

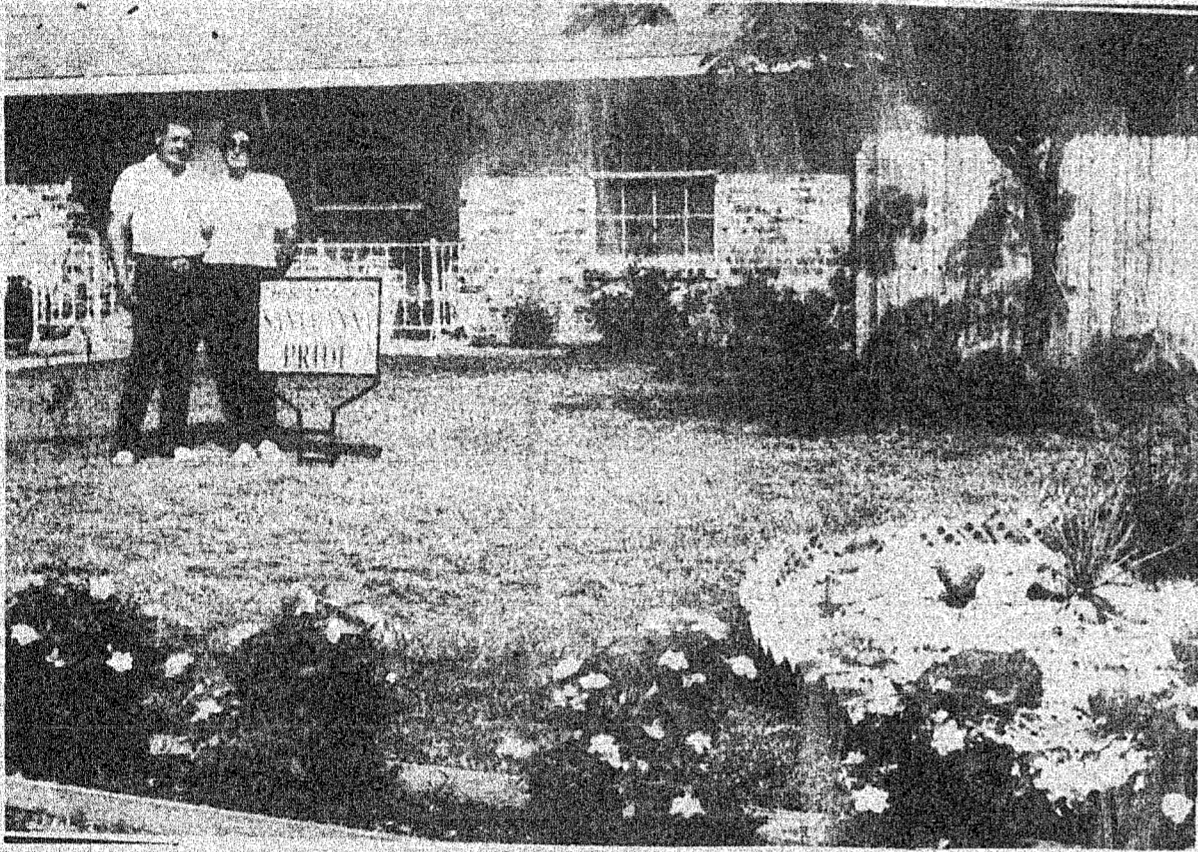

Take time to meet these new people and welcome them to our community.



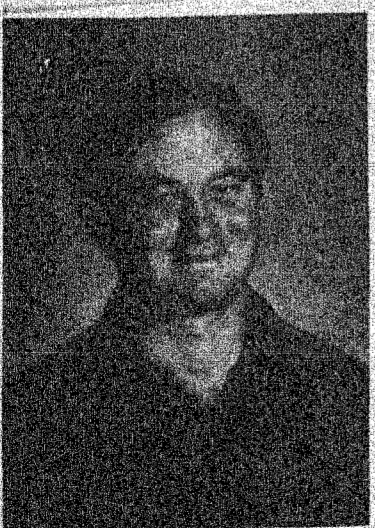

## Owners Of Dogs That Run Loose Are Subject To Fines And Arrest

Until now, dogs that have been found running loose in the city have been picked up and held in the pound until the owner claimed it and paid the appropriate fine.

The city council took action last Thursday evening that will take the owners to task even more. Since there is not presently an animal control person on the city staff, all city employees will be on the watch for dogs running loose in the city.

As the animals are spotted, they will be watched to determine their home. The owner will then be mailed a written notice. The second time the dog is reported running loose, the owner will be fined \$25.

The third offense, will bring a fine of \$50. The fine will double with

each succeeding offense up to \$200. The fines will be issued through the municipal court and if not paid, a warrant will be issued for the owner's arrest.

If no one admits ownership of a loose dog, the animal will then be picked up and destroyed.

The council also discussed various ordinances contained in the city code book, and took care of bills.

In 1942 when the war came and the defense plants opened and calls were made for workmen, this large family moved to California and established themselves as able workmen, as they had been taught by their industrious father.

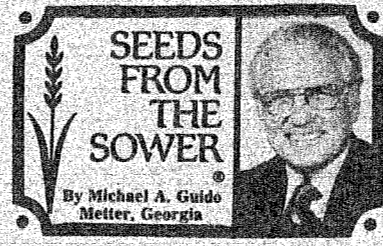

A Library Building fund was opened on March 29 with the grand total of twenty dollars. Today the balance is \$911.20.

During Frontier Days there was a money raising project. The museum of Early life in Santa Anna was very popular. Generous visitors deposited \$306.10 in our pickle jar. Over 70 people worked very hard to organize and present this. The faded lists of their names are still posted on the windows of the prospective library building.

The additional funds came from gifts to honor Mrs. Mac Blue on her birthday and from memorials to Mrs. C.D. Bruce, Mrs. Preston Bailey, Mrs J.C. Mathews, Mr and Mrs J.T. Oakes and Miss Ruby Harper.

Thousands of dollars will be required to convert the available building into a library. There is a 7 year limit on raising the funds.

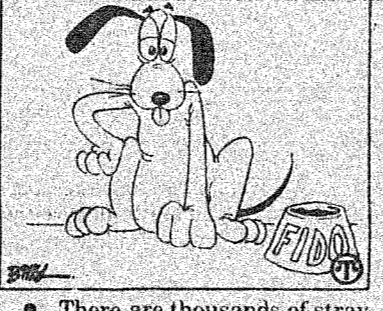

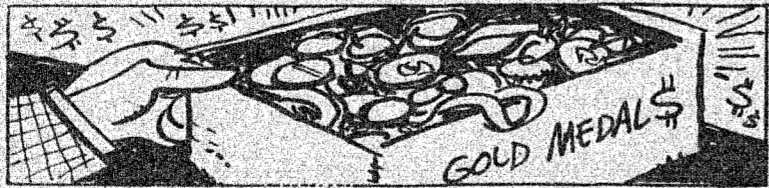

## Social Security and SSI Funds Explained

Although the Social Security cash benefits programs and the supplemental security income (SSI) program are administered by the Social Security Administration, the sources of funds required to finance the programs are entirely different.

The Social Security insurance programs are financed almost exclusively by a payroll tax levied against the earnings of workers in

Social Security-covered employment, their employers, and the self-employed. The taxes collected are intended to approximate Social Security expenditures; any excess is kept in trust funds and serve as a reserve. By law, these funds can be invested only in Federal securities.

# Wildcats Scratch The Mountaineers

## Mountaineers Looking For Win Against Abilene Christian

The Mountaineers are looking for a better night this Friday when they play host to Abilene Christian. They are a little battle weary after tangleing with the Wildcats from Rising Star but feel they are not yet to be caught off guard a second time.

The impressive Rising Star Wildcats clawed their way to a 47-15 win over the Santa Anna Mountaineers here last Friday night at Mountaineer Stadium, Santa Anna's first home game of the season. The Wildcats boasted basically the same team that defeated the Mountaineers last year for the second place slot in District 8A. Santa Anna is competing in district 15A this year and lost several of last year's team to graduation.

Rising Star built a 31-8 lead in the first half by scoring 17 points

in the first quarter and adding 14 in the second quarter.

Santa Anna scored in the second quarter on a 37-yard pass reception by Bobby DeLeon. The Mountaineers tacked on a two point conversion. The two teams matched third quarter scores before Rising Star closed with nine points in the fourth. Santa Anna's third quarter score came on a two-yard run by Reece McIver. Hartman added the extra point.

Stacy Green did a little bit of everything for the Wildcats as he found several ways to pad his scoring total. Green rushed for 115 yards on 14 carries. He also scored a touchdown, kicked two field goals and added five extra points.

Rising Star had 463 yards of offense. Santa Anna gave up the ball five times, three times in the

early part of the game, and Rising Star was able to take advantage of these costly mistakes by the Mountaineers. However, Coach Sandy McSpadden says about the Mountaineers, "Even with the mental mistakes, any team that can come up with 250 yards offense, is not just sitting around." He adds that the loss was probably a blessing in disguise. Perhaps Santa Anna was a little over-confident after taking a big win over AA Bangs the previous week and having had two successful scrimmages earlier.

"Nobody likes to loose", Says McSpadden, "but now we realize we have to work every day and be prepared for all the little things that can happen. We also realize we didn't block well, we didn't tackle well, and we didn't execute well on

offense. Our blocking and tackling wasn't crisp, we just let down in the second quarter, but came back and had a good third quarter. I gave Rising Star one touchdown by making a switch in the quarterback position. But I felt that Hardin needed some experience in a pressure situation that might pay off further on down the line. He certainly performed adequately although he had been sick all the previous week. Now we need to just put this behind us and get back to work and be ready for Abilene Christian High School Friday night".

McSpadden did see some bright spots. Rusty Bryce played an exceptional ball game. He showed lots of hustle and determination. Rusty is a senior and plays back-up swing man.

Bradley Wise is steadily improving and showing lots of ability.

"Reece McIver and James Hartman both looked very respectable, both running well and Hartman throwing well".

"We are still thin" McSpadden explains. Alonza Hernandez has a bruised shoulder, Jackie Duquette still hobbling with an injured ankle, Ken Brixey has been suffering from a viral infection, Zane Keeney a broken finger and Scott Valdez with a broken wrist. All but Valdez saw limited action against Rising Star. Scott will probably be able to return to the lineup in another couple of weeks.

Duquette had to go the whole game against Bangs on his sprained ankle since Hernandez was unable to play.

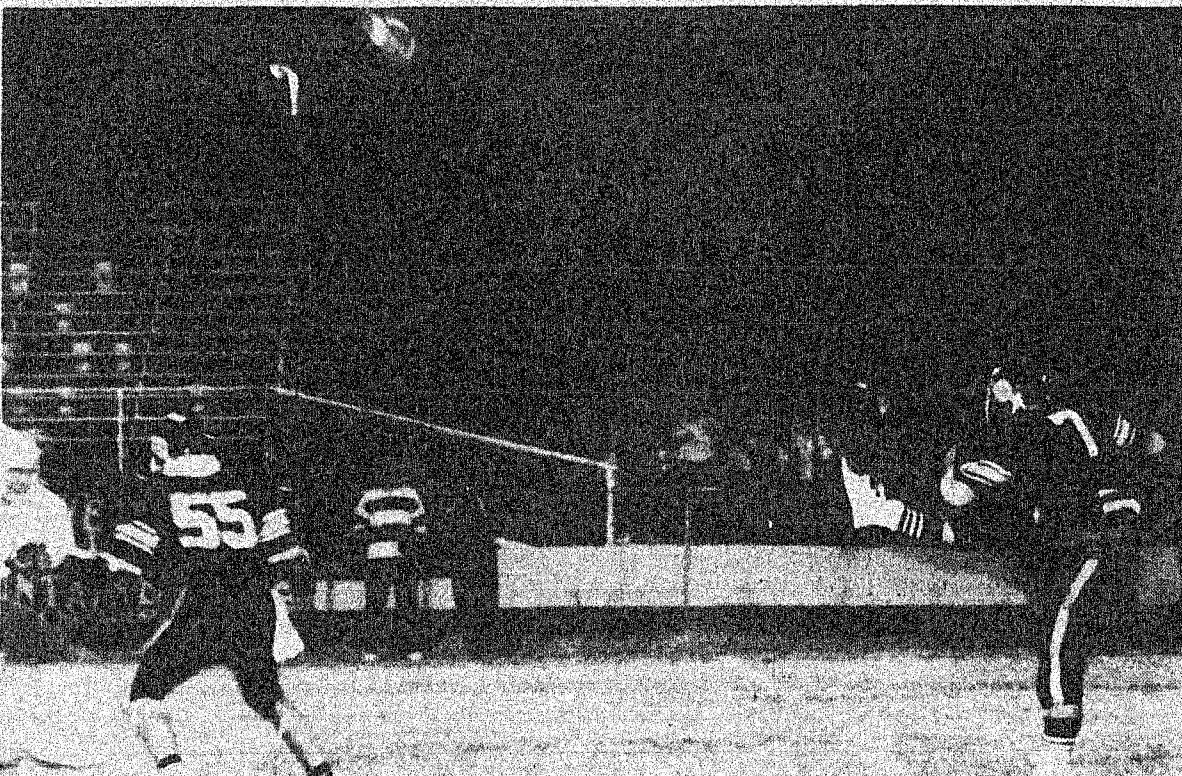
"Abilene Christian is a fine team," says McSpadden. "They played Roby a very good game even though they lost 25-12. They are now 2-0 and we are 1-1. We will see if we can bounce back. I consider this a crucial game for us as far as resiliency is concerned...how we handle the situation".

Officials stress they will need as many entries as possible and would appreciate your help in getting the word around to others.

The Santa Anna News did not receive the information in time to be published last week to let you know that the samples are to be

taken today (Thursday, Sept. 15) by Kerry Kropshire, County Extension Agent and mailed to A & M on this day for analysis. Drop off locations are Tomlinson Feed & Seed in Santa Anna, Coleman County Feed & Seed, Coleman and Gouldbusk Store in Gouldbusk.

All types of hay will be accepted for analysis and round or square bales can be entered.

Your hay will be kept and taken to the County Fair on Saturday, Oct. 1. Judging will be done by George Alston, Extension Services Agronomist. Judging will begin at 9:30 the day of the fair. Following the judging, awards will be presented under the big top tent. The hay must be picked up by 6:00 p.m. the day of the fair.

Will Meet In Reunion At Armory This Weekend

Parson Clan Migrates To Coleman County From Germany

Editor's Note: The following article written by Tex Wright of Santa Anna appeared recently in the Abilene Reporter News. The Parson family will meet in a reunion this weekend at the Armory in Santa Anna.

Joseph E. Parso, was born July 31, 1812, and came to the United States from Rings, in, Grand Duchy of Baden, Germany, arriving May 18, 1834.

Family stories have him working in both New York and Baltimore for 10 cents a day until he learned the English language.

Due to the religious pressures in his homeland, he was an avowed atheist. From the east coast city of his arrival, he later went to Kentucky.

Parson was married three times; the name of his first wife is not known.

His second wife was Elizabeth A. Robertson, and they had four children before her death in 1849.

They were Edward T., Permella A., Ann Mildred who married Rev. Green Anderson Miller, and William O. Parson.

Two years following the death of Elizabeth A., Joseph married Elizabeth Jane (Green) McCann-Owens, a widow with four children.

They married on Sept. 7, 1851, in Henderson, Ky. Their four children, born between 1852 and 1857,

were Robert (lived only four months), Franklin Pierce, James L.C. and Noah.

When Parson came down with tuberculosis, physicians offered no hope. Deciding that a change of climate might help, Joseph and Elizabeth Jane moved to Texas, arriving in Wise County on Nov. 12, 1858, with 10 children from the combined marriages. (The McCann daughters stayed in Kentucky with an aunt.)

Two more children, Johanna E. (Parson) Barkley and Joseph F. Parson, were born in Texas, in 1862 and 1866 respectively.

According to "A Family History" by June Rayfield Welch, "Parson's health improved on the Texas frontier. As he became better, he indulged more and more in what was to him a most intriguing and consuming pastime - arguing religion with the orthodox southern Christians who peopled Wise County."

"One of Elizabeth's McCann daughters and her husband came to Texas for a visit. The husband was a Baptist preacher. They had been in the house only a short time before Parson and the preacher were arguing religion. It must have been bitter on both sides. The minister must have thought that the trap door to hell had opened and Mephistopholes, with a German accent, had emerged."

"One day in 1874, Parson ran up against an argument he could not

meet. Suddenly the meaning of all the scriptures that he knew so well became clear to him.

In August of that year, Joseph was ordained as a minister in the Baptist church and preached the gospel according to that denomination until he died in Blanket, Texas, on March 14, 1891."

Elizabeth Jane lived another nine years and died Aug. 1, 1900; both are buried in Antioch Cemetery near Blanket.

Their oldest son, Franklin Pierce Parson, was born Sept. 1, 1853, in Henderson, Ky. He came to Texas with his parents in 1858, growing up in Wise County, near Elvord. Little else is known about his childhood.

He was married Dec. 31, 1840, in Dallas County, Ala., to Elizabeth Caroline Watson, the daughter of Rev. David Watson and Caroline Ethridge Watson.

(Rev. and Mrs. Watson had eight children, but is has been documented that they helped rear some 21 children of the frontier who had lost their parents. Rev. Watson was one of the signers of the ordination papers of Joseph Parson.)

Franklin and "Lizzie" lived and worked in the Wise County area until about 1889 when they moved to Brown County where his dad was a preacher.

At one time, Franklin ran a "lombstone yard" in Santa Anna. He cut and sold firewood near

Trickham, owned and operated two grocery stores in Brownwood, and once contracted a mail route between Santa Anna and Trickham. Franklin sold out in 1915 and moved to Arizona where both he and "Lizzie" died in about 1934. They are buried near Burton.

The children from their marriage were: Mary Ann (Parson) Miller, James Milton Parson, Frank Affie Parson, Jo Anne (Parson) Medley, Sara Nettie (Parson) Bolt-Kelly, Rhoda Earnest (Parson) Henderson, and Edna Malvina (Parson) Hair-Sylvester-Flores.

Affie Parson was carrying the mail on horseback when he made a stop at Niwot. There he met "a silly little girl" named Louisa Josephine Cupps, the daughter of John Lewis Cupps. They were married on April 28, 1901.

Over the next 30 years, Parson farmed and dug wells around Brown, Coleman and Callahan counties.

"They never stayed in one place over two years, sharecropping on the third and fourth system."

Affie and "Lu" had nine children: Nevy A., Norris C., Nolan U., Norrell W., Audrey M. (Parson) Wright, Nalton K., Newell B., L. Dorthy (Parson) Goodgoind and Muriel (Parson) Lappe.

Louisa Cupps Parson died Nov. 11, 1938, and is buried in Cleveland Cemetery in Coleman

County. Affie later met Naomi Ruth Williamson when he was in Limestone County digging a well.

Following their marriage in 1948, they returned to Coleman. Ruth died in 1969 and was buried in Limestone County beside her first husband. Affie passed away in 1972 and was buried next to "Lu" at Cleveland Cemetery.

The descendants of Affie and Louise (Cupps) Parson will meet for their annual reunion on Sept. 17-18. For further information, call or contact D.D. Wright, Box 404, Santa Anna 76878. His phone number is 915-348-3655.

"Some of them were spun a little out of context, such as the story of him and a friend digging the Jim Ned Creek and piling the dirt to build the Santa Anna mountains."

Options for Health by Dr. Scott White. DR. SCOTT WHITE is offered as a public service by Scott and White Memorial Hospital and Clinic in Temple. Q. I was thinking about buying a blood pressure monitoring kit to use at home because of my blood pressure level. Can you tell me what the blood pressure information really tells me? A. As you know, high blood pressure, or hypertension, is one of the key medical concerns in today's society. Physicians prescribe a low-salt diet, weight loss, stress management and even medication to address this problem. Due to apprehension and nervousness, some people have higher blood pressure readings in a doctor's office, so home monitoring may be better for them. If done properly, taking your blood pressure at home is no different than doing it at the doctor's. Blood pressure data explains several things. First, blood pressure is at its highest when the heart beats. This reading is referred to as the systolic pressure. Second, pressure is at its lowest when the heart is at rest, known as diastolic pressure. When taking a blood pressure reading, you will get both systolic (number on top) and the diastolic (number on bottom) pressures. For example, 120/80. The chart below, provided by the Joint National Committee on Education, Detection, Evaluation and Treatment for High Blood Pressure (May 1988) reports these values for people 18 years or older. Diastolic, mmHg: Less than 85 Normal; 85-89 High-normal; 90-105 Mildly high; 106-114 Moderately high; 115 and above Severely high. Systolic (when diastolic is less than 90): Less than 140 Normal; 140-159 Borderline; 160 and above High.

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 8, 1988. PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways." PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium. The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to transfer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue." PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT House Joint Resolution 3 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

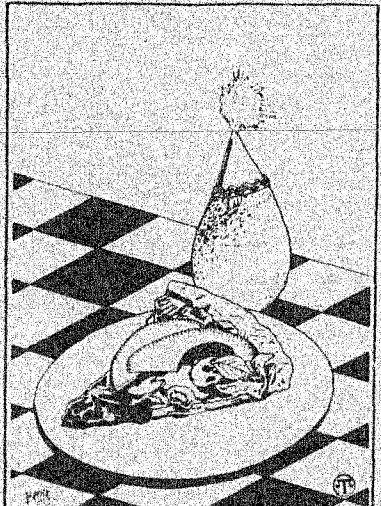

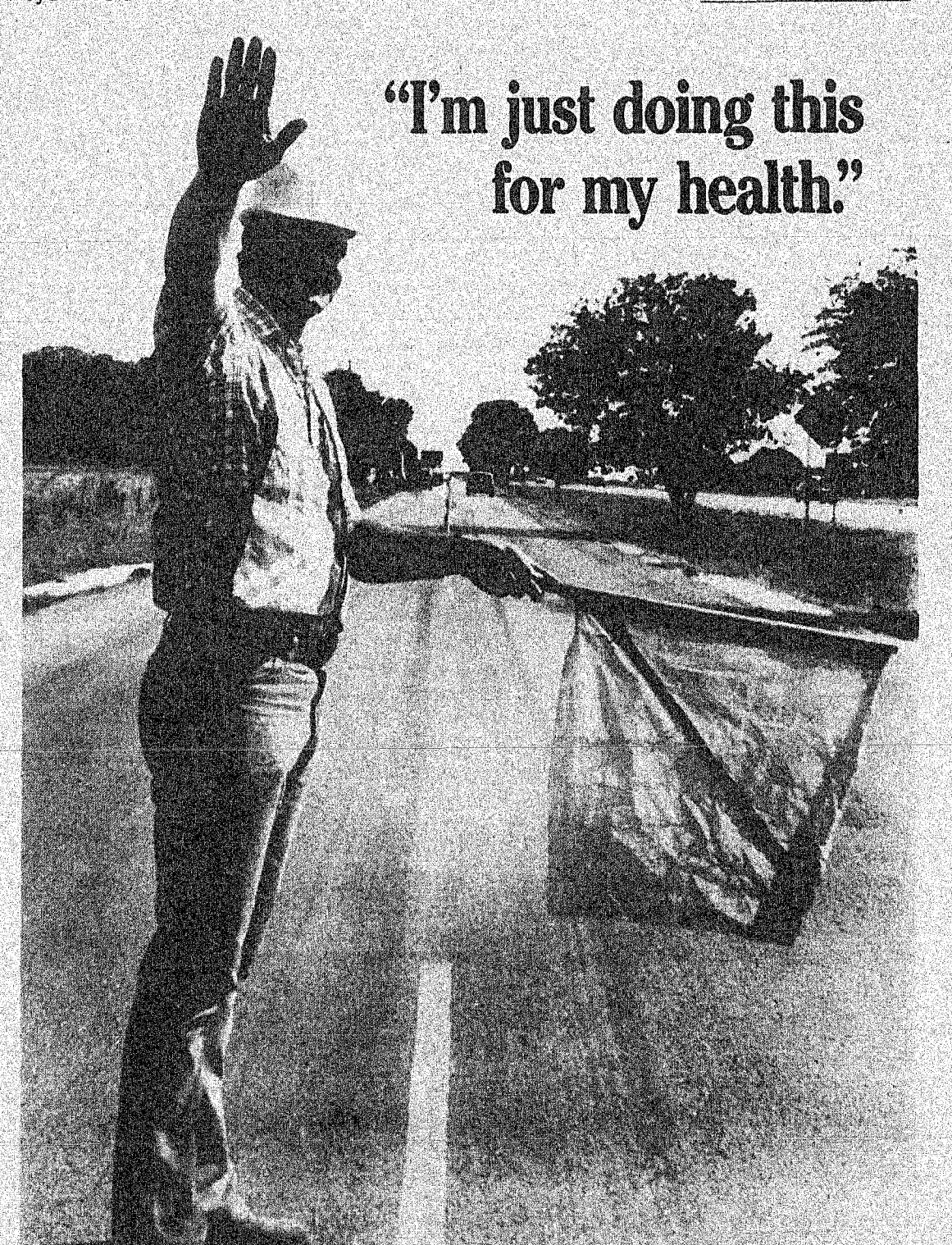
