Election Day Tuesday

S Anna Voters To Cast Ballots At Telephone Co-op

According to County Clerk Glenn Thomas, absentee voting has been very active. Thomas is anticipating that a record absentee vote may be cast for the November 8 general election. Absentee balloting will continue through Friday until 5:00 p.m. at the County Clerk's office in the courthouse.

Across the nation on Tuesday voters will be casting ballots for the presidential candidate of their choice, will be electing the 101st congress, judges etc. and local and state officials. The only local

race to appear on the ballot on Tuesday in Coleman County will be that for Sheriff, and the commissioner's race in Precinct 1.

Santa Anna residents and other Precinct 2 voters will cast their ballots at the Coleman County Co-op building in Santa Anna and 2A at the Rockwood Community Center. Monte Guthrie II will be the election judge for precinct 2 in Santa Anna and Wayne Bray will be the election judge for 2A at Rockwood.

There are three proposed constitutional amendments on the

ballot. These proposals deal with a variety of issues. The first proposed amendment addresses whether money received from the Federal government as reimbursement for State money sent for highway construction, maintenance and policing of public roadways should be dedicated solely for those purposes.

The second proposal relates to the establishment in the Texas State Treasury of an economic stabilization fund to be used to prevent or eliminate temporary cash deficiencies in the State's general

revenues. The third amendment would create the Texas growth fund as a source of investment for businesses, industry and world authority money in the permanent university fund, as well as the public school fund, to be invested in any prudent investment.

The Texas Constitution adopted in 1876 has been amended 104 times. For a total of 103 amendments which have been submitted to the voters for approval. The Constitution provides that the Texas legislature, by a two-thirds vote of all members of each house, may propose amendments revising the constitution, and those proposed amendments must then be submitted to the qualified voters at the polls.

An amendment may only become a part of the constitution if a majority of the voters cast for it in an election are cast in its favor. If approved, the amendment is effective on the date of the official canvass of returns showing the adoption. The date of canvass in law is not earlier than the 15th of the month after the election day. However, an amendment may provide for a later effective date.

Smallest Cowboy Is Gone

Cancer has taken the life of Rev. George Havens who died in a Dallas

hospital last Wednesday and was buried here in the Santa Anna cemetery after funeral services on Saturday at the First Baptist Church of Santa Anna.

Born September 17, 1920, in Santa Anna, he was the son of Bryn and Hazel Pearce Havens. He was the grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Pearce. He attended Coleman Schools.

He became a stunt man and actor and appeared in over 100 movies, most of which were westerns.

During a ten-year stint in Hollywood Havens was known as the "world's smallest cowboy" and "Hollywood's smallest cowboy stunt man" and rightly so, at 4'10" and 125 pounds.

He later turned his interest and energies to old time evangelism. Also active in the recording field,

he was once featured on an album "Little George Havens, Circuit Rider Preacher"

Havens's cowboy jump meeting style of singing was always a feature of the revival meetings held at his "Cowboy Camp Meetings" established at Flying H Acres between Santa Anna and Coleman some 22 years ago. The Camp meetings abounded in a warm atmosphere being conducted in the manner of the open air revival of the old west, which Havens loved.

Chuck wagon supper and covered wagon rides for the children were also features of his annual revival meetings when hundreds gathered from local areas and from all over the state and country.

He is survived by his wife Lucy of Dallas and his father, Dr. Bryan Havens of Berryville, Ark.; two sisters, Ora Beth Keene of Beaumont and Marsha Havens of Berryville, Ark.; and several nieces and nephews. Local survivors include several cousins.

Saturday Is Big Day For Local Masonic Lodge

Harvey, Deputy Grand Master, the most worshipful of the Grand Lodge of Texas, to Santa Anna for the celebration on Saturday and declare that he be presented with a "key to the city of Santa Anna".

The Mountain Lodge #661, of Santa Anna, was chartered on December 12, 1888. The Most Worshipful Anson Rainey, Grand Master of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Texas chartered the lodge for Master Masons of Santa Anna, Texas.

The first Worshipful Master of the local lodge was Calvin Holmes and the Senior Warden was W.S. Baxter. The Junior Warden was J.W. Herdon.

According to Rod Musick, the Santa Anna Lodge for some reason must have been inactive for a while and then reorganized again in 1903 when the following were installed: C.F. Shield, Worshipful Master; S.H. Phillips, Senior Warden; A.A. Dunwoody, Junior Warden; J.M. Bird, Treasurer; L.H. Torry, Senior Deacon; W.F. Erwin, Junior Deacon; J.D. Bird, Senior Steward; W.F. Erwin, Junior Steward; J.S. Schoolcraft, Tyler; R.C. Gay, Sec.

It is believed that the old lodge building between the Bank and the Telephone Cooperative was built by the Masons in 1908. The Lodge moved to their present lodge hall at the corner of Wallis and 2nd Street in 1987.

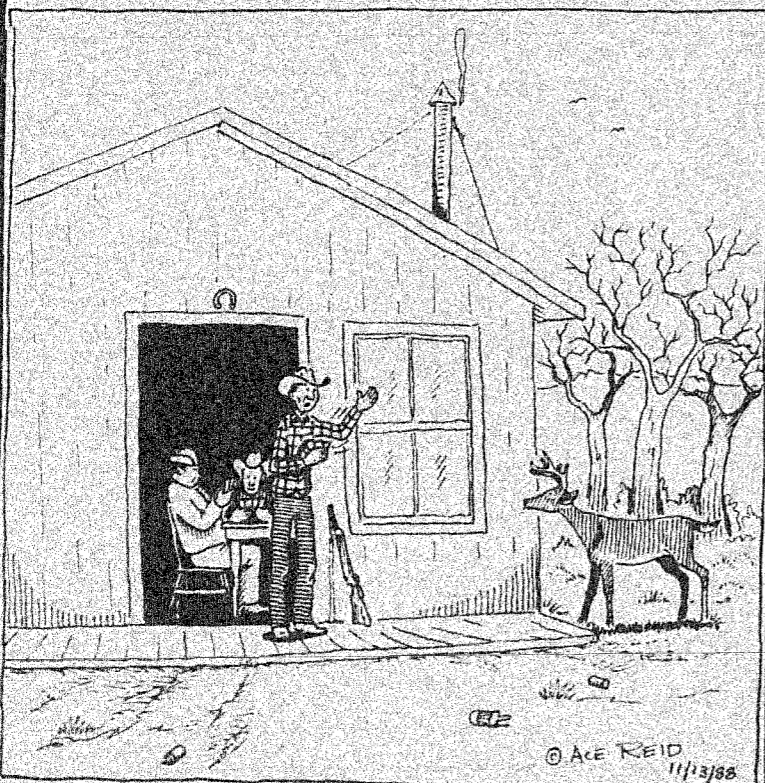

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Thoughts From Our Pastors

Has God decided who ought to be elected President of the United States? I don't know. At least He hasn't revealed His mind to me on that particular subject. But then I've long suspected that I'm not in the inner circle.

Some folks apparently feel the Lord had spoken quite clearly on this subject. The so-called "new right" has lent more religious influence to a presidential campaign than I can ever remember. And that is okay. There are all kinds of lobbyists in Washington and elsewhere so it's good to have a group with a Christian orientation speaking out on some of the issues. However, I clearly remember that, back when the National Council of Churches was making its pronouncements and Martin Luther King, Jr. was leading the civil rights movement, many of these who speak so loudly today, were the very ones who were screaming that Christians, and particularly preachers, ought not to get involved in politics.

I believe passionately in the separation of Church and State. What that means is that the government shall impose no religion upon the people. What it does not mean is that Christians should avoid the political arena. I want those who run for public office to be decent, God-fearing women or men. So far as I can determine, in this election the most popular candidates qualify at this point. So it becomes a matter of issues supported by the candidates and their party's platform. I think it is important that as individual Christians we determine to the best of our ability what the Gospel says about the issues...not simply specific words, but the spirit. For example, what is my understanding of what the Gospel is saying about the sacredness of life, and in particular, the issue of abortion on demand? My search of the Scriptures and my own theology about the nature of God and man help me formulate a "Christian" position on the issue. Of, Course, my Christian stance may differ from another Christian's equally earnest understanding, but I am under obligation to support that candidate or party which more nearly expresses my convictions on the issues, many of them unquestionably moral issues.

Has God decided who ought to be President of the United States? It may just be that He wants us to make that decision. After visiting our prayer closet we must not only vote on November 8, but actively support those who come closest to expressing our own private convictions. See you at the polls.

A Mountainside Viewpoint

Last week the Santa Anna News asked students in the local school from grades five through 12 to participate in an unofficial poll regarding the November 8 presidential election. The students were given a slip of paper which simply posed the statement: "If I could vote in the November 8 Presidential election, I would vote for Michael Dukakis, Democratic Party Candidate; or for George Bush, Republican Party Candidate, because....."

It was very gratifying to us that the vast majority of those students responded to the poll and for the most part in a very sincere manner. As always when dealing with youngsters, some chose to take the situation lightly and their reasons for their choice reflect that attitude. It was apparent that many of the students had picked up on the negativism of the current campaign. They often referred to one or other of the candidates as a crook, a nerd, too short, etc.

What was most disturbing was the fact that several high school students stated they would choose not to vote at all because, "It doesn't matter to me". "I wouldn't vote because I am not a politician" or "Neither, because I haven't been listening to all the ---- that has been going on". Of course, this last reason given for not being interested in voting, shows they are echoing the sentiments of many of the general public in how they feel about the type of campaign that has been run by both of the major candidates.

But isn't it our duty as citizens to at least be interested enough to try to sort out all the statements made by both and come to some kind of conclusion about who we feel we can most conscientiously support? "It doesn't matter to me" is perhaps the ultimate among the most disturbing responses. It should matter to all of us and of course it does matter!

Naturally we understand that the responses of the students are only a reflection of what they hear from adults all around them, but these students as well as the rest of us, need to be keenly aware of the responsibility and the privilege that we have in helping to make the decision of which candidate will be placed in the position of leading our country for the next four years.

While the popular vote will decide the outcome of the election, it is the Electoral College that actually elects the president. The number of Electoral College votes are based on the number of members of congress from each state with all of the electoral votes of each state going to the popular vote winner.

Thus the candidate that carries Texas in the popular vote will take all 29 of the state's Electoral College votes. That is why the candidates have been courting voters in Texas, California and New York so heavily. The combined electoral votes of these three states is 112. A candidate must receive 270 of the total 538 electoral votes to win the election.

So remember to vote as you please on Tuesday, but please vote!!

Woodrow Wilson, who was twice elected President and led the nation into World War I, never received a majority of the votes cast.

Abraham Lincoln, who came to power months before the beginning of the Civil War, received less than 40 percent of the votes in the 1860 election. Three opponents took a combined total of 60 percent.

Richard Nixon won the presidency in 1968 with less than 44 percent of the votes. Hubert Humphrey and George Wallace took 56 percent.

Bush Over Dukakis In Local School Survey

Jerry Magin Receives 4 Write-In Votes

Vice President George Bush is the overwhelming favorite among Santa Anna School students according to a poll conducted by the Santa Anna News last week. He was the choice of 176 of the 235 who responded to the question posed them. Michael Dukakis was picked by 51 students as their favorite of the two major candidates in the November 8 presidential election. Coach Jerry Magin received 4 write-in votes. As one student put his reason for voting for Magin, "He has more common sense than either of the above". The couple has lived in Graham for 43 years, owning a grocery store for many years. Mr. Fletcher is now a real estate broker.

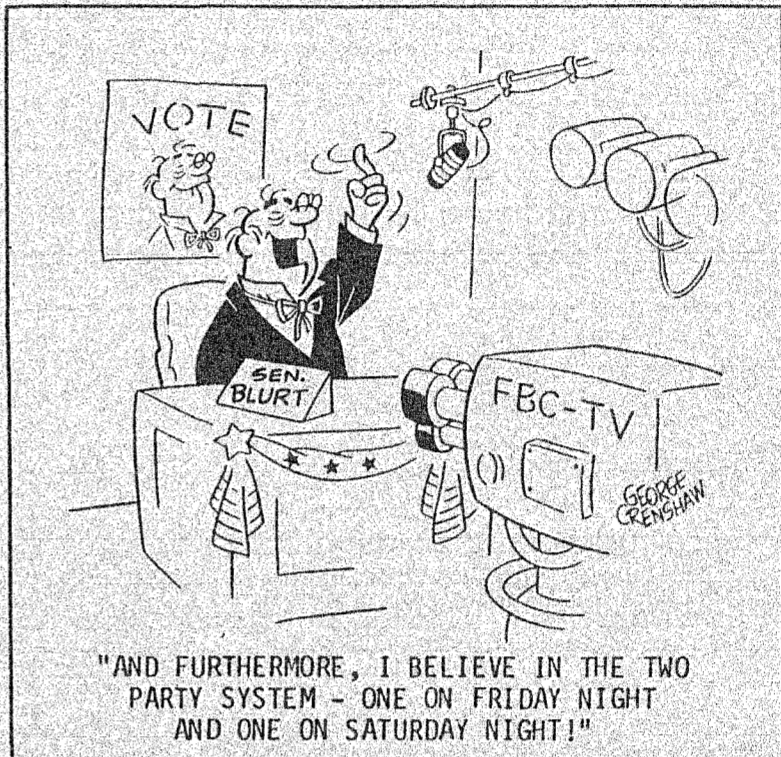

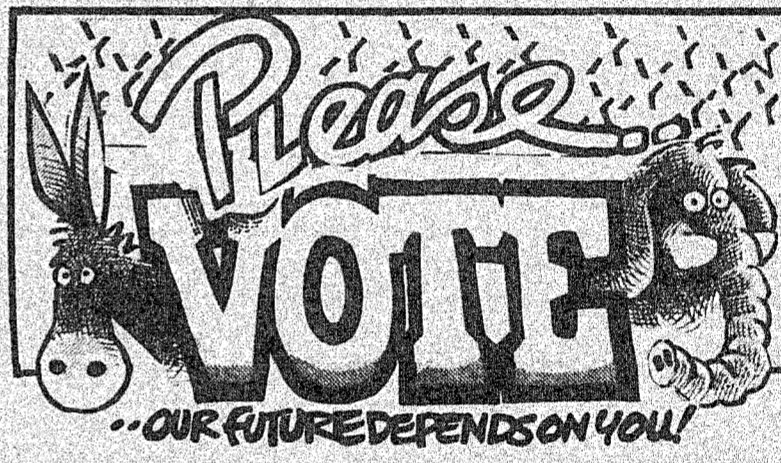

Three presidential elections in the 1800s denied the most popular man the Presidency.

Andrew Jackson received far more votes than John Quincy Adams in 1824, but Adams won the presidency.

Rutherford B. Hayes won the office in 1876, but Samuel J. Tilden had 250,000 more votes.

In 1888, Benjamin Harrison had nearly 100,000 fewer votes than Grover Cleveland, but the following year Harrison took office as president.

In each case, the candidate won the most votes in the Electoral College.

The Electoral College isn't always the final word. The House of Representatives decided the 1800 election after two candidates tied in the Electoral College. Thomas Jefferson became President; the defeated candidate, Aaron Burr was chosen Vice-President. X

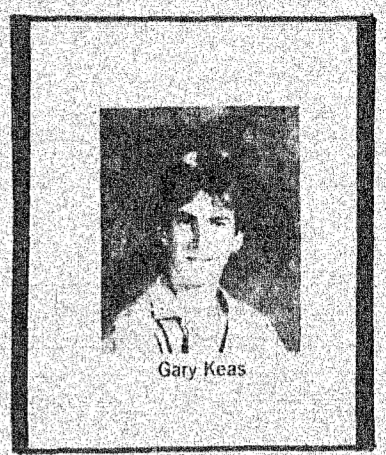

Spray Fruit Trees Now To Prevent Disease Next Year

Spraying fruit trees (peaches, plums, apricot, almonds and cherries) in the fall can reduce the incidence of several fruit tree diseases next year. Diseases targeted by fall spraying include bacterial spot, bacterial canker, peach leaf curl and coryneum blight, says Kerry Shropshire, CEA-AG.

Kocide 101 at a rate of 2 Tbs./gal. (2 lbs./100 gal.) or Kodie 606 (2-2/3 to 5-1/2 pt./100 gal. dilute or 8 to 10% pt./100 gal.-concentrate) are the best materials to use. Kocide contains copper, which will cause leaf burn on healthy green foliage, so it is important to wait until the leaves are beginning to drop and are easily brushed from the tree with a light touch.

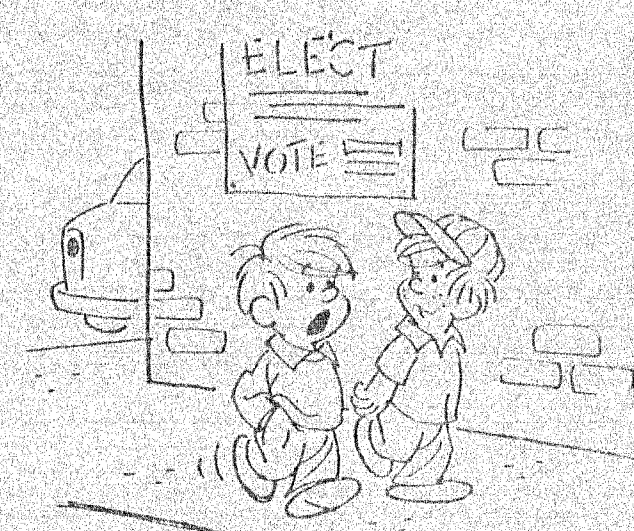
Fall spraying with Kocide is not a cure-all, but it does help. Bacterial canker is the most serious of the targeted diseases. It is a common cause of tree dieback and death. The most common symptom besides dieback and death is bleeding or gumming along the trunk and branches. Probably 8 out of 10 cases of fruit tree gumming are because of bacterial canker. This gumming is especially evident in the fall. Canker is caused by systematic bacteria that plugs the tree's vascular sys-

tem and spraying with Kocide will not help a tree that is already showing symptoms of infection.

The only thing that will help trees seriously infected with bacterial canker is good care - water, fertilizer, weed control, etc. Infected trees may live and bear fruit for 3 or 4 years, but they often die much more quickly.

Bacterial spot and Coryneum blight commonly damage leaves, and sometimes fruit of stone fruit trees in the spring and summer. We see them commonly as leaves are riddled with small holes (shot hole) and in severe cases trees are defoliated. Spraying now will not eliminate the diseases, but will help reduce their incidence next spring and summer.

Leaf curl is a very noticeable disease, especially on peaches, but damage here is usually not severe. Infection is noted in the spring with extremely mis-shapen and crinkled leaves. Leaf curl is caused by a fungus that quits once temperatures begin to get hot in the spring. The disease is worst following a cool, damp March, but spraying now is usually sufficient to prevent it from becoming bad enough to cause heavy defoliation next spring.

Teen Marriages Vulnerable

When teens marry, they are two or three times more likely to divorce than people who wait until they are older. Why?

According to family life researchers, one cause of failure is that teens often marry for the wrong reasons. They may think their spouse will be perfect, fulfilling all their needs, like the husbands or wives on television and movies.

When a partner doesn't live up to unrealistic expectations, the teenager begins to look elsewhere for answers for relationships and unfaithfulness often results.

Teen couples may be plagued with money problems because they have only enough education and training to hold down entry-level jobs.

When the couple lives with parents because they can't afford a place of their own, bonding together and becoming financially and emotionally independent is more difficult. Often it's easier to turn to a parent for consolation or financial help rather than work things out as a couple.

Married teens may also feel they've lost their freedom, are being suffocated by their mate's possessiveness or have been cheated of the fun things in young adulthood.

Teen couples need to communicate. But if they didn't have good communication with their parents, they may have little practice sharing feelings, controlling outbursts and taking on new roles.

Not every teenage marriage fails. A willingness to adjust to a new lifestyle, a commitment to staying married and working hard at the marriage can provide a strong foundation for any marriage.

Orienteering: Great Fun Outdoors

More and more Americans are discovering that orienteering, a hiking sport that involves map reading and using a compass is a great way to enjoy the outdoors.



If you can read a map you might enjoy a hiking sport called orienteering.

Here's how it works: Hikers compete over an established cross-country course. With a map and a compass they must locate checkpoints scattered throughout the course. The person who finds all the checkpoints first is the winner.

Happily, you don't even need a competition to enjoy a hike in the woods to discover some of the picturesque natural and man-made features. All you need is a good topographic map and a strong pair of legs. A 7.5 minute map is usually best for hikes; point out experts at the U.S. Geological Survey. The scale on these is 1:24,000 and the map area is approximately 49 to 70 square miles.

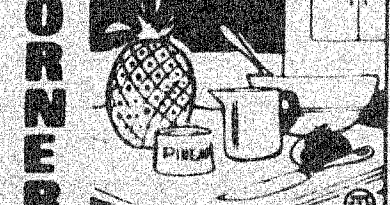

A Look At The Proposed Amendments

Amendment No. 1 is worded as follows: "The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining and policing public roadways."

This proposal, enacted by the 70th Legislature, Second Called Session, would amend Article VIII of the Texas Constitution to add Section 7-b. Texas voters adopted Section 7-a of Article VIII in 1946, which dedicates proceeds from motor vehicle registration fees and taxes on motor fuels and lubricants for the purposes of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways. This dedication, however, does not apply to taxes on the production of motor fuels or lubricants nor to property taxes on real estate used for the production. Additionally, one-fourth of the proceeds from motor fuel taxes are alternatively dedicated to the support of public schools.

The result of the vehicle registration and motor fuel tax deduction has been the consistent availability of State money to finance the construction, maintenance and improvement of the State highway system. Under the federal program of aid for public highways, states are required to pay almost all costs of planning, land acquisition, and construction on a highway project. If a project meets Federal aid specifications, the state is then reimbursed from Federal money for a major portion of its expenses (usually 90 percent of all costs of an interstate highway). The reimbursements have traditionally been used in Texas to replenish the dedicated pool of State money.

The fiscal crisis in Texas of 1986 and 1987 resulted in inquiries as to whether the Federal reimbursements could be used for purposes other than highways and policing of highways. Sources in the Federal government were divided in their opinion of permissible uses under the Federal law. Also, it is not certain whether the dedication of Article VIII, Section 7-a, of the Texas Constitution would be interpreted to incorporate Federal expense reimbursements.

The Texas General Appropriations Act estimates the amounts of Federal highway aid, most of which is Federal reimbursements, to be received in the most recent and current fiscal years to exceed \$900 million in each of those years.

Supporters of this proposal feel the Texas highway system is one to be proud of and is should continue to be financed as it is currently. It is suggested that population growth may result in a greater demand for new transportation facilities and require additional maintenance and improvements on existing ones. Those favoring adoption of this proposed amendment state that if Federal reimbursements of State highway expenditures are not required to be dedicated to highways, the dedicated State money could be spent each year, and the availability of unrestricted money would not be known from one fiscal biennium to another, affecting the process of planning transportation projects which require long-range budgeting.

Arguments opposing adoption of this proposal include the concern that the Legislature would be restricted in its ability to set fiscal priorities based on the needs of the State for each biennium. It should be understood that constitutional dedications of money to no guarantee that the money will be appropriated for the designated purpose; rather, they only prevent it from being used for any other purposes. Further, it is argued that the Federal government typically restricts the use of money it grants or rebates to the states; and, if the Federal government does not restrict a state's use of Federal highway money, that state should have the authority to leave it unrestricted.

Amendment No. 2 will be worded as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

This proposal would amend Article III of the Texas Constitution. It proposes the establishment of a "rainy day" fund in the State treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue. State's general revenues. The fund would consist of:

—50 percent of any unencumbered and unused general revenue remaining from the previous fiscal biennium;

—75 percent of any amount of State revenues from oil or gas production taxes that is in excess of the amount received in the 1987 fiscal year;

—interest and investment income credited to the fund; and

—additional amounts as appropriated to the fund by the Legislature.

The proposed Constitutional Amendment would authorize the Comptroller of Texas to adjust the amounts transferred into the fund so that the total fund amount in each biennium would not exceed 10 percent of all amounts that were deposited into the general revenue fund in the preceding biennium, excluding investment and interest income and amounts borrowed from other funds. Amounts borrowed from the Economic Stabilization Fund to avert a deficiency in general revenues would be returned to the fund from that source. In addition, the Legislature could appropriate money from the Economic Stabilization Fund for other purposes in certain circumstances and by votes of extraordinary majorities; specifically, it would require a three-fifths majority to appropriate money to overcome budget deficits arising during a current biennium and also to appropriate money from the Fund to cover a deficit for a succeeding biennium if the Comptroller estimated State revenues then would be less than those for the current biennium. To use money from this Fund for any other purpose would require a two-thirds majority vote in each House of the Legislature.

The Texas economy has been suffering and this has affected the available revenues which must be relied on to fund the critically important areas of the State budget. The Texas Constitution prohibits incurring State debt in Article III, Section 49; however, the State has experienced frequent deficits through its history. In 1942, Texas voters added Section 49a to the Texas Constitution requiring that appropriations for a given fiscal biennium (two years) be limited to amounts certified by the State Comptroller as within expected, available State revenues for that biennium. Although the intent of this amendment was to insure a "pay as you go" budget policy, it did not solve the repeated problem of cash deficiencies when State revenues were less than expected.

The progressive decline of the State's oil-based economy added to the continuing funding problems by bringing large, unforeseen deficiencies in the 1986-87 fiscal biennium. Because cash reserves in the general revenue fund fell below the amount that had been estimated by the Comptroller in 1985, the appropriations enacted by the 69th Legislature in 1985 could not be met. To avert such a shortage, Governor Clements called a Third Special Session, and the Texas Legislature enacted a new appropriations bill for the remainder of the biennium. It was necessary to pass this bill with lower funding amounts for programs which had been authorized to receive higher amounts of funding, creating financial hardships for many State agencies and programs.

This proposal is an effort to create a cash reserve for the State in case actual revenues received by the State for a biennium are less than the amount previously anticipated by the Comptroller.

Those supporting the creation of this type of fund say it would have the effect of an enforced savings plan by requiring the State to put aside specific revenue amounts against unexpected shortages. The Fund would allow the State government to act with more fiscal responsibility, and in times of economic uncertainty, provide a financial cushion against unexpected declines in revenue.

Further, supporters say that it is not possible to predict with absolute certainty what the State's economic condition will be two years in the future. An unanticipated revenue shortage is not covered by the intent of Section 49a, which provides for a "pay as you go" financial philosophy. An Economic Stabilization Fund would provide a cushion in the event that the Comptroller overestimates the State's future income and cash revenues cannot fulfill the designated appropriations provisions.

Those against this proposal say that it is too late to rely on such a fund to solve the State's financial problems. They state that it is probable no unencumbered funds would remain at the close of a fiscal biennium in the event of a major or prolonged recession, and that revenues from oil and gas production taxes would not increase. In such a case, there would not be any money in such a fund to help avert a revenue shortage unless the Texas Legislature appropriated money to the Economic Stabilization Fund.

Another argument against this proposal is that the Legislature needs more flexibility to make appropriations from a declining budget. Diverting money from general revenue to such a fund would reduce the amount that may be appropriated by the Legislature in the usual manner. Some feel an economic stabilization fund should be taken from money not otherwise available for general appropriations, such as funds which are dedicated for special purposes.

Amendment No. 3 is worded as follows: "The constitutional

amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

This proposal adds Section 70 to Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, and creates the Texas Growth Fund to be a source of investments, including venture capital investments, for Texas businesses. It also adds Section 11b to Article VII of the Texas Constitution authorizing money in the Permanent University Fund to be invested in any prudent investment, including the Texas Growth Fund, and adds Subsection (d) to Section 5 of that article, making the same authorization for money in the Permanent School Fund.

Due to the decline in the Texas economy, opportunities for persons to start new businesses or expand existing businesses have been limited. This proposed Amendment seeks to provide alternate sources of

capital through the creation of a Texas Growth Fund, which would provide a source of money from which businesses could receive financing.

The money in this Fund would come from investments made by the governing boards of the Permanent University Fund, the Permanent School Fund, the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and any other pension system created by State law. Not more than one percent, or \$285 million, of the value of the assets of any of these funds may be placed in the Texas Growth Fund. The Fund would be managed by a board of directors consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one representative each from: The University of Texas System Board of Regents; The Texas A&M University System Board of Regents; The Texas Teacher Retirement System Board of Trustees; The Texas Employees Retirement System Board of Trustees; and The State Board of Education.

This board of directors would oversee investment of the Fund money in investments related to creating, retaining, or expanding employment opportunity and economic growth in Texas. Not more than 10 percent of the investment could be venture capital investments; and at least 75 percent of those investments must be matched at least equally by investments from sources other than the Texas Growth Fund. The remainder of the Fund may be invested in more conventional investments in businesses in the State. The board of trustees may not invest money from the Texas Growth Fund in business unless the business has submitted an affidavit disclosing whether the business has any direct financial investment in or with South Africa or Namibia.

Profits from such investments are to be distributed on a quarterly basis to the funds and systems that invested in the Texas Growth Fund in proportion to the amount of their investments. The Texas Growth Fund

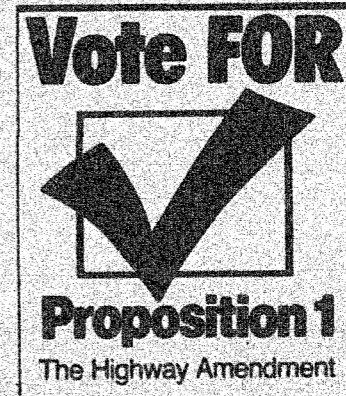

A Look At The Proposed Amendments

Amendment No. 1 is worded as follows: "The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining and policing public roadways."

This proposal, enacted by the 70th Legislature, Second Called Session, would amend Article VIII of the Texas Constitution to add Section 7-b. Texas voters adopted Section 7-a of Article VIII in 1946, which dedicates proceeds from motor vehicle registration fees and taxes on motor fuels and lubricants for the purposes of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways. This dedication, however, does not apply to taxes on the production of motor fuels or lubricants nor to property taxes on real estate used for the production. Additionally, one-fourth of the proceeds from motor fuel taxes are alternatively dedicated to the support of public schools.

The result of the vehicle registration and motor fuel tax dedication has been the consistent availability of State money to finance the construction, maintenance and improvement of the State highway system. Under the federal program of aid for public highways, states are required to pay almost all costs of planning, land acquisition, and construction on a highway project. If a project meets Federal aid specifications, the state is then reimbursed from Federal money for a major portion of its expenses (usually 90 percent of all costs of an interstate highway). The reimbursements have traditionally been used in Texas to replenish the dedicated pool of State money.

The fiscal crisis in Texas of 1986 and 1987 resulted in inquiries as to whether the Federal reimbursements could be used for purposes other than highways and policing of highways. Sources in the Federal government were divided in their opinion of permissible uses under the Federal law. Also, it is not certain whether the dedication of Article VIII, Section 7-a, of the Texas Constitution would be interpreted to incorporate Federal expense reimbursements.

The Texas General Appropriations Act estimates the amounts of Federal highway aid, most of which is Federal reimbursements, to be received in the most recent and current fiscal years to exceed \$900 million in each of those years.

Supporters of this proposal feel the Texas highway system is one to be proud of and is should continue to be financed as it is currently. It is suggested that population growth may result in a greater demand for new transportation facilities and require additional maintenance and improvements on existing ones. Those favoring adoption of this proposed amendment state that if Federal reimbursements of State highway expenditures are not required to be dedicated to highways, the dedicated State money could be spent each year, and the availability of unrestricted money would not be known from one fiscal biennium to another, affecting the process of planning transportation projects which require long-range budgeting.

Arguments opposing adoption of this proposal include the concern that the Legislature would be restricted in its ability to set fiscal priorities based on the needs of the State for each biennium. It should be understood that constitutional dedications of money to no guarantee that the money will be appropriated for the designated purpose; rather, they only prevent it from being used for any other purposes. Further, it is argued that the Federal government typically restricts the use of money it grants or rebates to the states; and, if the Federal government does not restrict a state's use of Federal highway money, that state should have the authority to leave it unrestricted.

Amendment No. 2 will be worded as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

This proposal would amend Article III of the Texas Constitution. It proposes the establishment of a "rainy day" fund in the State treasury to be called the Economic Stabilization Fund and to be used primarily to prevent or eliminate temporary cash deficiencies in the

State's general revenues. The fund would consist of:

—50 percent of any unencumbered and unused general revenue remaining from the previous fiscal biennium;

—75 percent of any amount of State revenues from oil or gas production taxes that is in excess of the amount received in the 1987 fiscal year;

—interest and investment income credited to the fund; and

—additional amounts as appropriated to the fund by the Legislature.

The proposed Constitutional Amendment would authorize the Comptroller of Texas to adjust the amounts transferred into the fund so that the total fund amount in each biennium would not exceed 10 percent of all amounts that were deposited into the general revenue fund in the preceding biennium, excluding investment and interest income and amounts borrowed from other funds. Amounts borrowed from the Economic Stabilization Fund to avert a deficiency in general revenues would be returned to the fund from that source. In addition, the Legislature could appropriate money from the Economic Stabilization Fund for other purposes in certain circumstances and by votes of extraordinary majorities; specifically, it would require a three-fifths majority to appropriate money to overcome budget deficits arising during a current biennium and also to appropriate money from the Fund to cover a deficit for a succeeding biennium if the Comptroller estimated State revenues then would be less than those for the current biennium. To use money from this Fund for any other purpose would require a two-thirds majority vote in each House of the Legislature.

The Texas economy has been suffering and this has affected the available revenues which must be relied on to fund the critically important areas of the State budget. The Texas Constitution prohibits incurring State debt in Article III, Section 49; however, the State has experienced frequent deficits through its history. In 1942, Texas voters added Section 49a to the Texas Constitution requiring that appropriations for a given fiscal biennium (two years) be limited to amounts certified by the State Comptroller as within expected, available State revenues for that biennium. Although the intent of this amendment was to insure a "pay as you go" budget policy, it did not solve the repeated problem of cash deficiencies when State revenues were less than expected.

The progressive decline of the State's oil-based economy added to the continuing funding problems by bringing large, unforeseen deficiencies in the 1986-87 fiscal biennium. Because cash reserves in the general revenue fund fell below the amount that had been estimated by the Comptroller in 1985, the appropriations enacted by the 69th Legislature in 1985 could not be met. To avert such a shortage, Governor Clements called a Third Special Session, and the Texas Legislature enacted a new appropriations bill for the remainder of the biennium. It was necessary to pass this bill with lower funding amounts for programs which had been authorized to receive higher amounts of funding, creating financial hardships for many State agencies and programs.

This proposal is an effort to create a cash reserve for the State in case actual revenues received by the State for a biennium are less than the amount previously anticipated by the Comptroller.

Those supporting the creation of this type of fund say it would have the effect of an enforced savings plan by requiring the State to put aside specific revenue amounts against unexpected shortages. The Fund would allow the State government to act with more fiscal responsibility, and in times of economic uncertainty, provide a financial cushion against unexpected declines in revenue.

Further, supporters say that it is not possible to predict with absolute certainty what the State's economic condition will be two years in the future. An unanticipated revenue shortage is not covered by the intent of Section 49a, which provides for a "pay as you go" financial philosophy. An Economic Stabilization Fund would provide a cushion in the event that the Comptroller overestimates the State's future income and cash revenues cannot fulfill the designated appropriations provisions.

Those against this proposal say that it is too late to rely on such a fund to solve the State's financial problems. They state that it is probable no unencumbered funds would remain at the close of a fiscal biennium in the event of a major or prolonged recession, and that revenues from oil and gas production taxes would not increase. In such a case, there would not be any money in such a fund to help avert a revenue shortage unless the Texas Legislature appropriated money to the Economic Stabilization Fund.

Another argument against this proposal is that the Legislature needs more flexibility to make appropriations from a declining budget. Diverting money from general revenue to such a fund would reduce the amount that may be appropriated by the Legislature in the usual manner. Some feel an economic stabilization fund should be taken from money not otherwise available for general appropriations, such as funds which are dedicated for special purposes.

Amendment No. 3 is worded as follows: "The constitutional

amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

This proposal adds Section 70 to Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, and creates the Texas Growth Fund to be a source of investments, including venture capital investments, for Texas businesses. It also adds Section 11b to Article VII of the Texas Constitution authorizing money in the Permanent University Fund to be invested in any prudent investment, including the Texas Growth Fund, and adds Subsection (d) to Section 5 of that article, making the same authorization for money in the Permanent School Fund.

Due to the decline in the Texas economy, opportunities for persons to start new businesses or expand existing businesses have been limited. This proposed Amendment seeks to provide alternate sources of

capital through the creation of a Texas Growth Fund, which would provide a source of money from which businesses could receive financing.

The money in this Fund would come from investments made by the governing boards of the Permanent University Fund, the Permanent School Fund, the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and any other pension system created by State law. Not more than one percent, or \$285 million, of the value of the assets of any of these funds may be placed in the Texas Growth Fund. The Fund would be managed by a board of directors consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one representative each from: The University of Texas System Board of Regents; The Texas A&M University System Board of Regents; The Texas Teacher Retirement System Board of Trustees; The Texas Employees Retirement System Board of Trustees; and The State Board of Education.

This board of directors would oversee investment of the Fund money in investments related to creating, retaining, or expanding employment opportunity and economic growth in Texas. Not more than 10 percent of the investment could be venture capital investments; and at least 75 percent of those investments must be matched at least equally by investments from sources other than the Texas Growth Fund. The remainder of the Fund may be invested in more conventional investments in businesses in the State. The board of trustees may not invest money from the Texas Growth Fund in business unless the business has submitted an affidavit disclosing whether the business has any direct financial investment in or with South Africa or Namibia.

Profits from such investments are to be distributed on a quarterly basis to the funds and systems that invested in the Texas Growth Fund in proportion to the amount of their investments. The Texas Growth Fund

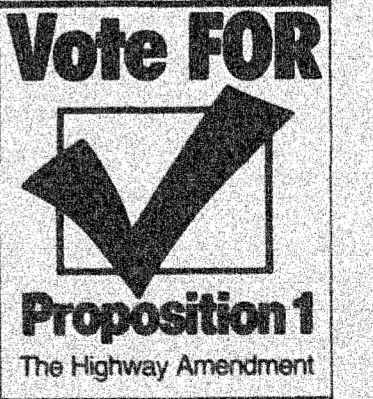

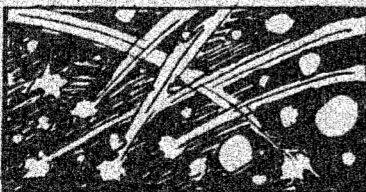

is to be phased out 10 years after its creation. However, at the regular legislative session next preceding the 10th anniversary of adoption of this Amendment, the Texas Legis-

lature, by two-thirds vote of each House, may create the Texas Growth Fund II to operate in the same manner for an additional 10 year period.

Supporters feel the State is obligated to its citizens to prevent the loss of new products and methods due to a lack of available financing. Such a fund could en-

courage an increase in the number of businesses in Texas, resulting in decreased unemployment and increased State tax revenue. Further, those supporting the Texas Growth Fund see this as a means to diversify the State's business economy.

Opponents state that it is not a function of State government to finance private business. The Texas Constitution now limits investments of the Permanent School Fund and the Permanent University Fund.

This Amendment would remove all Constitutional and statutory restrictions and allow the trustees to make any investments they choose, subject only to the "prudent person" standard. Opponents also feel that the money held by the State for the benefit of its students and retired employees should be protected and not used for risky investments.

Texas A&M researcher says drug addicts have long-term abstinence

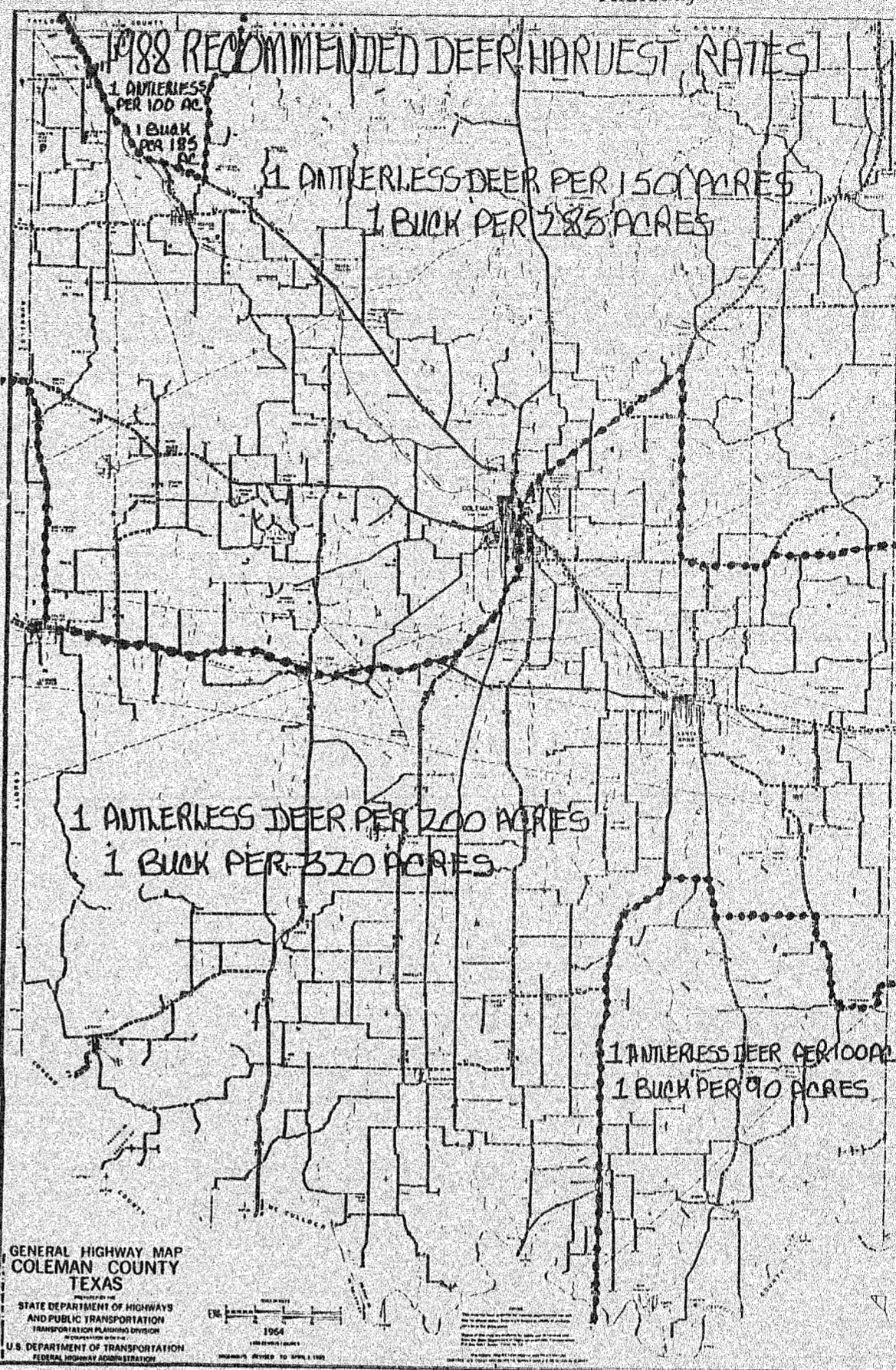
COLLEGE STATION — Drug relapse among addicts equates to failure in the minds of most people, but a 12-year study of heroin addicts shows that many addicts achieve long-term drug abstinence after an average of six episodes of treatment for addiction relapse.

Dr. Dwayne Simpson, head of the Behavioral Research Program at Texas A&M University, found that 25 percent of the 490-person sample never relapsed to daily heroin use during the 12-year follow-up periods, while 65 percent quit for a month or longer and then relapsed to daily use one or more times.

"I think the message here is positive because it is commonly believed there is no hope for addicts," Simpson said. "You have to understand that some of these people have drug addiction careers of as much as 35 years."

Simpson found lower rates of arrests and incarcerations, as well as higher rates of employment, were tied to increased resistance to relapse.

Drug abuse treatment over time was seen as significant in the overall recovery process. Two-thirds of the drug abusers who quit did so while in a drug abuse treatment program.



Deer & Turkey Season Begins Sat.

With the opening of deer and turkey hunting season on Saturday, November 5th, Don Davis,

Biologist for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department would like to remind landowners and hunters that no antlerless deer permits will be required for the taking of antlerless deer in Coleman County during the 1988-89 regular deer season.

The regular season begins Saturday, November 5th for the taking of white-tailed deer in Coleman County and runs through

January 1, 1989 with a bag limit of four deer, either sex but with a limit of no more than 2 bucks.

Deer populations vary from area to area and from ranch to ranch. The either-sex regulation allows the landowner flexibility to harvest deer on his property at the proper rate. It does not automatically mean that a heavy harvest of antlerless deer is needed. The recommended harvest rates of both antlerless deer and bucks, as provided by the Department, should be used only as

a general guideline for harvesting deer in Coleman County. Please notice that, in most cases, the department recommends more antlerless deer to be harvested than bucks.

Recommended harvest rates for both antlerless deer and bucks based on recently completed population surveys conducted in Coleman County is indicated on the County Map (see map).
