the 800m relays in Saturday's Booster Club Mountaineer Relays.

Boys 1st; Girls 2nd In Mountaineer Relays Sat.

The Santa Anna Mountaineers came out on the top at the Booster Club Mountaineer Relays, Saturday and the girls finished a strong second.

The boys tallied 148 points in the meet. Cross Plains was second with 95 and San Saba took third place with 88 points.

The Lady Mountaineers came in behind the girls from Cross Plains who had a total of 181 points. The SAHS girls totaled 122 points for the 2nd place slot and Baird trailed for third with 71 points.

The Santa Anna boys track team won the Mountaineer Relays championship for the second year in a row. This is the first time in recent history that a team has won consecutive championships. Santa Anna, trailing the leader by over 40 points at the end of the field events, finished strong in the running events and outdistanced the other teams.

Reece McIver was the outstanding individual for Santa Anna in the

boy's division of the Booster Club Mountaineer Relays Saturday. The overall outstanding boy was David White of Rising Star, who placed first in the long jump, 1st in the pole vault and 5th in the 100 meter dash.

McIver paced the Santa Anna team with 2nd place in the discus and the high hurdles and first in the 300 meter hurdles. He ran the third leg of the 1600 meter relay which finished 2nd.

Eddie Tomlinson won 2nd place in the high jump at 6 ft. Robbie Pritchard jumped in fourth place at 5-8.

In the Long Jump, Bobby DeLeon was 5th with a leap of 18-2 3/4 and Jody Purcell was 6th at 17-10 1/2.

Reece McIver took second place in throwing the discus 131' 1 3/4". The 400 meter relay team of Bobby DeLeon, Lonnie Kirven, Jody Purcell and Herbert Jackson finished 1st with a time of 45.73.

Jorge Suarez finished 4th in the 800m run.

In the 110m hurdles, Eddie Tomlinson finished 1st with a time of

17.06 and McIver came in 2nd at 17.09 in what could be described as a photo finish.

Herbert Jackson took 2nd in the 100m dash with a time of 11.79 and Jody Purcell was 6th at 12.42.

Lonnie Kirven finished first in the 400m dash with a time of 54.41. Robert Dues came in third at 57.11 and Robert Pritchard was 4th with a time of 57.23.

In the 300m hurdles, McIver finished 1st with a time of 42.26 and Bobby Pritchard came in 2nd with 43.09.

Herbert Jackson finished 2nd in the 200m dash at 24.16 and Bobby DeLeon was 5th at 24.88.

The Santa Anna 1600m relay team finished 2nd with a time of 3:42.56. Members of the relay team are Robbie Pritchard, Bobby DeLeon, Reece McIver and Lonnie Kirven.

Good Report From Texas Education Agency

The Santa Anna schools have received the results of the recent monitoring visit conducted by the Texas Education Agency. The purpose of the monitoring is to help districts determine whether they are in compliance with appropriate state and federal rules and regulations and, if not, to assist them in

reaching compliance. According to the letter received, the team found many commendable practices in the district, however the compliance monitoring reports discuss only areas of concern and discrepancies.

The areas monitored were fiscal and personnel; compensatory

bilingual-ESL; and Vocational education. The Santa Anna Independent School District was found to be in compliance based on the program review conducted by the monitoring team and the report expressed appreciation for the courtesies and cooperation extended by the persons contacted during the review.

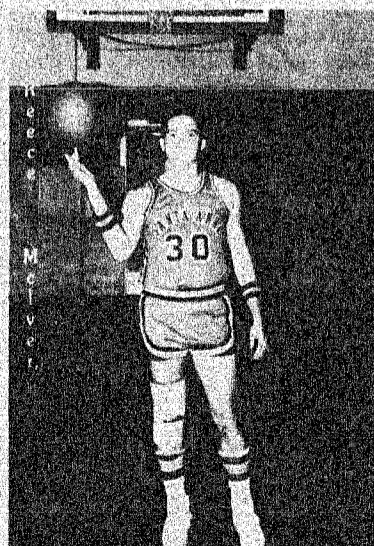

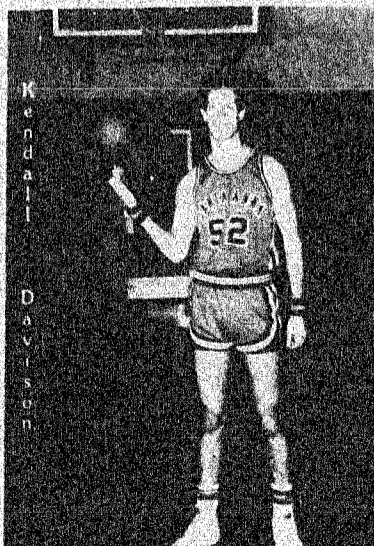

Investigate Before Buying Timeshare

A timeshare, or purchasing a unit in a resort area for use a specific week every year can be a good vacation option for some families, says Bonnie L. Piernot, a consumer economics specialist. "No matter how attractive the deal, however, consumers should carefully investigate before buying a vacation timeshare," cautions the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist. She says it's most important to know what kind you're buying. An ownership, or "interval" time share, gives you a simple interest in the property, providing title, deed and title insurance. You can sell your share of the property, will it or give it away.

"Right-to-use" time share offers no equity in the property. You're given the right to use a specific unit for a certain period of time, after which possession reverts to the developer. This type of timeshare may also be called a vacation license, lease or club membership, she explains. "Contests and gifts have been used to induce people to visit a site where unscrupulous sellers then apply heavy pressure," the specialist says. "Texas laws protect consumers by allowing a 3-day cooling off period, during which you can back out of a contract and get a refund," notes Piernot. Before signing a timeshare contract, the consumer specialist suggests you figure your total costs, including interest to be paid for financing and annual maintenance fees.

For his tour Stevenson bought a donkey, "Modestine", to carry his supplies. At the end he sold her "saddle and all" for 35 francs. His relationship with Modestine gives the reader many heart warming chuckles. Anyone who has had dealings with a donkey can certainly sympathize with his plight.

Through Stevenson's journal the reader feels as though he has had a personal encounter with the French people of this area. His account of the travails in finding campsites, keeping a pack on the donkey, traversing trails in the dark of night and storm - all give this small book a very intimate feeling.

Those who love Stevenson will delight in this travelogue and find many quotes worth quoting and remembering.

Fire Dept. Still Busy

With the arrival of cool, wet weather the fire department had a quiet few days last week but by the weekend things had pretty well dried out and the fire danger was again high.

On Sunday, March 20, the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Dept. was called to a fire between Coleman and Santa Anna on the Santa Fe right-of-way. Also on that day, they assisted several other departments working for about 8 hours to contain a grass fire near Novice that burned somewhere around 2000 acres, mostly on the Hudson Ranch.

There were two fires at about 1:00 p.m. on Monday of this week. The Santa Anna Fire Dept. answered the call on a fire approx. one mile east of town which burned an estimated 20 acres on the David Bradley place.

While the Santa Anna firemen were attending that fire another was reported less than five miles away on the toward Coleman. The Col-

eman Department handled that one as they knew Santa Anna was busy at the time.

According to a fire department spokesman, both fires started on the highway right-of-way and appeared to have been set. He also stated that if you see anyone that you suspect might be starting a fire, take down the license plate number and report it to the sheriff's department or to the fire department.

Late word received from the VFD was that they were called to a second fire on Monday afternoon 1/2 mile west of Talpa that burned approx. 1200 acres. Seven other fire departments worked with Santa Anna on the containment of that fire.

There Was Cotton Acreage in County Prior To 1910

In last week's article giving figures from a census of Coleman County in the year of 1910, it was stated that there seemed to be no cotton farming in the county at that time and that it did not become a factor in the county till later in time, because no cotton acreage was listed in the census.

John Womack, who lives northeast of Santa Anna near the Buffalo community, called to say that he remembered there was cotton farming in the county at that time. In fact, his parents were engaged in raising cotton in 1906 in the Plainview community. He advises us that Miles Vance had a cotton gin at Shields at least during 1907 and 1908. Womack recalls that the cotton at that time was making a bale an acre.

Other families he recalls who were engaged in farming cotton in the area were Shooks, 2 Curry families, Mark Bailey, Will Gilbreath and the Bartons.

He tells of a contest he and Hale Barton had to see who could pick the most cotton in a day. They were

about ten years old at the time and Barton won the contest by picking 250 pounds to Womack's 240 pounds.

Kallie Gray has been named SAHS Citizen of the week. Kallie, a senior, is the daughter of Kay and Frank Gray and is active in many areas of student life.

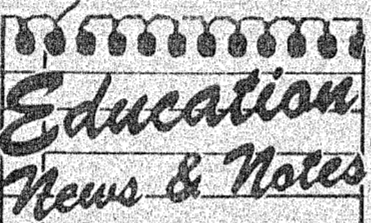

Communities can rescue dropouts—here's how!

School dropouts affect everyone. Whether you are a parent or not, whether you have children in schools now or not, you can help.



How? A key factor in keeping students involved in school is collaboration—citizens working together. That's why the members of the National Education Association have allocated \$100,000 to establish Operation Rescue, a special effort to fund first dropout prevention programs. Some ideas:

- Businesses and offices can set up intern programs that give students a close-up look at the world of work.
• Senior citizens and retired workers can help as tutors with one student or with small groups.
• Homeowners, senior citizens, business people, and others willing to talk with students about the importance of education to their careers and their lives can start a "Community Care" cadre.
• The total community should be involved: Make the subject of dropout prevention a topic of discussion and action everywhere—civic associations, businesses, religious groups, health care organizations.

SURVIVAL OF THE FITTEST

A 14-year study of finches in the Galapagos Islands shows that there is definite relationship between climate and bird size. "National Wildlife" magazine reports that, during droughts, more large finches survived because they had the strength and big bills necessary to crack open the large, hard seeds that remained after smaller seeds had been consumed. Small birds thrived in rainy years, because the dampness fostered growth of plants that produce small seeds. Larger birds couldn't eat small seeds fast enough to keep up with their energy demands.

In the boys division, Tommy Williford placed first in the pole vault.

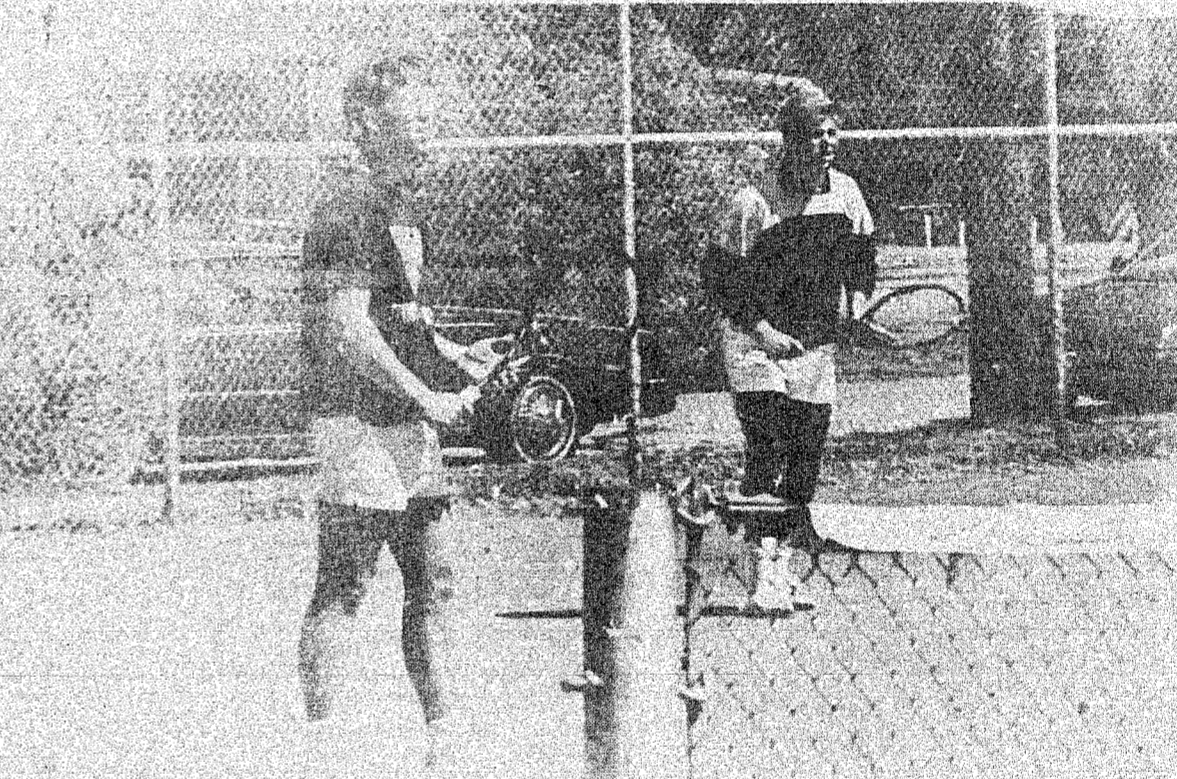
In the long jump, Santa Anna took three places. Phillip Hernandez won the event while teammates Vicente Frausto and Tommy Williford placed 4th and 5th.
