Audit Shows That 1987 Was A Good Year For The City Of S.A.

According to the minutes of last weeks City Council meeting there was some good news for the citizens of Santa Anna.

After a review of the audit as presented by Collier Watson, he told those present that Santa Anna had the best year ever in 1987, in terms of cash at the end of the year. The report given by Watson showed highlights of audits from 1982 to 1987. The audit showed the utility revenues were down from the previous year, and expenditures were up but so were general fund revenues. In all, according to Watson, it made for a good year for the

city of Santa Anna.

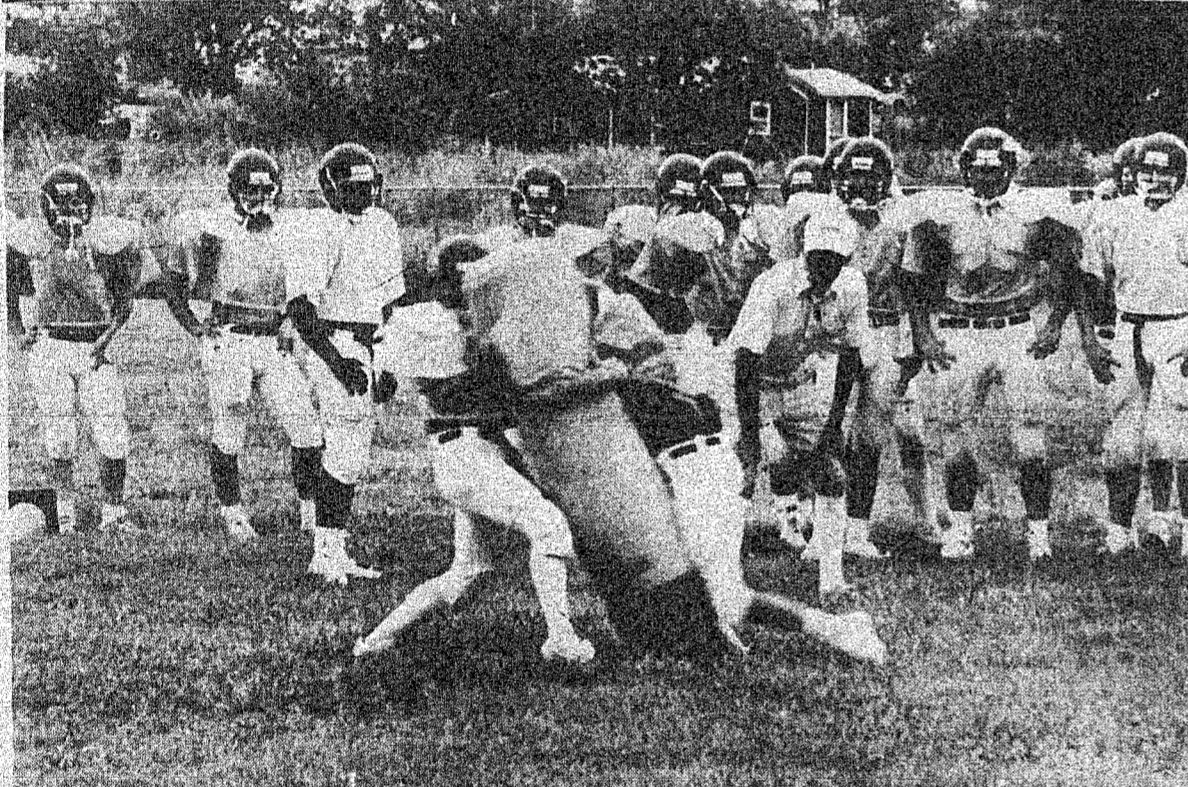
The new tax rate was set at .6994 in order to bring in the same amount of revenue as last year.

An insurance package presented by local insurance agent, Scott Patterson, was accepted by the council after he showed them where he could save them some money over their previous coverage which included property, contractor's equipment, commercial general liability, law enforcement, public officials, auto, and physical damage, all at a total cost to the city of \$19,509.

In other business before the

council they heard a complaint about the call forwarding, through Coleman, of police calls in the evenings. Seems someone left a local convenience store without paying for gas and the complaining party felt the matter could have been handled more quickly by local officials if they did not have to use the call forwarding. Mayor Brooker agreed to look into the matter further.

All council persons were in attendance at the meeting except Quinton Daniel who was out of town on business. Several other city officials and interested citizens were present.

the counselors position.

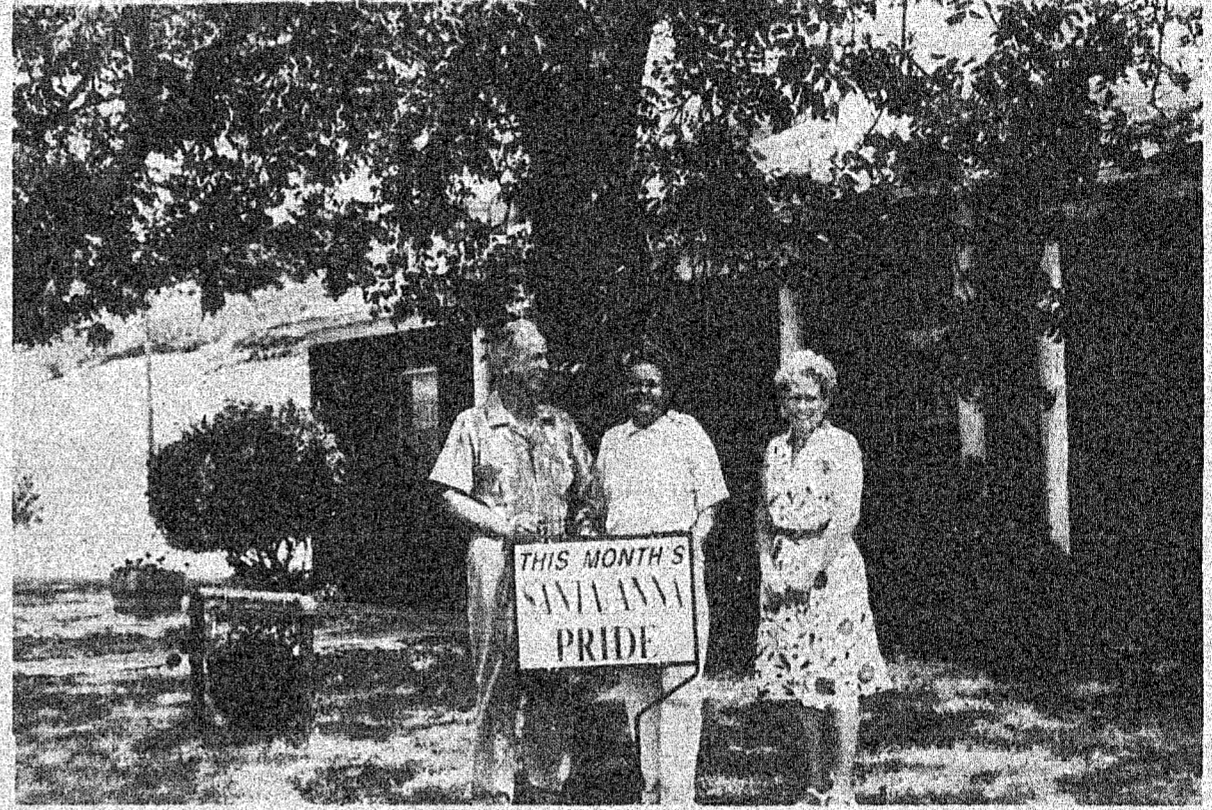
Mr. Brister reported on a PTO project of improvements to the playground equipment at the elementary school.

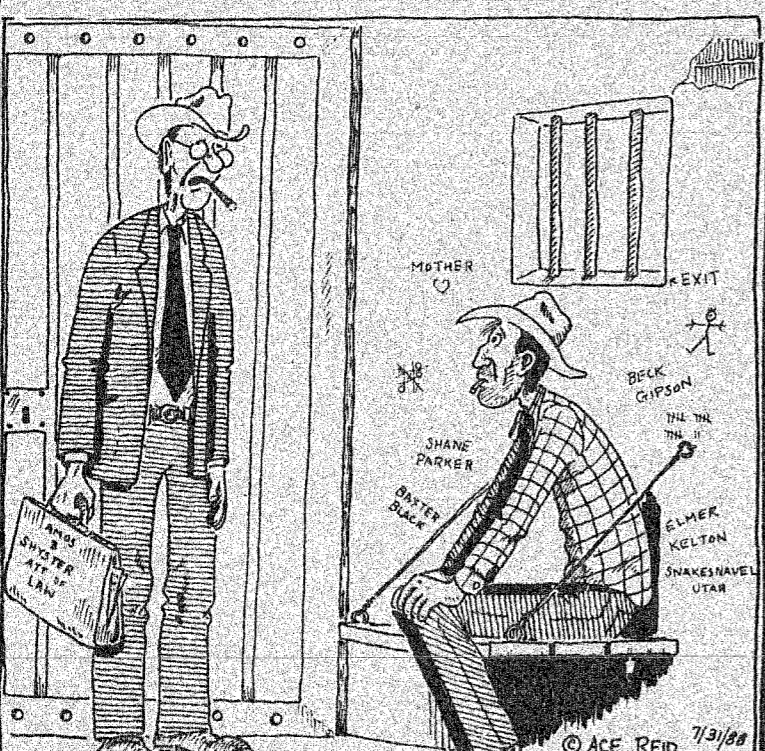

Over Half Of Right Of Way Acquired For Great American Pipeline

HOUSTON - Celeron's All-American Pipeline Company has acquired more than half of the right-of-way for the final segment of its 1,750-mile crude oil pipeline that will complete the link to Gulf Coast refineries.

According to Celeron president Robert W. Milk, the right-of-way acquisition program in Texas is ahead of schedule and will be completed this fall.

"We anticipate that construction will begin by the first quarter of 1989 and it is expected that the R.B. Potashnick Co. of Cape Girardeau, Mo. will construct 301 miles of the project," Milk said. The contract for the remaining 189 miles has not been awarded.

The 500-mile extension through West Central and East Texas from McCamey to Webster, which runs through part of Brown and surrounding counties, will become part of a \$1.4 billion heated pipeline system that will couple West Coast and Alaskan producers with compatible refineries east of the Rockies.

A 1,100-mile section of the mainline continues to deliver crude oil from California's San Joaquin Valley with deliveries running at about 85,000 barrels per day.

More than 14 million barrels of crude oil have been delivered to customers through the pipeline system since the line began interim operations in early December of last year. The line has a capacity of 300,000 barrels per day.

Finding one's way to Lone Star can be a problem, since five places in Texas have had that name. The largest (population 2,036) is in Morris County. Another (population 125) is in Floyd County. Other Lone Stars once shone in Comal, Cherokee, and Wise counties.

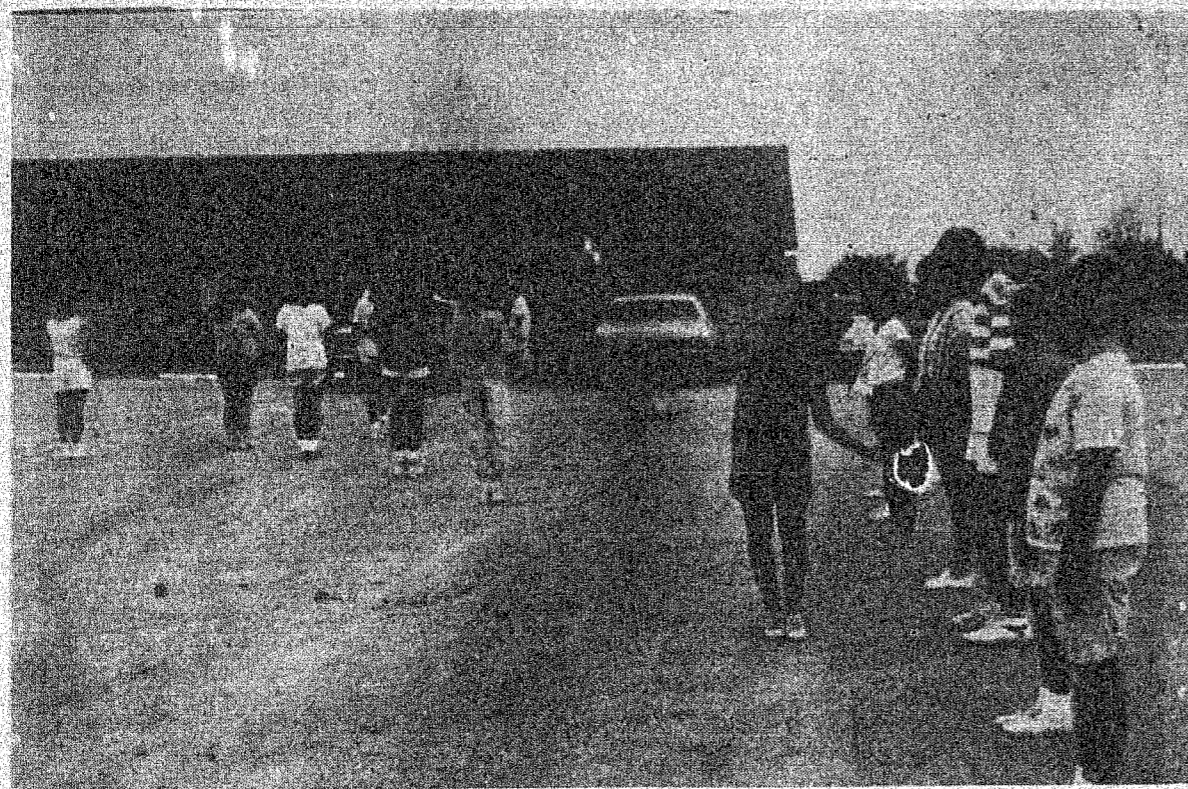

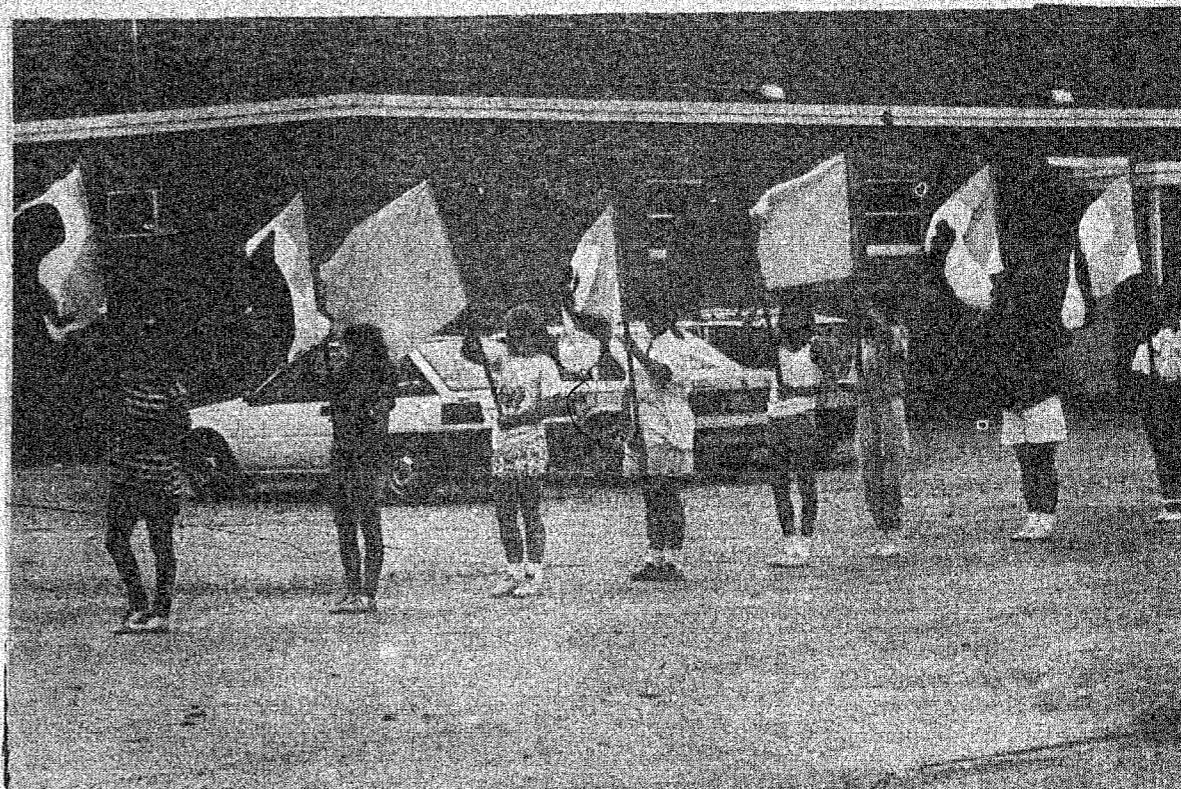

Parents Should Help To Instill Confidence

Parents are the first teachers of children. When they are overpowering, overpermissive or overpossessive parents, they often turn their children into insecure underachievers. Children in these families lack the motivation to face life situations with self-confidence or poise. Lack of self-reliance fosters feelings of inadequacy and is the basis of low self-concept, which is a heavy burden to carry through life. When children or adults have low self-concept, they refuse to accept responsibility for things that happen to them. They blame others and try to build themselves up by putting other people down. Low self-concept leads to fault finding and a compulsive need for attention and approval. When someone constantly misbehaves or shows off, they usually lack close friends. Low self-concept is often shown by children with a compulsive need to win. They are trying to prove themselves to others, to be "better than" the next person. It is honorable to want to achieve one's potential - but not at someone else's expense. Children with low self-concept are often depressed and withdrawn, selfish and greedy, and afraid of making mistakes. So they put up a fake front of self-confidence.

- 1. Accept the fact that every person is unique. He looks and acts like only himself and has a special purpose to fulfill in life. 2. Set goals and accept rewards for accomplishments. 3. Learn from mistakes or failures rather than to be devastated by them. 4. Be flexible in thought and willing to change, rather than thinking one is always right without looking at the options. 5. Work toward open

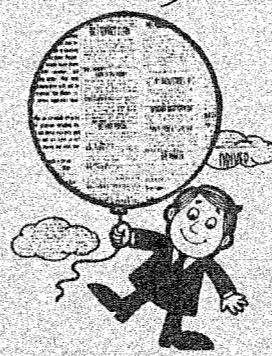

Safe Summer Picnics Pack No Punch

Picnickers are advised by health officials to pay special attention to food preparation and storage to ward off uninvited bacterial guests to summer outings.

According to Scott and White clinical dietitian Debbie Broun, heat is one of the biggest culprits in making a delicious picnic spread go bad - but it is not only the high intense heat people need to be wary of.

Any temperature over 50 degrees, Broun notes, has the potential for contaminating food.

There are five types of bacteria which bring on food poisoning: staphylococcus aureus, clostridium botulinum (creates botulism), clostridium perfringens, salmonella and streptococcus. They produce nausea, vomiting, diarrhea and fever that lasts from a few hours to several days.

Some even produce paralysis of the muscles that control breathing, double vision and a dry mouth. If left untreated, this type of food poisoning can be fatal.

Food poisoning can cause mild to serious reactions. If a person who has been affected by food poisoning

is only mildly ill, just treat the symptoms, get plenty of rest and drink plenty of fluids.

If the symptoms are more severe or if the victim is quite young or elderly, see your physician.

If the food you believe to be contaminated was eaten at a public establishment, the information should be reported to your public health department.

Cleanliness, thoroughly cooked and properly refrigerated foods are the three most important preventive measures to take to avoid food poisoning.

Perishable items should be kept very cold. Meats, mayonnaise-based salads, egg or cream product foods should all be kept in a cooler filled with ice. Temperature should be below 50 degrees.

Keep your ice chest in a shaded place such as under a tree or under a blanket. Put the ice chest in the passenger area of the car versus the trunk, where it will stay cooler. To keep your ice chest cold, wrap it with newspaper.

Do not lay your picnic feast out and wait until your hungry crowd is ready to eat. Keep all perishable foods in the ice chest until the time to eat.

If you cook raw meat on a grill, be sure to wash your hands, any utensils and cutting boards that have been in contact with the raw meat before you touch non-cooked foods. Be sure to cook the meat thoroughly.

It is just as important to keep hot foods hot as it is to keep cold foods cold. If you are taking a casserole to an outdoor gathering, letting it cool to a temperature of 125 degrees or less is giving bacteria an open invitation to your party. Try wrapping several layers of aluminum foil around the casserole, followed by newspapers and a towel.

Texas A&M veterinarian offers hearing aids and testing for dogs

COLLEGE STATION — Hearing aids for dogs are now available through Texas A&M University's College of Veterinary Medicine, the only site statewide where hearing loss in dogs can be tested.

Older dogs that have lost their hearing are now able to hear incoming cars, imminent danger and their master's call — all of which may have been silenced before, says the only board-certified veterinary neurologist in the state, Dr. Patricia Lottgen.

The device used for testing the type and degree of deafness in dogs is called an electrodiagnostic unit. Texas A&M has the only technology in the state that tests dogs for hearing disorders. The hearing aids themselves were developed at Auburn University last year.
