## City Fathers Have A Look At 911 Emergency Service

Mayor Brooker called the council meeting to order last Thursday with the following city officials present: Quinton Daniel, Derriel Warnock, Susie Voss, Alex DeLeon, Laura Thornton, Rusty Wells, Ken Brixey, Max Eubank, and Alys. Pelton, Several interested citizens were also on hand for the meeting.

The minutes of the last month's meeting were approved with the changing of one financial figure. Seems the damage done to the pipe at the sewer farm was \$390 rather than \$300.

Collier Watson was not present to review the audit ending in March, as had been planned, so the group moved along to other business, including the opening of bids for a lot that had been advertised for sale. Two bids were received but both were rejected. Clint Day had bid \$501 and Edd Hartman had bid \$400 on the lot which is adjacent to Hartman's home.

The Council approved Texas Municipal League Retirement System Ordinances. Council members had had an opportunity to review the ordinances before hand.

A discussion was held on the

possibility of a 911 service in Santa Anna. A resolution sent to the City by the West Texas Council of Governments to start 911 service, estimated the cost at 50 cents per phone access line. The proposed service would not be put into service until 1989, if the plan is approved, Councilman Quinton Daniel, a service manager for the Coleman County Telephone Co-op, felt that the cost would probably be more than the proposed amount.

City Administrator Max Eubank emphasized that the resolution does not bind the City to approving the 911 service, but simply states that they are interested in having the

November 17. "You may think you can't but you can" says talk show host Larry King. "My secret tip was a heart attack".

Some easier tips: Hide ashtrays, matches; stock up on sugarless gum or carrot sticks; ask a friend to quite, too. According to statistics in the

United States alone, 350,000 people die annually from diseases caused by tabacco use. That is the equivalent of a collision, with no survivors, of two jumbo jets every

Ninety percent of everyone who ever smokes starts the habit before the age of 20, according to statistics furnished by the office of the U.S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop. In Fact, 60% start before the

Although tobacco is still the major health problem in the United States, the battle against smoking can be won. The fight against tobacco use is still the number one public health problem in the U.S., if you talk about the number of people affected.

Surgeon General C.Everett Koop says that AIDS has taken our attention because of the great potential for death, but he places the comparison between the two major health problems in perspective by pointing out that tobacco kills as many Americans every month as have died of AIDS in the past seven years.

James Ford Assembly Of God


Psalms 95:2...."Let us come before His presence with thanksgiving, and make a joyful noise unto Him with psalms".

#### Gettysburg Address

It was 125 years ago, on Nov. 19, 1863, that President Abraham Lincoin delivered perhaps the most famous speech in American history. The occasion was the dedication of a national cemetery, on 17 acres of land near Gettysburg, Pa., where 43,000 men had been killed or wounded in a three-day battle four months earlier.

Newspapers of the day devoted most of their coverage of the ceremony to a two-hour speech given by a noted orator, Edward Everett. But it was the two-minute address by Abraham Lincoln that became famous throughout the world.

"Pour score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal," began the president.



The Friend of 4-H Award went to Simmons Feed and Seed of Santa Anna. This award is given to the business or individuals who show continuous support of the 4-H program.






#### **Eddie Odom** Talks To Local 4-H About Rattlesnakes



#### Learn To Use **Child Safety Belts Correctly**

COLLEGE STATION: Safety seats can save children from injury or death in automobile accidents, but only if they're used correctly.

Since passage of the Texas child safety seat law in 1984, public awareness of the need to use child safety seats has increased. However, studies conducted in urban areas during 1988 show that only half of Texas children under age four actually ride in safety restraints.

Concern that this use rate may be even lower in rural areas has prompted the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Department of Highways to initiate a year-long program in rural child passenger safety education.

"Extension agents and volunteers in about 85 rural counties will be conducting observational studies of child safety seat use over the next several months", said Dr. Peggy Owens, an extension home economist and the project supervisor.

"Since there is no data on whether rural residents are using child safety restraints, we hope to generate some benchmark information for measuring the effectiveness of educational programs", she

Owens said county extension programs throughout the state will also be offering educational programs on the selection and correct

use of child safety seats. According to Department of Highways figures, car accidents are the leading cause of death and serious injury for children. Infants under six months of age are at greatest risk of being killed in an accident.

The most common causes of death and injury to unrestrained children in auto accidents are being thrown into the dash or windshield, being thrown from the car or being crushed by the adult's weight while being held.

Car safety seats, when used correctly, reduce deaths more than 90 percent and serious injuries by almost 80 percent.

Owens said the most common mistakes that lead to misuse of child safety seats are as follows:

Not reading the instructions and installing the seat incorrectly. Incorrect installation may cause the seat to collapse or not function in an accident. When instructions are not provided with a used safety seat, you can write the manufacturer and obtain another set.

Non-use or misuse of tether straps which allows the safety seat Tether straps must be attached to the rear seat belt for front seat installation or to an anchor bracket installed behind the seat for rear seat installations. If you do not want to use a tether strap, do not select a seat that requires one.

·Seat belts routed through or around the seat improperly so the seat may tip over, fall apart or move too much even in normal driving.

•Facing an infant seat forward. Infants up to about 20 pounds must ride rear-facing so that crash forces can be distributed across their strong backs. Not using seat harnesses or

adjusting them too loosely, which

allows children to be ejected from



- The last half-inch adjustment to perfectly align your scope will move the group 21/2 inches.
- To determine the direction of the prevailing wind in a real buck hotspot you've just discovered, go to the best spot for a stand and look in the direction of the best deer trail. That is the direction the prevailing wind blows.
- When meeting a friend to hunt his area, the map he has drawn will omit at least one major crossroad and a critical right turn.
- If you have spent all season figuring out a trophy buck's pattern and have chosen the ideal stand, he will be killed on doe day by a firsttime hunter with a borrowed rifle from the stand you used at the beginning of the season.
- The chance of your hitting a 2-inch sapling at 100 yards is directly
- proportional to the size of the buck standing behind it. . You will not have to "go," unless you have forgotten the toilet
- If you drop your rifle, the sights will not be knocked out of alignment unless you are going to get a shot at the biggest buck you've ever seen the next morning.
- The squirrel that has played peacefully around your stand all morning will panic and loudly scold you as deer approach.
- If you want to see deer, light a eigarette, eat your lunch or take a nap—they will appear as if by magic. If you want to see a buck, get into a situation from which you can't possibly shoot.
- When you've killed a decent buck and have a pretty good story to go with it, there will be a bigger deer and a bigger lie waiting back at camp. Isl

The 1988 pecan harvest is underway and as usual, not all of the nuts look as good as we would like them to. Insects and drought are the major problems that limit quality. Disease and inferior varieties are also culprits in certain cases. Some of the common problems are discus-HOLES IN THE NUTS

These are made by "redheads" -

the larva of the pecan weevil. The weevil larva eat the pecan nutmeats during September and October and then bore a small (1/8" diameter) exit hole to escape to the ground to overwinter. They can be controlled by properly timed insecticide sprays. Pecan weevil are one of our worst pest problems but damage has been much lighter than usual this year.

PECAN SHUCK WON'T OPEN

The hickory shuckworm, a small white worm about 3/8" long, tunnels in the shuck and causes extensive damage to the shuck tissue. This can cause the shuck to remain tightly closed, or to only open partially if the damage is only at the base of the shuck. The shuck damage also results in poorly filled nutmeats. Properly timed insecticide sprays are essential for control. Destroy or plow under infested shucks to reduce the population of overwintering shuckworm larva.

A condition termed "sticktight" can also result in failure to the shuck to open. Sticktight shucks gradually blacken as the nut approaches maturity in August and September. Affected shucks do not open and the nuts are very difficult to shake from the tree. Nutmeats in sticktight pecans are poorly developed. Sticktights are associated with tree stress both drought and heat. Shuck disease is also a possibility, but no disease has ever been clearly linked to the disorder. Failure of shucks to open can also be caused by an early hard freeze that kills the shuck before it opens.

PECAN KERNELS ARE POORLY FILLED

Several factors can be involved in

Drought stress can be a major cause. Poor nutrition especially inadequate nitrogen and zinc fertilization also play a role. Insect damage such as the shuckworm damage described above can cause the kernel to fail to develop fully. Aphids sucking sap from pecan leaves during the summer and fall also rob nutrition and the black mold that grows on the "honeydew" secreted by the aphids blocks sunlight and thus photo-synthesis Any such problem that interferes with energy production by the trees will result in poor nut

Certain varieties also fill poor-.y. Large varieties like Mahan and Mohawk are notorious for poor kurnel development. Overbearing also can cause poor nutfill because of Dear Commissioner Nabers:

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97 percent 10 year survival

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in symptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease.) 


