Fun, fun, fun!...for everyone is on tap when Santa Anna's annual Fun-

tier Day takes place Saturday. Most activities will be concentrated in the downtown area. There will be something of interest for everyone to see or take part in. As they say...children of all ages will delight in what has been termed Santa Anna's own three ring circus.

Mayor Thelma Brooker received a call last week from someone in Tampa, Florida. Seems a member of a recreational trailer club spotted the event in the Texas Highways magazine, and since they would be traveling through this area at that time, wanted to know about parking facilities here. The Mayor quickly made arrangements for the group of possibly up to twenty rigs to park on the grounds of the Civic Center (Armory), so they may stop in Santa Anna and enjoy the festivities.

A fly-over by the Coleman Aviation Club will signal the start of the big parade to kick off activities at 10:00 a.m. Expected for the parade are antique tractors, covered wagons, a trail riding club, muleskinners, buckskinners, Boy Scouts, antique and vintage cars, bicycle acrobats, and square dancers. The U.S. Marines and the U.S. Air Force will both have color

guards participating in the parade and it is expected that the Air Force will have a life size model of a plane on a float. Both units are to have exhibits during the day of festivities.

Immediately following the parade will be a maypole dance by elementary school students, then square dancers and a melodrama written and directed by Gale Brock all to be presented in the shaded main activity center on North Second Street between the Bank and the Highrise.

Polling Places Designated For Saturday Elections

With all the fun and excitement taking place in town Saturday during Funtier Day, citizens should also remember to take time from the festivities to vote in the city council and school board elections.

The city council election will be held at the Mountain City Community Center located in the center courtyard of the highrise apartments at 702 Wallis Ave. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. til 7 p.m.

On the ballot for the three at-large positions on the council will be (in order of their ballot position), Craig Terry, Mark Turney, Susie Voss, Derriel Warnock, Jim Laubhan and Alex DeLeon. Voss and DeLeon are incumbents seeking re-election.

The school board election will be conducted at the school administration office located in the junior high building on the school campus. Voters should enter the campus through the drive between the old gymnasium and the agriculture building and drive to the junior high building located near the Cullen Perry Gym. Election notices will be posted at the building.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. til 7 p.m.

Candidates for the two at-large positions on the school board are incumbents Danny Kellar and Bill Martin being joined on the ballot by Danny Cook. The order of their listing on the ballot is 1) Danny Kellar, 2) Danny Cook and 3) Bill Martin.

School Board

In an effort to let you know something about the candidates for the city council and for the Santa Anna ISD board of trustees, and perhaps give voters insight about voting in Saturday's elections; the Santa Anna News sent a questionnaire to each of the candidates, asking the same questions of each candidate. Questions posed to the school board candidates after giving their name, occupation and something about their families were:

- 1) Why do you feel you are qualified to serve as a school trustee and why are you a candidate for this office?
- 2) What would you like to see accomplished?
- 3) What do you see as the greatest need of the school?

Danny Kellar and Bill Martin are the incumbents seeking re-election and Danny Cook is also seeking one of the two seats to be filled in the school board election.

The school board election will be held at the school administration office which is located in the Junior High building south of Cullen Perry gymnasium. Voters should enter the campus at the driveway between the old gym and the agriculture building and drive south to the junior high building. Election notices will be posted at the building.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Danny Kellar

I am employed as general manager of Coleman County Telephone Cooperative. My wife Jean and I have a son, Lynn, who is a senior at Santa Anna High School and a daughter, Leanda, a freshman.

I feel I am qualified to serve because of my experience of having already served a term as trustee.

I would like to see a winning athletic program incorporated with emphasis on scholastic excellence.

I see the greatest need of the school in SPECIAL EDUCATION;

gearing and teaching these students for life after graduation. I would also like to see the Special Ed students, those who are able, brought back into the regular class load. This can be accomplished by exerting more emphasis on their weakest subjects.

Danny Cook

I am employed by Coleman County Telephone Cooperative and am a member of the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department.

My wife Glenda and I have three daughters and a son. Selina and Missy are SAHS sophomores and Devin is in the third grade. Our son Boone is a kindergarten student.

I feel that with our local economic situations we need to examine how our revenue is being used, while maintaining our high standards in every department of our school system.

Even though I believe we have one of the finest school systems in the area, I feel all of our school's activities need more support from the public as well as the community functions need more involvement from the schools.

Bill Martin

I am currently employed by Mid Tex Grain, Inc. I am married to the former Becky Pauley and we have two daughters, Brandi, 9, who is a student in Santa Anna Elementary School and Buffy, 5.

I feel I am qualified after having served for the past 4 1/2 years on the school board and held the offices of secretary, vice-president and president. I have also served on the Coleman County Farm Bureau Board of Directors; Texas Jersey Cattle Club Board of Directors; Central Texas Dairy Herd Improvement Assn. board and as president for 3 years; Brooksmith Water Supply Corporation Board of Directors; and the Central Colorado Soil and Water Cooperation District.

I am currently employed at Allsup's Convenience Store. My wife Marsha and I have no children.

I feel I am qualified to serve on the council as I have been in law enforcement for some 20 years and I have seen how many towns are run in this manner. I currently have over 1200 hours of education in many phases of law enforcement, many

which deal with management, job stress, financial records, civil liability of cities and many other schools.

I am a candidate to try and bring about changes for the betterment of the entire community, not just a select few with money.

I would like to see a more effective and efficient city council that isn't afraid to make decisions instead of tabling issues that never get acted on.

I see as the greatest need to bring new industry and business to our community to help employ our citizens that are unemployed; to try to cut wasteful spending at city government; to see if taxes can be rolled back so our community can survive.

Mark Turney

I am an electronic technician and Zenith dealer.

My wife Marsha and I have a son, Jon. My parents are Edith and Rex Turney.

I was born in Santa Anna in 1957, and have had a permanent residence here for 30 years. I am a property owner on Mountain Street and have increased the tax base of the city by running a successful business. I have ideas for other ways to increase our funding base. TEXAS TRIVIA

When it was rumored in the 1840s that the Republic of Texas was to be annexed into the Union, the ladies of Boston, Massachusetts, protested. Three thousand indignant young women signed a petition published in the Boston Nation stating that the men of Texas were wild and given to duelling. The bachelors of Houston and vicinity responded by writing to the Boston paper describing the resources of the Republic. They proposed marriage to the ladies and promised each new bride two-thirds of a league of land. No word on how many young women responded.

Texas Forest Service records show, however, that the tallest tree in the state is the black tupelo in Robertson County. At 139 feet, it rises two feet higher than the 137-foot champion loblolly that grows in Rusk County, and 14 feet taller than the 125-foot longleaf pine in Jasper County.

event with a leap of 17-8/16 and a second place finish in the triple-jump with a distance of 35-10. In Austin the long jump event will be at 1:00 p.m. Friday, May 13 and the triple jump will be at 9:00 a.m. that Saturday morning of the 14th.

The 400m relay team of Brown, Kristi Morrow, Patricia Frausto and Maria Moreno, qualified for the finals and ended up in 6th place. They ran their best time of the season, 51.18 seconds.

The 800m relay team made up of the same girls also qualified for the finals and wound up in 6th place but was disqualified because one exchange was out of zone. In the prelims, the 800m relay ran their best time of the year, 1:50.11.

Santa Anna High School sophomore Shannon Brown was the shining star for the Lady Mountaineers at the regional track meet held last week at McMurry Indian Stadium in Abilene. Shannon will advance to the state track meet to be held in Austin May 13 and 14 by virtue of a first place in the long jump

Mountaineers Participate In Regional Track Meet

Athletes from eight districts, representing 25 percent of the Class-A school in the state of Texas, competed in the Region II track meet held at McMurry Stadium in April 29-30. Contestants from over 50 schools were present in the boy's division which was won by the Munday Moguls with a total score of 95 points. Of the 16 participants in each event, only two will advance to the state finals in Austin. Nine Mountaineers competed in the regional meet: Reece McIver, Lonnie Kirven, Robert Duus, Eddie Tomlinson, Bobby DeLeon, Herbert Jackson, Bobby Pritchard, Robby Pritchard, and Jorge Suarez.

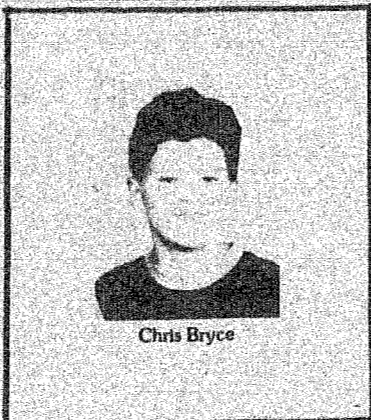
Reece McIver advanced to the finals in the discus competition and placed 7th. Eddie Tomlinson per-

formed well in the high jump with a leap of 6'2". The event was won by Kyle Stewart of Munday with a record breaking jump of 7 feet.

In the running events, the 400m relay team of Bobby DeLeon, Lonnie Kirven, Reece McIver and Herbert Jackson made the finals and finished 4th in a time of 44.51 seconds. These boys currently hold the SAHS record and have bettered it four time this year. The previous record of 44.90 was set last year. This year they have posted times of 44.78; 44.60; 44.51 and 44.34.

Reece McIver and Bobby Pritchard both performed well in the 110m hurdles and the 300m hurdles but failed to qualify for the finals.

Robert Duus ran the 800m run and Jorge Suarez ran the 1600m run.

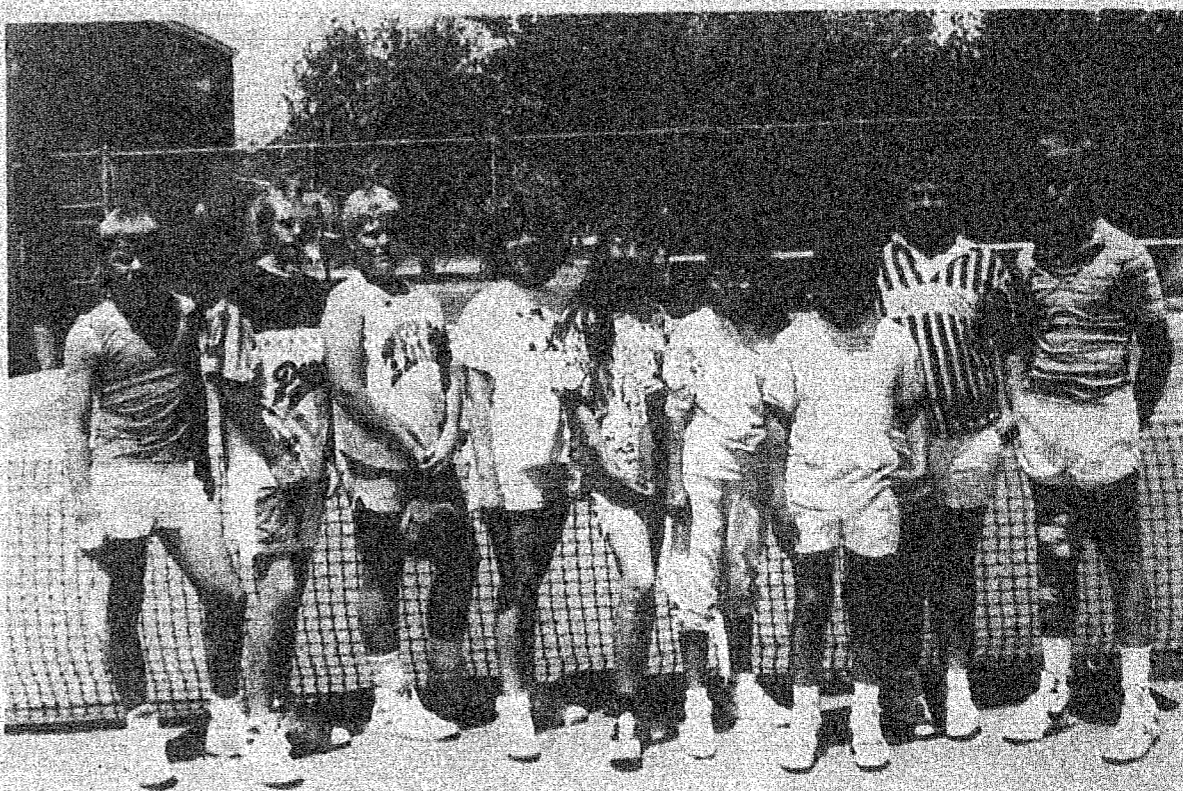
Lonnie Kirven, the current Santa Anna record holder in the 400m dash qualified for the finals and placed 6th in a very fast field.

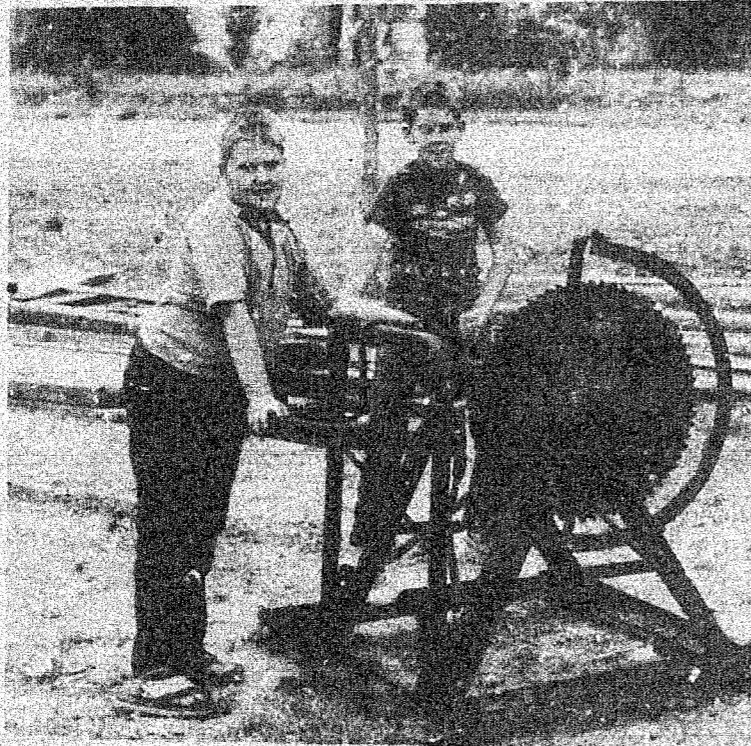

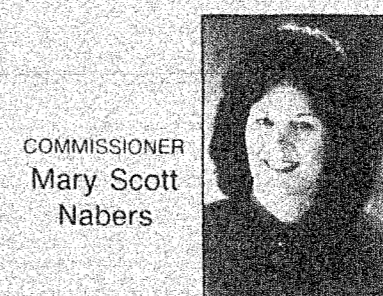

Severance Pay Does Not Diminish Benefits

Dear Commissioner Nabers: We are having to cut back drastically just to keep our doors open and last week we let our secretary go. I realize she is entitled to unemployment benefits, but we did give her two weeks severance pay. I told the local Texas Employment Commission office about this and they said it did not matter, that the two week pay was a "gift". Why should this lady be eligible to draw benefits for these two weeks?

Dear F.H.: Under our law, only one type of post employment payment will delay a claimant's receipt of benefits

TEXAS BUSINESS TODAY and that is wages in lieu of notice. This payment means just what it says. If an employer gives an individual no notice that he is being let go and instead gives him additional wages to make up for this lack of notice, then those wages will delay payment of unemployment benefits for the number of weeks they represent. An employer is not obligated to pay wages in lieu of notice.

Severance pay, on the other hand, is not listed in the law as a type of payment which will delay, reduce, or otherwise affect the payment of unemployment benefits.

In contrast to wages in lieu of notice, severance pay is something your company has

obligated itself to pay, either verbally or through written company policy or contract. It is usually based upon some formula which is tied to length of service — for example, one week's pay for each year with the company. The payment of severance is not a substitute for notice because it would be payable regardless of the amount of notice given.

If your company has a policy of giving severance, then you must realize your company is, in fact, augmenting payments which may be available under the unemployment insurance law.

Buckskinners Are Coming To Town Saturday

The Buckskinners are coming to town! They are one of the interesting groups planning to be here for Santa Anna's 1988 Funtier Day. In order to tell you something about the Buckskinners, we have taken excerpts from an article which appeared in the March, 1985 issue of Texas Parks and Wildlife.

The rows of cars, pickups and vans easily could have been parked in any dirt parking lot adjacent to any rodeo in Texas. But walking around the corner into the camping area hidden behind the tall trees was like stepping back in time more than 100 years.

Campers were dressed in buckskin and homespun styles from the pre-1840s. Their camping shelters were Indian-style lodges known generically as tepees, canvas wall tents or curd lean-tos.

Rendezvous to the fur-trading, Indian fighting mountain man was his annual opportunity to trade skins for supplies, renew friendships with other trappers he had not seen in a year and generally let off steam. In that brief and memorable American era dramatized by such movies as "Jeremiah Johnson," "Mountain Man," and the TV epic, "Centennial," rendezvous may have been the fur trappers' sole connection with civilization such as it was.

For a growing fraternity of modern buckskinners, regular rendezvous represent just the opposite. In the 1980's they buckskinners go primitive as an escape from the high-tech pressures of the modern 20th century and recapture admirable qualities lost in the shuffle of convenience stores, telephones, and microwave ovens.

The typical buckskinner is looking for his independence. Being independent is rare in this day and age and the fur trapper probably represented independence more so than any other group of Americans. Trappers went into hostile territory and lived from rendezvous to rendezvous with the gear they could carry. If they needed something

they made it or traded with the Indians for it.

As one modern buckskinner put it "We are trying to say we can come out here and live without running water, without electricity and do just fine."

Certainly outlandish by today's standards, dress of the buckskinners brings to mind the 1960s vintage hippies. You could make a similar comparison to today's attention-grabbing punk rockers except that black powder rifles, tomahawks and Green River knives represent the only heavy metal favored by buckskinners.

Like the Indian with a terminal betting problem, the fur trappers of the American frontier gambled their futures on the price of Beaver skins on the European market. "Shining times" didn't last long but the impression made by a small band of individualists who were bold enough to open the gateway to the West remains today.

The influence can be seen wherever modern buckskinners gather.

Participants are required to dress in primitive fashion, circa 1840s, which means an emphasis on homespun cotton, wool and buckskin. While some buckskinners make their own clothing and gear, stores catering to primitive hunters and campers have the right equipment for sale.

Rendezvous events include shooting contests with black powder firearms. Many of the group hunt with primitive weapons, which, aside from slow reloading times and relatively short effective ranges, are devastating firearms. Other events include throwing knives and tomahawks.

In an effort to spread the gospel of their favorite American era, some of the more serious history buff give demonstrations at school, Boy Scout outings and at other public gatherings such as our own Funtier Day celebration.

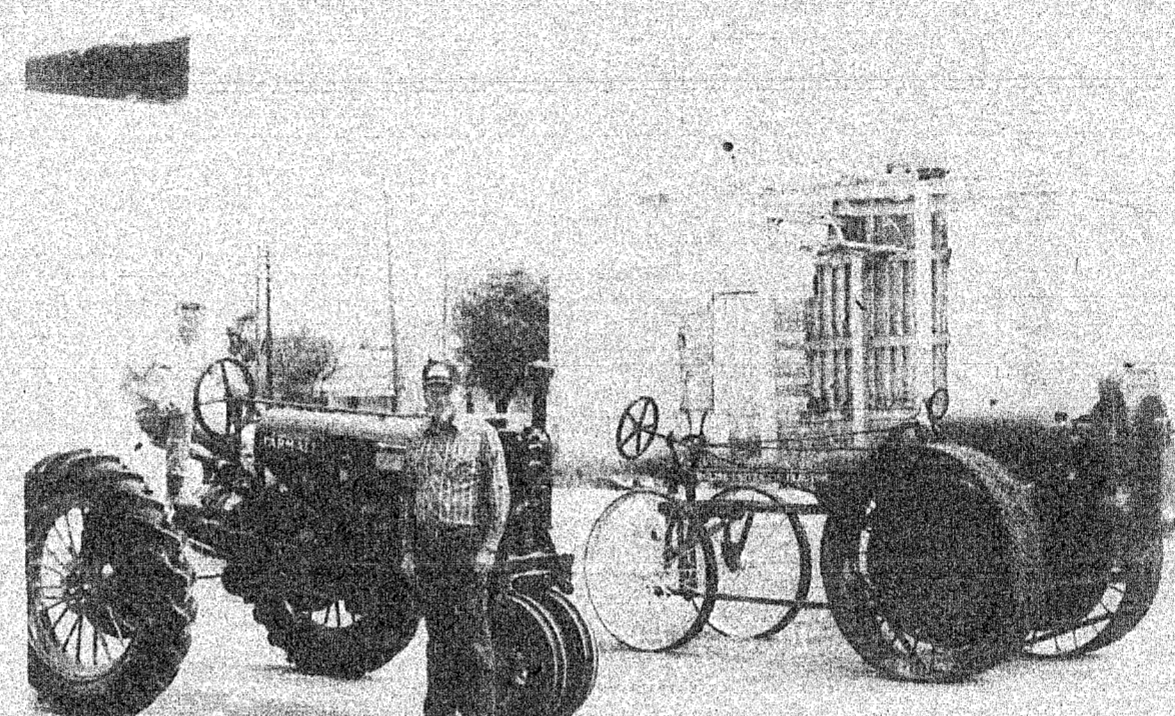
