Bill Martin Appointed To Fill School Board Vacancy

Former School board member. Bill Martin, was appointed last Thursday to fill the position on the board vacated by the resignation of Ronnie Hartman. Martin will fulfill the term that will expire at the time of the board election in the spring. Hartman's resignation came because he is moving from the school district and will be residing at Lake Brownwood.

We had reported last week that the budget had been adopted in a previous meeting, when in fact, the action taken at that meeting was to amend the 1987-88 budget in order to close out the fiscal year.

The new budget calls for a local operating budget of \$1,579,727.

2 Chases Result **In Three Arrests**

Two high speed chases, one in Santa Anna and another in Coleman, netted three arrests of local people last week in unrelated incidents.

Local police officers responded to a disturbance call last. There was a family disturbance on South Lee street Tuesday and while a woman was being arrested for disorderly conduct, her husband took off in a car with the officers in hot pursuit. The chase ended on 3rd. street and the man was charged with an attempt to elude and with disorderly conduct.

Calling for assistance from the Sheriff's department, the officials searched the couple's apartment, after obtaining permission. The search 'yielded drug paraphernalia and a misdemeanor amount of marijuana. Drug charges were filed against Jim Barker and Brenda Barker. Both have been released on bond.

A high speed chase, taking place

in Coleman, of sometimes more than 90 miles per hour, according to Coleman Police Officer Terry Cowen, ended with the arrest of Benito Diaz of Santa Anna. Officer Cowen and Officer Rick McKee observed the vehicle parked at a little league ball park in the early morning hours of last Wednesday. After passing the parked vehicle, they observed it leaving the scene at a high rate of speed and they began pursuit. The chase through north Coleman ended near the airport. Benito Diaz of Santa Anna was apprehended with assistance from Chief Sheriff's deputy Wade Turner and game warden Steve Vail, for eluding a police officer and speeding possession of narcotics and paraphernalia. 

School officials have announced those wishing to retain their option for reserved seats during football season need to contact Ann Langford at the school administration office as soon as possible.



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
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

Look Mountaineers Scrimmage line after a strong defensive effort Jackie Duquette could manage only Good

A large crowd of fans were on hand in spite of the sweltering heat last Friday evnening to support the Mountaineers in their first competition of the season.

Santa Anna's Mountaineers lost that 2-0 scrimmage here Friday night to the Class AAA Early Longhorns but Coach Jack Narrell of Early was impressed with Santa Anna and made the statement, "They (the Mountaineers) are going to be alright".

Ironically, the Longhorns scored both times on their last two plays of a 20-play controlled scrimmage. The first score came on a 4th down try from the Santa Anna 1/2 yard by Reese McIver, Bryon Dowdy, Scott Anderson, Alonzo Hernandez, Bobby DeLeon, Sammy Ramirez, Herbert Jackson and Jackie Smith that held the Longhorns at the Mountaineer's 2 yard line for three downs. With just one play left, the Longhorns threw an expected pass that went for 65 yards and their final tally of the game.

Santa Anna started first as James Hartman hit Jackson on a 35 yard pass. McIver hit up the middle for 12 yards, putting the ball at dthe Early 34 yard line. However; Santa Anna without the services of starting guard Ken Brixey and tail back

nine yards in the next 4 plays. That would be as close as they would get to the Early goal line despite another 22 yard pass from Hartman to Bobby DeLeon and hard running by McIver, Hernandez(filling in for Duequette), Brad Rice, Buddy Hardin and Jodie Purcell. Despite the loss, Coach Sandy McSpadden was mildly surprised with the overall play of both his first and second groups. "Our kids have a lot of pride and character. We stayed in a regular 5-2 defense and did not stunt or change even down on the goal line. I wanted to see how well our kids could react to



the ball without being told what to do every play. The second touchdown was my falt, it was their last play. I knew what they were going to do, they knew what they were going to do and everyone in the stands knew what they were going to do but we committed the cardinal sin of playing the football rather than defending the goal line." "offensively," McSpadden stated, "we went into the ball game without our starting tail back, Duquete, due to an ankle injury from Thursday night. We didn't know until late Friday afternoon that Ken Brixey would be unable to play duc to illness. Alonzo had been playing strong end with Bobby Deleon and on Thursday night we moved him to tail back. I personally think he did an excellent job but there is no doubt that the lack of experience at that position and the loss of our strong guard hurt us. We are extremely talented in five or six positions and then we seem to thin out quite a bit. Both Hartman and Buddy Harden did a fine job for us at quarterback. We had moved Rusty Bryce over to strong end to help us at that position but will probably move him back to wide receiver next week. It's all according to how fast Jackie recovers."

McSpadden also had high praise for his second group consisting of Ross Bradley, Zane Keeney (who also played some on varsity), Jason Dean, Troy Abernathy, Charles Dixon, Chris Bryce, Mark Frausto, G.C. McIver, Charles Morris, Ar-mando Mata, Phillip Hernandez, Tommy Williford and Wesley Baugh who McSpadden thought had a great game at defensive end. The two junior varsities battled to a 0-0 tie.

"We feel that Bradley Wise and Jody Cupps are coming on strong and should make a real contribution before the season starts," Coach McSpadden commented. We only used four running plays and three pass plays for this scrimmage. Offensively, you have to be impressed with Hartman, Hardin, Reece McIver, Anderson, Dowdy and Herbert Jackson. Purcell and DeLeon also looked real good.'

"Right now we have already lost Scott Valdez with a broken wrist for four more weeks and it's vital that we dodge injuries for the remainder of the season in order to be real title contenders. Immunizations Necessary For School

Regardless of whether a child attends public or private school, every student in Texas must have proof of immunization.

Upon enrolling a child in school for the first time or transferring the child to a Texas school from another state, a parent must provide proof that the child has been immunized appropriately for his age against diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis,

measles, mumps and rubella. With rare exceptions, Texas law forbids schools to accept children without proof of immunization. The Texas Department of Health has

established minimum requirements for immunization for the admission of school-age children to schools. They are as follows: Four-year-olds entering pre-

school:

•Three doses of oral polio vaccine •Three doses of diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (DTP) vaccine •One dose measles vaccine or a

physician-verified history of the illness.

•One dose mumps vaccine or a physician-verified history of the illness

•One dose rubella vaccine Five years and older: •Three doses oral pollo vaccine

(one dose since the child's fourth birthday). Applies to children through age 17 •At least three doses of DTO

and/or tetanus-diphtheria vaccine (one dose since the child's fourth birthday and within the past 10 years)

•One dose measles vaccine or a physician-verified history of the illness


•One dose mumps vaccine or a physician-verified history of the illness (through age 16)

•One dose rubella vaccine (through age 11)

If a child is on an ideal immuniza-tion schedule, he or she will have received five doses of DTP vaccine and either four or five doses of oral polio vaccine by the time he or she enters school

Children can be immunized by their family doctor or at their local health department. Any validated document of immunization will be accepted by the schools providing it shows at least the month and year

when each immunization was given. The Texas Department of Health and local health departments will provide record-keeping cards free of charge for maintaining school im-
