Tax Board **Approves** '89 Budget

The 1989 budget was approved by the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District at the group's meeting Monday, July 11.

The budget for the coming year totals \$236,840 which is just \$8,000 more than the current year. However the district will end this year with excess funds that will later be refunded to the taxing enti-

Increases were in several categories, with salaries and benefits accounting for over half the increase. Also increased is computer maintenance and supplies.

The public hearing on the budget was held at the conclusion of the regular monthly session.

In other business the group approved the 1986 - 1987 audit report by Collier Watson and reviewed and

Sales Tax **Figures** Still Up

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said last week that payments to continue to show an increase this month with July payments up 14.3% over those sent in July of last year.

Armed Robber Hits Bangs Store

The Bangs Police Department and the Brown County Sheriff's Department are investigating the armed robbery of the town and Country Convenience Store located

Ine robbery took place at approximately 10:30 P.M. on Sunday, July 17. After entering the store the subject displayed an automatic pistol and ordered a customer behind the counter while the clerk emptied the cash register.

The subject is described as a white male, 25 to 30 years of age, 160-170 pounds, approximately 5'6" tall, short light brown hair and darkly tanned. Subject was wearing a white shirt with yellow stripes, blue jeans and a red ball cap.

A witness observed a second subject, described as a white male with long dark hair, parked on the east side of the store. The witness described the vehicle as a brown or maroon Chevrolet Citation.

The school districts cooperating without completing requirements for a diploma. The five school districts will begin the program in

September of this year for persons

between the ages of 15 and 21 who wish to resume their education. The program will provide what is needed to improve academic skills and, at

which will serve all 5 participating school districts. Mrs. Clyde War-

ren, Executive Director of the Service Center, is allowing CAP a long term loan of an offset printing press for use in the print shop. The ESC will also pay one teacher's salary and some inservice training will be provided for the CAP staff itself.

Applications have been made for other state and federal funds and word is expected shortly as to whether the applications have been approved.





He noticed they were larger than cattle bones so he picked them up. Smith's wife, Gay, took them to an archeology professor at Tarleton State University. The professor said they were bones of an extinct mastodon, a long-haired elephant-type mammal. The bones are at least 10,000 years old, according to the professor and could be up to 100,000 years old.

On Monday nights I have the honor of conducting a Bible study for the "Recycled Teenagers". This is a delightful group of Senior citizens who have formed the group for fellowship and study.

I look forward to each Monday to spend some time with them.

For the past three months we have been looking at the book of Philippians, I say we have been for we have not finished yet.

May I share with you some of the "gems" we have come up with in our study. I would like to share with you for the next few weeks a series entitled "The Believers......". Then we will look at a passage and see what it has to say to us.

This week I want us to look at "The Believers Attitude" as found in Phil. 2:5. In this passage Paul talks about Christ emptying Himself, taking on the form of a servant, and being obedient in humil-

In so many cases we judge other's Christian living by a set of negative actions. I know you have heard "We don't smoke and we don't chew and we don't go with those who do." Well, that just does not tell it all!

How do we treat others? How do we forgive? How do we face disappointment and doubt? Are we concerned about others? That is what Christian living is all about.

Paul said in this passage that Christ had given the perfect example of the Christian attitude. When Paul said "have this mind of Christ", he tells us three things about His example.

A. "He made of Himself no reputation. Jesus forgot Himself. His mission was to glorify God even though it would cost Him his life on the cruel Roman cross.

B. "He took on the form of a servant". Christ emptied Himself, this emptying was not a surrender of divinity but the acceptance of servanthood. It refers to his pouring out of His life to humble, obedient self denial refusing in any form to act selfishly.

C. "He humbled Himself." Here is the most solemn example of humility ever given to the world. Now what does all that mean to

me now? How does that affect my living and my attempt to follow

Notice, He forgot Himself. Why do we do these things? Even good things are sometimes done for selfish reasons. Peter said in summarizing the ministry of Jesus "He went about doing good". He was not a "do-gooder" who got some selfish satisfaction out of doing an occasional good turn. True compassion not selfish intent drove Jesus to do all He could.

Again notice, He took on the form of a servant. After eating the Last Supper with His disciples, He left His position to wash the disciple's feet. It was perhaps that this humble task was given to someone of low means that none of the other disciples had taken this task. But, in what better way could he have demonstrated the fact that He came not to be served but to serve others.

Last of all, "He humbled Himself". Our Lord's humility and voluntary submission to the will of God was the underlying principle of His sacrifice on the cross.

What does it mean to be humble? The word comes from a root word meaning :the taming of a wild horse". To be humble is simply to be disciplined. He does not ask us to give up our strength or personality but to have them disci-

True humility is the believer permitting the Lord to break up selfish desires and surrender to His will. He doesn't want weak minded but strong men disciplined to hear and obey.

To live the Christian life is to forget ourselves, to have a servant's heart, and be disciplined in the will "The Believers....Attitude: is one

of humbled service to the glory of

Prioritize the problems according to their importance-and according to your ability to have an impact on them. Don't waste time on problems you can't do anything

Break down the problem into manageable pieces.

 And remember to pat yourself on the back when you overcome that piece of the problem:

A few deep breaths and a little reflection could save your heart.

Until public welfare programs came into vogue in the 1930s, many Texas counties had "poor farms." They originated in 1876 when the Legislature adopted the Elizabethan Poor Laws of England. The laws allowed a county to establish a manual labor poorhouse and farm for the indigent. The idea was that these unfortunates could raise crops for their own food and sell the surplus for cash. The county poor farm in Texas was the first and for many years the only public charitable institution.

People across the country have been receiving direct mail solicitations asking that they pay \$7 to ioin an organization that says it will provide services related to Social Security, Randall Stogner, Social Security manager in Brownwood, said recently.

First, there is no need to pay any firm money to obtain any service

In return for the \$7 payment, this firm offers a statement of a person's earnings covered by Social Security, a plastic Social Security card,

Any person can obtain a statement of social security earnings without paying anybody. All a person has to do is call any Social Security office and ask for a request for a statement of earnings from. After completing the form and mailing it, the person will receive the statement in a few weeks. The firm charging the \$7 fee can do no

In addition, there is no need for a plastic Social Security card. It is of no use for Social Security purposes. The Social Security number o card issued by the Social Security Administration is the only official card and should be used whenever a Social Security card is needed.

New legislation requires that employers see an official Social Security card before allowing a newly hired employee to begin working. Some agencies providing services to the public such as Texas Employment Commission and Texas Department of Human Services require applicants to produce an official Social Security card before approving any benefits that a person may be eligible to receive.

People can obtain many publication about Social Security free of charge at any Social Security office. For pamphlets with information you would like to have, just call

Time To Update Earnings Reports

It's a good idea about this time of year for people who are receiving Social Security benefited and are still working to check their earnings to make sure their estimate of their annual earnings they made earlier is till accurate. If expected earnings are higher than estimated on their annual earnings report, they should notify Social Security as soon as possible to avoid prob-

lems with overpayment of benefits. A change in earnings during the year is one of the most frequent causes of overpayments. This is why beneficiaries should review the earnings statement they were required to submit to Social Security by April 15. Monthly benefits payable are based on expected eam-

ings for the year. Under the law, an annual limit applies to people reviewing Social Security benefits who work. Earnings over the limit result in benefits being reduced \$1 for each of \$2. of earnings above the limit. The 1988 earnings limits are \$8,400 for people 65-69 and \$6,120 for people under 65 all of 1988. People who do not report their correct earnings and who receive benefits to which they are not entitled are required to repay the overpayment. Generally, the repayment is made from deductions from future checks.

A mass mailing is conducted each August as part of an effort to alert peneticiaries to update meir earnings reports to avoid overpayments. An estimated 70% of overpayments likely to occur in 1988 will result from low estimates of annual earnings reported to Social Security.

Changes in earnings may be reported by phone, mail, or in person. Almost all Social Security matters can be handled by phone at the Brownwood Social Security of-

GOLDEN FRUIT SALAD

1 large Dole Fresh Pineapple

1 small mango I cup strawberries, halved

cup honeydew melon balls

Zesty Poppy Seed Dressing

Cut one-third off side of pineapple leaving crown intact. Remove fruit from both sections leaving shells intact. Core. Dice fruit. Peel mango and slice fruit from large center seed. Cut into bite-size pieces. Combine pineapple, mango, strawberries and melon balls. Spoon back into large pineapple shell. Serve with Zesty Poppy Seed Dressing. Serves 4 to 6.

ZESTY POPPY SEED DRESSING: Combine 1/2 cup orange juice, 2 tablespoons vegetable oil, 1 tablespoon honey, 1 tablespoon white wine vinegar, 1/2 teaspoon poppy seeds, 1/4 teaspoon grated orange peel and 1/8 teaspoon dry mustard in a screw-top jar. Shake well.

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


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
