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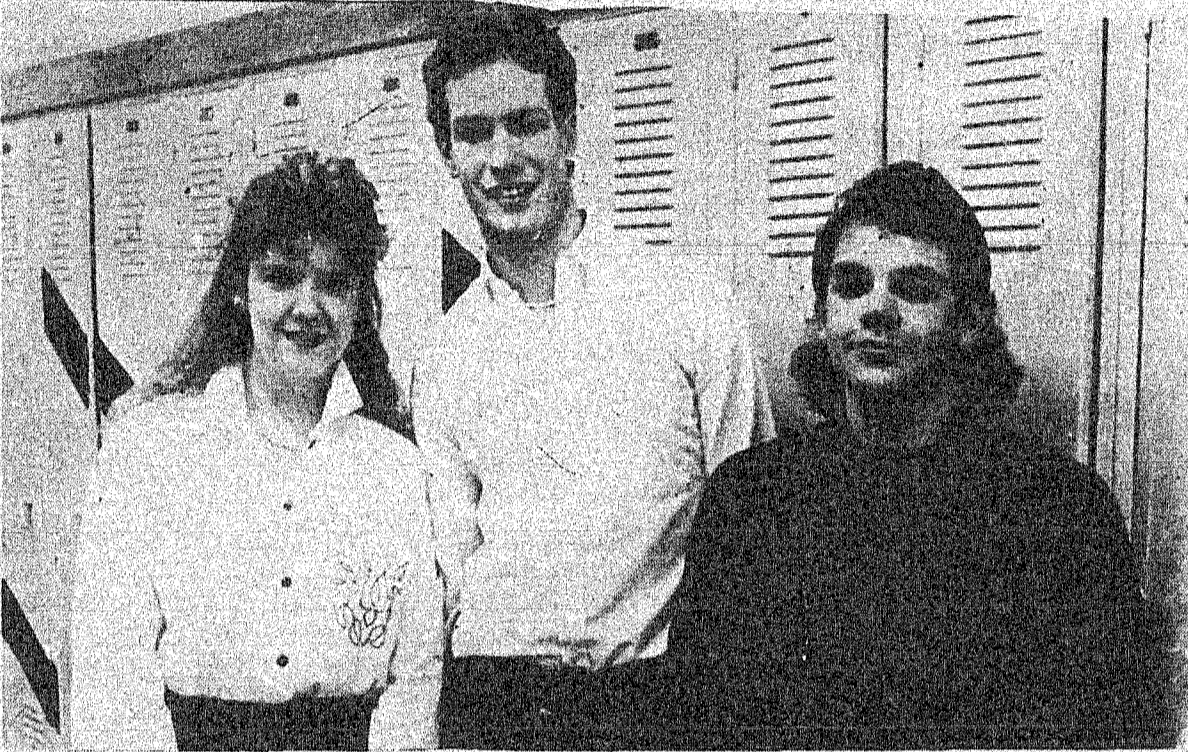

## Law Issues Warning; To Get Tough On Minors In Possession

"I used to be kind of lenient. When I'd stop a vehicle and find the teenaged occupants with evidence they were drinking, I'd tell them they didn't need that. Most of the time they'd agree and pour the stuff out, and that was it." was a statement made by DPS Trooper James O'Shields at a meeting last week in which representatives of various law enforcement agencies and school officials joined in discussion on how to combat the teen drinking problems in the county. O'Shields went on to say that after December 5 he didn't care who thought he was a "horse's rump".

December 5 was the date of an accident that took the lives of 2 Coleman county teens and injured others. After investigating that accident and seeing the outcome, O'Shields was determined to get tough with the offenders. Drunk driving was determined to be the cause of the accident. The driver of the vehicle was a minor.

The common goal which seemed to be set forth in the discussion was that of getting tough on offenders in order to save lives and give teens a new direction to do something more constructive with their lives and break away from the peer pressure that tells them drinking is "cool". However this is going to take some

cooperation between the law enforcement agencies, the school officials and most of all, parents. According to statements made during the discussion, therein lies one of the biggest problems facing them. "Some parents just don't seem to care" was heard over and over again from those participating in the meeting.

"It's pretty hard to get cooperation from parents when they are guilty of giving the teens a case of beer and telling them to 'get lost for a while'." "Some parents just want them out of their hair", was a statement that most participants agreed with. "When you charge a minor with possession and Daddy comes down and pays the kid's fine and hands him a six pack to celebrate getting off so light, we've got a problem!" Other parents just don't want to admit their kids are drinking or just don't believe it, when confronted with the evidence.

"Parents are going to have to wake up to the fact these kids are killing themselves and each other", said one participant.

An incident related by O'Shields, emphasizes the problems facing them in making the youngsters adhere to the law. He stopped a vehicle recently and in which all the occupants were found to be drinking

beer. Upon investigation, he found the 14 year old driver to be the oldest of the group in which the youngest was 11 years of age. They admittedly purchased the beer from a Coleman business, and their parents knew they were out in the vehicle with an unlicensed driver. Of course, the seller of the beer couldn't be prosecuted, because there has to be an adult eye witness to the sale to have a case, even though the youngsters told where they got the stuff.

Minors in possession has become a real problem. Last year in Coleman County, Justice of Peace Emery Rider processed 8 counts of MIP through April. Through April of 1988, there have been 35 cases processed and as of last Thursday, May 12, there have been 7 cases in May of this year. It is a known fact that many of these youngsters get the alcohol from their parents. It is also a known fact there are places of business who will sell to the minors and there are a number of persons in the county who will buy it for minors, for a fee. Of, course, as any teen knows, there are many resources for fake ID's.

The law officials have issued the statement they are going to get tough on all these offenders, from the bootleggers to the parents, to the offenders, and ask for the cooperation of all concerned citizens in the county.

As a begining, schools and parents have been asked to cooperate in offering alcohol-free end of school parties. Parents are asked to encourage their youngsters to resist the peer pressure. Drinking is not "cool", it only leads to bigger problems and can even kill. Parents can set an example by examining their own habits.

Schools will again exert special efforts in next years school year to offer education and guidance and possible implementation of other programs that will be helpful in trying to curb the problems.

The possession and use of alcohol by youth is not merely illegal. It is dangerous - even life threatening. Use by young people (as compared with adult use) is more likely to result in an accident or their death because alcohol affects the depth perception and slows response time more quickly in the younger user. Also youth are more risk-taking than adults, even without the mind alteration effects of alcohol.

Legal intoxication in Texas is 1% alcohol in the blood. But, at just half (Please see MINORS page 8).

## Task Force Operation Snares 5 Local People

The Regional Crime Task Force, operating in a joint effort with the Santa Anna Police Department, the Coleman City Police, and the Coleman County Sheriff's Dept. has snared 5 on drug charges in Santa Anna.

The arrests took place last Wednesday afternoon in a roundup that took several hours. According to Chief of Police Ken Brixey, the operation was the result of a 2½ month undercover surveillance of drug activities in the area.

One juvenile was caught in the snare. Others arrested were:

Robert Lynn Puckett, age 27, charged with felony delivery of marijuana and class B possession of marijuana.

Gary Wayne Morris, 28, charged with felony delivery of marijuana, felony delivery of methamphetamine and class B possession

of marijuana.

Benito Vasquez Diaz, 36, 2 counts of felony delivery of marijuana.

Willa May Terry, 31. Ms. Terry was charged with class B possession of marijuana.

Diaz, only recently released from Texas Department of Corrections after serving time on similar charges, was arrested at a convenience store in Bangs. Law officials raided a home in Santa Anna and arrested the other suspects.

Frank Cleveland, head of the task force, said the investigation also resulted in \$5,000 worth of illegal drugs being seized.

Diaz is in the Coleman County Jail in lieu of bonds totaling \$60,000. Morris and Puckett have been released on bond. Final disposition of charges against Ms. Terry have been made before the County Judge.

### Vandals Hit Park Again

Vandals have recently attacked the restroom facilities at the Gary James Park. Lockers were broken off and the facilities entered where the vandals pulled faucets off the lavatories and shattered the commodes. According to Mayor Brooker, this is the 6th time in the past two or three years that the commodes have had to be replaced in the restrooms after being destroyed by vandals. Citizens, especially those living in the vicinity of the park, are asked to be on the watch and to report any suspicious activity to the police.

A swing was recently taken from the playground and anyone having

knowledge of that incident is asked to report it. It would be greatly appreciated if the swing is returned for the use of the children of the community.

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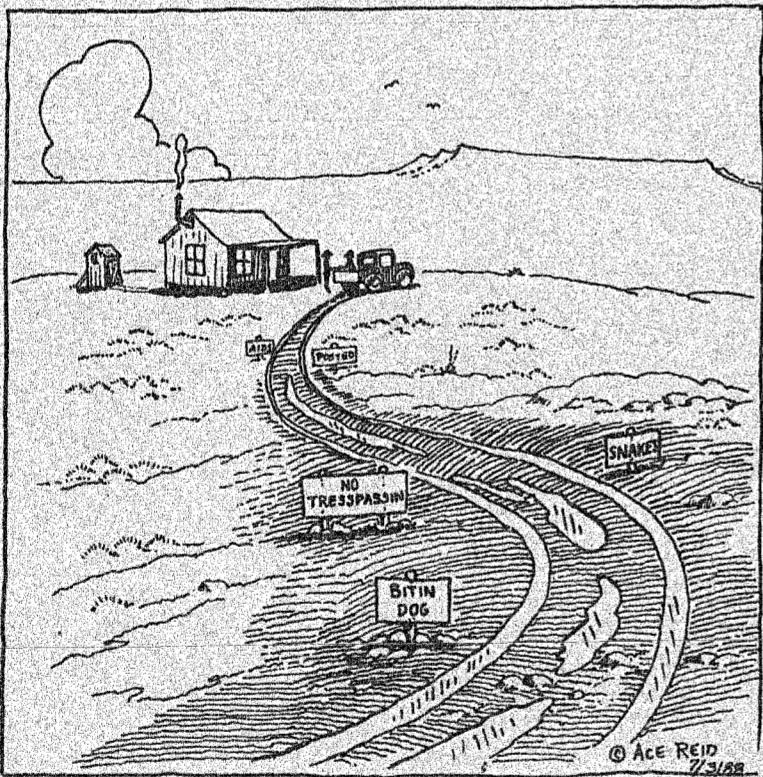

## Thoughts From Our Pastors

### Claude W. Davison First United Methodist Church

I confess it is hard for me to maintain a discipline of prayer, not because prayer is hard, but because discipline is hard. Like many a person, I'm the victim (or maybe the cause) of cluttered, busy, and unfocused life. I discovered some time ago that when I become discouraged or weary it's simply because all I know is what I see or read or witness - and that's enough to make anybody discouraged. But in those rare, illumined moments when discipline has been maintained and the unseen becomes real for me, then what has appeared to be insurmountable is put into proper perspective, that is, something I can handle.

Let me share a couple of stories that illustrate this. A man came to a Rabbi once and said, "Rabbi, how am I going to handle all these things that worry me?" The Rabbi said, "Pray to God." The man said, "I don't know how to pray." The Rabbi said, "Then, indeed you do have a great deal to worry about."

A woman came to St. Teresa of India and asked, "What would you do if some terrible calamity came over your life?" She replied, "All I would need is a place to kneel, and five minutes, then I would be all right."

I guess St. Paul said it best when he wrote: "Do not hold to the things that are seen, but to the things that are unseen, because the things that are seen are transient, but the things that are unseen are eternal." For that reason he went on to say, even though "we are afflicted, we are not crushed; when perplexed, we are not driven to despair; when persecuted we are not foreaken; when struck down, are are not destroyed." (II Corinthians 4:8-9)

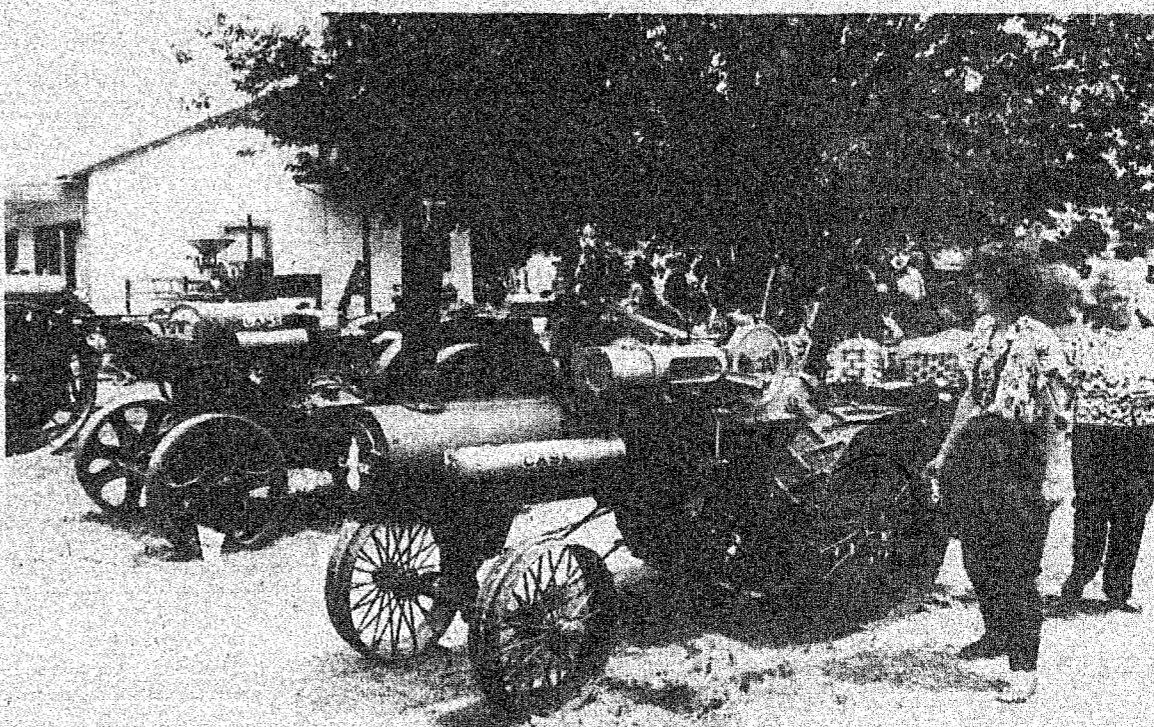

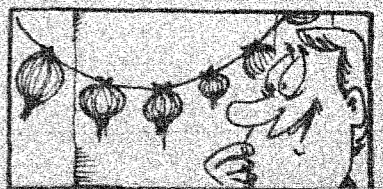

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### Sales Tax Rebate Down For Quarter; Up For The Year

According to a report received last week from State Comptroller Bob Bullock, Santa Ann's Sales Tax figures are down for the recent quarter but up for the year.

Bullock last week sent checks totaling \$120.7 million to 1,041 cities and 81 counties leveling the sales taxes.

"The economy of Texas is recovering", Bullock said, "and the consumer confidence is reflected in

the rebates going to local governments." May checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in March and quarterly filers for the first quarter.

Santa Anna's net payment this period was \$2,958. The comparable period last year showed a total of \$3,108 rebated. Payments to date in 1988 total \$12,052 for Santa Anna City coffers. At this time last year they had received \$7,722. Even though the quarterly collections were down, the report still shows a 56 percent increase over this time last year in total rebates from the sales tax collected in the city.

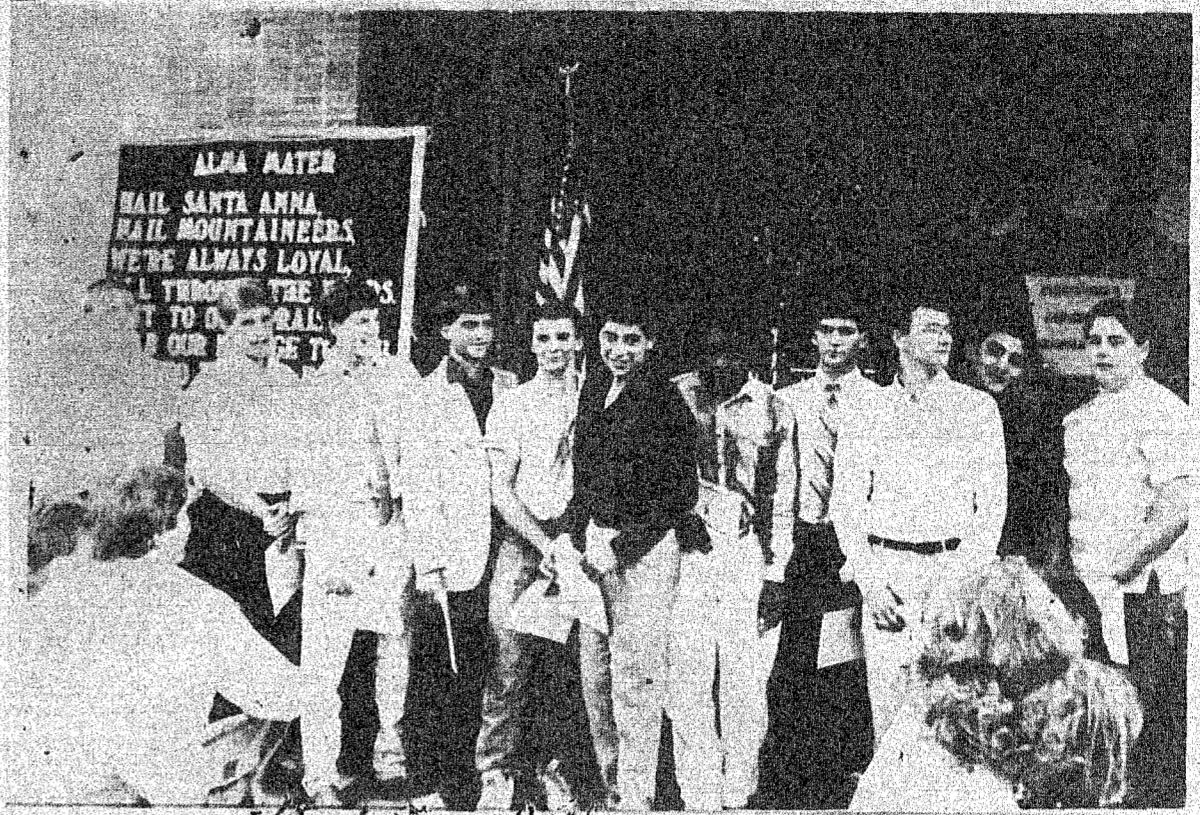

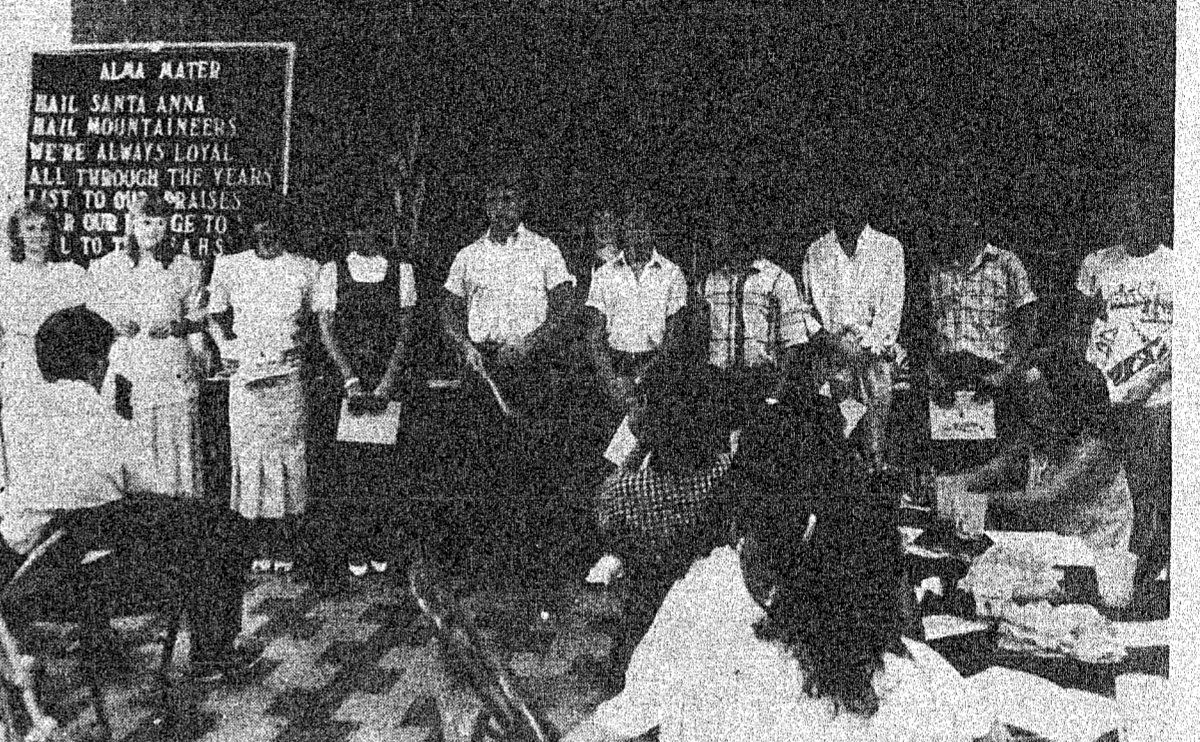

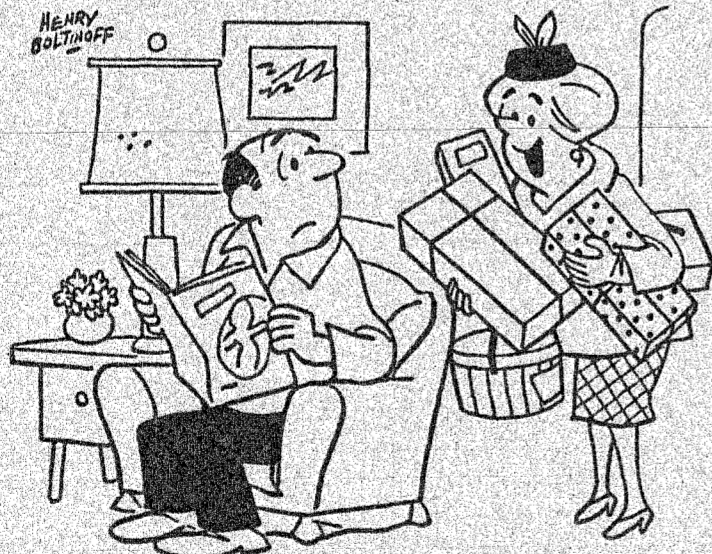

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### County Tax Board Meets

The Coleman County Tax District directors met in regular session Monday, May 16, at the Tax District office in Coleman. All members were present, being Barbara Kingsbery, chairman; Lang C. Martin, secretary; and Jake McCreary, Dwight Nanny and Richard Johnson.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved, and bills and accounts for the prior month were approved for payment. Chief Appraiser Bill Jones reviewed the monthly reports and status of the budget.

Mr Jones reported that over \$3,141,000 in taxes has been collected this year, with April collections being almost \$50,000. Of the collections for all entities in the county, the average is 86 percent, two percent above the same time last year. Ninety percent of the delinquent taxes have been collected at this time.

The Board reviewed the proposed budget for the coming year, and after changes were made, it was approved. A budget hearing will be held at a later date.

Mr Jones reported on the first meeting of the Appraisal Review Board, with James Hunter being sworn into office and also elected chairman. Glen Copeland was re-elected secretary, and Topy Beaver was named vice chairman. The group will be in session June 27, 28, and 29 to hear protests from property owners on the 1988 tax appraisals. Mineral appraisals will be reviewed on June 29 only.

Tax notices for 1988 are to be mailed later this month, and property owners are urged to look carefully for errors or problems and contact the Tax District office. The majority of changes can be made with the staff rather than meeting with the Appraisal Review Board.

The next meeting of the Appraisal District group will be on Monday, June 13.

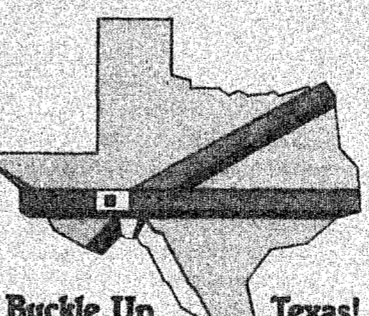

that level the reaction times of young drinkers is so altered as to make them a danger to themselves and others. The MIP statute and its enforcement is necessary to save the lives of our youth and to protect the lives of others on our highways.

Here is a rephrasing of the suggestions given to the Felony Prosecutor by those present:

•Recommending that one or two juvenile officers be added to the County Sheriff's staff. They would investigate solely juvenile matters. The trustees of the local school districts will be asked if they would be willing to contribute funds toward payment of a salary for these persons.

•Increased enforcement of the law and particular attention be given to juveniles in possession of alcoholic beverages.

•Making public records available by the Justice of Peace, Municipal Judge and the County Judge of any high school student 17 years of age or older of any of the county high schools who were picked up for minor in possession, or making alcoholic beverages available to a minor.

•Each of the school superintendents will call their students together and advise them of the increased emphasis on abuse of alcohol and the increased law enforcement that they can expect from the law enforcement authorities.

•County attorney Joe Dan LeMay will write to all of the local alcoholic beverage dispensing businesses advising them that a better check of driver's licenses and identification needs to be made and that a further emphasis will be made upon strict enforcement of sales of alcoholic beverages to minor children.

•The possibility of publicizing the names of offenders was discussed.

•James O'Shields agreed to put together an alcohol abuse program for presentation to the county schools. There are apparently also educational programs available through the Alcohol Abuse Center in Abilene. These programs will probably be initiated early in the 1988-89 school year.

•Notification will be given to all parents of minors 16 years of age and under at the time the child is apprehended. The parents (both, if possible) will be required to be present at any hearing concerning juvenile matters. Also, the law enforcement officer will try to be there at the time of the hearing to explain to the parents exactly what the students were caught doing. Attempts will be made to counsel

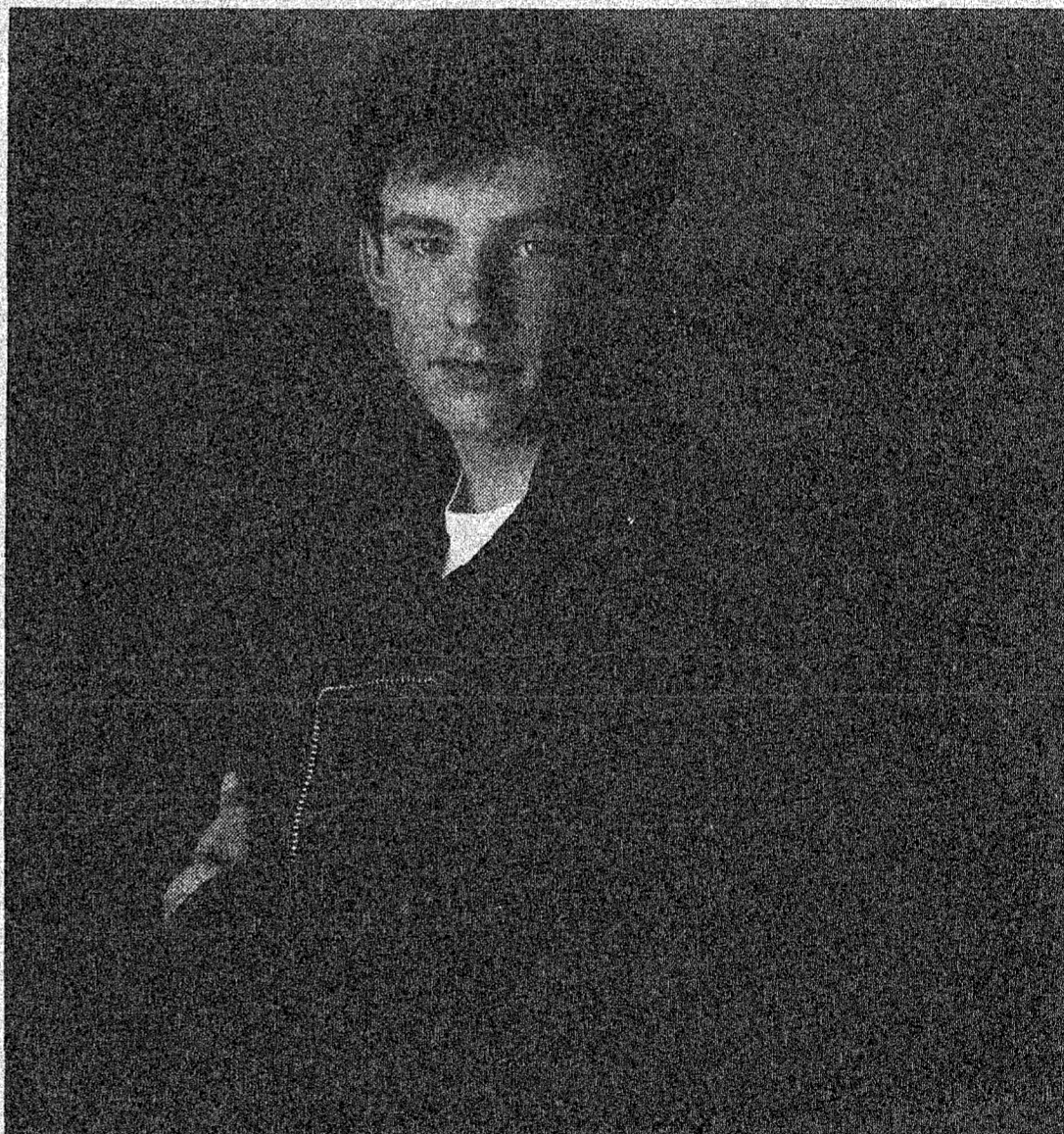
