Roosevelt Is Cited To Show Right To Act

Walker Resumes Role Of Witness At Hearing In Albany

ALBANY, N. Y. (AP)—An order requiring Governor Roosevelt to show cause why he should not be restrained from passing on the right of Mayor James J. Walker to continue in office was issued Friday by Supreme Court Justice Harold Hinman.

Resuming the role of a witness in executive hearing of oyster charges, Mayor James J. Walker Friday disclaimed any financial benefit from granting of a franchise to the Equitable Bus Company.

Court action Friday subordinated events of the hearing, presenting the possibility of delaying the governor's decision until after the November election.

STATE CAPITOL, Albany, N. Y. (UP)—James J. Walker, mayor of New York, went on the witness stand in his own defense Thursday to tell Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt why the state executive should not remove him from office on charges of incompetence and corruption.

\$71,724.11 In County Fund On August 1

Other Assets \$10,826; Total Bonded Debt \$238,000

The county of Howard had in its funds July 31, a total of \$71,724.11, according to the monthly report of E. G. Towler, county treasurer.

The total assets of the county totaled \$10,826.66, represented by \$1,826.66 cash balance of a county road bond issue, five \$1,000 Howard county special road bonds and four \$1,000 bonds of Howard county common school district No. 8.

Balances in various funds at the end of July were: jury fund, \$10,194.75; road and bridge fund, \$14,183.91; general fund, \$10,053.40; Howard county road bond fund, \$1,826.66; Howard county special road bond fund, \$1,292.72; jail improvement bonds, \$3,495.65; paving warrant fund, \$6,481.54; court house and jail warrant fund, \$1,957.77; school warrant fund, \$1,849.88; highway fund (motor vehicle license fees), \$18,548.51; jail improvement warrant fund, \$3,495.65; court house and jail fund, \$3,533.57; special fund No. 1 \$43.81; special fund No. 2, \$3,286.96; special fund No. 3 \$488.95. During the month \$20,000 was transferred from the highway fund to the road and bridge fund. The highway fund really is a part of the road and bridge fund. It contains the county's share of the motor vehicle license fees, which are retained by the county up to \$50,000. The separate fund is set up on the county's books so that income from this source may be more clearly known at all times.

The three 'special' funds also are in reality parts of other funds. No. 1 special fund belongs to the jury fund, No. 2 to the road and bridge fund and No. 3 to the general fund. They were set up for the purpose of keeping a better record of the income of these funds from sources other than taxation such as interest on daily balances and trial fees. The law provides that money may be transferred from the jury, road and bridge or general funds to either of the other two.

Receipts of the various funds for July follow: jury, \$1,477.31; road and bridge (overdrawn) \$2,743.32 at \$100,000; general fund, \$10,053.40; highway fund, other receipts \$1,049.62; general fund, \$3,094.27 (\$1,849.88 transferred from this to other funds); county road bond, \$1,748.01; county special road bond, \$2,218.19; jail improvement bond, \$3,273.65; paving warrant, \$995.51 (\$546.84 transferred from this to other funds); court house and jail warrant, \$2,221.01; viaduct warrants, \$442.43; highway, \$536.23; jail improvement warrant, \$222; court house and jail bond, \$2.54; special No. 2, \$187.70; special No. 3, \$468.59. Disbursements during the month from the various funds were: jury fund, \$24; road and bridge, \$4,519.9; general, \$846.84.

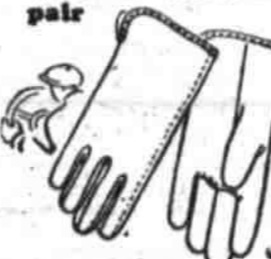
