Oil Pipeline To Cross County; Will **Bring Economic Benefits**

When the "northern alternative" route was selected for the Celeron Corporation's final link in a California to Gulf Coast crude oil pipeline, it assured Coleman County of many economic benefits.

Construction will be a major project when the 30-inch line is laid across southern Coleman County. When completed one of the pump stations will be located in the county, likely with some employees. Then on the long range there will be the benefit from taxes to both the county and school districts involved. The line will mean a big load for the electricity suppliers.

There will be some economic benefit when easements are secured. It is understood that easement activity will begin in the county next month, and when the easement corridor has been secured construction will begin.

The line will enter Coleman County at a point just below Stacy Reservoir Dam, will go northeast to a point halfway across the county and then continue on an easterly direction untill crossing into Brown County. Near the Waco area the line will dip sharply to the southeast as it heads for Webster in the Houston

The line will cross the east part of Coleman County at a point about midway between Santa Anna and the Colorado River.

When application was made by Celeron the proposed route was more direct, but the southern and northern alternative routes were also presented. Following hearings on the Invironmental Impact Study, decision was made to use the northern alternative which included Coleman County.


During the day there will be music by several groups, skits, activities for children, and the Lions Club auction to the close the activities.







A Cancer detection unit from the Women's and Children's Hospital of Odessa is parked at the Santa Anna Civic Center (Armory) today (Thursday) offering mammograms for the detection of breast cancer.

For last minute appointments you may call 348-3887, or go by and check at the detection unit.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at the Women's and Children's Hospital, "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists."

By using modern state of the art X-Ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90-97 percent survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50 percent survival rate in five

Daon was diagnosed as having Leukemia when she was six years old. She was under the supervision of Dr. Castlebery at Children's Hospital in Birmingham when the Martin family was told the seriousness of her condition and that a bone marrow transplant was an alternative. When it was decided that a bone marrow transplant was the route to take, the family was tested for a donor. Donna Martin Folen. Daon's older sister, had the closest match; as a matter of fact, the match was "as close as you can get and not be twins", said their mother, Sandra.

The family decided to have the transplant performed at the Fred **Hutchison Cancer Research Center** in Seatle, Washington. The Center had been the pioneer in bone marrow transplants. Daon's transplant was performed May 4, 1984. Dr.

On March 29, Daon Martin of Prat-Hickman, who invented the plastic tubes which feeds fats, lipids, medication and glucose to the transplant patient, was on the staff at the hospital and actually inserted Daon's tube.

Everything in Daon's room had to be sterilized, even the toothpast, and the room had plastic across it. Each person entering the room, including hospital staff, had to scrub, wear a mask, gown, gloves, boots and cap. You couldn't touch anything even after being suited up, or the routine had to be gone over again. Daon said the worst thing about the transplant was being sick of course, but next, "I think I hated losing my hair". Daon came home August 9, 1984

after a very successful bone marrow transplant. She goes back to Birmingham only twice a year now for checkups. She is given a physical, and her blood, height and weight are tested. In between visits. Dr. Norgard in Montgomery keeps a check on her. As a matter of fact, it was Dr. Norgard who submitted her name for the Celebration of Life

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicans, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

I. 35-40 years of age- One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age- A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over- An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at

appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

How Long Nas The Post Office Been **Charging For** Mail Delivery?

With the recent hike in postal rates still fresh on our minds, have you ever stopped to wonder how long the post office has been charging for mail delivery?

According to a statement made in a recent Associated Press story, the custom for paying for mail delivery began in the first half of the 19th century and at that time the cost of sending a single sheet of paper 40 miles or less was between 6 cents and 8 cents. The cost would increase the farther the paper traveled.

If the-final destination was 400 miles or more the cost would be 25 cents to send a sheet of paper.

Postage stamps and standard rates began in the middle of the 19th century. The cost started at 2 cents per

half-ounce in 1863 and rose to 3 cents The current first class standard

based on 1 ounce was started in 1885 and the one-ounce rates since then have been as follows:



cause a potassium loss. Physicians often recommend eating more highpotassium foods to overcome this. And additional potassium may be prescribed as a medicine.

According to the American Heart Association, the amount of recommended potassium will vary, and a physician or dietitian should be consulted to determine if a potassium supplement is needed, and if so, how

Foods high in potassium include bananas, cantaloupe, honeydew melons, white potatoes and molasses. Prunes, prune juice, and grapefruit, orange or tomato juice are also very good sources of potassium.

Cooked dried beans, cooked greens, sweet potatoes, green lima beans, winter squash, raisins and apple juice are also good sources of potassium. Do keep in mind the fact that canned, frozen and processed foods often have sodium added. Be sure to read the labels on processed food packages.

The AHA suggests that people following a special diet, such as one to control weight, restrict sodium intake or manage diabetes, should discuss which foods high in potassium are most appropriate. Also, people with kidney disease may require special potassium-restricted diets.

Most healthy adults get all the potassium they need from their normal diet. A balanced diet that includes selections from the major food groups usually provides a substantial amount of potassium.


