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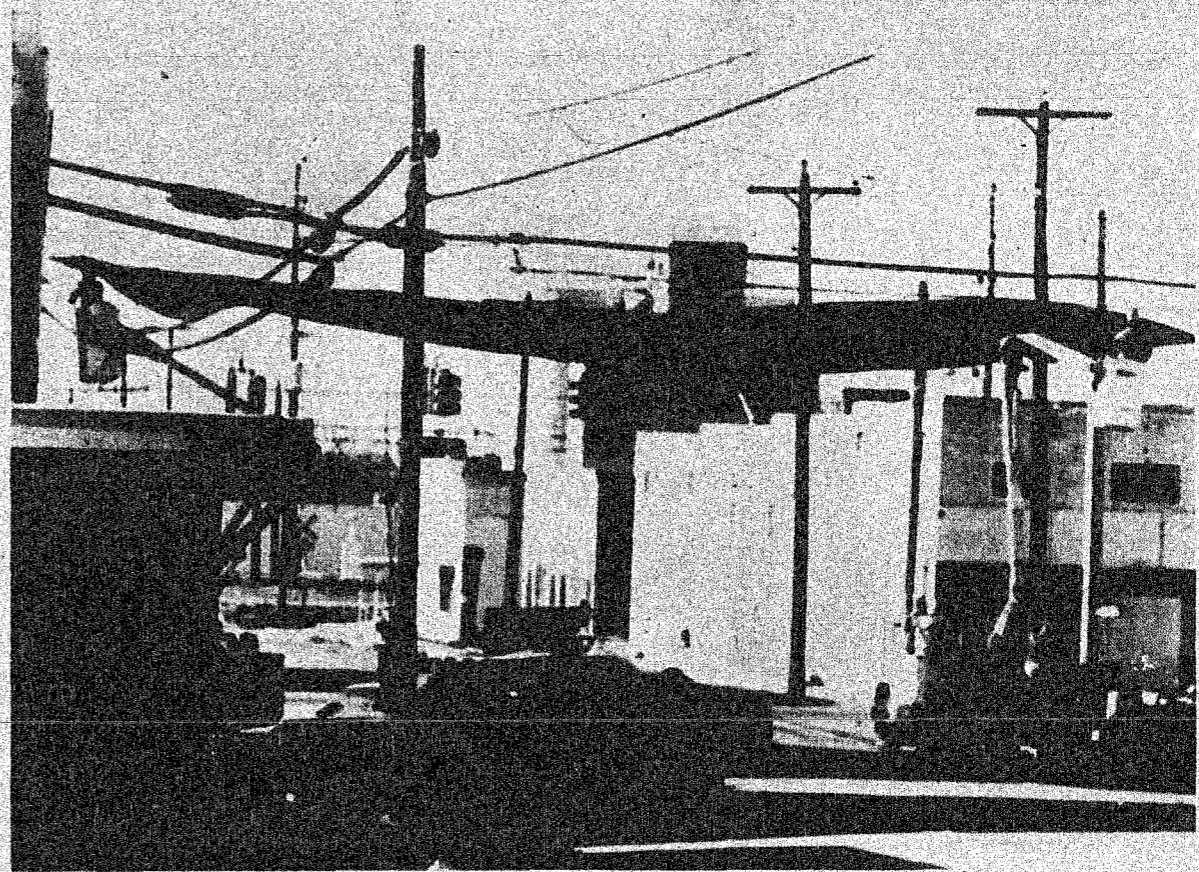
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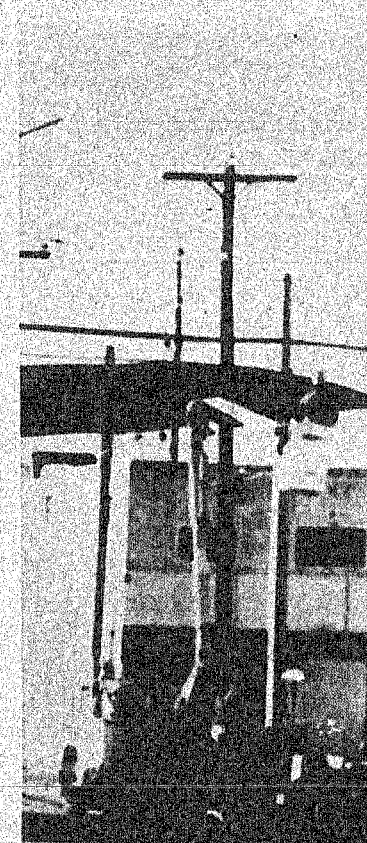

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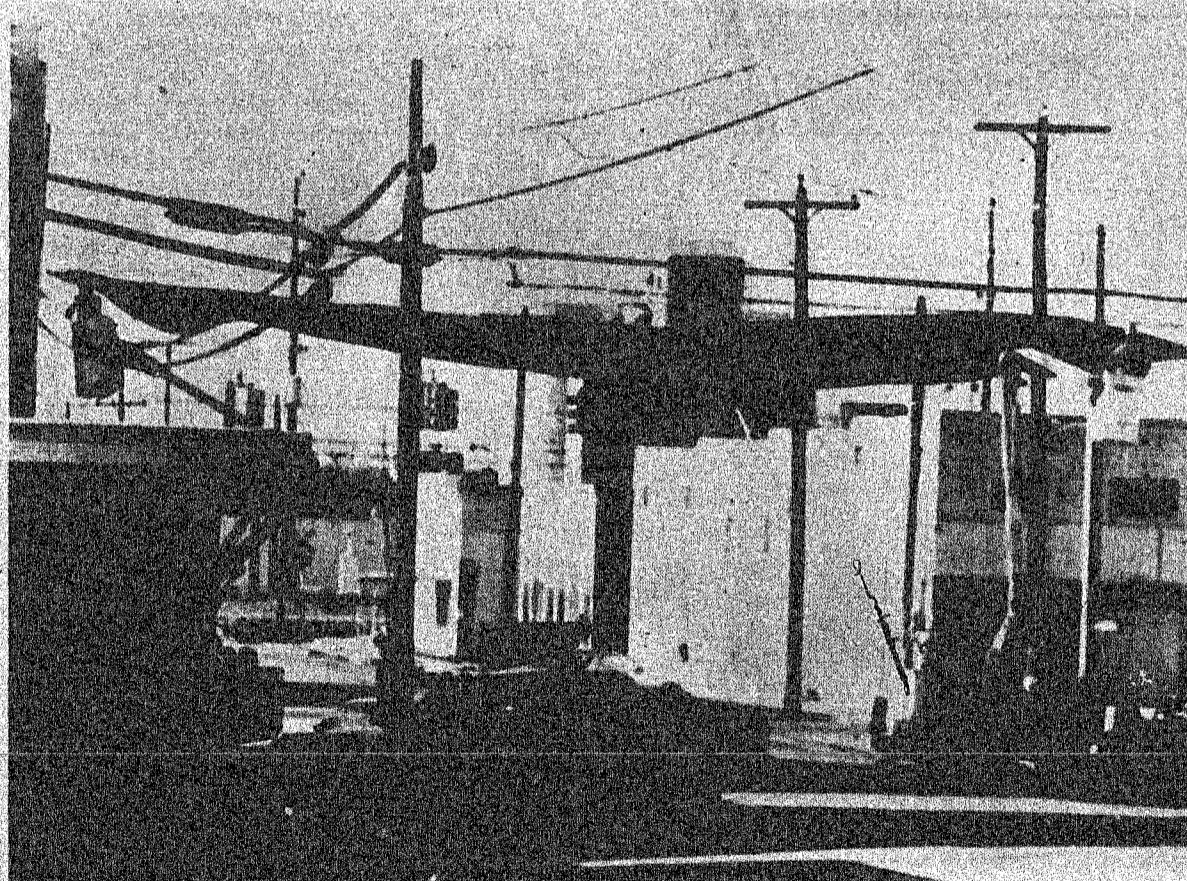
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# Niece Of Local Woman Receives Courage Award In White House Ceremony

On March 29, Daon Martin of Prattville, Alabama was presented the 1988 COURAGE AWARD by President Reagan in a ceremony that took place at the White House during the Celebration of Life Program in Washington D.C. March 28 and 29. Daon, the 14 year-old daughter of Sandra and Bob Martin and the niece of local resident, Lois Harper, had the honor of being selected for the award as Alabama's representative to the American Cancer Society sponsored event.

Daon was diagnosed as having Leukemia when she was six years old. She was under the supervision of Dr. Castleberry at Children's Hospital in Birmingham when the Martin family was told the seriousness of her condition and that a bone marrow transplant was an alternative. When it was decided that a bone marrow transplant was the route to take, the family was tested for a donor. Donna Martin Folen, Daon's older sister, had the closest match; as a matter of fact, the match was "as close as you can get and not be twins", said their mother, Sandra.

The family decided to have the transplant performed at the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center in Seattle, Washington. The Center had been the pioneer in bone marrow transplants. Daon's transplant was performed May 4, 1984. Dr.

Hickman, who invented the plastic tubes which feeds fats, lipids, medication and glucose to the transplant patient, was on the staff at the hospital and actually inserted Daon's tube.

Everything in Daon's room had to be sterilized, even the toothpaste, and the room had plastic across it. Each person entering the room, including hospital staff, had to scrub, wear a mask, gown, gloves, boots and cap. You couldn't touch anything even after being suited up, or the routine had to be gone over again. Daon said the worst thing about the transplant was being sick of course, but next, "I think I hated losing my hair".

Daon came home August 9, 1984 after a very successful bone marrow transplant. She goes back to Birmingham only twice a year now for checkups. She is given a physical, and her blood, height and weight are tested. In between visits, Dr. Norgard in Montgomery keeps a check on her. As a matter of fact, it was Dr. Norgard who submitted her name for the Celebration of Life awards.

Daon and her parents, Sandra and Bob Martin, left for Washington March 25. Some of the events they participated in for the winners were a reception and Banquet at the Shoreham Hotel hosted by members of the American Cancer Association's 75th Anniversary Committee;

a press conference where a Cancer Survivors' Bill of Rights was signed by 57 participants representing the 3 million Americans who have survived cancer; a luncheon in the Senate Office Building hosted by Senators Orrin Hatch and Edward Kennedy and attended by congressmen and senators who represent the 57 participants; and, last but not least, the awards presentation by the President at the White House.

Some of the former Courage Award recipients include Marguerite Piazza, Jack Pardee, Gene Littler, Otto Graham, Ann Jillian, Minnie Pearl, Forrest Gregg and Amanda Blake.

Daon's mother, Sandra is the daughter of the late Jack Shields and Virgie Shields Hook and the sister of Lois Harper. Her father, Bob Martin, is the nephew of the late T.K. Martin.

## Phase 5 For County System

# County Water Line Project To Begin Within 30 Days

Bids for the construction of Phase 5 for the Coleman County Water Supply Corporation were opened on Tuesday of last week and apparent low bids have been forwarded to the Farmers Home Administration office in Temple for final approval, reports Raymond Rush, president of the county water system. Construction is expected to begin within 30 days.

Rhodes Construction Company of Lubbock was the apparent low bid-

der on the north part of Phase 5 while H & S Utilities of Everman had the low bid on the southern part of Phase 5 and the pump station.

Construction bids totaled \$2.51 million, which Rush feels are good bids. Ten bids were received on the project.

The Phase 5 project, as approved by the Farmers Home Administration, will include 450 meters. The contract calls for completion within 360 days.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97 percent five year survival rate and a 90 percent 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.
