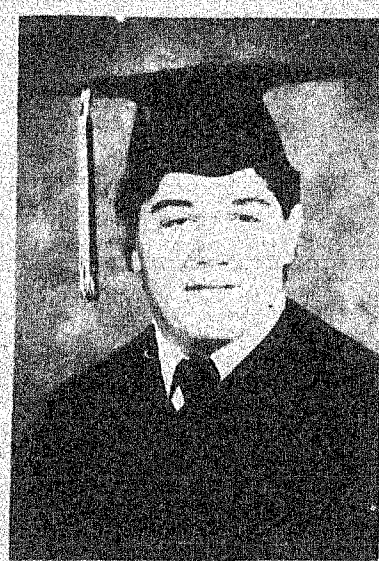

Appraisal Notices To Be Mailed This Week

The 1988 appraisal notices will be mailed this week to Coleman County property owners, whose appraised values increased, listing the appraised values and estimated taxes for the year. Property owners will have an opportunity to request changes or corrections and are encouraged to assist in making the appraisal roll correct.

When the notices are received, the 1988 value will be shown in addition to the 1987 value and the tax amount for the past year. However the tax rates and exact amount of taxes may vary when the taxing entities set their rates for the current year.

As the notices are received and questions arise, you are urged to contact the Appraisal District Office in Coleman. Most questions are resolved by a phone call or a visit to the office. However if errors or problems cannot be resolved, property owners may request a meeting with the Appraisal Review Board that will meet in June.

In order to be granted a meeting and make an appointment with the ARB, a special form must be filed with the Appraisal Office on or before June 27, 1988. The Appraisal Review Board is composed of James

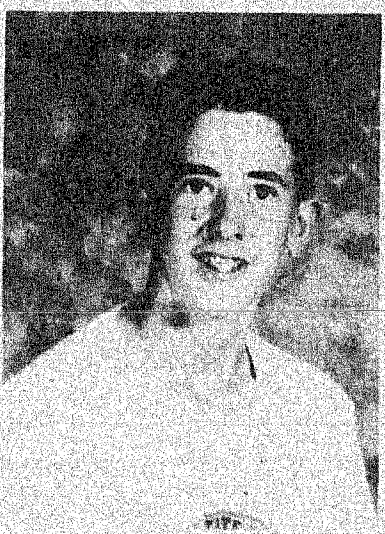
Honor graduates of Santa Anna Junior High have been announced. Tommy Williford has been named Valedictorian of the class and Grady Clay McIver the Salutatorian.

One Deathless Day

The campaign is designed to increase the public's awareness of the magnitude of traffic accidents and deaths. Hopefully, Texans will meet the challenge for one deathless day by accepting their responsibility to drive safely. This includes everyone buckling up on every trip, whether three blocks to the grocery store, or 300 miles to the coast.

The 101 DAYS OF SUMMER officially begins May 28 and goes through Labor Day, September 5. Periodic updates will be made through the media to keep the public advised of the situation.

"A CHRISTIAN OR A PHARISEE?"

Acts 11:26,

The disciples were called Christian first at Antioch. The name Christian may have even been given them by their enemies, nevertheless the terminology "Christian" means to be Christ like or like Christ. We must study the Bible to see what Christ was really like and just what we must do to be like Him. 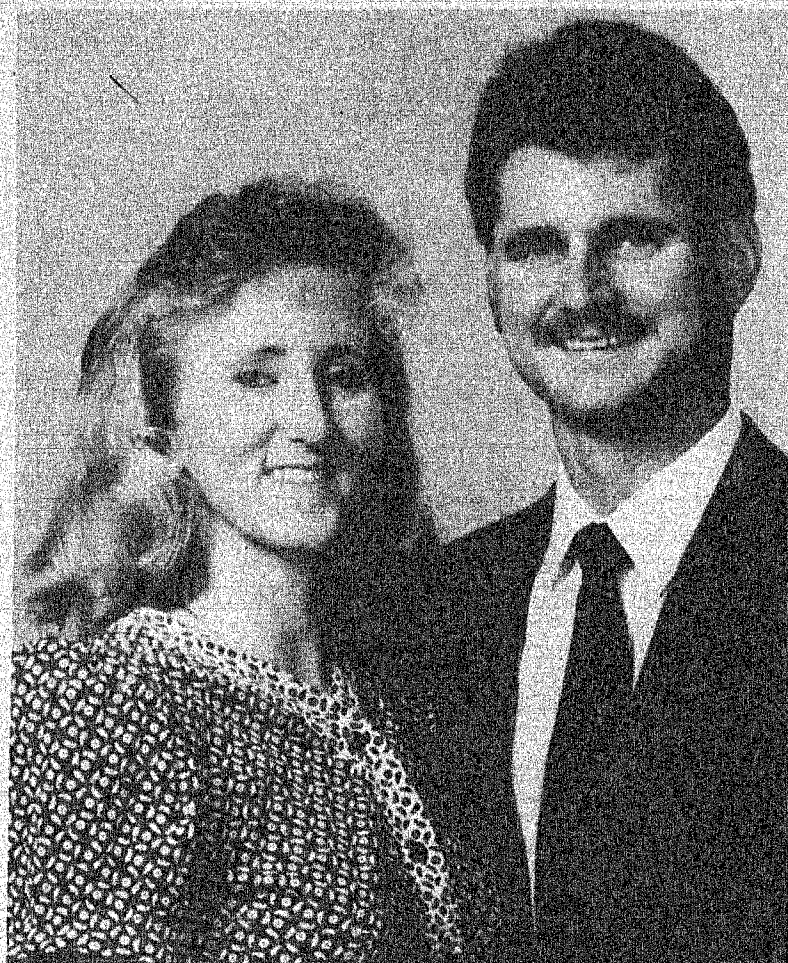

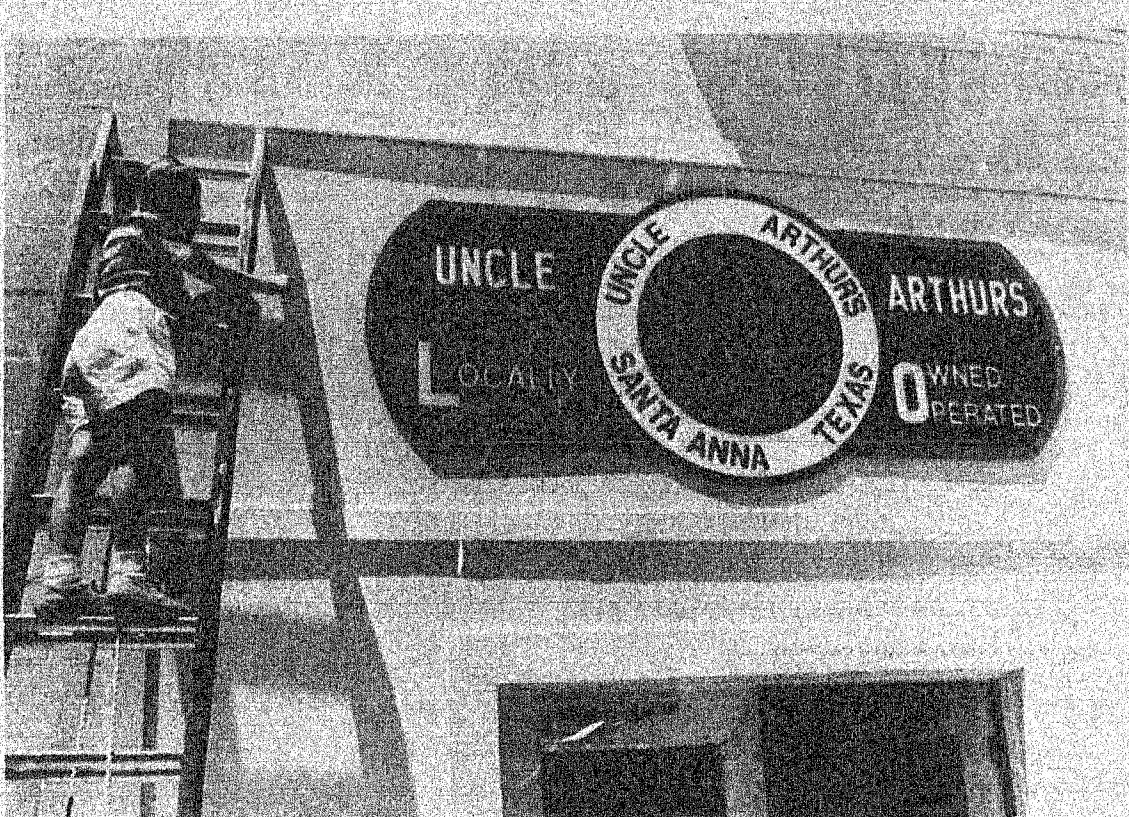

When Graduating To High School Was The Challenge

The following story was submitted by William H Bell, Bay St. Louis Miss., to the Wall Street Journal and later reprinted in Fence Post Magazine.

Years ago in Indiana, if a pupil in the rural schools (about age 13) wished to enter public high school, he had to pass an examination.

What did the state expect the 13-year-old pupil to know?

Bell took the test in March, 1911, and kept the test questions.

They cover all of the basic subjects- geography, grammar, arithmetic, physiology, reading and history.

What follows is a sampling of the test Bell took so long ago. Try it and see if you would have entered high school along with Bell.

1. In what state and on what waters are the following; Chicago, Duluth, Cleveland and Buffalo? State an important fact about each.

2. Name and locate two countries in which the following are important products: wheat, cotton, wool, coffee.

3. Write on the Panama Canal, telling who is building it, its location

and importance.

4. What causes the change from day to night, and from summer to winter?

5. Name five republics, three limited monarchies, and one absolute monarchy.

6. Name the classes of sentences on the basis of meaning and use. On the basis of form.

7. Write a sentence with its verb in the active voice, change to passive voice.

8. What is meant by inflection? What parts of speech are inflected?

9. Write sentences containing nouns showing six case relations.

10. Write a model business letter of not more than 40 words.

11. What is the length of a rectangular field 80 rods wide that contains 100 acres?

12. A wagon is 10 feet long, three feet wide and 28 inches deep; how many bushels of wheat will it hold?

13. A rope 500 feet long is stretched from the top of a tower and reaches the ground 300 feet from the base of the tower; how high is the tower?

14. In physiology, name three kinds of joints and give an example of each.

15. Give the structure of a muscle and of the spinal cord.

16. Define arteries, veins, capillaries and pulse.

17. Write a brief biography of Evangeline.

18. What do you think the author of 'Enoch Arden' aims to teach?

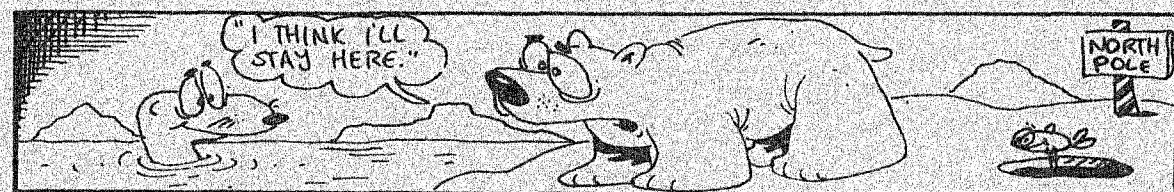
19. What kind of man was Shylock?

When Bell took this test in 1911, "there was no attempt to pass a pupil so that he could keep up with his peers," he said.

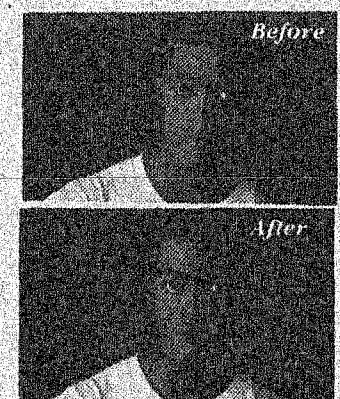
"In my days as a college student," Bell added, "I never heard of any institution of higher education giving remedial reading and remedial mathematics."

Year after year, we hear of tragic accidents taking the lives of young graduates who have been celebrating by consuming alcohol or

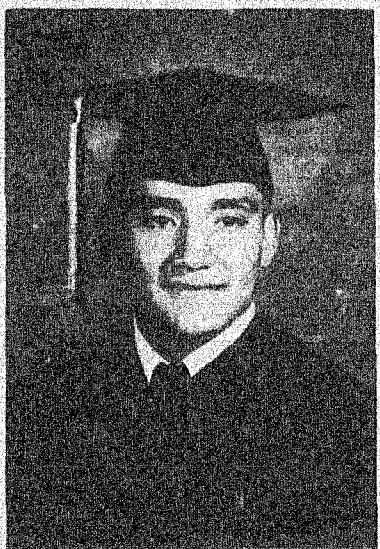

"Giraffes also have a unique defense against the sun," he continued. "They spend much of their time stripping leaves from branches with their tongues. Mother Nature gave them black tongues to keep them from blistering in the summer heat."

The best defense for humans appears to be a dose of common sense. Limited exposure to the sun, proper clothing and sun screen are good ideas for all of us.

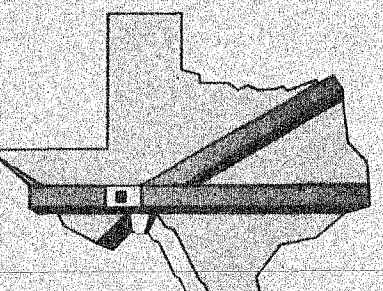

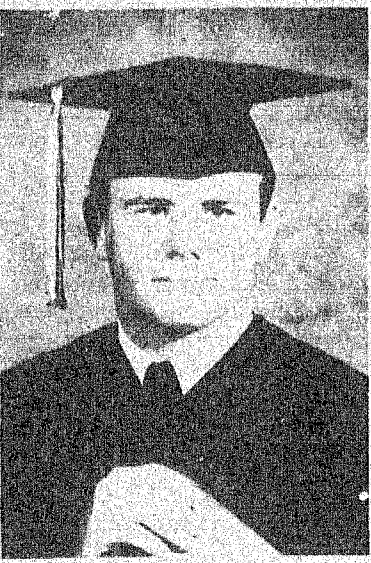

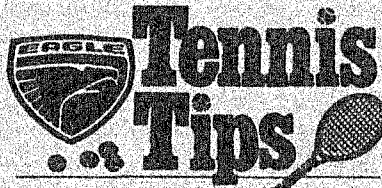

Topspin and Underspin

By hitting the ball a certain way, you can give a shot topspin or underspin. Having these two shots in your arsenal can often put your opponent into a tailspin.

Spin causes the ball to react in such a way that it is difficult to return. A lob hit with topspin will dart toward the rear of the court after it lands. A shot hit with underspin barely clears the net and stays low after it bounces.

Alternating these with strong forehand and backhand drives can keep your opponent off balance and lift you into the winner's circle.

'Natural' Foods - A Matter Of Definition

Consumer surveys show that people are attracted to - and buy - food products that are supposed to be "natural."

But the term "natural" on a food label can mean almost anything, because its use is not regulated by the Food and Drug Administration.

Here's an example of a food labeling term that is regulated. "Pasteurized" is the term which refers to the heat treatment that kills bacteria in foods. It's most often used for raw milk.

Because the Food and Drug Administration has regulated use of the term, consumers can be assured

that all foods labeled "pasteurized" have gone through the same type of process.

By contrast, terms like "natural," along with "organic" and "health," also appear on food labels. But these terms are being used to promote the food rather than to describe its scientific properties.

Because these terms aren't regulated by the FDA, consumers have no way of knowing whether they accurately describe the product or not.

But many consumers believe that "natural" foods have more vitamins and minerals and less sodium


cholesterol, fat, white sugar and chemical additives than ordinary products.

That may or may not be true. And in some cases, the difference between "natural" and regular products may not be significant.

TEXAS TRIVIA
