School Board Hears Auditor And Acts On Board Policies

The Santa Anna School board met Tuesday night of last week with all members present.

Burt Lowry of the firm of Colyer and Lowry presented the report of the annual examination of the school district's financial and compliance records. The report showed things to be in order and was accepted unanimously by the trustees.

Update number 30 of local school

board policies as prepared by the Texas Association of School Boards was reviewed. This was the second reading of the update and was approved by the board with the exception of a section dealing with communicable diseases.

A citizen of the school district was on hand to ask the board to consider

the changing of the school dress code concerning facial hair on students.

The matter was discussed in a closed session later in the meeting, in accordance with the Open Meetings Act, Article 6252-17, Texas Revised Civil Statutes. After the session the board voted to uphold the current clean shaven policy for students.

The trustees cast their 595 votes for director of the Coleman County

Tax Appraisal District for Barbara Kingsbery. They also accepted \$300 from the athletic Booster Club in payment for a 25 inch television for

the athletic department for use in viewing game video tapes; and reviewed and approved payment of accounts payable.

After discussing the need for a merit pay system for school personnel, board president Danny Kellar appointed Gary Absher and Dickie Horner to work with school administrators in devising such a program.

Superintendent of schools Gerald Brister discussed current plant

needs and financial information. Among items discussed were termite control, athletic track preservation, pupil transportation needs, and reduction in state funds for 1987-88. No action was taken on any of these items. Several other items were presented to the board for informational purposes before they adjourned.

Community Thanksgiving Services Sunday

Join The Smokeout

Today (Thursday) is the day for the Great American Smokeout and the American Cancer Society has some encouraging words for the nation's 34 million smokers: "Just say yes." If you stop smoking today, your chances of lung cancer will decrease more and more each year.

Two New Councilmen For Santa Anna

Last week it was announced that the City Council of Santa Anna had appointed Quinton Daniel to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Jim Keeny who had left his position on the council for personal reasons. That announcement came after a special called meeting last Tuesday night.

On Thursday night, November 12, another called meeting was held to take care of the resignation of Councilman Joe Taylor. No reason was given for that resignation. After accepting the resignation, the council appointed Alex DeLeon to fill the

position. DeLeon had run for a place on the council during last April's election and will finish out the six months left on Taylor's term. He is a 1977 graduate of Santa Anna High School and has lived all his life in Santa Anna. He is employed with Kohler in Brownwood.

Daniel will serve the 18 months left on Keeny's term which started when he won a seat on the council during the April election. Daniel earlier served on the council during the late 1970's. He is long time employee of Coleman County Telephone Cooperative.

- Miss Christmas and Mr. - grade 9 thru 12.

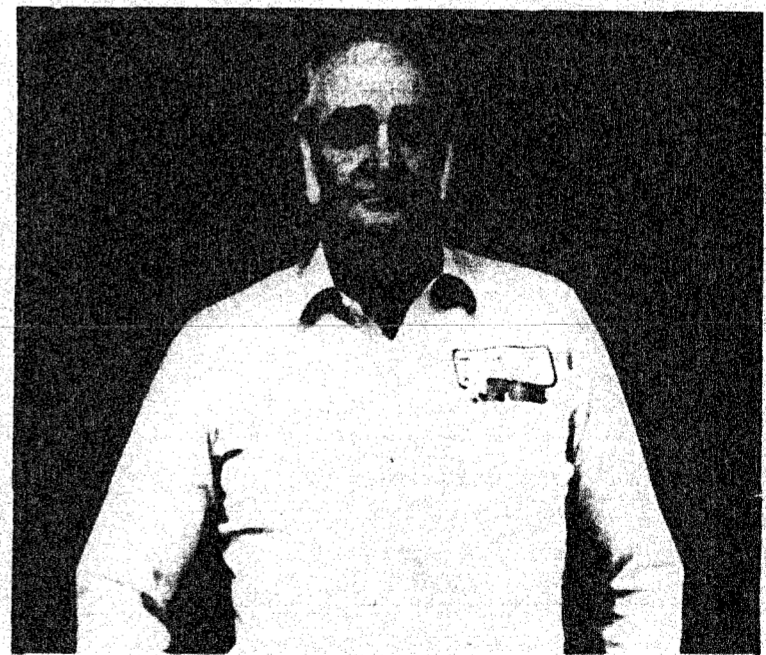

Voting will be done by a penny a vote. Jars may be placed in area and local businesses on November 23rd. Jars must be put out and collected

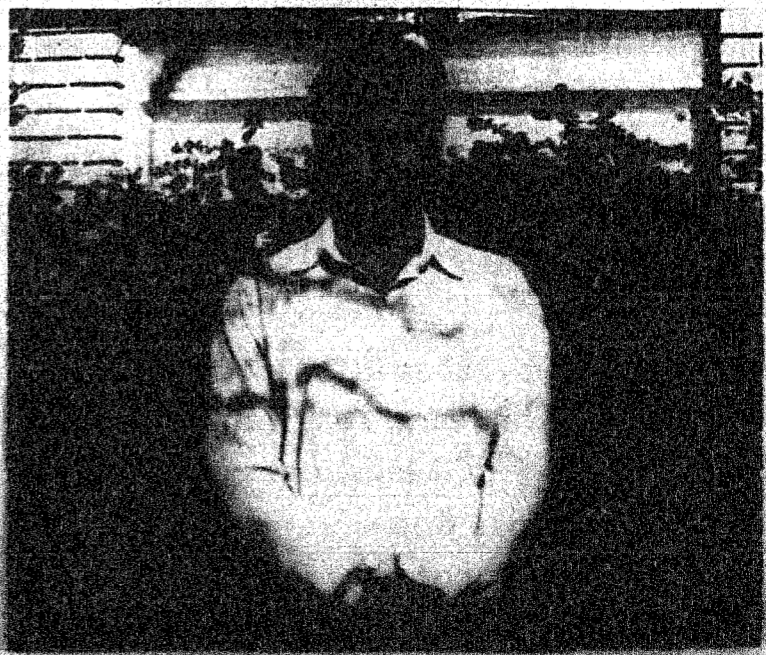

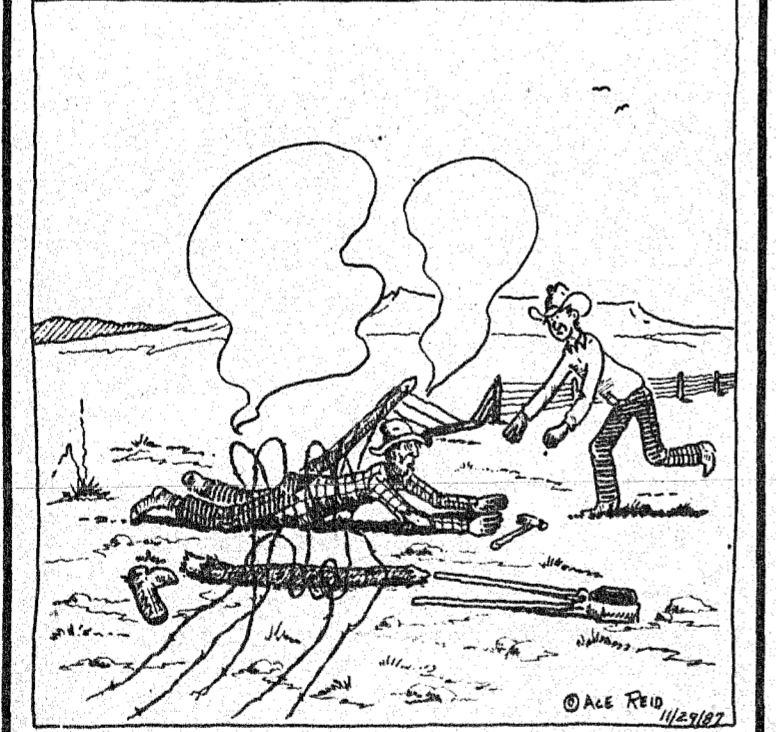

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Children Need Social Security Numbers Too

Everyone who applies for a Social Security Number must provide evidence of age, identity, and U.S. citizenship or lawful alien status, including young children, Randy Stogner, Social Security manager in Brownwood, said recently. Starting with the federal tax return for 1987, parents claiming children as dependents will have to show the Social Security number for children age 5 and older.

Parents sometimes have difficulty finding the required evidence for their children, Stogner said. They especially have trouble with the idea of providing evidence of identity.

Proof of age is relatively easy. An official U.S. public birth certificate recorded before age 5 is preferred. This document will establish citizenship.

Documents which establish a young child's identity and which are

usually available to most families include a report card, school identification card, newspaper birth announcement, court order for name change, church membership or confirmation record, doctor or hospital record, vaccination certificate, day care or nursery school record, or child's membership in youth organizations, such as Scouts.

This is not an exclusive list, Stogner said. Any document providing enough identifying data can be used.

Foreign-born applicants will also need the appropriate Immigration and Naturalization Service documents.

Only original documents or copies certified by the issuing agency can be used.

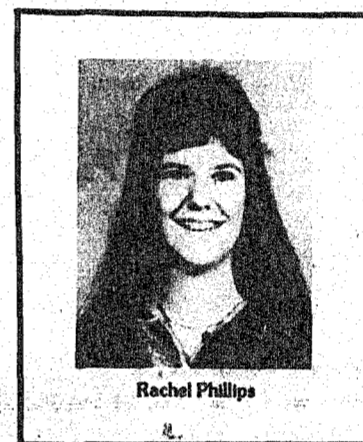
National Honor Society

Thanksgiving Message

Once again, it's time to talk turkey.

There's plenty to be thankful for in this land of plenty. Ours is a country blessed with good land and water, pretty good weather and the most productive and efficient farmers in the world. Most of us are drooling already, just thinking about feasting on the Thanksgiving bounty of our farms, chewing on that turkey leg while surrounded by mounds of dressing, vegetable and fruit concoctions of every description and consistency and acres of pumpkin and pecan pies. On Thanksgiving, nearly everyone in this country becomes personally and deeply involved in agriculture.

But, in many cases, the people who bring you these delicacies—and I'm not talking about Aunt Esther back there in the kitchen or Uncle Ed, who made seven trips to the grocery store—have a hard time putting their own Thanksgiving feasts on the table. Our family farmers are having a hard time because federal government policy prevents them from earning a fair price for what they produce. In some cases, it costs farmers twice as much to produce a commodity as they receive for that commodity. You don't need a degree in finance from SMU to know that means slim pickings at the Thanksgiving table for the people who produce our agricultural bounty.

Most people aren't aware that Texas farmers actually lose money on supplying much of the food for our Thanksgiving table. For instance, your eight-ounce serving of succulent Texas turkey is costing you 53 cents—or between one and two cents a bite—but the Texas farmer who raised that turkey lost more than a penny on supplying your eight-ounce serving. You're paying 20 cents for all the stuffing you can manage to load into your system, but the farmer who grew the wheat for the stuffing is losing half a penny per serving. (If the stuffing is the store-bought variety, the box or plastic containing the bread crumbs costs ten

times the price of the crumbs themselves.) Half an ear of corn costs you 11 cents to purchase, but the farmer who grew it netted 2 cents for his efforts, and there was not a lot of processing in between.

Now, let's say, before you plow into that pie, you have a second serving of the Texas Ruby Red grapefruit salad Cousin Ida always brings. Cousin Ida paid 16 cents for the grapefruit on your plate, but the producer who grew that grapefruit made between one and two cents per serving in the production process. Finally, we get to the pecan pie. You paid 63 cents for that two-ounce slice you're about to eat. But the producers who harvested the pecans and the farmers who produced the wheat and sugar for that slice of pie together lost half a penny.

It doesn't add up to prosperity for the Texas farm economy. The Texas Department of Agriculture calculates that Texas farmers will pocket barely eight cents for every Thanksgiving dinner they supply—ingredients that

will cost you, the consumer, about \$2.53 per meal to purchase. On four items, the turkey, stuffing, rice and pecan pies, Texas farmers will actually lose more than two cents per serving.

Last month Wall Street dropped \$500 billion in value in a single jolt heard round the world. Because of bad farm policy, American agriculture has dropped \$441 billion in real value since 1981. But the loss has been registered farmer by farmer, one rural community after another. We haven't had 20 television cameras in Crosby or Matagorda counties to tell us that the farm economy is running dry. But the truth is we've lost 43,600 family farms in Texas since 1981. We're still losing them at a rate of 172 a week.

Still, we can be thankful. We can be thankful that we have the most efficient hard-working and innovative producers in the world. By working with the human and natural resources with which we are blessed, state government can help ensure that everyone shares in the bounty of this season. Through a number of marketing and economic development programs, the Texas

Department of Agriculture has been able to assist a large number of full-time Texas farmers and ranchers to work their way out of the downdrafts of our economic climate to a position in which they can be self-sufficient and self-

sustaining once again. Our direct marketing approach has helped Texas farmers and ranchers reach customers inside and outside the state and around the world to whom they formerly had no access. With the state acting as the catalyst, farmers and ranchers themselves have been able to keep most of the profits that would have otherwise gone to marketing and distribution firms. We have helped Texas farmers and ranchers diversify to meet growing demands, such as for blueberries and lean beef, in order to be able to survive and prosper when demand for the commodities they have been producing is far below supply. Right now we are helping launch 62 new agricultural processing enterprises so that more of the food and fiber dollar stays in the state in locally-owned-and-operated enterprises.

Through programs such as these, combined with a new federal agricultural policy that will allow farm families to earn a fair price for their production we can ensure that the Thanksgiving harvest we reap in the years ahead will also be enjoyed by the family farmer.

This pecan show will be held on Tuesday, December 1st at the J.A.B. Miller Library building on the Northwest corner of the Courthouse square.

As in years past there will be a Pecan Nut division and the Pecan Food division. In the Pecan Nut division, you will need 40 unshelled pecans for an entry. These entries will be taken between 8:30 and 9:30 a.m. at the Miller building. Each sample will have your name and pecan variety on it.

In the Pecan Foods contest there will be three categories, cookies, cakes, and pies. If you plan entering this contest, the food needs to be brought in between 8:30 and 9:30 a.m.

Consumer Facts

Job Seekers: Beware Up-Front Fee

Looking for a job is hard work and can be very discouraging. Job hunters often turn to employment service agencies to help them find that elusive golden opportunity.

Employment services are regulated by state law and, except for management search consultants, labor unions, and in-house personnel service, must be certified by the Texas Department of Labor and Standards.

Employment services are not permitted to charge an "up-front fee," that is, a fee before finding a person a job. It is also illegal for a service to make any false or misrepresenting statements or to refer applicants to places where no job vacancy exists.

Beware of services that "guarantee" jobs, or that want payment in advance. Better yet, check out any employment agency with the Better Business Bureau or the Attorney General's Office before you do business with them.

Remember, now is the time to start planning, practicing and gathering the champion nut and pie.

A—Yes. A VA guaranteed loan may be used to buy and improve a lot on which to place a manufactured home you already own and occupy.

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
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

A clean filter, along with other conservation measures you can do at home, will help you save energy and money!


Set Thermostat at 68°



Tightly close the damper in your fireplace when you're not using it. The same draft that is needed to help make a fire burn could circulate through your fireplace and pull warm air out of your home. For more conservation tips, call your local WTU office.
