristoval playing 6 man football. The offense uses six man plays and runs them with 11 men.

In Looking forward to the season play, there is a bright side to last year's injury-scarred season. The Mountaineers picked up some very valuable experience for the 1987 District 8-A race that figures to be one of the best in Central Texas.

No team in the area is more experienced than the Santa Anna team, which has been state ranked, 10th by Texas Football Magazine and 7th by Associated Press Schoolboy Football Poll. They were rated 10th last season before the injuries took their toll.

Santa Anna is expected to fight it out with Baird, Rising Star and Gorman this season. Last year they defeated Rising Star but lost to Baird and Gorman. Privitt has 10 offensive and 8 defensive starters back among 20 returning lettermen.

Back is almost the entire offense, that includes James Hartman (186) and Reece McIver (200), two of the biggest and best in the district at their positions.

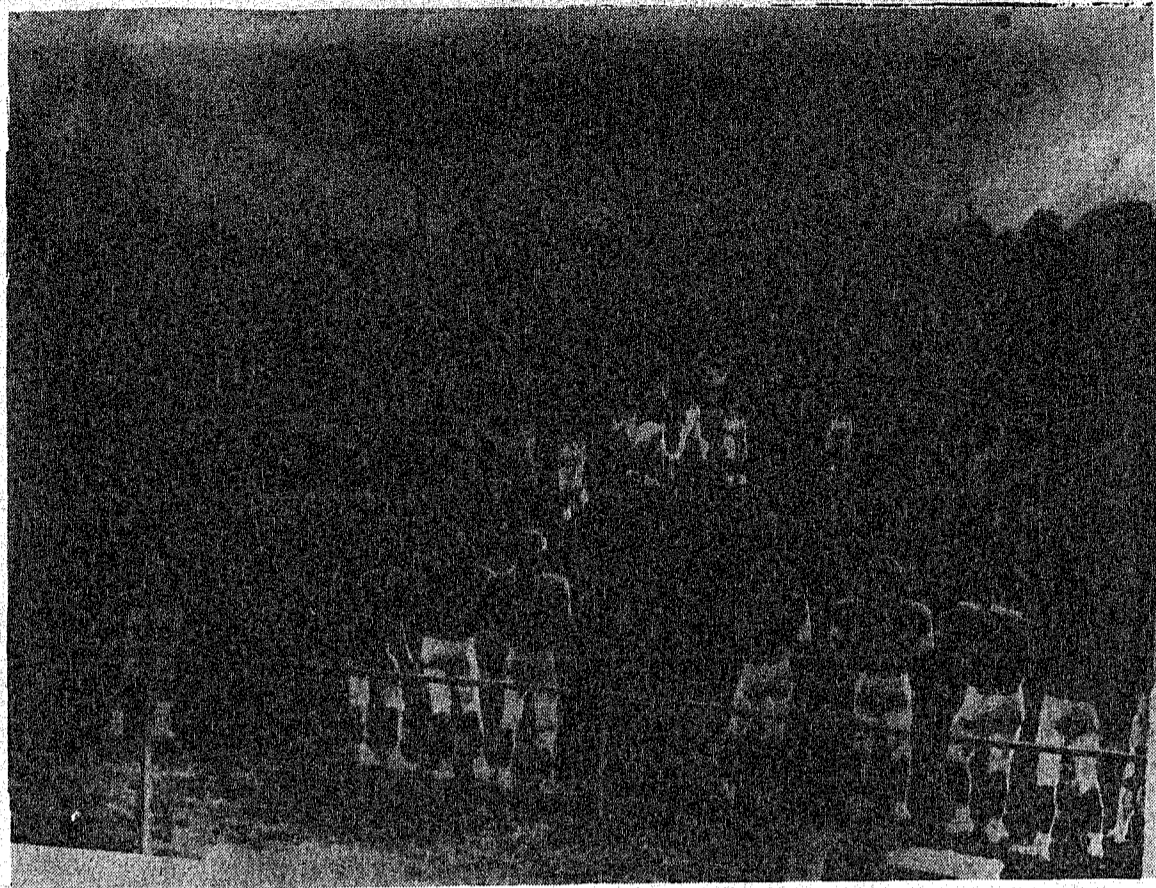
Bobby DeLeon and Alonzo Hernandez also return in the backfield. Robby Pritchard is a veteran split end.

Coach Privitt has had to replace just one starter in the line that features Paul Mata(170) at center, Vernon Valdez(210) and Paul Anderson(180) at tackle, Scott Anderson(185) at guard and Eddie Tomlinson(165) at tight end.

Defensively, Hartman, Tomlinson, Robby Pritchard, and Bobby Pritchard return in the secondary. In front of them are linebackers Lynn Kellar(160) and McIver, plus Mata and Scott Anderson on the line.

Even though the future looks bright for the Mountaineers, Privitt is not having any illusions about the district race. "It should be very close, and for the fans very interesting" he has been reported as saying. "Realistically, four schools have a right to feel they can win, and possibly six do. Whoever of the top six stays healthy, or healthiest, should win."

The Mountaineers meet Bangs on the Santa Anna field at 8:00 p.m. Friday.

Footnote to history: The University of Texas had a football team seven years before the game became an intercollegiate sport in this state.

On Thanksgiving Day 1893, 16 players from the tiny Austin school went to Dallas to play that town's Football Club at Fairground Park. It was an unusual match since the game was not then a Texas college sport, although it was played by Ivy League schools.

Despite the fact that football was not a recognized sport, some U.T. students had organized a team. In

this book, 'Here Come the Longhorns,' Lou Maysel recounts that the team depended for opponents on towns around the state that had fielded local teams.

According to Maysel, the Dallas team had a reputation for such rough play that it was too tough a match for most opponents and had remained undefeated for several years. This did not deter the Texas youngsters from trying to dethrone Dallas.

Thus the teams and fans alike were surprised when the University won 18 to 16. However, the Dallas

team had been guilty of such unsportsmanlike conduct (Maysel says they didn't know the difference between a football game and a free-for-all fight), the U.T. faculty ruled that the school could not play a rematch.

Nevertheless, U.T. students continued to have a team and the school recognized it officially in 1900. In 1903, the school newspaper dubbed it the "Longhorns" and that name finally was approved a decade later. In 1914, the Southwest Conference was organized and college football came to Texas to stay.
