The four places to be filled are for three, 3-year terms and one, 1-yearunexpired term. Dickie Horner, Gary Absher and Roddy Dean now hold the 3-year term seats and Bill Martin holds the place for the unexpired term, having been appointed when another board member moved from the school district. Fond Memories Of Santa Anna Me, A Restaurant Chef?

I was actually in business in Santa Anna, Texas in the year 1933

Many people may not recall the economic situation of that era but there was a depression existing. Because there were so few opportunities for young people tp go to college after high school, a lot of my friends were getting married. Especially where I lived at Dexter, New Mexico.

Shortly after my marriage, my sister Blanch and her family came to visit from Santa Anna.

My brother-in-law, Clebert Willis spent much of his time in pondering "What to do?" He was very good at coming through with ideas on how to remedy an ailing situation.

He, himself, was a candy salesman at that time and had routes which led him to Whon, Trickham, DeLeon and other places besides Santa Anna.

When Clebert saw that my new husband had no job or any prospect for one he thought it would be a good idea for us to return to Santa Anna with the Willis family.

At that time there were such things as marble machines gracing some of the restaurants and cafes. Of course, Clebert was abreast of any new gadget considered to add some substance to the family coffers.

There was a small cafe for rent, having gone out of business. I. think it was called The Blue Bonnet Cafe. Clebert began thinking how he could help my husband and me on the road to financial security and enhance his bank account at the same time. He rented the cafe.

My husband and I were to operate the cafe and Clebert was to have control of the marble machine. Blanch bought some material and hurriedly stitched up some uniforms. I think she selected pink for the uniforms and made the aprons of white Indian Head. Considering the fact that she was about as good a seamstress as I was a cook, I must admit the sewing held out much longer than the cooking.

The day of the opening of the Blue Bonnet Cafe arrived. Clebert was ecstatic as he took my husband Pat, and me, to our new business. I was praying fervently that no one came to eat as I had never cooked a meal in my life! My older sister, Whittie, who was still at home, did the cooking, or at least helped my mother. I got in on the dishwashing end of the meal preparation. But here I was! The chef at the Blue Bonnet Cafe. Clebert was exceedingly proud of the steam table. To me it looked like a huge monster, ready to devour me at any moment! Clebert had planned the first day's menu. Fortunately it was made up of his favorite food because he had to eat most of it. My prayers were answered that first day in business. Not one customer came through the door! Clebert stopped in several times. As Pat had mixed up a huge bowl of

Coming from a farm family who had bacon and eggs, biscuits, and oatmeal for breakfast, I was overwhelmed at what this man ordered.

When I asked him what he wanted, he said, "Sliced tomatoes". I couldn't believe it. It seemed so outlandish to me that I figured there must be something unusual that I did not know about sliced tomatoes. I certainly meant to find out, so I said to the customer, "Well, how do you fix THAT?"

Since the Blue Bonnet Cafe had no customers there was plenty of free time for my husband and me to devote the afternoons to doing fun things. He joined a baseball team from Glen Cove ... and I took up bycycle riding.

Every afternoon, my nephew, Eugene Willis would come to the cafe on his bicycle. We would then take it up to the empty space above the cafe. It was a very large space, with beams supporting the roof at appropriate places. Gene and I would take turns riding around and around the beams in a circle eight. It was great fun, but hardly a sufficient reason for Clebert to continue to pay rent on the place.

The Blue Bonnet Cafe, with us a managers, only stayed in business for one month. It was then Clebert decided to close the cafe and at that time he found a grocery store in Whon. And whom did he elect to run the small grocery store? None other than the newlyweds from New Mexico. But that is another story.

Watering Guide The type and slope of the soil, the fertilizer that is used, the amount of water needed by plants and grass, and the efficiency of the sprinklers affect when to water.

Soll Type

Lawns on sandy soil require more frequent watering than lawns on loam or clay soils. Water can be applied less often to clay and loam soils, but it should be applied more slowly to prevent runoff.

Slope

To avoid runoff on sloping areas, place sprinklers near the top of the slope. Apply water slowly for 5-15 minutes, off 15 minutes, on 5-15 minutes, etc., until the correct amount of water has been applied.

Fertilizer

A slow release nitrogen fertilizer helps plants use less water, and a lawn fertilizer with a 3-1-2 ratio of nitrogen (N) -phosphorus (P) -potassium (K), such as 15-5-10, is recommended to help grass withstand stress. Remember, each 100 lbs. of 15-5-10 fertilizer contains 15 lbs. of N, 5 lbs of P, and 10 lbs. of K. Fertilize lightly in the spring and again in early fall.

Trees, Shrubs, Groundcover

Established plantings do well in the summer when watered about once a week, especially if mulch and soil are placed around plants. Apply enough water to wet the soil to a depth of at least 12 inches. Flooding diked areas and using low output sprinkler heads, bubblers, or drip irrigation systems help prevent runoff.

New plantings require more frequent watering the first two years. Consider Texas-grown, drought-tolerant varieties, when purchasing new or replacement plants.

When to Water Grass

1.5 in/5 days

Most grasses take on a dull, dark appearance and leaves begin to roll when they need water. The best time to water is early morning.

How Much to Water

Apply enough to wet the soil to a depth of 4-6 inches. One to 1.5 inches of water is usually adequate. Use a soil probe or screwdriver to determine the depth the water actually reaches.

How to Water

1. Use a sprinkler that emits large drops of water that remain close to the ground, not one that sprays fine mist into the air.

2. Determine how much water your sprinkler applies:

Corpus Christi

.75 - 1 In/5 days

- A. Set 3 to 5 empty cans at different distances from the sprinkler with the last can near the edge of sprinkler coverage. B. Run the sprinkler for 30 minutes.
- C. Add the inches of water in all cans and divide the total inches by the number of cans to obtain an average.
- D. Multiply the average by 2 to determine how many inches of water are applied in 1 hour.

3. Locate your area on the map to find out how many inches of water to apply every fifth day to bermudagrass during June, July, and August. Buffalograss needs about 25% less water, and St. Augustine needs about 15% more. Subtract any rainfall from the amounts given on the map to determine how much water to apply.

One such woman is Mrs. Hardy (Mac) Blue of Santa Anna. She observed her 95th birthday on Monday, May 1. following a busy weekend with family and friends for celebration of the event.

Mrs. Blue was honored at the Sunday morning services at the First United Methodist Church where she is a long-time member, Sunday School teacher and leader. Church members and family members paid tribute to her long and faithful service to the church and to the community, and a basket of flowers was presented to her in appreciation. In an earlier presentation, members of the Hays-Blue Sunday School Class gave her a gold engraved pendent. Mrs. Blue has been a teacher of the class for about 50 years, sharing teaching responsibilities with the late Annabelle Hays in earlier years and with Mrs. Gladys Hunter in later vears.

Mrs. Blue was not always a Methodist. She was one of eight children born of the late John A. and Lula (Richey) Allen in Goldthwaite, and was reared in the Baptist Church. It was many years later that she joined the Methodist Church where her husband was an active member.

Her first assignments were in rural Mills and Hamilton county schools, with the summers spent attending Howard Payne College. In 1916 she applied for a job in Santa Anna and was hired to teach sixth grade. She was familiar with this community, having visited here with relatives, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Robin, since a child.

"Miss Mae", as she was known to her students..and still is called today...married Hardy Blue, a young Santa Anna businessman, in 1921. Her teaching career was postponed fo a few years after the birth of the couple's first child in 1923. She later was a frequent substitute teacher in the local schools, and in 1925 taught high school math and English and was sponsor for the Class of 1926, which each year includes her at their annual class reunion.

From the late 1920's Mr. Blue worked with her husband at the family hardware store, with much time spent with church and school activities. She joined the Self Culture Club in 1922 and is still a member, having served in every office and twice as president. She was also a member of the Garden Club for several years. She is now a member of the Coleman DAR Chapter.

She was a teacher in the youth department of the Methodist Sunday School for many years until younger women of the church organized the Hays-Blue Class. Mrs. Blue has served on the administrative board and has been a member and leader in the Methodist Womens' organization.

After Mr. Blue's death in 1960, Mr. Blue continued to operate the hardware store until it was sold to the Galloway - Eubank families to become G & E Hardware Co about two years later.

Although Mrs. Blue has help with heavy housework, she lives alone and is in charge of her household. She frequently has lunch with other senior citizens at the Nutrition Center, enjoying the meal and visiting with friends. She also enjoys playing "Eighty-Four" with a

group of triends at Trickham when transportation is available, and misses frequent games with Santa Anna friends in past years, most of whom are no longer alive or able to take part.

In reminiscing about earlier times, Mrs. Blue recalled seeing Halley's Comet in the early 1900's. She and her sisters were awakened during the night by their mother to see the historic event. She recalls vividly the bright light and sweeping "tail" with flying sparks.

As a child of a Santa Fe Railway employee, Mae often made trips by train, and it was at the railroad crossing in Cleburne that she first saw an automobile. She describes it as a buggy with a motor, waiting for the passenger train to go by.

While attending Howard Payne College in July 1918, she and some college friends ran outside at the sound of motors and saw two airplanes overhead...her first sight of the World War I flying machines.

Looking back is not the style of this young-at-heart lady. She is enjoying the opportunities and plea-

sures of each day with family and friends.



Marketers In Our Mailbox: How They Find Us

If you're like me, your mailbox is filled with a growing number of catalogs and sales fliers. Maybe you bought a T- shirt by mail a while ago, and now you get a whole collection of clothing catalogs every week. It just goes to show you that sellers are getting better at finding likely buyers.

When I ask around, it's not hard to find friends who like to shop from home. But it's just as easy to find the ones who think "direct marketing" (as it's called) is nothing more than junk mail. Some think their privacy is being invaded. Others just want to have a say in the kind of sales offers they -- or their children -- see. Either way, good direct marketers are wise to do everything they can to pinpoint people who would be interested in their products, and to

avoid bothering those who aren't. I found myself wondering where direct marketers get lists of names to help them target mailings. How

do they find us? Well, I did some checking and here's what I found. Direct marketers get lists from a variety of places -- logs of licensed drivers and records of birth and marriage certificates, for example. (It's public information in most states -- you or I can look it up if we want.) Also. sellers of similar products often make extra money by renting lists

of their own customers to each other. In addition, credit bureaus and other firms have huge, computerized files of data collected

from assorted forms we've filled out (loan applications, etc.) or information about us that our creditors gave them. I found out these companies can't sell or even give away credit information about us to just anyone who asks. It's against the law. It must be

someone like a bank or employer, and even then only when we're applying for a loan or job.

But these companies can tell their computers to pick out people with similar credit habits or histories and to put them on a list. Then they rent the lists to firms that sell things by mail.

I was concerned that if my name was on one of these lists, my buying habits and how often I use a credit card would be there, too. Not so. It's names and addresses, and everyone on the list has something in common with me. It could be that we all have a certain credit card or earn a certain amount of money. In any case, it's some- thing the list renter thinks makes us more likely to buy the product or service being offered.


But maybe you don't want your name on these lists. What can you do? First, you can write your electric company, lenders and other companies and ask them not to give your name to direct marketers. Also, if you write the Direct Marketing Association, they'll have their members take you off their mailing lists. After all, nobody wants to spend money to tell you about an item that you simply won't buy. But maybe you want

more direct mail. Well, they can take care of that, too. You can write the DMA Mail Order Preference Service at 6 East 43rd Street, New York, N.Y. 10017.



High School **Cheerleaders To Sponsor Funtier** Day "Fun-Run"




