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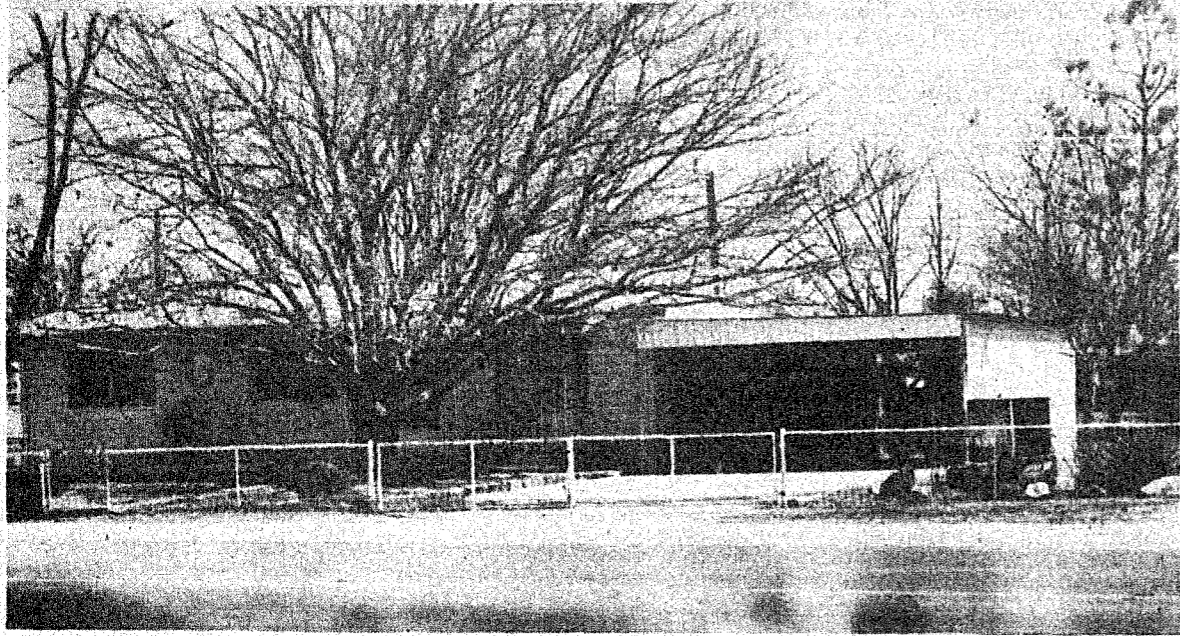

City Takes Action On 911 Resolution, Sets More Dump Ground Rates

The City Council took action on a resolution to show interest in 911 service and set additional rates for dumping at the landfill when they met last week. These items and others were on the agenda when Mayor Brooker called the meeting to order last Thursday evening at the Mountain City Center for its regular monthly meeting. All council members were present and several citizens were in attendance.

Before bids on pickups advertised for sale were opened, City Administrator Max Eubank made a recommendation for the council to reject all bids on the 72 Chev due to the fact that her believed it could possibly be put back into service for less cost than another, a 76 Dodge. He also stated the council

might think about putting the 76 Dodge up for bids.

Bids received on pickups advertised for sale by bid were as follows:

1974 Dodge Power Wagon: Doug Keeney, \$300; Wendell Rice, \$300; Herman Winslett, \$225; O.L. Burnett, \$100; Joe Baker, \$100; Charles Gross, \$75.

1974 Chev.: R.D. Cupps, \$375; Jody Patterson, \$300; Rod Musick Jr., \$200; Rod Musick Sr., \$176; Herman Winslett, \$175; Joe Baker \$100; and Charles Cross \$75.

1972 Chev.: Jody Patterson, \$500; Herman Winslett, \$200; and Joe Baker \$100.

The Council agreed to reject all bids on the 1972 Chev and to accept bids on the 1976 Dodge. They

accepted the bid from R.D. Cupps on the 1974 Chev. and a bid-off will take place between the two highest bidders on the 1974 Dodge Power Wagon. The men had turned in identical bids. Eubank was given authority to accept the highest bid on the vehicle.

Gary Patterson and Lewis Guthrie were appointed to two-year terms on the Housing Authority Board of Directors. Reappointed to the Library Board were Imogene Powers, Barbara Simmons, Jane Gustavus, Betty Key, and Alice Spillman.

The Santa Anna News has been advised by city hall that Craig Terry, former Santa Anna Policeman, has tossed his hat in the ring to run as a candidate for a place on the City Council.

Terry is employed at the local Allsup's convenience store. He was defeated in a bid for a council seat in last spring's election.

Incumbent Jim Spillman has filed to seek reelection to his place on the council. The other expiring term is that of Quinton Daniel, who has not made a public statement about his intentions for the election.

Mayor Thelma Brooker has not declared herself a candidate for reelection to her post. Former insurance woman and teacher, Gale Brock has announced she will seek the Mayor's position.

In the School Board election, the incumbents whose terms are expiring have all filed for reelection. They include Dickie Horner, Gary Absher, Bill Martin and Roddy Dean. At press time no others had indicated plans to run for those places.

Candidates have until March 22 to file in either election.

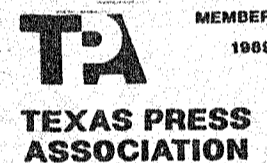

BORN AGAIN — JOHN 3:1-8

As we look at this scripture we see a man, Nicodemus, who was a ruler of the Jews. Even so, he still needed Jesus. He needed a born again experience in his heart. Many times, people think, when things are going good that they do not need Jesus. Jesus is for the whole man whether things are going good or bad. He can fill the void in the life of anyone that will let Him.

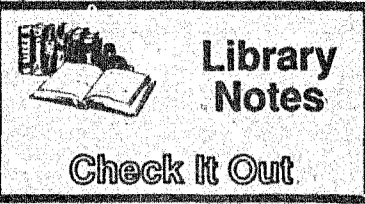

Proposed Project Would Save 3 Stacy Area Houses

Word has been received by the NEWS that local and area support is being secured in a project to preserve three historic houses in the Stacy Reservoir basin that have been listed in an Environmental Impact Statement. The houses would have to be moved to new locations. Houses included in the proposed project are the A.S. and Lem Cresell house, built about 1880, the Rich Coffey house, built around 1882, and the Mabel Day Ranch Headquarters house, built

about 1905. Mabel Day was known as the "Cattle Queen" of Texas. Project proponents point out that the three architectural styles exemplify a definite period of Texas history, associated with significant events and people who were important in the history of our area and Texas. All three of the houses are in the historic Trap Crossing on the western cattle trail to Dodge City.

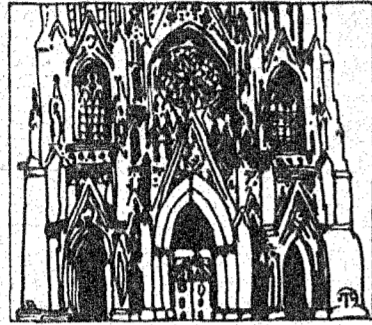
PTO Reports Book Fair A Successful Activity

Everyone is urged to welcome these volunteers and give generously to this worthy cause.

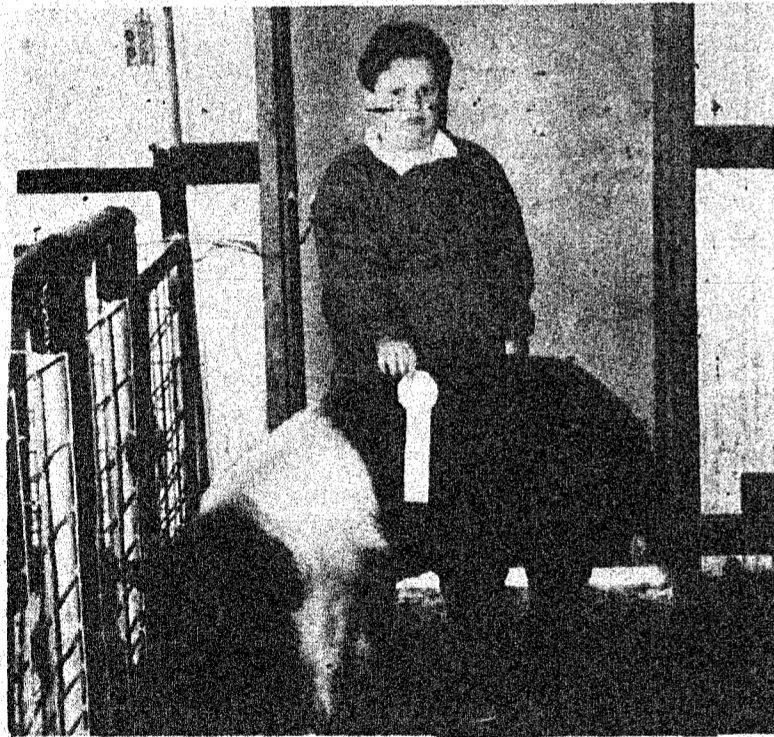
VFD Begins Annual Membership Drive

"Although consumers usually slow down their spending in January, this is a good sign that the state's economic engine is running strong and steady," Bullock said.

March checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in January and reported to the Comptroller's office by February 21.

Santa Anna's tax rebate check was up 81% over the check received this time last year. However the payments received so far in 1989 are down from the payments received by this date in 1988.

State To Pay For Low-Income Texans Under Catastrophic Health Care Law

AUSTIN—About 35,000 low-income Texans may be eligible for payment of Medicare fees for federal catastrophic health care, according to Charles Stevenson, acting commissioner of the Texas Department of Human Services. "The department will pay Medicare premiums, deductibles and co-insurance fees on Medicare-covered services for persons who qualify for the special benefits," Stevenson said.

He said these criteria apply:

- Persons must be enrolled in Medicare Part A.
- Gross monthly income cannot exceed \$429 for a single person or \$568 for a couple.
- Countable resources may not exceed \$4,000 for an individual or \$6,000 for a couple.
- Persons must be at least age 65 or declared disabled by the Social Security Administration. "Texas residents who meet these criteria should contact their local Department of Human Services office to explore eligibility as a Qualified Medicare Beneficiary," Stevenson said.

The federal catastrophic health care law requires the state to establish Medicaid coverage for individuals who are eligible for Medicare Part A, have incomes up to 85 percent of the federal poverty level and have resources no more than twice the limits for the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program.

He tells us that in those times you could get a leather half-sole job done for \$3.35 to \$3.85. Hand made boots back then, in the 40's and 50's, would cost you \$35 to \$85, and they were all leather! Phillips closed the shop in 1958 and sold the equipment. He was the last person to operate a shoe repair in Santa Anna. After closing the business, Phillips worked for a while at the Inlow Shoe Repair Shop in Brownwood before retiring.

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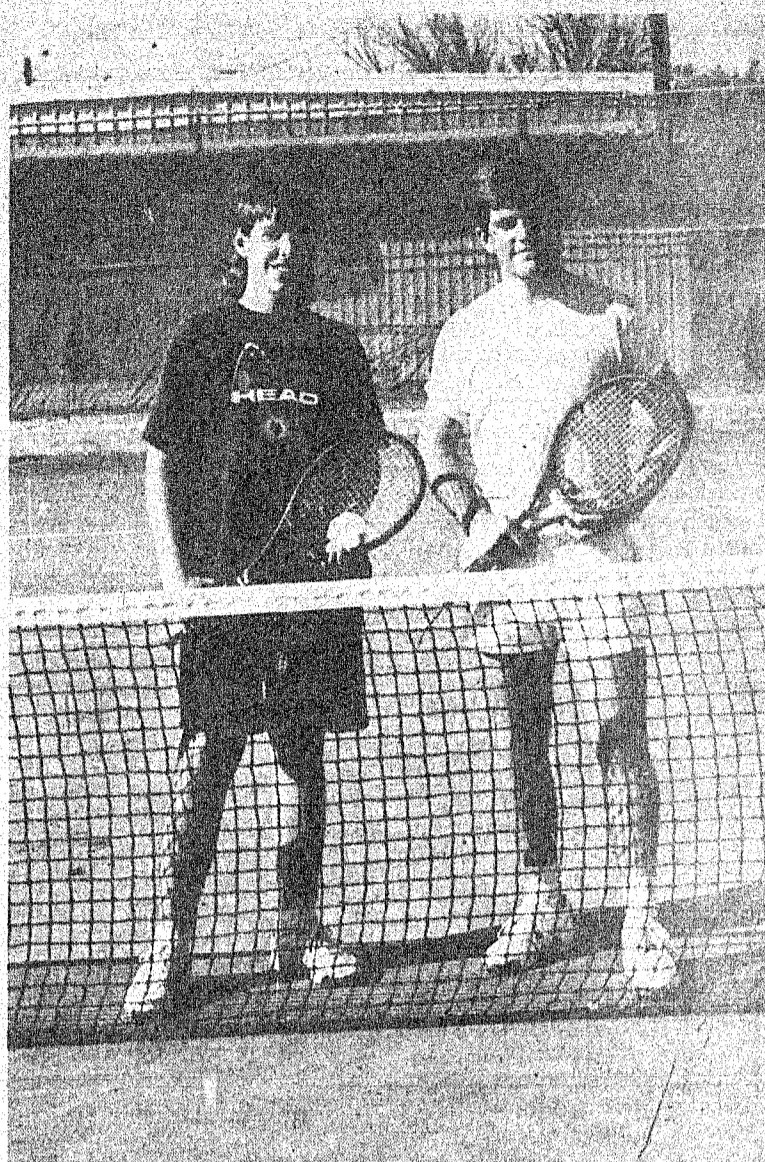
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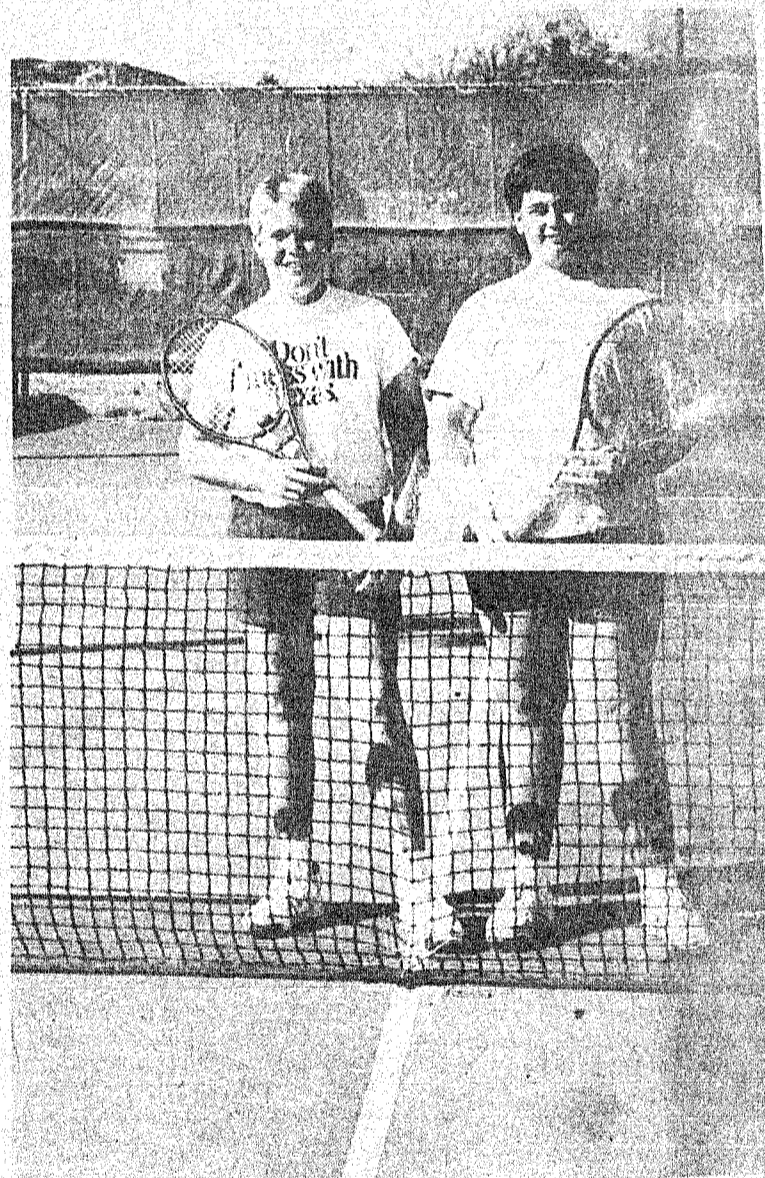
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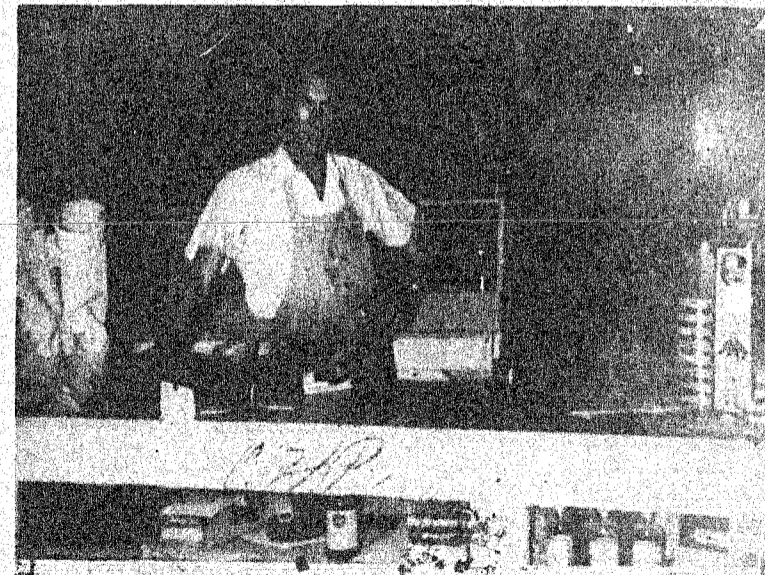
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SAHS Track Teams Open Season At Cross Plains

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Following are representative questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office.)

Q — My firm has a contract to provide services to the Veterans Administration. Is the contract still binding after March 15, 1989, when the VA becomes the Department of Veterans Affairs?

A — Yes. The legislation making VA a cabinet department contains what is called a "savings provision" which insures the continued validity of all legal documents concerning the Veterans Administration.

Q — Are the proceeds from National Service Life Insurance considered as income from VA's Improved Pension?

A — Yes, under the current pension program, proceeds are considered as income.

Q — I am interested in purchasing a motor home. Can I use my VA home loan guaranty?

A — No. Motor homes are not included in the VA Loan Guaranty Program.

PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS— RENDER YOUR PROPERTY

A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1989. The form is available at your local appraisal district or you may draft a similar form.

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income—such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

The advantages of filing a rendition:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district places a higher value on

your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a report of decreased value, to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation to your property in 1988. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1989.

The deadline for 1989 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.

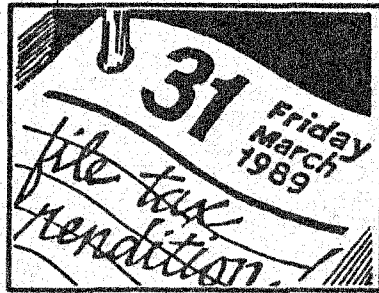

DECLARACION PARA IMPUESTOS SOBRE LA PROPIEDAD



LE AYUDA A PROTEGER SUS DERECHOS COMO CONTRIBUYENTE

Una declaración (rendition) es un reporte al distrito de valoración que enumera todas las pertenencias que usted tiene o controla a partir del primero de enero de 1989 sobre las cuales se pueden cobrar impuestos.

Usted debe presentar una declaración si es dueño de bienes muebles tangibles (tangible personal property) que son usados para producir ingresos—tales como la maquinaria y otro equipo usado por una empresa. El distrito de valoración puede exigir a cualquier contribuyente que entregue una declaración notificándole por escrito y enviándole un formulario para hacer su declaración.

Las ventajas de presentar una declaración:

- Usted puede dar su opinión del valor de su propiedad. Si el distrito de

valoración impone un valor más alto sobre su propiedad le debe de notificar por escrito de ese valor más alto y le debe de explicar como puede protestarlo ante la junta de revisión de valoración.

- Usted registra su dirección correcta para que sus cuentas de impuestos sean enviadas a la dirección correcta. Si su cuenta es enviada a una dirección incorrecta, la ley aún lo hace responsable de que pague sus impuestos a tiempo o que pague cargos extra por hacer pagos tardíos.
- Entregando un tipo especial de declaración llamado *reporte de valor decreciente*, usted puede notificar al distrito de valoración de daños graves que le ocurrieron a su propiedad en 1988. El distrito envía a alguien para que verifique los daños y se tome en cuenta para cuando se le asigne valor a su propiedad para 1989.

Presente su declaración en las oficinas de su distrito de valoración local en la dirección citada abajo. Ahí encontrará los formularios que usted necesita.

El plazo para presentar su declaración para 1989 es el 31 de marzo. Usted puede recibir 30 días adicionales si lo pide por escrito antes del 31 de marzo.

AGRICULTURAL MILESTONES

RELATIVELY FEW PEOPLE know that the Cooperative Extension Service originated in Texas.

It started in 1903 with a unique farm demonstration initiated in North East Texas near Terrell, in Kaufman County.

Dr. Seaman A. Knapp, special agent with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, established a demonstration on the Walter C. Porter farm to show how the cotton boll weevil could be controlled by following certain scientifically-designed practices.

The demonstration was so successful that additional "demonstration agents" were employed, first in counties along railroads, and later in all parts of Texas.

The Porter farm was designated a REGISTERED NATIONAL HISTORICAL LANDMARK on May 5, 1965, by the National Park Service of the Department of the Interior, as the place of origin of the Cooperative Extension Service.

Several other "firsts" were established in this same period. W.C. Stallings was the first county agent to serve a single county. He was employed by Smith County in 1906 and was headquartered at Tyler, Texas.

Another Texas heritage in Extension was made in 1908 when County Agent Tom Marks of Jack County organized a "Boys Corn Club," the forerunner of today's 4-H Clubs. In 1912, Mrs. Edna W. Serrig was appointed the first county home demonstration agent, serving in Milam County with headquarters at Cameron. She worked with girls in Tomato Clubs, another forerunner of 4-H Clubs of today.

On May 8, 1914, the U.S. Congress passed the Smith-Lever Act, which provided for the establishment of a "Cooperative Extension Service in Agriculture, Home Economics, and Related Subjects" as a part of the Land-Grant University System in each state and territory of the nation.

The Texas Legislature on Jan. 29, 1915, accepted provisions of the Smith-Lever Act, and the new agency was assigned to Texas A&M for administration.

Scientists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station must have breathed a sigh of relief. The director mentioned in an annual report that the Station's correspondence with the public was about 50,000 hand-written letters each year.

After some discussion on employee insurance, the matter was tabled until it could be looked into further.

Due to the fact that some area dump grounds have been closed, the council set a rate scale for non-residents of Santa Anna to dump at the City landfill. The rate is as follows: 1/2 ton pickup or trailer—\$2.00. 3/4 ton pickup or trailer—\$4.00. Truck (Five Yards) —\$10.00. Truck and trailer —\$20.00. Other garbage handlers—\$25.00.

Dead animals:
Horses and cows —\$30.00.
Calves, sheep, hogs, goats—\$10.00.
Dogs, cats, and other small animals —\$5.00.

Any resident of Santa Anna may dump at the landfill without a charge by showing a current water bill.

The Council reviewed some more of the City Code Book and accepted the sections in question. An ordinance was then read adopting the Code Book in its entirety. The ordinance was adopted.

On the question of 911 service to

the city of Santa Anna, it was observed that the County has already adopted a resolution showing interest in the service, so it seemed odd fitting that the City do the same. There had been a question raised at a previous meeting concerning a surcharge on telephone bills. Councilman Quinton Daniel, who is employed with Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, had looked into the matter and found the charge would only be on intrastate long distance calls and would amount to one half of one percent. (The surcharge for a \$30 intrastate bill would amount to 15¢). The resolution to express interest in the service was adopted.

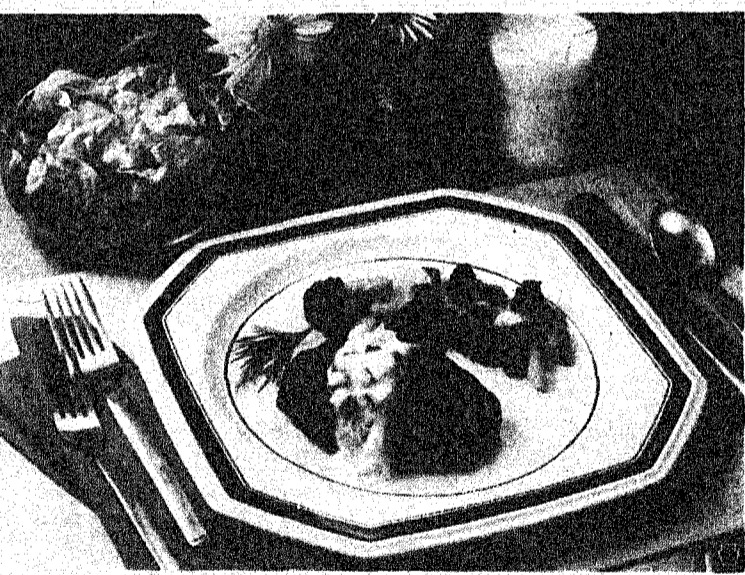

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THERE IS NO SUCH THING AS A FREE PRESS

ONCE UPON A TIME IN TEXAS, there lived a newspaper that reported all kinds of things, from weddings to obituaries to local needs and needs, to clubs and church news, to water and power to local elections. Just the cost of keeping its doors open increased to \$526 per day for every 2,500 circulation.* The newspaper was forced to reduce its staff a bit, along with some of its local coverage because the dollars just don't have the same reach as prior years.

BUT THE NEWSPAPER (every newspaper) kept plugging along, attending countless local meetings and events. And its staff worked long hours to find ways to produce a better newspaper for the town, and to provide business with a valuable means of selling their goods and services, and informing readers about everything from government to fashions and foods.

TEXAS NEWSPAPERS are always plugging, because they enjoy exercising "Freedom of the Press." But please understand, this freedom doesn't come cheaply. It costs lots of dollars to keep it going. THIS newspaper intends to continue to support this community in every way it can, but in turn it needs your support.

SYMPTOMS OF CIRCULATION PROBLEM

When the arteries narrow, they are incapable of delivering an adequate supply of blood to the feet. Depending upon where the blockage is, this could affect the circulation to either one or both feet.

The first symptom of the narrowing is a cramping or aching that is experienced on exertion. This is caused by the artery's inability to deliver enough oxygen to sustain the active tissues. The pain normally disappears within a few minutes when the foot is put to rest.

As the condition worsens, pain is felt in the foot and leg even when the patient is at rest... especially when lying down with the leg in a horizontal or slightly elevated position. At this point, it is no longer taking advantage of gravity to help the blood pump through the blockage. It is not unusual for pain to jar the patient awake in the middle of the night and force him to sit with his feet hanging over the bed until some semblance of circulation returns. This is a serious condition and should be examined by your podiatrist.

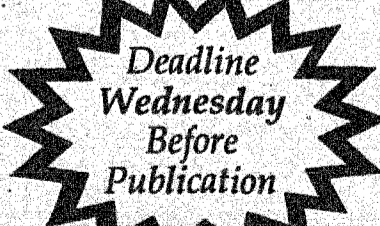

SYMPTOMS OF CIRCULATION PROBLEM

When the arteries narrow, they are incapable of delivering an adequate supply of blood to the feet. Depending upon where the blockage is, this could affect the circulation to either one or both feet. The first symptom of the narrowing is a cramping or aching that is experienced on exertion. This is caused by the artery's inability to deliver enough oxygen to sustain the active tissues. The pain normally disappears within a few minutes when the foot is put to rest. As the condition worsens, pain is felt in the foot and leg even when the patient is at rest... especially when lying down with the leg in a horizontal or slightly elevated position. At this point, it is no longer taking advantage of gravity to help the blood pump through the blockage. It is not unusual for pain to jar the patient awake in the middle of the night and force him to sit with his feet hanging over the bed until some semblance of circulation returns.
