Invitation To School Open House: Question Answered

Keeping You Informed

The Santa Anna Independent Schools will host an Open House on Monday, September 26 and Tuesday, September 27. The Elementary school (K-6) will be open to the public beginning with a welcome by Principal Jack Burns on Monday the 26th. The welcome will be given at 7:00 p.m. in the cafeteria. Following the welcome, parents and interested community members will have the opportunity to visit with the staff.

Grades 7-12 will have an open house on Tuesday, September 27th. Principal Frank Gray will welcome guests at 7:00 p.m. in the high school auditorium. The school will run a brief schedule of classes for those parents who want to meet their children's instructors. The National Honor Society induction will be held in conjunction with the open house.

The school encourages you to attend one or both of these activities.

This is your school, and we want you to be a partner in the education of our children.

A question has arisen as to why the bus drivers are allowed to use the buses during the school day to "shop" or "go to the bank". The answer to this question is quite simple. The drivers are asked to take the buses to their homes at night. It has been proven that we have less vandalism and theft at the driver's homes than at the bus barn. Most of the drivers live at the end of their route. By not returning the bus to the school at night, there is a daily savings of approximately 68 miles per day. At the state calculated rate of 66.3 cents per mile, that is a savings of \$45.04 per day or \$7,882 per school year. Since the drivers do not have their personal vehicles at the school, the cost of their use of the buses during the day still saves the district money.

New School Board Member Takes Seat; Policy Set For Band Member Responsibilities

Bill Martin, appointed to the school board to fill the vacancy left when board member Ronnie Hartman moved from the district, was sworn into office as the first item of business taken care of at the regular September meeting of the Santa Anna ISD board of trustees.

Among the items discussed at last week's School Board meeting was that of setting a policy for band performance and rehearsal responsibilities.

The policy that the board approved is as follows:

Performing musical organizations often require extra rehearsals and participation in activities outside school hours. These rehearsals and activities fall into two different categories, co-curricular and extracurricular.

Night rehearsals, after school sectionals, and concerts are considered co-curricular, therefore they are considered an extension of the classroom and will be considered as part of the earned grade along with classroom performance.

Pep rallies, football games, parades, and contests are extracurricular. These activities incorporate several aspects essential to a bands curriculum and are an integral part of a successful band program, however, they are not considered part of the earned grade.

It will be the responsibility of

the eligible band member to attend these rehearsals and performances unless excused by the director. Determination of excused and unexcused absences from these band activities will be governed by Texas Education Code, Section 21.035.b

Unexcused absences from co-curricular activities will result in no credit for the activity missed.

After two unexcused absences from any band activity, the student may be removed from the band program.

Any exceptions to the above policy may be subject to administrative review.

Sharon Cheaney, president of the local ATPE chapter reported to the board concerning activities of the newly formed organized local chapter and invited board members to attend a meeting with candidates for the State Board of Education.

Teacher appraisal dates were set for September 19 - December 21 and January 4 - May 24. Superintendent Gerald Brister, elementary principal Jack Burns and high school principal Frank Gray were named appraisers.

Following a discussion of fund raising activities, the board voted to approve an administrative proposal that the Junior class be allowed proceeds from home football concession stands and that the Hal-

loween carnival and basketball concessions be sponsored by booster organizations which include the Band Boosters, the Athletic Boosters and the PTO.

Phase 5 Water Line Extended

Coleman County Water Supply Corporation has decided to extend the water line for the Phase 5 water project to include a group of houses southwest of Santa Anna. According to Davey Thwait of the Coleman County Water Supply Corporation most of these people had been a part of the original Phase 5 project and were eliminated because the water board was not sure there was enough money to complete the project. When Phase 5 was completed there were funds left over so the decision was made to take water to an additional 13 or 14 meters. Work is already in progress on the additional line.

An application is being prepared on a Phase 6 water project which will include other rural residences in the Santa Anna area not included in Phase 5.

Mountaineers.

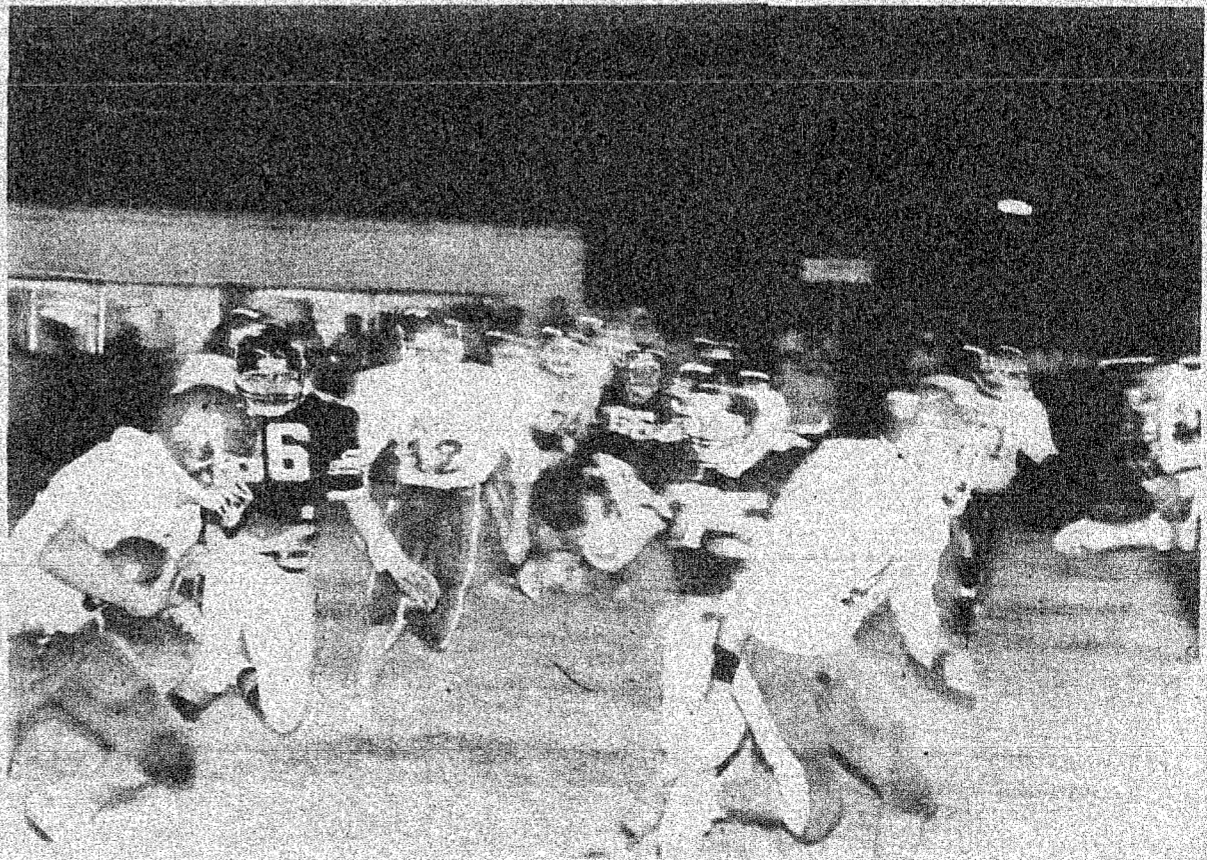

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Census Workers Begin Listing Addresses In Co.

Workers for the U.S. Census Bureau are to soon begin the compiling of house-by-house lists within Coleman County.

"The purpose of the address listing program is to help prepare a complete list of all residential addresses in the city for the use in delivering a 1990 census questionnaire to each household," said John Bell, Regional director.

Census workers will be driving on streets and roads in the city to prepare the address lists. They will be knocking on doors and asking householders for correct mailing addresses.

Bell said city residents can identify the census employees by the

red, white, and blue census identification badge which all will wear.

Census workers also will carry 11" by 16" books, address registers, in which the addresses are written.

After listing, the addresses will be entered into a master address file that the Census Bureau will use to produce address labels for the census questionnaires and to keep track of the questionnaires as they are processed.

By law, Title 13 of the U.S. Code, name and address lists are confidential and can be seen only by sworn Census employees.

Census day is April 1, 1990. The Census Bureau is an equal opportunity employer.

Library Notes Check It Out

PARENTS: YOU can make a difference.

"It's never too early to open the door to the magic kingdom of books," says Claudia Lewis, specialist in children's literature. Start by singing nursery rhymes, Read them from a book as you sing. You are the best teacher your child can have and you can give them a head start. They learn language skills and love for reading.

As your children grow, help them find books that interest them (even comics!). Just help them learn to love reading.

Parents can control the amount of TV their children watch. Education leaders say that the average child watches 25 hours a week. If a child spends 3 1/2 hours a week reading books, magazines or newspapers, he will score higher and do better in high school.

John F. Kennedy said that every child in his family was required to bring a current event to the supper table each day. What a wonderful way to teach a child to read and join in discussions.

Educators agree that parents should provide a good place (quiet, well lighted and comfortable) to read or study. Parents should be seen reading and should show interest in what their children have read. When did you last ask what the story was about or what your child learned in school and really listen to the answer?

According to a study in California, half the improvement in grades can be attributed to parents interest in school and homework.

School just started. Parents, YOU make a difference in your child's success or failure.

Delta Omicron Chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha met Sept 12, 1988 at the CLC Building at First Baptist Church.

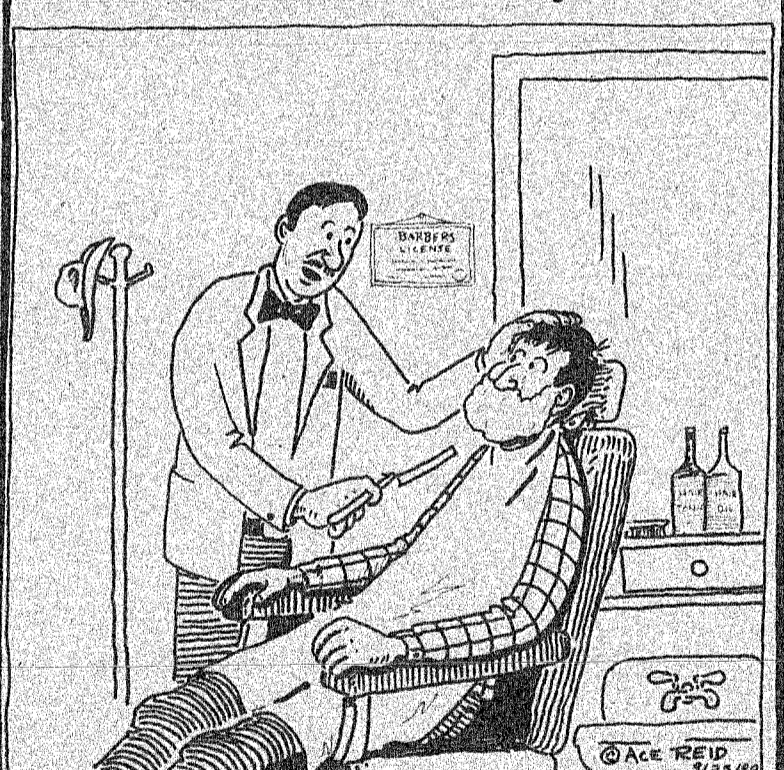

Dana S. Poer has been named Coleman County Extension Agent-Home Economics effective October 1 according to an announcement made by County Judge, W.W. "Pete" Skelton and Extension Director Carolyn Gilbert.

Poer will be headquartered in the Extension offices located on the second floor of the Coleman County Courthouse. In her position, she will be responsible for all Extension home economics endeavors in the county.

"We feel fortunate to have hired an individual with Mill Poer's practical background and varied job and professional experience," said Gilbert. "Coleman County is recognized as a supporter of strong Extension programs. Miss Poer brings qualifications to the position that can only enhance the program in the County and District."

The new agent is presently County Extension Agent-Home Economics for Ellis County, a position she has held since February 1987. Prior to that time, she was employed by the Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Service where she was County Extension 4-H agent for Choctaw County.

In her Extension work, she has

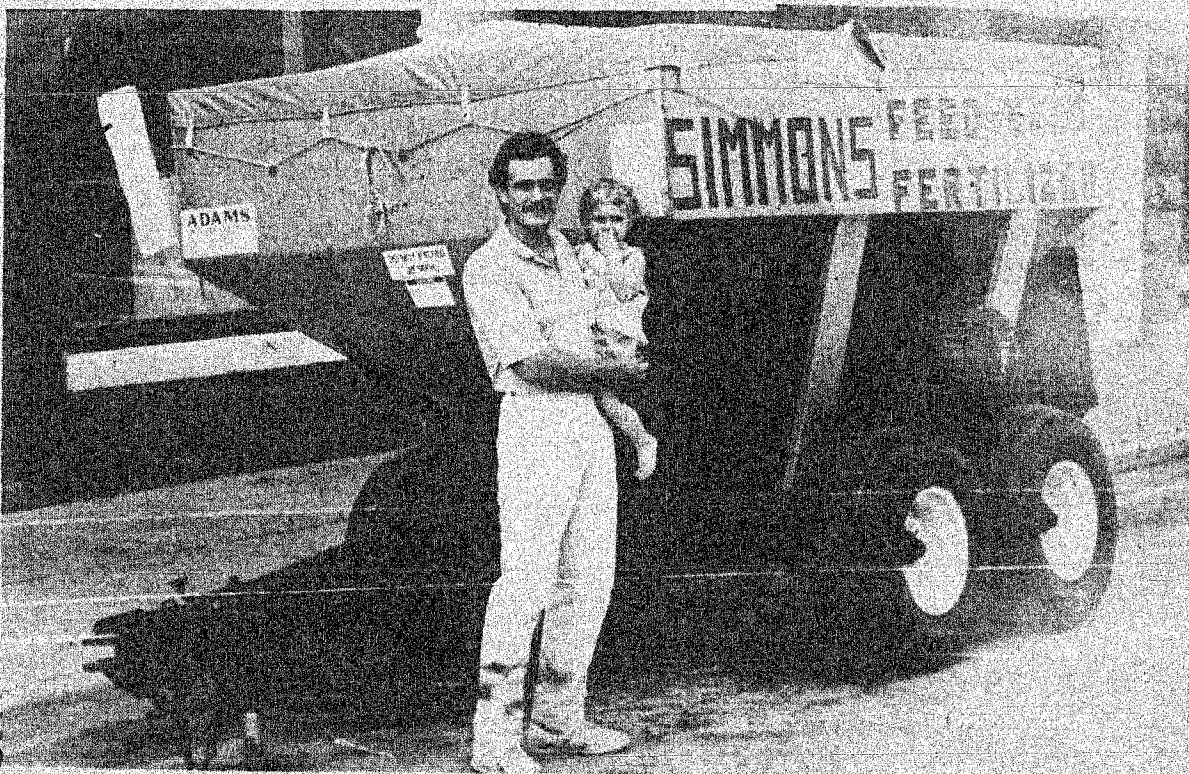

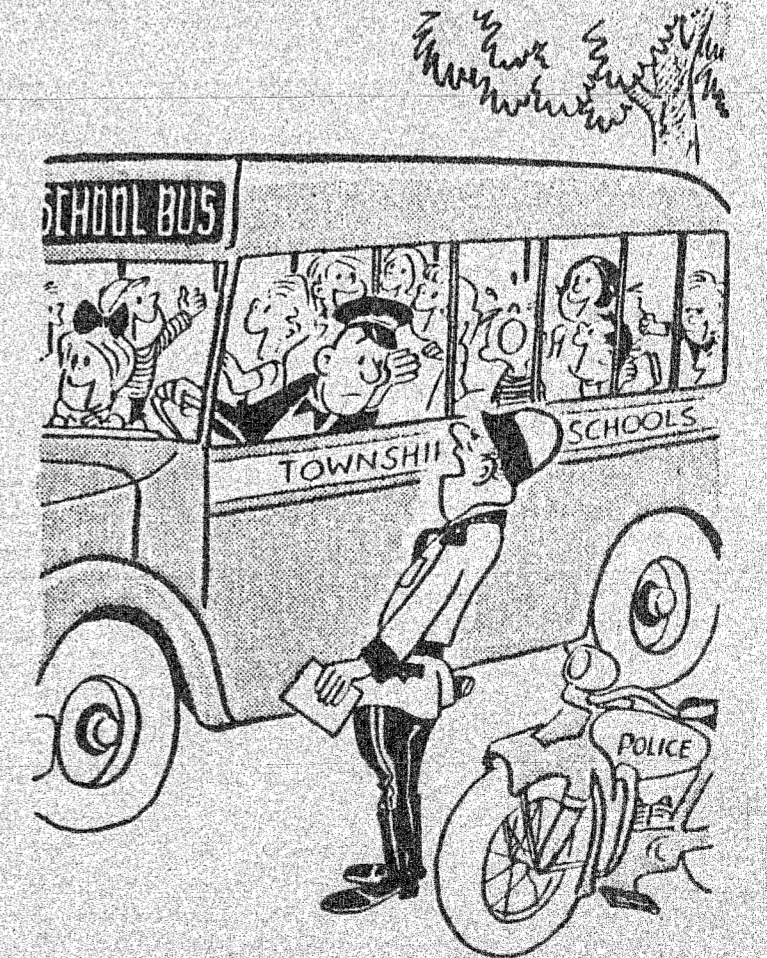

National Farm Safety Week

COLLEGE STATION - National Farm Safety Week is Sept. 18-24, and that week also has been declared Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Week by Gov. Bill Clements.

The theme of the weeklong observance will be "Ensure Your Future with Farm Safety."

The theme stresses the hazards involved in agricultural production and the effort into preventing injury and illness on the farm, especially during times of economic stress, according to Thomas D. Valco, an engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Valco said that each year, there are about 100 Texas fatalities from farm and ranch-related accidents. Also, an estimated 10,000 disabling injuries and 100,000 injuries requiring medical attention occur annually in the state.

According to National Safety Council figures, some 1,600 deaths resulted from farm accidents in 1987, with most fatalities caused by (in descending order) tractors, firearms, drowning, burns, falls, electrical shock and machinery.

Through a continuing educational effort in safe farming and ranching operations and improved safety design in machinery and equipment, rural fatalities have been reduced by 50 percent in the past 10 years, Valco said.

Simply following safe work procedures and keeping equipment and machinery in good repair can make a big difference, he claimed.

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 8, 1988

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. The Texas

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."
