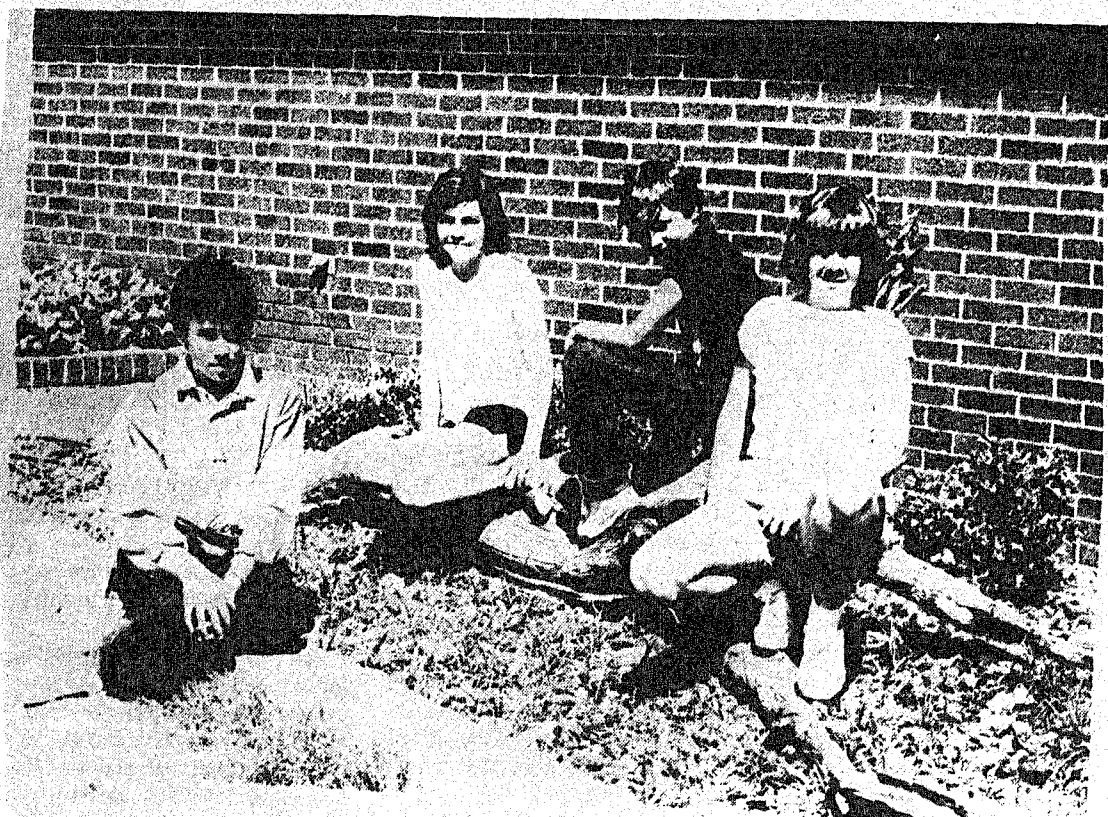

In August the officers attended a leadership camp at Hords Creek Lake for Coleman and Runnels County officers. Both events were not only learning experiences, but allowed 4-H'ers to meet new friends and have fun.

County camp was in fact a camp out. The exhilaration of putting up your own tent and the education that comes from using the outdoor restroom (no running water) in the middle of the pasture on a dark night, made for a memorable experience.

County Agents, Kerry Shropshire, Debbie Reber and Barry Cooper along with Big Six Ranch managers Mike and Debbie Bodenchuck led the campers through setting up the campsites, preparing and cooking their food, and fishing, swimming and shooting sports. Parents of the campers were invited out for a hamburger supper and skits were presented in groups by the campers for the evening's entertainment.

Kit Horne, a representative of West Texas Utilities and a former Coleman County 4-H member instructed the group in making lamps, the bases being aluminum cans. Each camper took a lamp home to use in his or her room to "study" by. Those attending from Santa Anna included Corey Brown, Cheree Halmon, Erica Pearce, Becky Simmons, Mika Gore, Bryce Ellis, and Jamie Ellis. Jane Gustavus attended as the adult leader from Santa Anna.

## County Commissioners Approve Air Strip

The Coleman County Commissioners Court last week approved a proposal to build an air strip to be built adjacent to the Stacy dam site just off the extension of the county road being built to access the construction site.

As approved, the air strip, which will handle private planes including jets, is to be built by the Colorado River Municipal Water District which will later deed it to the county.

The Water District is to procure the land, build the strip and an ac-

cess road, and will also fence the property. When deeded, the county will assume maintenance. The landing strip will be built with a 10' base "of the best material available in the area" and the county may inspect the work in process, and must approve the construction before voting for acceptance of it.

In another matter, Jack Strickland, Precinct 1 Commissioner, informed the court that he had agreed to furnish road repair materials to the Lake Coleman Com-

munity Center Directors. The roads around the lake are "dedicated to public use" and the lake residents are to provide the labor required to put the county furnished materials into the potholes.

Judge Skelton informed commissioners that he had sent out 5 copies of the approved specifications on the county ambulance service. Bids are to be opened at the regular meeting of the Commissioners Court on September 14 at 10 a.m.

## Coleman County Over The Top In Savings Bonds

United States Savings Bonds sales in Texas for the first nine months of the fiscal year 1987 amounted to \$304,574,108, an increase of \$30 million or 11 percent over the same period of 1986. T.J. Morrow, District Director for the U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Texas, announced last week. These sales represent 78.5 percent of the state's 1987 assigned dollar goal of \$388 million.

Sales of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$17,087 during June 1987 in Coleman County, Larry Willard, Volunteer County Chairman, said. The October 1986-June 1987 total for the County was \$172,596, which

represents 203 percent of the County's assigned dollar goal of \$85,000.

Nationally, June 1987 sales of Series EE Bonds totaled \$543 million and brought total sales of U.S. Savings Bonds to \$8.68 billion for the first nine months of the fiscal year 1987, an increase of 67 percent over the same period a year ago. The amount outstanding in U.S. Savings Bonds as of June 30, 1987 was \$96.80 billion, up 15 percent over June 1986. Bond sales are back again, after being suspended for a brief time between July 18 thru July 30. The average yield for Bonds held since

the beginning of the market-based interest rate on November 1, 1982 is 8.68 percent; the rate for the period May 1, 1987 thru October 31, 1987 is 5.84 percent. Outstanding Series EE Bonds, Series E Bonds and Savings Notes held and earning interest for at least five years after November 1, 1982 are also eligible for this market-based yield. All Series EE Bonds purchased on or after November 1, 1982 and held at least five years will earn 85 percent of the average market yield on Treasury marketable securities. Bonds held less than five years earn interest on a fixed, graduated scale.

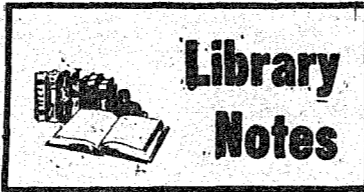

**Thoughts From Our Pastors**

**Claude W. Davison First United Methodist Church**

I confess it is hard for me to maintain a discipline of prayer, not because prayer is hard, but because discipline is hard. Like many another person, I'm the victim (or maybe the cause) of cluttered, busy, and unfocused life. I discovered some time ago that when I become discouraged or weary, it's simply because all I know is what I see or read or witness...and that is not enough to make anybody discouraged. But in those rare, illumined moments when discipline has been maintained and the unseen becomes real to me, then what has appeared to be insurmountable is put into it's proper perspective. That is something I can handle.

Let me share a couple of stories that illustrate this. A man came to a Rabbi once and said, "Rabbi, how am I going to handle all these things that worry me?" The Rabbi said, "Pray to God." The man said, "I don't know how to Pray." The Rabbi said, "Then indeed, you do have a great deal to worry about."

A woman once came to St. Teresa of India and asked, "What would you do if some terrible calamity came into your life?" She replied, "All I would need is a place to kneel, and five minutes, then I would be all right."

I guess St. Paul said it best of all when he wrote: "Do not hold to the things that are seen, but to the things that are unseen, because the things that are seen are transient, but the things that are unseen are eternal." For that reason, he went on to say, even though "WE are afflicted, we are not crushed, when perplexed we are not driven to despair, when persecuted we are not forsaken, when struck down, we are not destroyed." (2 Corinthians 4:8-9)

**Mountaineers Win Opener**

The State ranked Santa Anna Mountaineers were able to come back after a sluggish first half last Friday night and stop the Bangs Dragons in their tracks for the season opener for both teams. It was a defensive battle all the way.

The bleachers were near full for the first game of the season and the band and cheerleaders kept the spirit flowing through the crowd as the two teams traded ownership of the ball back and forth through-out the first half but neither team was able to cross the goal line til Bang's Danny Sotelo scored with two seconds left in the half, with a 33 yard pass from Richard Lucero. Sotelo also scored the two bonus points with a pass from Michael Bernard.

Santa Anna put their first points on the scoreboard in the third quarter when Reece McIver scored from the one yard line. James Hartman added the two pointer to tie the score.

Bangs took a 43-yard pass play from Lucero to Sotelo, and drove to the Mountaineer 29-yard line in the fourth quarter. The drive failed with an incomplete pass on fourth and five.

The Mountaineers took over on their own 29-yard line and quarterback James Hartman broke free and went the 71-yard distance, untouched, on the first play from scrim-

mage, for what turned out to be the game-winning score with just over three minutes left in the hard fought contest.

Santa Anna had a couple of chances to score in the first half, but just were not able to pull things together until the third quarter. Their best drive of the first half ended at the Bangs 15, from where the Mountaineers missed a 32-yard field goal try.

The Bangs Dragons turned the ball over five times and finished with 107 yard on the ground and 118 through the air.

The Mountaineers kept the ball out of the air most of the night, running for 206 yards and passing for only 12.

The Mountaineers will travel to Irion County Friday night for an 8:00 game.
