Community Joins Red Ribbon Campaign

You have seen your neighbors and business people around town sporting red ribbons this week.

At a School assembly Monday every student in the Santa Anna schools were given red ribbons to wear in support of a drug free society. The focus was on drug awareness during the assembly and it was announced there will be speakers, who are recovered drug abusers, in the schools next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday to alert the students of the dangers and long term effects of drug and alcohol use and how to obtain help if already addicted.

"Join Me, I'm Drug Free" is the slogan for the Red Ribbon Campaign taking place in communities across the state this week. Participants are wearing red ribbons to indicate they pledge to stay drug free and to encourage others to do the same. Those wearing the ribbons are not only saying "Just say no to drugs" but are also telling others they are willing to help them to say no also.

The activities are part of the National Red Ribbon Campaign and conducted by county societies and auxiliaries of the Texas Medical Association (TMA) and its auxiliary in cooperation with the Texans War On Drugs.

The Red Ribbon Campaign originated in California after federal agent Enrique Camarena was murdered by drug traffickers in 1985. It was expanded nationwide last year by the National Federation of Parents for Drug Free Youth. The ribbon became a symbol to reduce the demand for drugs, just as the yellow

ribbon symbolized hope for the release of the hostages in Iran.

In an effort to open the eyes of youth to the adverse affects of alcohol and drug abuse. Two recovered addicts from Dublin recovery Centers, in Dublin, Tex. last week presented a film to six classes of the Cooperative Alternative Program, located at the old Centennial school site.

Telling his story to the C.A.P. students, Johnny Wright, 27, told

Wesley Myron Hays of Novice, a member of the Santa Anna High School graduating class of 1939, is named to be honored as "Ex-Student of the Year" during the Ex-Student Association Homecoming to be held here in Santa Anna Friday and Saturday. He will be recognized at halftime of the football game Friday night and again at the business meeting Saturday morning.

Born at Novice September 1, 1922 to the late Pitzer and Mary Hays, he received his primary education at Novice and attended Santa Anna High School, graduating in 1939. He attended Allen Academy and Texas A&M University.

Hays joined the U.S. Naval Air Corps in 1942 and received his wings in Corpus Christi in 1943. He served in the Pacific Theater in World War II, aboard the Air Craft Carrier Intrepid as a fighter pilot. He retired from the Navy as a commander in 1961.

He owned and operated the Western Auto and True Hardware Store in Winters from 1948 to 1988. He served as a city councilman at

Winters and also as Mayor. He was named "Man of the Year" at Winters in 1967. He also served on the Winters school board for 9 years. He is a past president of the Winters Lions Club and Elm Creek Water Board and served as Secretary-Treasurer of the Salvation Army. He was appointed by the Governor

of Texas to serve on the Runnels County Water Authority. He also served on the administrative board of the First United Methodist Church of Winters for many years and 25 years as Scout Master and Advisor. He was a member of the board of directors of the Winters Chamber of Commerce for several

years. He is a Mason and a member of the San Angelo Commandry. Now retired, he makes his home on the family farm near Novice.

He is married to the former-June Kirkpatrick, also of Santa Anna. The couple were married in 1943 at Pensacola, Florida. They are the parents of 4 children, Wesley Hays, Jr. of Miles, Michael Hays of Houston, Marsha Simmons of Ballinger and Chris Derrick of Corsicana.

Elizabeth Mae (Dean) Steele of Grandbury has been chosen "Coming Home Queen" for the Ex-Student Association Homecoming and will be recognized at halftime of the Friday night football game. She will also be introduced during the business meeting on Saturday morning.

Beth was born in Coleman September 22, 1950. Her parents are Rodney Dean and Sybil (Fellers) Dean Eubank.

Beth was raised in Rockwood and attended Santa Anna Schools, graduating with the class of 1969. During high school Beth was manager for the girl's basketball team, was involved in FHA, Annual Staff where she served as photographer, Librarian's Club, and Band, serving as Band Captain and twirler. She was named prom queen her senior year and runner-up for most beautiful girl in Santa Anna High School. During her last two years of high school, she worked as a nurses aide at Ranger Park Inn Nursing Home.

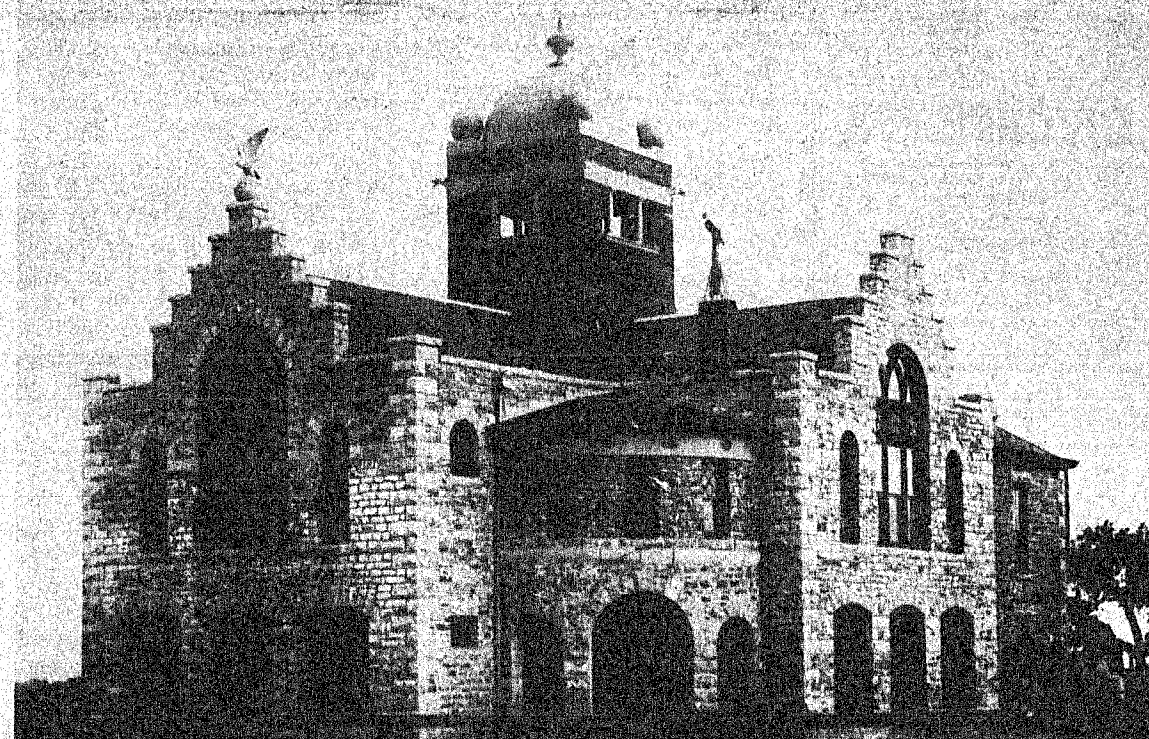

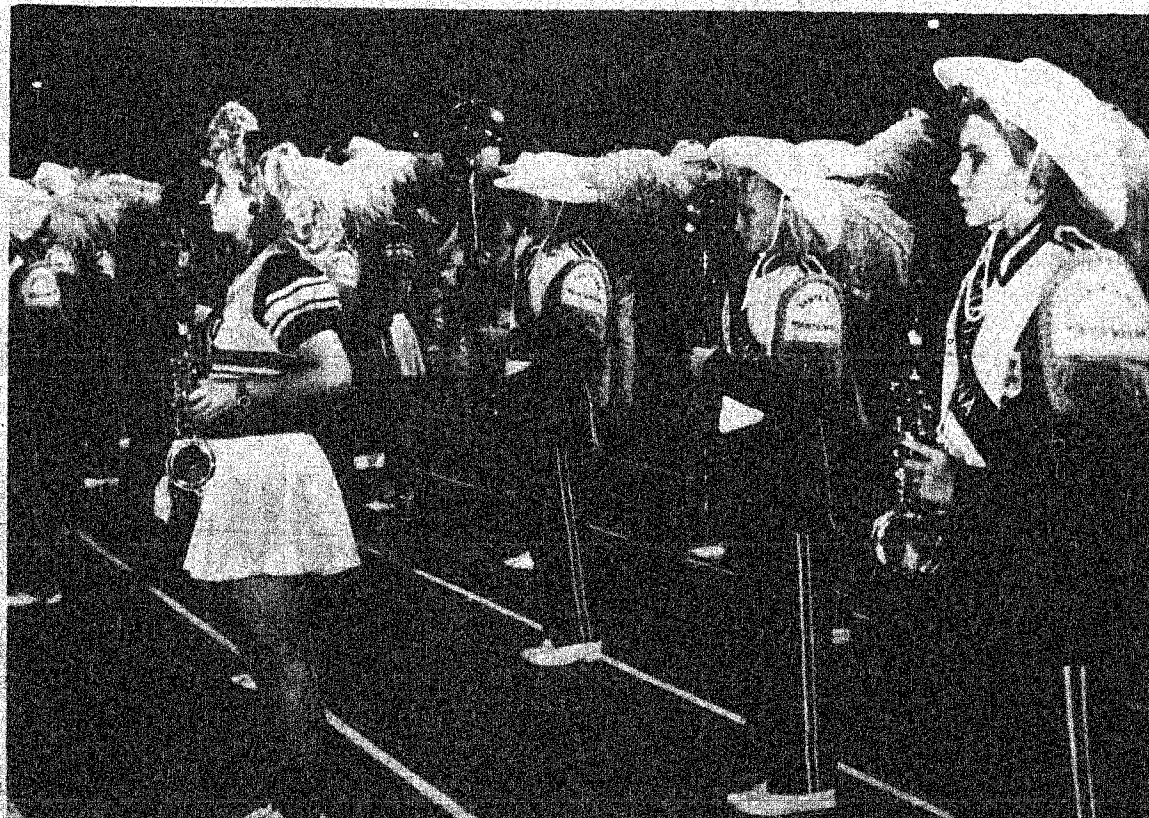
During the summers, Beth is a busy mother with children participating in little league, softball, and Little Dribblers Basketball.

She has expressed her appreciation at being chosen for this honor and is very excited about seeing old friends and classmates during the Homecoming festivities.

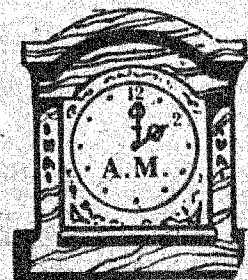


THE SANTA ANNA SCHOOL IN 1906-07: Pictured is the Santa Anna school building as was in 1906-07, located where the armory now stands. According to the late historian, Leona Bruce, probably the first school in Santa Anna was taught in the farm home of Mrs. J.H. Austin, probably to educate her only child, Gertrude. The children who were near enough to walk there were fortunate to have the influence of this cultured woman who lived on a farm more than a mile from town. The first school in town was a one room structure about a half mile southeast of the stores of that time. In 1884 there was a small school about 14 feet square. It was added to and made

about 36 ft. by 16 ft. and was at the location where the building above was situated. In 1887 more room was needed and another frame building was erected. A Mr. Hackney was employed to teach and the building became known as the "Hackney Annex" The first stone Building consisted of four rooms, (two upstairs and two down) and cost \$4000.00. It was known as the "college". In 1904, six rooms were added. The ornate facade was later removed and the building enlarged to become a square stucco structure. It was used until the late 1940's. Santa Anna was classified as a first class school in 1911 and was fully accredited by the universities of the state in 1914.

Acts Chapter 3:1-10:

"Now Peter and John went up together into the Temple at the hour of prayer, being the ninth hour. 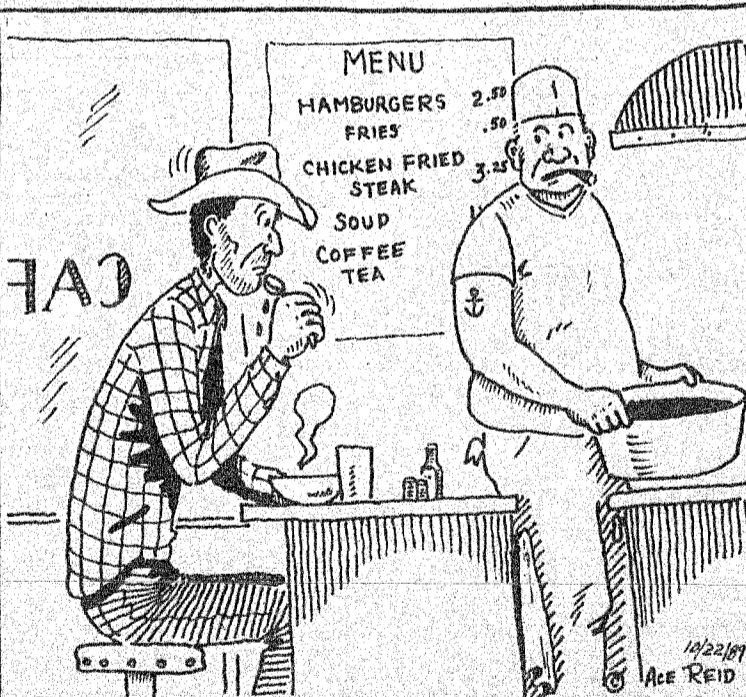

Mountainside Viewpoint

That Mountaineer Spirit Is Alive

Welcome to all ex-students and guests who will be in town for this weekend's activities of the SAHS Ex-Student Association Homecoming.

When considering what this event means to the ex-students and to the current students of SAHS, I began to think about the characteristics of our school mascot, "The Santa Anna Mountaineer". It comes to mind that the rugged Mountaineer we took for our school symbol so many years ago was probably very strong, courageous, loyal and fearless, strongwilled, and dauntless.

Well, to you ex-students, we say that we have seen those virtues displayed in a very real way just recently among some of our young Santa Anna Mountaineers.

As a way of explaining what I am talking about, I invite you to read the following from an article written by Bill Hart of the Abilene Reporter News after Santa Anna's recent win over Miles in their first district football game, Friday, October 13. The story goes like this:

Johnny and Michael Betts played their best football of the season Friday night when Santa Anna upset pre-season District 15-A Miles.

And had Charles Betts, their father, been there, he would have been proud of their performance.

But Charles was there only in spirit. He died in Dallas early Thursday morning, awaiting surgery.

A truck driver, Charles became ill returning from a trip to Cali-

fornia on Aug. 22 and stopped off at an emergency room at a Lubbock hospital. The next day he was moved to a Brownwood hospital then two weeks ago was transferred to the Veterans hospital in Dallas where he died from pancreatitis.

At first, Charles' illness was not thought to be life-threatening, but the family was told last week that he was critical.

"Charles had been an all-state football player at Seymour and later in the Marines, but he didn't finish high school," Mrs. Betts said. "So he wanted the boys to do well in school, make good grades and play sports to enjoy it."

Johnny and Mike played Friday night because they felt that is what their father would have wanted.

"One of his last thoughts to them was to stay in school and do the best in everything they tried," Mrs. Betts said. "He was a firm believer in the ones left should go on living. "We had gone through a similar situation two years ago when Charles' mother died, and he told the boys to play and that life had to go on."

Johnny, a senior quarterback, rushed for 111 yards on 15 carries and scored on a 57-yard run in a 20-0 win over previously undefeated Miles. Mike, a senior half-back, rushed for 63 yards on 11 carries.

"I know it fired up the team when the other players saw them show up. They knew what both had gone through, and it gave us the inspiration to go out and play well," said coach Doug Dallas.

"I had talked with the boys before the game. I knew how much the boys loved their dad, and that now he had the best seat in the house for this game.

"Charles was really interested in the boys and he wanted them to do well. He'd come up to school when he was in town and ask about their progress."

A third brother, Doug, a freshman, played in the junior varsity game Thursday night and admitted afterwards that he looked

into the stands where his dad would have been.

But Charles hadn't seen any of his sons play a game this year.

Mike, whom his mother says is easily upset, said he felt a little tension before the game, but not during.

"I tried to block it out, but it got to me after the game," he said. "I played because I knew if I had missed, he would have been upset. "It was kinda difficult for me to go on the field. At first, I didn't want to, but that didn't last long."

"There were times in that span where we couldn't work out when Johnny wasn't there because our other quarterback (Buddy Hardin) was hurt," Dallas said. "We've had as many as five players out, and the game against Miles was the first time we've been healthy. It was like having a new team."

The teammates have rallied around the two brothers, who moved to Santa Anna from Rochelle last spring. Johnny was voted one of the captains.

"They're good kids, fit right in and made friends easily," said Dallas, who has known the Betts for years, dating back to when both families lived in Eastland.

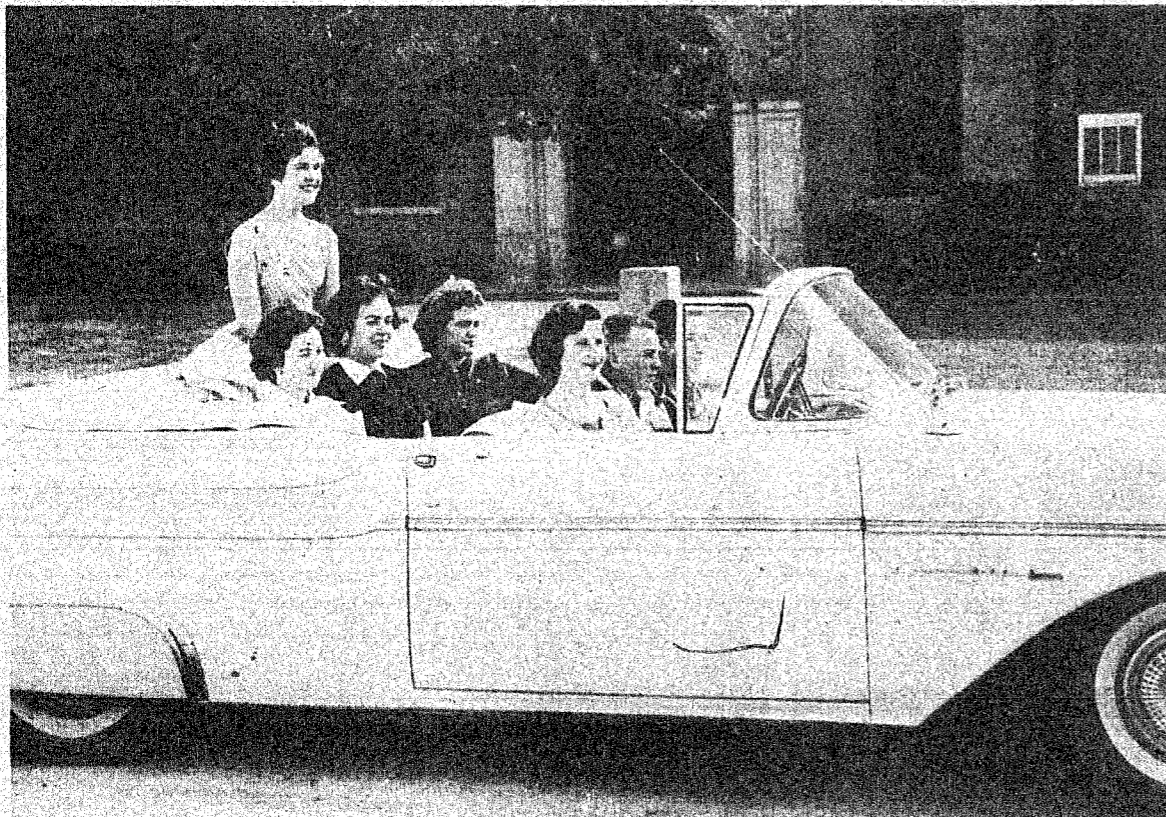

THICK TOENAIL (ONYCHOGRYPHOSIS)

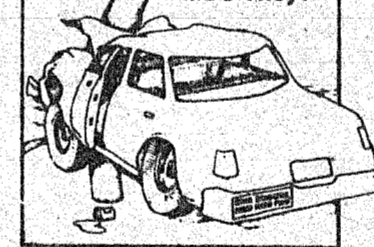
