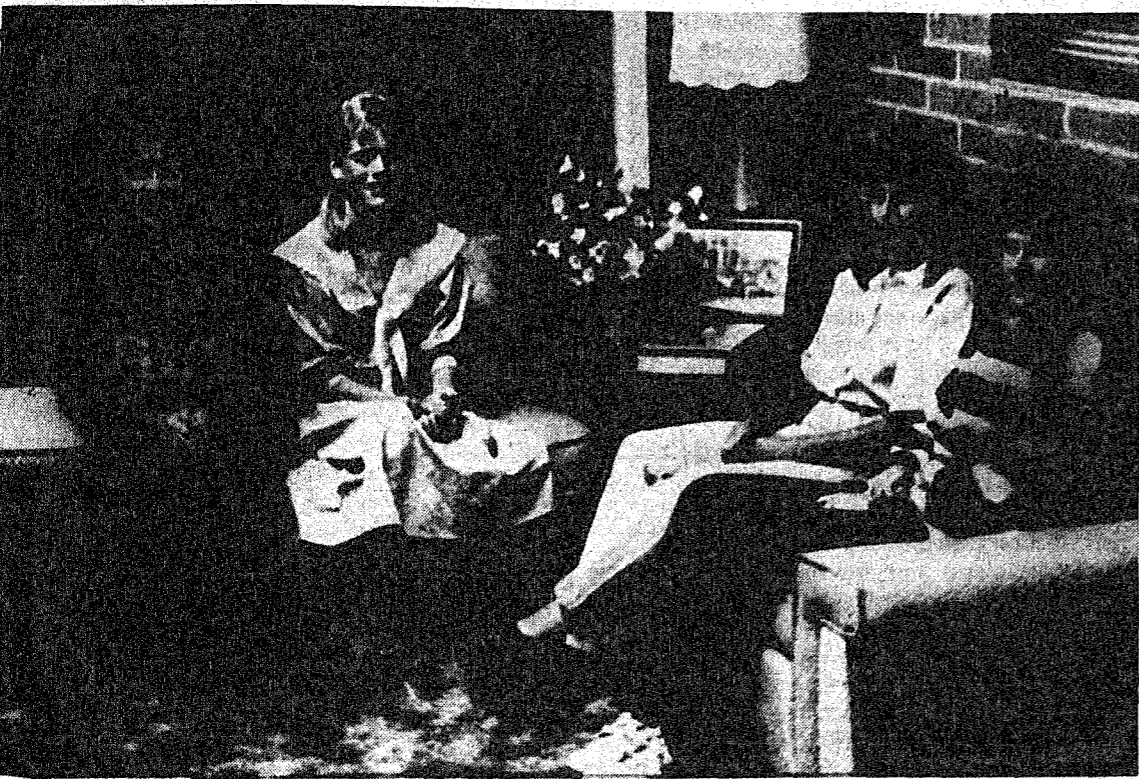

Santa Anna ISD Offers Quality Education

Each year all school districts and campuses are ranked according to the previous years scores on the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS). The Texas Education Agency uses this information to target and assist those schools in the lower 5 and 25

percent. The ranking for the Santa Anna ISD was received by Superintendent Gerald Brister last week. The Santa Anna Elementary School, grades K-3, ranked number

558 out of a total of 5329 schools. This is within a fraction of the top 10 percent. Santa Anna High School ranked number 3406 out of the same 5329 schools. When combined, the scores for the entire Santa Anna ISD ranked number 200 out of a total 1052 school districts in the state. This ranking is within the top 20 percent.

The district was also compared to the 44 districts and 137 campuses within the Education Service Center XV Area. This Area includes the following counties; Sterling, Coke,

Runnels, Coleman, Brown, Irion, Tom Green, Concho, McCulloch, San Saba, Crockett, Schleicher, Menard, Mason, Sutton, Kimble, Val Verde, and Edwards. The elementary school was number 13 or within the top 10 percent. The high school ranked 91 out of 137. The entire district ranked number 6 out of the 44 school districts in the area.

The people of the Santa Anna ISD can be proud of these rankings as they indicate that their children are receiving a quality education.

WTU Gives Commissioners Stick With Original Road Plans

West Texas Utilities Co. customers will receive another fuel cost refund this month.

The refund, requested by the company, was approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas and will total about \$4.6 million. This includes actual over-collections of fuel costs from December 1986 through July 1987, plus interest.

The refunds will be credited to customer bills. A typical residential customer will receive a little more than \$7. This is the sixth refund made to WTU retail customers since the summer of 1985.

The fuel rates charged to customers have been adjusted with every refund, but the price of natural gas, WTU's main power plant boiler fuel during the period, has continued to decline.

Meanwhile, WTU is expecting a decision by the PUC in November regarding the Company's request to increase its base rates. A hearing in the case ended September 16 and a final order from the three-member PUC is expected in time to apply any rate change on December bills.

The company had requested an increase to add \$50.3 million in annual revenues, which would bring the new coal-fired Oklaunion Power Station into the rate base.

Columbus Day, Monday, is an official holiday for all government offices. The Bank and post office will be closed on that day. There will be no mail delivery on rural routes, although mail will be placed in the postoffice boxes.

When the Coleman County Commissioners met last week they decided to stay with their original decision concerning the relocation of a county road into the Stacy construction site.

Commissioner Vernon Slate, Precinct 3, had explained to the court his many conversations with all interested parties. The Miller family has given an easement across their property, but the location was not the route selected and agreed upon by other interested groups. The issue before the court was whether or not to accept the easement offered by the Millers. The unanimous decision was to "pass up the easement offer".

According to several expressed opinions, the original location is the best location for the road. Slate is convinced it is the most economical route from the perspective of construction costs. The result of the Court's action will be to put the subject back into negotiation. If agreement cannot be reached, condemnation proceedings will become necessary, but not desired.

No one showed up for the public

budget hearing, so, County Auditor Shirley Sansing went rapidly through the budget. Revenue projections are down and expenditures are up compared to the budget for the fiscal year just ending.

Tax Collector Billie Baker requested and was granted permission to purchase two typewriters. They are to replace a couple of worn out 1974 models used daily in her office. She was also authorized to purchase an adding machine-calculator.

Barbara Kingsbery, Jake McCreary and Dwight Nanny were renominated for positions on the Coleman County Tax Appraisal Board.

Commissioners discussed the recent accident involving a county road grader and operator with a train. No action was taken. They also discussed touring the Stacy construction site as a group. All were in favor of that proposal.

An announcement was made that construction has not yet begun on the east wing elevator at the courthouse.

In routine business, the court approved bills for payment and the bank balances were read by the county auditor.

Hand In Hand...

Beth takes Erma everywhere with her. For two years they've walked together hand in hand, with Beth watching out for Erma, keeping her safe and making sure she doesn't get lost. Beth knows that Erma depends on her for everything.

The scenario sounds like that of a mother with a young, helpless child, but the relationship isn't a typical one. Beth Burton is a 21 year-old recent college graduate. Erma is Erma Burton Elliot, 80 years old. She is Beth's grandmother. Beth's grandmother has been diagnosed as having Alzheimer's disease. She is physically active, but she gets confused, forgets things, and sometimes wanders off. Mrs. Elliot's condition worsened two years ago and her family realized she could no longer live alone.

That's where Beth stepped in. She knew she'd rather die than see her grandmother in a nursing home, so she volunteered to take care of her. The fact that Beth was a full-time student at Abilene Christian University at the time didn't seem to bother her. "I wanted to go to school, but I

wanted to take care of her...she doesn't belong in a rest home."

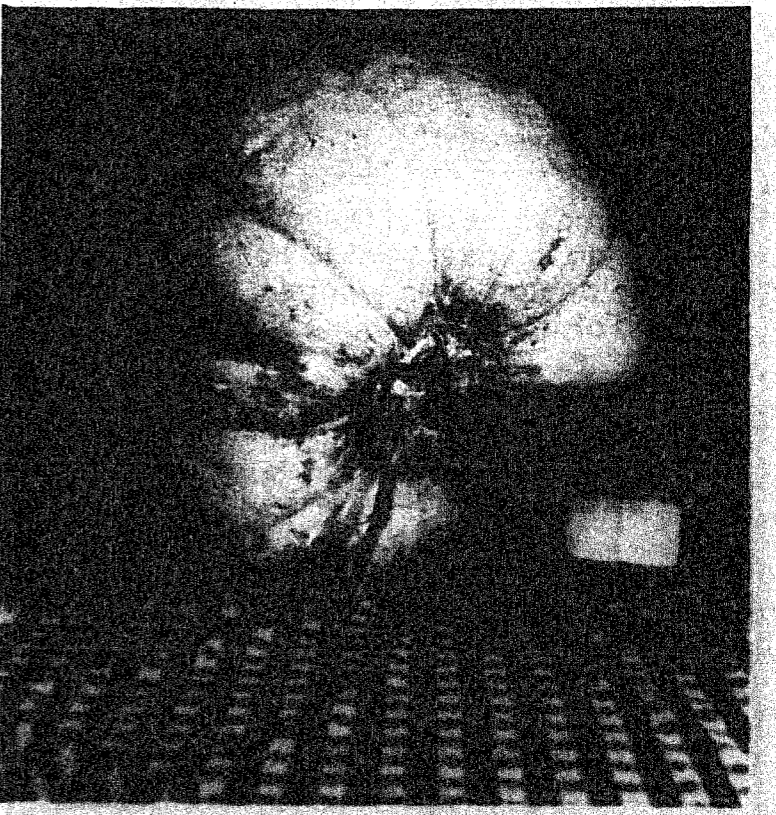
But how do you solve the problems of constant care for an elderly relative while still making it to all your classes? It was an easy decision for Beth. She took her grandmother everywhere she went.

"She's my little shadow," says Beth, and they both laugh. "She likes to go." Beth has taken her grandmother to 90 percent of her classes during the past two years. They're a familiar sight on the ACU campus.

Beth doesn't see her devotion to her grandmother as a sacrifice. "When it's someone you love, you don't really think about it," she says. "I don't know what it would be like without her."

Beth does have some help with her grandmother. Her parents try to visit every other weekend. Beth's dad is Bob Burton, WTU local manager in the Big Lake office. He was manager of WTU in Santa Anna for a number of years while Beth

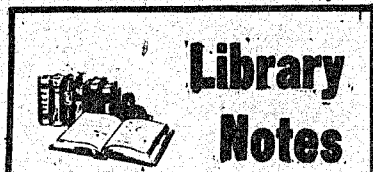

income a person has. It is supplemented by many states.

The general rule is that the monthly SSI payment of a person who lives in the household of another is reduced by one-third. The reduction is required because the room and board provided for the person get-

ting the SSI helps to meet his or her basic needs. Exceptions are made in cases where the person is paying a fixed amount for room and board or pays his or her share of total household expenses. In either situation the SSI payment is not reduced.

Any change in living arrangements should be reported to the Social Security office immediately, since it can affect the payment a person is receiving. If a

person moves out of the household of another, the monthly payment may go up. If he or she moves into the household of another while receiving payment, the payment may be

reduced. Failure to report immediately could lead to overpayment or underpayment of benefits. Overpayments must be repaid; in most cases this is accomplished by

deductions from future checks. However, if fraud or deliberate concealment of the facts occurs, a person may receive penalties ranging from a fine to a jail term.

People who have questions about how their living arrangement affect their SSI payments should call their

Social Security office and let us know what the circumstances are. The number for this area is 646-7533.

ARE YOU A FOLLOWER OF JESUS?

One challenge that stands out in the New Testament is to "Come, follow Me". Jesus the Christ issued this challenge to all who would call themselves Christian. He made it very clear that if we would follow Him, we must first deny self. That is, we are not called to deny ourselves of certain THINGS, for if we do that, self is still in control deciding what to deny. Rather, Jesus says to deny SELF and follow Him.

Once SELF has been denied, and the will submitted (surrendered) to His will, and the decision made to follow Him, Jesus promised certain results.

First, Jesus Himself is THE PERSON TO FOLLOW. He did not ask us to follow a creed, or a confession, or a philosophy. He called us to Himself. There is no other Name worthy of our consideration, no other Foundation could be laid. He, and He alone is the Person to follow.

Secondly, He has the POWER TO FORM. It is His divine purpose to seek followers who are submitted to him so He can form them into

vessels that will glorify God. In Romans, the apostle Paul refers to this power to form as the power a

potter has over a lump of clay. Jesus is the perfect Potter who has ALL power to form us to that which we should be.

If we heed Jesus's call that He is the Person to follow and submit to His power to form, then He gives us meaningful PURPOSE TO FULFILL! What is the purpose? To become fishers of men is the purpose of every follower of Jesus the Christ.

Most Christians today would readily answer yes to the question "Are you a follower of Jesus Christ?" A more pointed, and perhaps more convicting question is "Are you a fisher of men?" Are we actively seeking persons with whom we can share the Good News of God's love and forgiveness in Christ Jesus? Jesus really did not leave us options. He did not say CONSIDER following Me. Consumer Facts Debt Collectors Cannot Be Abusive

The downturn in the Texas economy has left many people unable to pay their bills on time. While creditors have an indisputable right to ask for payment, there are some methods of collection the law does not permit them to use.

State law prohibits debt collectors from using fraudulent methods to collect a debt. They are also barred from harassing those who owe money by making continuous phone calls, threatening to garnish wages, representing that they are attorneys if they are not, or sending documents that appear to be from a court when they are not.

It is also against state law for a debt collector to use profane or abusive language or to call you at your place of work if it is known that your employer prohibits such calls.

If you are being harassed, notify the collector in writing to stop. Keep a copy of your letter and send the one to the debt collector by certified mail.

If you have further questions, contact the Consumer Protection Office nearest you. The Attorney General has offices in Austin, Dallas, Houston, San Antonio, McAllen, Lubbock, and El Paso.

Like it or not, a member of the Texas Legislature can't quit unless he dies or takes another job with a state agency. If he resigns, he is still considered as holding the office until a successor is elected. If he takes any other state job, however, he's automatically out. Texas law prohibits state employees from serving in the Legislature or other elective office.

How SSI Treats Living Arrangements

People applying for or receiving supplemental income (SSI) payments, or who live with someone who does, should be familiar with the effect living arrangements can have on their benefits. Because living arrangements can make a difference in a person's income; they may affect the amount of payment a person can get.

SSI payments are made to people with little or no income and resources, who are 65 or over, blind, or disabled. Currently over 4 million people are receiving SSI benefits nationwide. The basic Federal payment is \$340 for eligible individuals and is \$510 for eligible couples living together. This payment may be reduced depending on the amount of

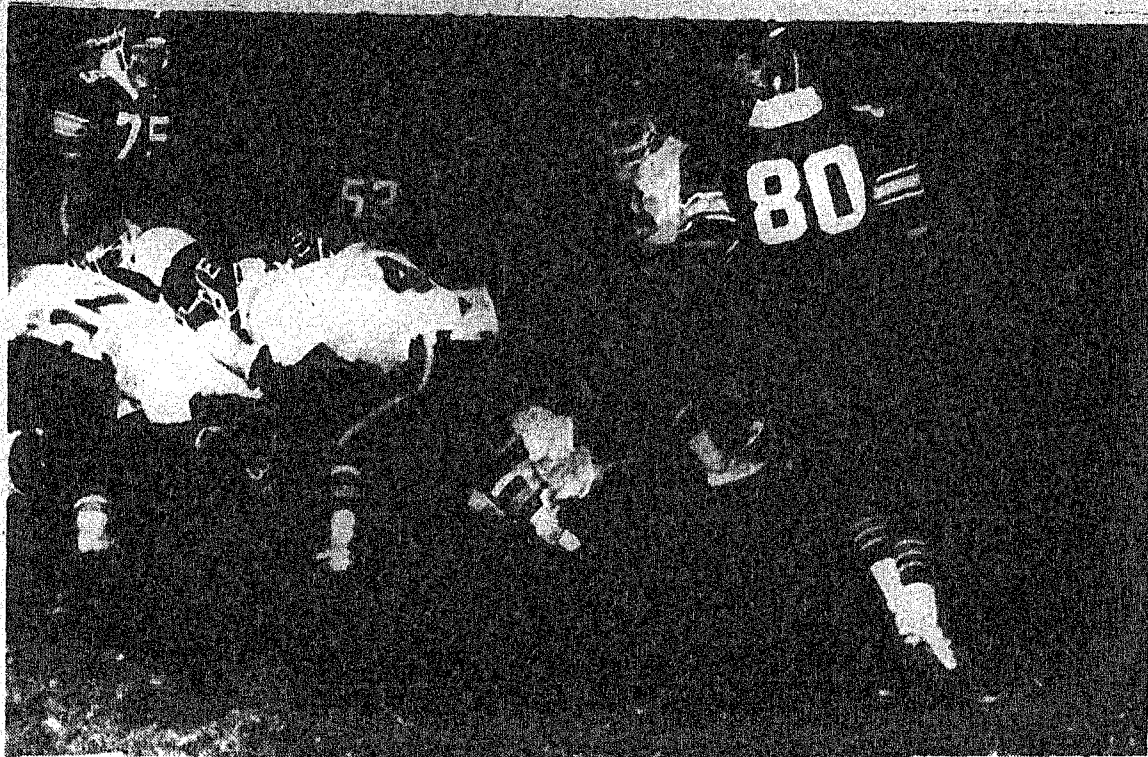
