## National Honor Society of SAHS

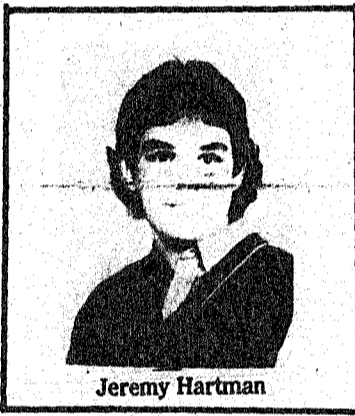

**Library Notes**  
**Check It Out**

The following is a continuation of last weeks library column. We were talking about the effect TV has on our children.

Television, by vying for children's time and attention with a constant diet of unchallenging simplistic entertainment, stimulates antisocial and antireading feeling among children.

Television has a negative effect on children's vital knowledge after age 10, according to the Schramm study of 6,000 school children. It does help, the report goes on to say, in building vocabulary for younger children, but this stops by age 10.

Television stifles the imagination. In reading the reader conjures up the pictures of the story in his own mind. Once images are put on the screen, there is no longer room for imagination.

Television overpowers and desensitizes a child's sense of sympathy for suffering, while books heighten the reader's sense of sympathy.

Television is a passive activity and discourages creative play. Educators point out that in reading a child must actively use a variety of skills to sound out words and use spelling rules in addition to constructing mental images of the scenes described in the book. Television requires no such mental activity.

Television is psychologically addictive. Many children and young people experience an urgency to watch TV in order to fulfill peer and family pressure.

Television has been described by former First Lady Betty Ford as the "greatest babysitter of all time," but it also is reported to be the nation's second largest obstacle to family harmony.

Television's conception of childhood, rather than being progressive, is regressive. It exposes children to the world of adults, when they lack the maturity to handle what they see and sort it out for themselves.

Television presents a continuous distortion of physical and social realities, thus reinforcing false stereotypes. There are not nearly as many children or obese persons on TV and murder is 200 percent more prevalent as a TV crime than it is in reality.

Bob Keeshan, most often heard in the role of his TV character Captain Kangaroo, places the prime responsibility for television's negative influence upon the parent. In a 1979 interview with John Merrow on National Public Radio's "Options in Education", Keeshan said, "Television is the great national babysitter. It's not the disease in itself, but a symptom of a greater disease that exists between parent and the parent-child relationship."

**Thoughts From Our Pastors**

**LOVE THYSELF**

"Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself." Mathew 19:19

The emphasis in this text is to love our neighbors, but we have directives from heaven to seek the best for ourselves. Self-appreciation is a Christian duty when we think of what price God paid for our redemption. To properly evaluate our worth we must (1) recognize our status as a child of God, made in His image (Genesis 1:27); (2) believe in what we may become through Christ; and (3) cheerfully accept the disciplines of the gospel for our everyday conduct.

Seeking fulfillment through any one of these three practices will result in improved behavior. To appropriate all three is to develop into a full man in Christ, and into greater favor among men, for the psalmist says, "men will praise thee, when thou doest well to thyself" (Psalm 49:18). Self-respect is one of the most dynamic motivations for a Christian to live up to his potential as a steward of God's love.

We may find proposition three especially difficult. Because this world is so attractive, and so magnetic its pull that any restraint is regarded as "old fashioned". But let's face the truth. Although there are some things that God refuses to tolerate in His children, He will take nothing beneficial from them. "For...no good thing will he withhold from them that walk uprightly." (Psalm 84:11). The child of God recognizes in His prohibitions a guide to life. If a thing is good, it is permitted; if harmful, it is forbidden. The Christian's highest privilege is the grace of humble submission that God's greatest favor may be upon him.

It is ironic that God should love us more than we love ourselves, and that self-destroying habits are naturally appealing to us. We should indeed love ourselves too much to stoop to popular evil customs and practices. The key to unswerving self-love, of course, is love for God. When our relationship with Him is normal our view of ourselves and of our fellow man assumes the proper perspective. Then are we prepared to say, "All that the Lord hath said will we do."

**Fruit Rolls Not Same As Dried Fruit**

Commercially prepared fruit rolls, wrinkles and bars are conveniently packaged for children's school lunches but, don't measure up nutritionally to dried fruit. "Fruit rolls are high in sugar and starch, and typically contain less than 2 percent of the Recommended Dietary Allowance for vitamins of minerals. They are, however, often fortified with added vitamin C," explains Dr. Alice Hunt, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. Fruit rolls don't contain the fiber that is found in fresh or dried fruit either, she notes.

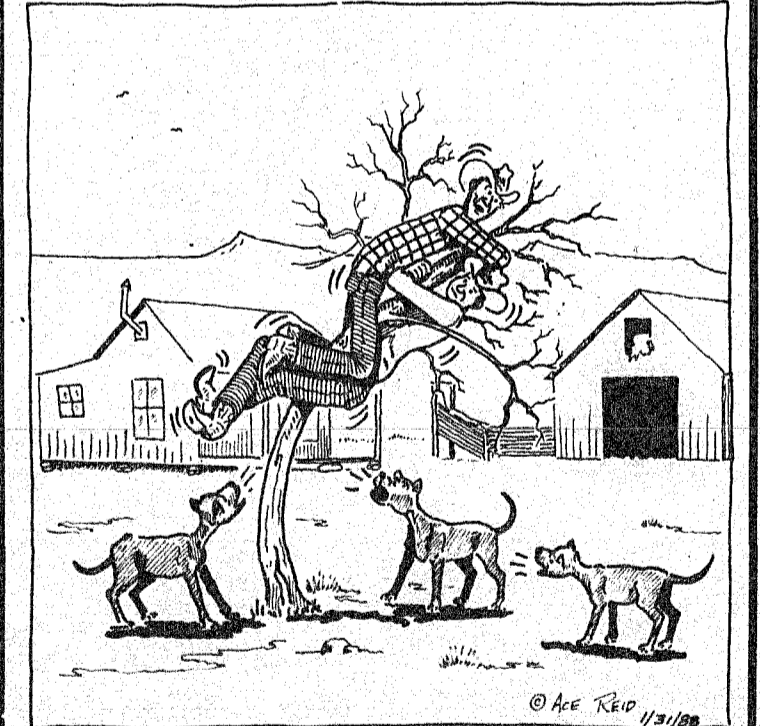

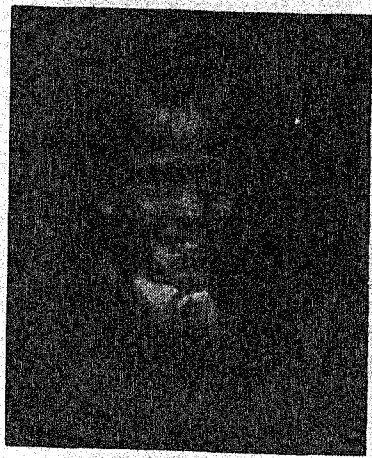

Complaints concerning failure to withhold or pay portions of other federal taxes should be made in writing to the Internal Revenue Service.

DEAR COMMISSIONER NABERS: Under new provisions of the federal Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act (COBRA), my company must provide continuation of group health insurance coverage to a terminated employee unless that employee was terminated for gross misconduct.

I was told at a professional association meeting that the Texas Employment Commission can tell our company whether gross misconduct was present. Is this true?

mation going around on this subject. COBRA is an extremely broad and lengthy act. The requirement to offer continued insurance coverage is only a small part of COBRA and it has nothing to do with the Texas Employment Commission.

The TEC decides issues of misconduct under Section 5(b) of the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act ONLY when a claim for unemployment benefits is filed, not before. The TEC has no authority to officially rule on the merits of any work separation outside the unemployment claim process.

I suggest you get legal advice on your responsibilities to employees under COBRA. There may be severe consequences for failing to offer employees and their dependents the option of continuing insurance coverage subsequent to their departure from your employment.

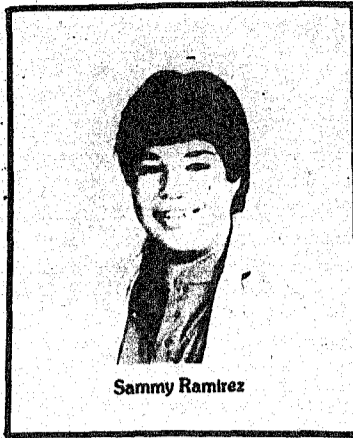

## For Santa's Helpers: User-Friendly Stocking Stuffers



Is Santa Claus computer literate? The question arises because so many people now have personal computers of so many different brands and styles that trying to put a little something under the tree for the computer-user in your family may be yet another exercise in frustration.

Is it possible to find something for a personal computer user, even if you're not really sure what kind of computer he has, or what type of software she uses? Something that costs less than \$20, comes in a small enough box to be gift-wrapped and won't make you look foolish when it's opened on Christmas morning?

In other words, are there such things as "one size fits all" computer accessories for non-computerized Santas?

"Absolutely," replies Tim Carr, market development manager in charge of more than 50 accessory products for 3M, the world's largest supplier of computer storage media. There are a number of useful computer products that even the least knowledgeable computer shopper can stuff in a stocking or slip under the tree with confidence that they'll be appreciated. And used.

For instance, almost every com-

puter has a screen. A computer screen can create fatigue after extended periods of time. Some people get red eyes, tired eyes, even headaches. The dirtier the screen gets, the harder the eyes have to work. The screen gets dirty because it generates static, which attracts dust and debris just like the screen of a television set. Yet very few people clean their screen.

Screen cleaning kits cost less than \$10. Most contain pretreated, disposable cleaning pads designed to remove dirt and debris while at the same time eliminating static buildup. 3M's system, called Clean'N'Safe, comes in a handy box that can be attached, removed and reattached to the side of the CRT screen.

As a stocking stuffer with a handsomer touch, try a Diskrite permanent marker. It looks like a conventional felt-tip pen, but writes in permanent gold ink with a specially designed soft tip that allows it to be used safely even on the black PVC jackets of computer diskettes.

If Santa's Christmas fund is a little larger, a static control strip or pad can be a nice "touch." When the user touches the keyboard, static in the body can drain into the computer, zapping data or even ruining a delicate computer chip. An anti-static mat or strip is grounded, so touching it first allows the user to channel static away from the computer. Mats go under the computer or keyboard; 3M's anti-static strip can be positioned unobtrusively on the keyboard itself. They all sell for around \$20.

Most computers are hooked up to printers, for which there are lots of inexpensive printer accessories to choose from. A sturdy plastic Universal Printer Stand fits the printer,

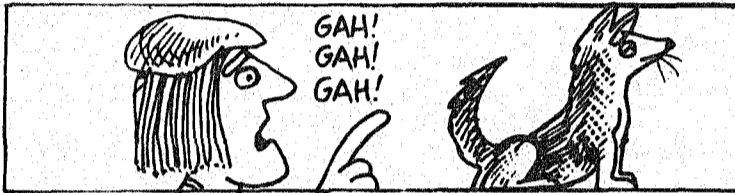
regardless of the style or brand being used, allowing paper to be stored and fed to the printer from below.

For platenes (the black roller on typewriters, printers and sheet and envelope feeders), there are cleaning kits like the Clean'N'Safe platen cleaner and restorer pak. Cleaning the platen extends the life of that important part by restoring its "grip." That, in turn, prevents paper from sliding and also eliminates the transfer of ink and oils from the platen to the back of the paper going over it.

Does Santa need more ideas? How about a non-magnetic copyholder (magnetic fields can distort and destroy the computer user's data) that puts work at a comfortable eye level while saving desk space, and 3M's version can be folded up for compact storage when not in use.

Santa's helpers don't have to be full-fledged computer users to choose something a computer user will appreciate. Most computer stores and office supply stores carry a wide selection of computer accessories to fit almost any need or budget.
