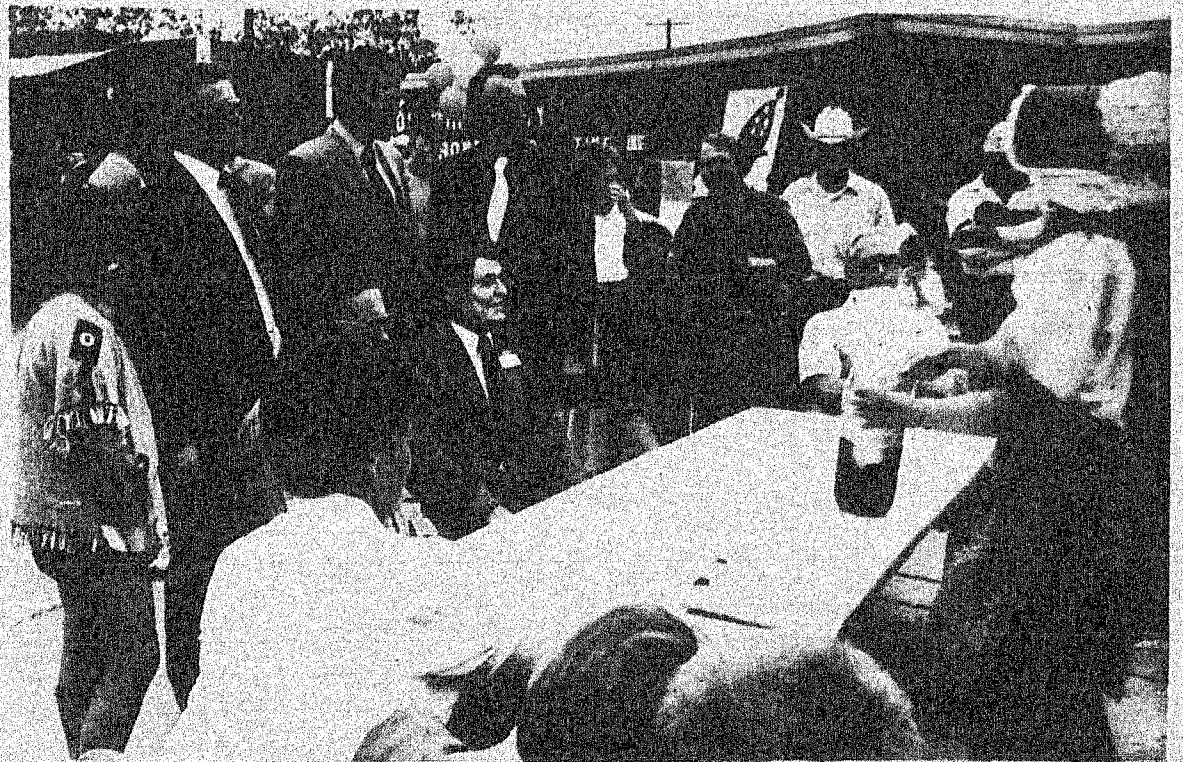

Many visitors came for the events and many travelers stopped to take in the sights and fun. The reports

from the booth venders are that they outdied all previous years.

The activities were varied and enjoyable for all ages...the parade that lasted almost an hour and showed us everything from a covered wagon to a jet plane, the bicycle acrobats, the skit performed by townspeople, the Library Board Pioneer Living Exhibit, the Masonic Lodge dunking booth, the park board bingo, the varied musical enter-

tainers which included the Santa Anna School Jazz Band, the Lions Club car bashing and auction, the Band's treasure booth, the tractor show, the mule skimmers and buckskimmers, the square dancers and cloggers, the antique cars, the ice cream freeze-off, and all the various food and craft booths, the fly over by the Coleman Aviation Club and many, many more interesting exhibits and activities.

They are all memories now, but one thing you can count on, the Santa Anna Chamber of Commerce is already making plans for next year and another "Really, Really Big Show".

Hats off to the Chamber of Commerce and especially to general chairman of the event, Charlotte Moseley, for sponsoring and guiding us through that big show and helping to pull the community together in an

atmosphere of fun and work.

As Ms. Moseley stated, Funtier day, May 7, 1988, ended with the clean up and lowering of the street cover about sundown, and certainly can be termed another success. She also expresses her thanks "to everyone who helped with many hours of work to make this day a success". And to Jay Moseley who came from Fort Worth to act as

master of ceremony.

Our hats are also off to our Mayor who encouraged us to work toward being bigger and better and to the city employees who were so helpful in every phase of the preparations and the staging.

Warnock, DeLeon & Voss Win Council Seats; Cook & Kellar - School Board

In two separate elections held Saturday in Santa Anna, the voter turnout was disappointing, as compared with other years. The City Council Election held at the Mountain City Community Center got the attention of 231 voters. Only 166 voters cast ballots in the school board election held across town at the Junior High School building. Both elections normally draw 300 to 400 voters.

City officials attributed the light turnout to the fact that so many got involved in Funtier Day activities and forgot to take time to vote.

School officials were also disappointed by the light turnout and

wondered if the changing of the location from downtown attributed somewhat, along with the fact that there were no controversial issues at stake.

Newcomer to the council, Derriel Warnock led the balloting in the city council election with 184 votes. Incumbents Alex DeLeon and Susie Voss came up with 144 and 139 respectively. Others were Craig Terry, 36; Mark Turney, 85; and Jim Laubhan, 77.

In making their bids for the three at-large seats on the council, Warnock had campaigned on a desire for the city council and the citizens to pull together for the good of the com-

munity; DeLeon had expressed a desire to help the city grow; and Voss had discussed the need for unity and pride.

It was challenger Danny Cook who led the balloting in the school board election with 125 votes for one of the two at-large places on the board. Danny Kellar received 104 votes to return to the board. The other incumbent, Bill Martin, lost in his bid for re-election by trailing with 83 votes.

Receiving write-in votes were Eddie Hartman with 6 votes; and Gary Absher, Roland Duus, Stanley Hartman and Scott Patterson with one vote each.

Santa Anna Sophomore Trackster Heads For State Competition In Austin Friday

Shannon Brown is headed for the state track meet in Austin. In fact this will be the second trip to the state meet for the talented SAHS sophomore athlete. Shannon will be competing Friday morning at 9:00 a.m. in the long jump and again at 1:00 p.m. in the triple jump. Shannon placed first in the long jump at the recent regional meet and second in the triple jump, qualifying for both events in the state competition.

In last weekend's state qualifier's meet held in Abilene at ACU, Shannon won the long jump with a distance of 18-4 1/2 which was 1/4 inch less than her best to date. In the triple jump event at the qualifiers meet, Shannon came in second with a distance of 36-7. According to Coach Galen Privitt, this was her best ever in that event. She out-jumped Yolanda Phillips, the highly

touted athlete from Stephenville who is the defending state champion for class AAAA.

"Everything is coming together and Shannon is hitting her peak at the right time for this competition," Coach Privitt said. "Her performance at the qualifier's meet really boosted her self confidence. She went over there feeling intimidated by Phillips and then found out she could compete with and even beat the best in the state," he added. Privitt is confident Shannon is ready for this big event and feels she will bring home a championship in at least one if not both events.

The events will take place at the University of Texas Memorial Stadium. Those who possibly can, are encouraged to be there in support of Shannon on Friday. Good Luck, Shannon!

Library Notes Check It Out

Did you watch "The Attic, The Hiding Place of Anne Frank" on television recently? This was the story of Miep Gies a woman from Amsterdam, Holland. She helped hide a Jewish family, the Franks, from the Nazis. After the Franks were taken to the concentration camp, Mrs. Gies found papers written by the teen age girl, Anne. After Anne's death, these were published as "The Diary of Anne Frank". The library has a paperback copy of this book. Older children and young adults who did not know about World War II should read this.

One of the reviews in a recent Abilene Reporter was "The Last Man Out" by Robert H. Charles. This story recognizes a Dutch doctor, Henrie Hekking, who saved the lives of hundreds of Americans. These men were prisoners of the Japanese in the South Pacific. Many were Texans - some from the famed 36th Division. The author raises the question about recompense for the Japanese who were sent to U.S. internment camps.

First Priority should be given to the men who were survivors of the Japanese slave labor camps. Our library does not have this book, but can order it from the Texas Library System.

Another book about the courage of the Dutch people is "The Hiding Place" by Corrie Ten Boom. Corrie and her family worked with the underground hiding Jewish families. They were all discovered and taken to Nazi concentration camps. Corrie was the only survivor and returned home to become the most dedicated of Christian leaders.

This book is in the small library at the Presbyterian Church. Most books there are about Christians and Christian living. If you would like to read books from there, call or go by on Wednesday, Friday, or Sunday afternoon. Other churches will also have books you will enjoy.

So if you are experiencing adversities in your life right now it may be God's way of advancing you or to grow you in your Christian faith. Ask God to show you what He is trying to show you in this. And then thank Him for it and that it may glorify Him.

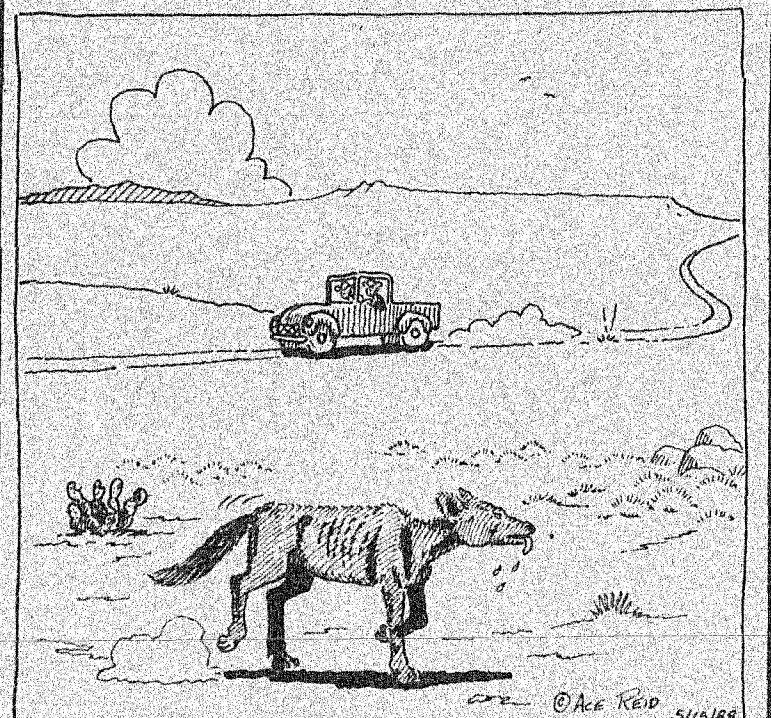

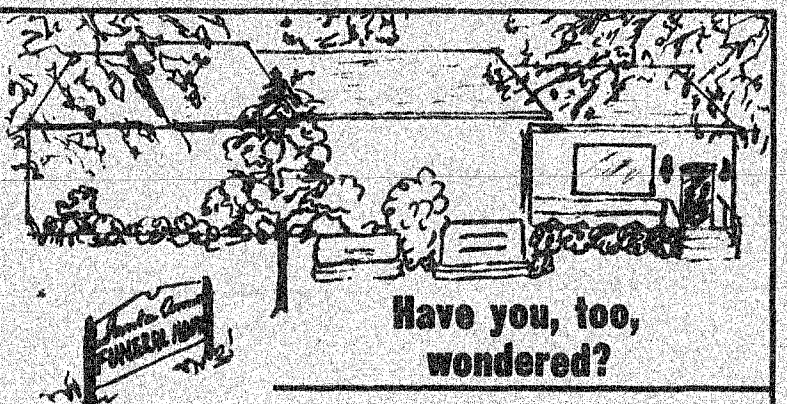

Absentee voting has begun for the second Texas Silver Haired Legislature and continues through Friday, May 20.

Individuals who are 60 years or older, a registered voters, and who reside in the district in which they are voting, may cast ballots in their community senior citizen centers or by mail.

Persons should contact their local senior citizen center for the specific dates and times when absentee voting will be conducted. Homebound persons who are unable to go to a voting site may receive a ballot by mail.

The statewide election will be held



Tuesday, May 24 in senior citizens throughout the region. Each center should be contacted for the specific times when their polls will be open.

Delegates to the Silver Haired Legislature will be elected through the 28 area Agencies on Aging in Texas. The West Central Texas Council of Governments' Area Agency on Aging covers a 19-county region which will send four delegates to the Silver Haired Legislature when it convenes in September.

Sewing, Saving Wedding Gowns

Like traditional weddings, homesewn wedding gowns are back in style. The Sewing and Fashion Council reports since 1984 the number of bridal fashion patterns has increased 100 percent. About 40 percent of the wedding fashions are sewn at home by the bride, a family member or a professional dressmaker.

Dr. Ann Beard, a clothing and textiles specialist, says that homesewing a wedding gown has always been a way to hold down expenses, but that isn't the only motivation.

"The home-sewn wedding gown has grown in appeal because it offers the opportunity to have something unique and to create a family heirloom," she adds.

To preserve your family heirloom, it should be cleaned immediately after the wedding and stored using one of two methods. Hang the dress on a padded hanger, with waist loops running from the inside waist seam to the hanger to take the stress off the shoulder seams. Also stuff the sleeves with tissue paper. Then wrap the gown in freshly washed cotton fabric, such as an all-cotton sheet.

The specialist says the other option is to fold the dress carefully and wrap it in the all-cotton fabric. Then store inside an acid-free box, which will be available from many commercial cleaners.

WHEAT GERM BREAD

1 tablespoon dry yeast
3 1/2 cups warm water
2 tablespoons molasses

2 teaspoons salt
1 cup wheat germ
7 1/2 to 8 1/2 cups whole wheat flour

Grease two large bread pans. Sprinkle the yeast over the warm water in a large mixing bowl. Allow the yeast to dissolve, about 5 minutes. Add molasses, wheat germ and salt. Stir well. Add 4 cups of the flour and stir. Slowly continue adding flour until the dough becomes stiff and pulls away from the sides of the bowl. Turn the dough out onto a floured board and knead for 5-7 minutes or until the dough is smooth and elastic. Divide the dough into two equal parts. Shape into loaf shapes and place in bread pans. Cover with a clean dish towel and allow to rise in a warm spot until dough is about doubled in bulk. Preheat oven to 350°. Bake for 50 minutes or until done.

A loose nut behind the wheel often isn't as dangerous as a tight one.

One who was unable to attend, told a story of special interest - Sylvia Herring, the florist who made the centerpiece arrangement, told that Doyle Wright was one of her very

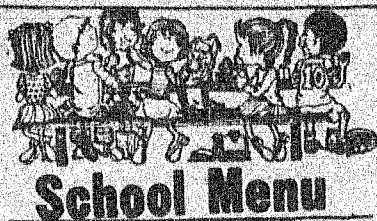

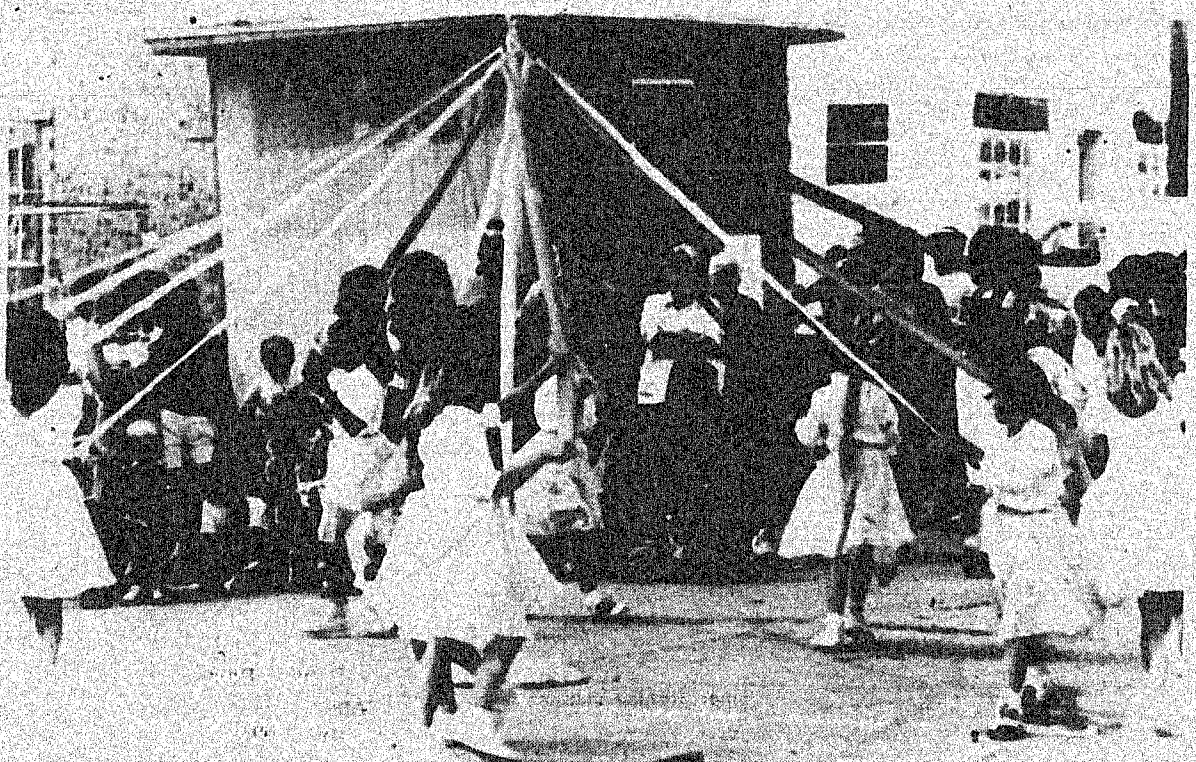

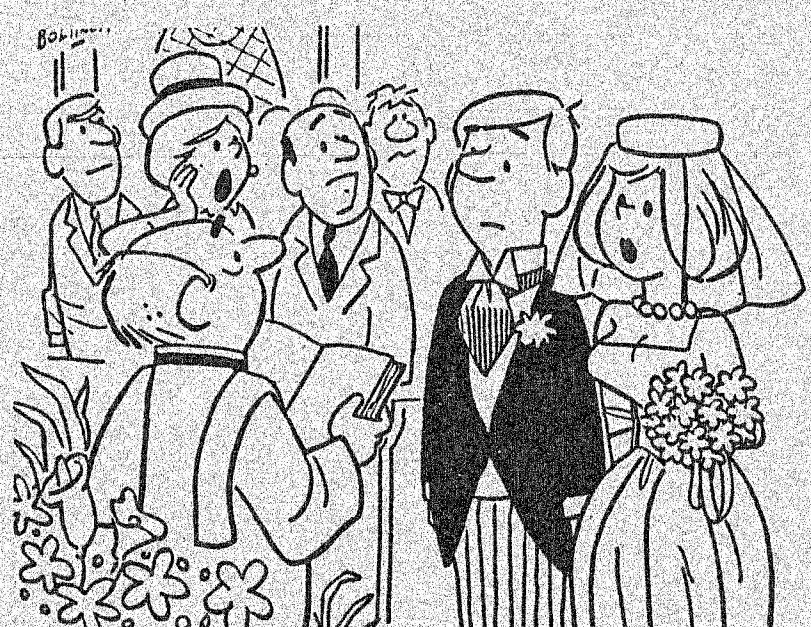

News For Veterans

Editor's Note: Following are representative questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office.

- Q. - I receive VA compensation and would like to know why the VA did not send me a W-2 form?
- A. - VA compensation payments are not taxable. The W-2 forms are sent only to record taxable income.
- Q. - Does the New GI Bill, which was started July 1, 1985, have an ending date for participation by active duty military personnel?
- A. - This program was made permanent on June 1, 1987. It was redesignated the Montgomery GI Bill with no termination date.
- Q. - My spouse and I are veterans of the armed forces and plan to use our GI Bill education benefits to attend school. May we claim each other as dependents?
- A. - Yes. Any veteran may claim his/her spouse as a dependent for education benefits, provided a certified copy of the marriage certificate appears in both VA files.
