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
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
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

Rev. Wright Price, a former pastor of the First Baptist Church, and Mrs. Price, were special guests. Rev. Price offered the table prayer.



The Family Violence Trauma Shelter in Brownwood serves Brown, Comanche, Coleman, Eastland and Stephens counties.







30-35 percent fat for genetically normal adolescents will adequately fulfill their nutritional needs.

"To achieve these decreased levels (of fat) would also mean decreasing intake of protein, in such foods as eggs, dairy products and red meat," said Alvin M. Mauer, M.D., University of Tennessee, at the recent American Dietetic Association annual meeting in Atlanta. "The problem is that normal growth necessitates consumption of these very foods."

Another nutrient that decreases when some of these foods are avoided is calcium, a substance that teens are not consuming in the amounts recommended by the Food and Nutrition Board. Low calcium intake by teens is caused in part by their heavy usage of goft drinks as a substitute for milk.



Q. I have fair skin that burns and hair. A friend of mine said I'm susceptible to "melanoma." Can you explain what melanoma is and what are its warning signs?

A. With your skin type and hair color, you are susceptible to melanoma as are people with red hair or people with relatives who've had melanoma.

Melanoma is a type of skin cancer that may begin in or near a mole or dark spot on your skin. Although it's less common than other forms of skin cancer, it is currently the second fastest growing form of cancer in America. Because melanoma can spread to other parts of the body, it's also considered one of the most dangerous forms of cancer. However, when caught in time, it is easily

Warning Signs

Moles that may be potentially dangerous can usually be identified by:

They look different than freckles easily as well as blond other moles. A normal mole is an evenly colored brown, tan or black spot on the skin. It can be round or oval, and is usually about the size of a pencil eraser. High-risk moles are often larger and may have a rough surface, appear to be inflamed or

scaly, and may bleed easily. • They are often multicolored. Shades of tan, brown and black are present. Red, white, blue and even pink or lavender may give these

moles a multicolored appearance. They have irregular borders. The edges are ragged, notched or

The best way to protect yourself is to keep your exposure to the sun at a minimum. If you must be in the sun, use a 15 SPF-rated sunscreen.

Examine yourself monthly. See your doctor as soon as possible if you have a suspicious looking mole or notice a sudden or continuous change in a mole's appearance.






