County Water System Planning Phase 6

Coleman County Water Supply Cooperation is in the process of making application to Farmers Home Administration for financial assistance on another addition to the water supply system, which will be referred to as Phase 6.

This will include the places which were deleted from the Phase 5 and other parts of the area which are not being served at this time.

"If you are interested in this new phase, we ask you to come by the office during the afternoons from 1 to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday. We will be taking memberships, meter locations, and right of way easements. It will not be necessary for those deleted from the Phase 5 to sign again", officials explained.

It is important that this first step of the application be completed as

soon as possible. Therefore, August 1 is set for the completion day for applications.

The corporation would like to stress the fact that signing up does not guarantee the water service, but it provides the necessary information for the engineering plans which will be presented to Farmers Home Administration for approval.

School Board Votes To Participate In Purchase Of Property For CAPS

The regular monthly meeting of the Santa Anna ISD was held Thursday, July 7 with Danny Kellar, Dickie Horner, Danny Cook, Ronnie Hartman, Terry McIver, Roddy Dean, Gerald Brister, Ann Langford and Judy Hartman present.

The board unanimously voted to participate in the purchase of property for CAP campus (Cooperative Alternative Program at Centennial). Santa Anna ISD's part of the purchase price will amount to \$6,000 of a total of \$30,000. The program will benefit at risk students in the county.

Interviews were held with representatives of the following companies or organizations who submitted bids on employee group health insurance coverage: Texas School Services Foundation; Employer's Health Insurance Company; American Teacher's Life; and Gibson National Life. Option 3 with Texas School Services Foundation was accepted with a vote of 4 for (Cook, Horner, Hartman and Kellar) and 2 against (Dean and McIver).

The board also took care of pretty much routine business as they approved accounts for payment, and again selected Colyer and Lowery accounting firm of Brownwood for examination of the 1987-88 fiscal records.

Combined loans were at \$60,737,673.13, down from each of the last four years.

Lower Phone Rates Are Set For Elderly Disabled Texans Who Are Poor

AUSTIN - Reduced telephone rates go into effect July 1 for older disabled Texans who live in poverty, according to state officials who worked out the plan with telephone company representatives in response to recent legislation.

Under Tel-assistance service, phone companies offer a 65 percent reduction in the basic monthly local charge. The reduced rate does not

Ambulance Contract Up For Renewal

The upcoming renewal of the county ambulance contract was one of the items discussed by the county commissioners as they met recently in Coleman. The ambulance services contract now held by Ed Freeman will be up for renewal later this month.

Commissioners have stated they have received no complaints about the services provided by Freeman. As a result of the discussions at the meeting it is clear the commissioners still desire to contract with one service provider on a county-wide basis. The possibility of contracting for one year or for

three years was discussed. The agenda for the next meeting of the court this week will include proposed specifications and advertising for bids for continued ambulance service. The bids will be opened at the August 8 meeting of the court and the contract awarded then.

County Tax Assessor, Billie Baker met with the commissioners to explain the need for an additional computer. No action was taken on the request, but Mrs. Baker will discuss the need with County Auditor, Shirley Sansung.

Justice of the Peace Emory Rider requested and received permission to

hire an additional part-time clerk and to upgrade the present clerk to a temporary full time pay basis. The additional staff is expected to be necessary for the next few months to handle an increased volume of traffic arrests being made by the state highway department.

Commissioners also agreed to a request from the Sheriff's department to build a holding pen for loose cattle that are being picked up. These cattle must be advertised and held for several days awaiting identification by their owners. Such cattle are presently boarded with a local veterinarian at the cost to the county of \$5.00 per head.

Council Conducts Routine Business

Bids were opened and reviewed on the old city maintainer when the city council met for its regular session on Thursday night of last week at the Mountain City Community Center. Two bids had been turned in. Charles Wells had submitted a bid of \$400 and Richard Cupps had bid \$625. The group voted to accept the bid from Cupps, with Councilman Warnock opposed and Daniel abstaining.

A resolution to change the meeting date was approved. The council will meet the second Thursday of each month. The meeting date has been the second Thursday following the first Monday of the month.

City Administrator Max Eu-

bank, gave his report to the council and addressed the option of sales tax on utilities once again. Because of opposition in the community at this time toward adopting the utilities tax it was not discussed further by the council. However, Eubank has explained that just because he brings an item such as this before the council does not mean he is either for or against it. He brings it strictly for the information of the council, he feels, it is part of his job as City Administrator to make the council aware of any possible resources.

Eubank showed the council the preliminary drawings for the building to be constructed at the landfill site. The building will be used for storage of the new dozer used there. Councilman DeLeon made a motion to accept the drawings with the exception of having two roll-up doors instead of one. The motion was seconded and carried unanimously.

A discussion of the copier service

The Texas Public Utility Commission is responsible for rules governing participation by telephone companies. The human services department will take applications for the service and determine eligibility.

The department will also furnish telephone companies with a monthly list of eligible Texans. To be eligible, a person must

live in Texas, be the head of a household, be at least 65 years old, be disabled and have income at or below the federal poverty level. The 1988 poverty level for a one-person household is \$480.83 per month.

The income limit for a two-person household is \$644.16; for a three-person household, \$807.50; and for a four-person household, \$970.83. For each additional person, add \$163.33 per month.

A person may have only one telephone line and may not have optional extended area service. People without telephone service must pay installation charges.

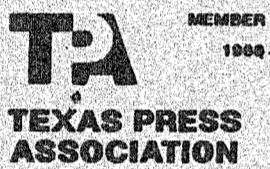

Dear Editor:
It seems that Santa Anna is on the short end of the stick again! On Monday July 11, we attended the Commissioners Court meeting at which time ambulance service for Coleman County was discussed. We attempted to get the Commissioners Court to recognize that Santa Anna as well as Coleman

should have subsidized ambulance service for their tax dollars. We had requested that they consider a split county contract. They dis-agreed with this idea and want only to subsidize one service for the whole county. It is my opinion that they do not want to recognize our contribution to the County's Ambu-

lance Service. We have continued to take care of Santa Anna or anywhere in the county that requested us. Explaining this to the Commissioners, they still would not accept the fact that the county subsidized ambulance service in not covering the whole county.

As you will recall, in 1987 when the controversy over ambulance service started, we attempted to save the taxpayers money by offering to provide the county with ambulance service at no cost on a trial basis. This offer caused problems, so the county called for a vote by the citizens and Santa Anna voted against the subsidy. I feel that since it was voted down that Santa Anna has had ambulance service and that if our tax dollars are to be used for a subsidized ambulance it should be in Santa Anna as well as Coleman. Since I am only one person, the commissioners will not listen to me. There needs to be a lot of voices heard to get them to reconsider this issue of splitting the contract.

On August 8, 1988 at 10:00 a.m., the Commissioners Court will accept bids for ambulance service. I strongly urge you to call or write any member of the Commissioners Court and if possible to be at the meeting on that date to voice your opinion.

The reason that we would like to see a subsidy for this part of the county is for purchase of equipment to better serve this area. We welcome any and all comments and stress the importance of your voice to the commissioners.

"One Deathless Day" Progress Report

A month into the summer driving season, The Texas Coalition for Safety Belts has not yet reached its goal of "One Deathless Day" during 101 Days of Summer.

The Department of Public Safety recorded no deathless days between May 28 and June 15, the first 19 days of the vacation season. "From our preliminary counts, it appears that our best day so far was June 13. We had three people killed that day," said Public Information Officer David Wells. "The worst day we saw was June 4, with 12 deaths. Again, all numbers are preliminary at this time." Fatality counts are compiled by DPS Statistical Services.

Law enforcement officers, community groups, and private businesses in many parts of Texas have joined the effort to promote one day without a traffic death between May 28 and September 5. The last deathless day on Texas roadways was January 5, 1977.

Everyone is urged to buckle up, avoid driving under the influence of alcohol, and watch out for the other driver.

"I have fought the good fight. I have finished the race. I have kept the faith." 2 Timothy 4:7

Great words. With them St. Paul sums up his remarkable life, and they have been a source of inspiration to countless people. What he's really saying in more primitive language is, "I didn't quit."

That's saying a lot, isn't it? In these days when we begin to focus again on the upcoming Olympic Games, it's refreshing to see Paul using the symbolism of a race to say that even though he was tempted many times to drop out he nevertheless completed the course.

By implication Paul is saying that life is not a hundred yard dash but a long distance run. In every area of endeavor we can find plenty of brilliant starters, but it takes considerable commitment and stamina to stay with it to the end.

One of the great temptations is to go awhile and then lose enthusiasm. I'm continually impressed by those who carry on in spite of obstacles and difficulties. Most people I know are carrying some kind of burden. I have long since stopped envying anybody because I have discovered that, when at last I really get to know them, they were usually carrying loads worse than mine.

The good news of the Gospel is that we have help. Jesus taught us to take a day at a time and not try to borrow trouble from tomorrow. Paul knew this to be true and in his strong faith he had discovered the strength to meet whatever difficulty came his way. He walked with Christ and he was upheld by the everlasting arms.

In the living of our days, in the constant responsibilities of life, it is indeed good news to know that there is a reservoir of strength upon which we may call. Paul found it, and those words of his that I quoted in the beginning come ever new to the Christian who keeps on going even when he no longer feels like it.
